City sets up contact system for off hours

The City of Clarendon is asking citizens not to call employees at home if there is a city-related emergency after business hours and on weekends.

Instead, citizens are asked to call the Donley County Sheriff's Department's non-emergency number - 874-3533 - for any issues, such as breaks in water or wastewater lines. The dispatcher will then call the appropriate on-call city employee.

Court hears pleas in several local cases

The 100th Judicial District Court heard two pleas resulting in deferred adjudications last Tuesday, November 16, in Clarendon.

District Attorney Luke Inman prosecuted the cases for the State of Texas with the Honorable Judge Stuart Messer presiding.

A total of \$5,000 in fines was assessed, and the defendants were also required to pay a total of \$1,072 in court costs.

April Nichole Ballard Randall was placed on probation for a period of two years for the third degree felony offense of retaliation. Randall pleaded guilty and was placed

on deferred adjudication for the offense.

Randall was arrested in Donley County for the offense that took place July 17, 2010, and was later indicted by the Donley County Grand Jury on October 27, 2010.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Randall is required to pay a \$2,000 fine to Donley County, and is also required to pay \$473 in court costs. If Randall violates probation, she could face up to 10 years in the Institutional Division of the TDCJ.

Jacob Israel Brashears was placed on probation for a period of three years for the third degree

felony offense of injury to a child. Brashears pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication for the offense.

Brashears was arrested in Donley County for the offense that took place October 31, 2009, and was later indicted by the Donley County Grand Jury on October 27, 2010.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Brashears is required to pay a \$3,000 fine to Donley County, and is also required to pay \$599 in court costs. If Brashears violates probation, he could face up to 10 years in the Institutional Division of the TDCJ.

Also last week, the court met in Panhandle on Monday and heard seven pleas from across the district which resulted in six convictions and one deferred adjudication.

Out of the six convictions, five defendants were sent to the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. Three of those defendants were locals to the Texas Panhandle.

A total of \$16,500 in fines was assessed as a result of the pleas that took place on November 15. In addition to the fines, the defendants were required to pay a total of \$2,522 in court costs and \$420 restitution.

Mark Allan Linley was convicted and sentenced to six and one-half years in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. Linley was sentenced for the third degree felony offense of abandoning a child.

Linley, 52-year-old resident of Howardwick, was arrested in Collingsworth County by Deputy Vincent Marasco for the offense that took place on June 18, 2010.

"Deputy Marasco is a full-time deputy for Donley County and also assists Collingsworth County on a part-time basis," said Inman. "Mar-

Broncos fall to Seymour, 14-7

No other words fit so well in describing the Broncos' 7-14 loss to Seymour on Saturday in Lubbock than "heartbreaking." No one would have guessed the "Boys of Fall" would not still be playing football this week.

The Broncos' stellar season came to abrupt halt in the Area round of the playoffs ending a year that was one for the record books. It was the first time since 1981 that the Broncos were named District Champs and a win would have been the first time since 1972 that the Broncos made it past the second round. But it wasn't their day.

The Panthers may have won on the scoreboard, but the Broncos reestablished their position in 1A football as a team to not be taken lightly. Game after game this season the Broncos proved they could play

with the best of them after posting only two losses overall.

"Our expectations were high for this game," head coach Gary Jack said. "We felt we were ready and had a great week of practice. We expected a tough game, and that's exactly what it was. I'm still trying to figure it out."

Jack felt the Broncos were not as sharp as they had been. Several things could have played a part in the loss, but Jack is not making excuses. There was a lot of emotion running through the team and things just really didn't click the way they had been, Jack said.

Defensively, the Broncos played outstanding, but offensively they could not get things going like they had in the past.

"It was a good defensive game," Jack said. "But offensively, the things we had been doing that

worked were not working for us. We could never get into a flow. The defense definitely dictated both sides of the ball. One or two plays either way could have changed the outcome of the game."

Jack gave Seymour credit. "They are a good team, and they played well," Jack said. "We didn't think anybody would slow us down and they did."

The Broncos' only score came on a four-yard run by senior Chris Crump with Johnny Gaines kicking the extra point. Clarendon racked up 249 total yards and was virtually even with Seymour in the stats book. With less than 30 seconds left in the game, the Broncos were moving the ball down the field and had a chance to tie the game at 14 all. But the Panthers intercepted a Gaines pass on the nine-yard line and ran the clock out.

Despite the loss, the Broncos had a great year and Coach Jack is extremely proud of them.

"I will miss the seniors," Jack said. "They played hard and were great leaders. I'll have good memories of the entire team and the seniors. What a run these kids had this season."

Jack knows there is good talent coming up.

"We have a bunch of kids returning, and they have big shoes to fill."

The Bronco underclassmen will be ready come fall; ready to rewrite the record books once again.

The senior Broncos are Johnny Gaines, Mike Crump, Chris Crump, David Roberts, Bradley Watson, Brayden Phillips, R.J. Nino, John Levario, Daniel West, Coby Braughton, Trent White, Clayton Shields, and Monty Holland.

Calls for ambulance service rising

A recent increase in ambulance calls has the Associated Ambulance Authority baffled as to the cause.

In 2004, the highest number of monthly calls was 49. This year, the highest number is 96 calls in September, and there are two other months that have received 95 calls.

"We've never seen this much activity," Ambulance Administrator Anna Howard said. "We've steadily crept up on our number of calls, but nothing like this year. For unknown reasons, this year has had an amazing jump."

According to Howard, there are a few more medical calls than trauma, but on average they are the same.

"We don't have a good explanation because it's not all one thing," Howard said. "Our car accident calls have actually decreased since I came here in 2002. We see all sorts of different medical issues, like strokes and heart attacks as well as trauma, so it's hard to pinpoint what the

problem is."

The average age of the patients varies as well.

"Some wonder if the increase has to do with the higher elderly rate in Donley County, but some of these patients aren't elderly," Howard said. "The average age of the patients is pretty much even because there is the same amount of people in each group."

The majority of the calls are from Donley County citizens.

"We don't get that many calls from people out of town or just passing through," Howard said. "In fact in October, we had 56 calls from Donley County citizens and 17 from non-citizens. We thought that was impressive."

One hypothesis Howard has is that people are putting off going to their primary physician.

"They wait until they start feeling really bad and then finally call the ambulance."

The amount of calls frequently requires two ambulances running.

"We're definitely staying busy,"

Howard said. "We are fortunate to be able to run two ambulances in Donley County because a lot of small places are struggling to actually get a crew for their ambulance. We staff two trucks 24/7 with personnel, and with the increased calls we even have to staff a third truck at times, but it hasn't affected the payroll yet."

The two brand new ambulances received in March already have 24,000 miles on them.

"The old ambulances we replaced got 8.6-9.0 miles per gallon, while the new trucks get 10.9 so that's good," Howard said.

"We hope to keep these ambulances until they get at least 300,000 miles on them."

Howard said the biggest issue with the increased calls is the fuel cost.

"We are still in budget as far as fuel, but if it keeps up like this I'm sure we'll be over it soon," she said. "We'll be \$4,000-\$5,000 over the

fuel budget if we keep up with the call volume of 80-90 calls a month."

The amount of calls has not affected the care patients receive, though.

"We have a great crew," Howard said. "If we need a third crew, someone is always going to be there. We

have enough people willing to serve the community as EMTs who will even on the rare occasion act as a first responder when all three ambulances are out to provide immediate emergency care until one of our ambulances arrive. To me, that's unheard of in a rural community."

Hearing draws no comments

CHILDRESS - A public hearing was held Tuesday, November 16, 2010 at the Childress Fair Park Auditorium, regarding the proposed plan for construction projects in the Texas Department of Transportation's Childress District.

TxDOT invited residents and local officials in Wheeler, Collingsworth, Childress, Hall, Donley, Briscoe, Dickens, King, Knox, Foard, Motley, Cottle and Hardeman counties to make public comments pertaining to the Childress District FY 2011-2014 Rural Transportation Improvement Plan.

No comments were made at Tuesday's meeting, which Director of Transportation Planning and Development Marty Smith said isn't unusual.

"We usually have a very small group, if any," Smith said. "I think people don't feel as if they have any input on the rural plans."

A copy of the plan can also be found at txdot.gov/business/governments/stips.htm. The document includes details for seal coating and overlay projects on state highways in Donley County and replacement of two bridges in Clarendon - one on Seventh Street at the City Park and another on Rosenfield Street.

"All projects have funds obligated to cover the cost from the state and federal levels, and most of these projects are for preservation sake," Smith said. "With our limited funds, we're just trying to hold the system together."

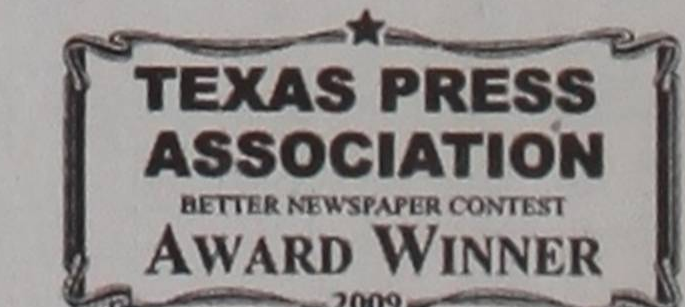

Less government, more responsibility

Whenever government has one of those supposedly non-partisan panels look into an issue they invariably decide we need more government. The solution is never that politicians have made a mess of things and we should dismantle the bureaucracy.

Government does nothing well. We have lousy schools, roads filled with potholes, a military engaged in unwinnable wars, a bankrupt Social Security system and a horrifying health care system.

I wouldn't trust the United States government to make me a peanut butter and jelly sandwich. After that simple request I'd likely end up with Congressional hearings, a special prosecutor, three years of delays, a \$3 billion bill and no sandwich.

This makes it all the more shocking that the public continually turns to slight variants of this broken system. The Republicans won't be any better than the Democrats a fact proven by history, reinforced by our willingness to repeat history.

Fixing our economy, schools, roads and everything else requires a radically different approach. We need to stop moving three degrees to the right then two degrees to the left. Instead, we need serious, uncomfortable change that blows up the existing system. I'll boil it down to two key platform points that will bring everything else into line.

First, we need to eliminate our absurdly complicated punitive tax code and replace it with a flat tax. Let's call the first \$20,000 an individual makes or the first \$45,000 a family with kids

makes tax free.

If you're a family making less than \$45,000 a year, the last thing you need is Uncle Sam taking a piece of the pie and you'll only need him to give you some of it back in entitlement programs. If you actually had the money you earn there would be less need for those programs and we're well on our way to making government smaller.

Any income above those amounts will be taxed at a flat rate. Every person, rich or middle class, will pay the same percentage dollar for dollar. There will be no deductions and we won't be taxed twice. That means we stop taxing inheritances and corporate profits.

Any money in an estate was already taxed and corporate profits should go to shareholders, business owners and business leaders as taxable income. The government still gets its cut, but they should not get to take a slice off the top and then another when the cash actually makes it into your pocket.

The second piece of my platform will be decidedly unpopular, but it cuts to the core of our economic problems. It should be considered child abuse to knowingly have a child you cannot provide basic food, shelter and clothing for.

I'm not talking about the person who has a kid then loses his job or falls upon hard times. These are the people we need to help get back on their feet, because circumstances kicked them in the teeth — they did not knowingly create a life they could not provide for.

I'm instead referring to the unemployed teenagers and the people who barely have a roof over their own heads

who somehow decide that having a bunch of kids makes total sense. Having a child is a responsibility, not a right. If you can't reasonably be expected to meet that responsibility you are committing a crime against that child and society in general.

If you bring home a puppy that you can't afford to feed, you will get arrested for animal cruelty. Do the same repeatedly with children and you get some of my money. It's an absurd double standard built out of the notion that everyone has the "right" to have children and we're racists/class snobs if we declare otherwise.

Cut the number of kids that the public has to pay for because their birth parents can't support them and we pretty much solve all of our problems. The schools become less crowded, our healthcare system becomes less taxed, crime goes down and "Maury" gets cancelled.

Our society should have a safety net for bad luck and unforeseen circumstances. We should not, however, be paying for other people's willful, repeated decisions to do things they can't actually pay for.

What we're doing doesn't work. It's time for something different. No more commissions, no more bipartisan panels and, please, no more studies. We need fair, logical solutions built on personal responsibility.

Congress must cut its spending

Republicans in the House and Senate recently took an historic step and voted to support a moratorium on Congressional earmarks. I supported this effort because it will give Congress the opportunity to make our nation's budget process more transparent and accountable, and it will allow us to focus on cutting spending.

As the elected representative of the people of Texas in the United States Senate, in addition to serving our national interests, I have been charged with protecting our state and keeping Texas taxpayers on an even playing field with others. And, in the process of fulfilling that duty, I have fought hard to bring federal resources to projects that have been prioritized by communities in Texas and where there is a national service.

At Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio, I was able to direct spending to build up infrastructure so it could attract a new mission; that made it attractive when the Army decided to move its headquarters for Army South Command. Both Fort Hood and Fort Bliss were once in danger of being diminished or closed, but now, thanks in no small part to our ability to direct federal resources, they are two of the largest and most important training installations in America. Administration decisions to shutter these bases with their unusually large land space for training would have been very detrimental to the requirements we need today but were unanticipated at the time.

Congressionally-directed support to significantly deepen and widen the Houston Ship Channel is ensuring the Port of Houston remains competitive with ports around the world. Through Congressional designations, I have been able to help Houston Metro and DART get robust mass transit systems up and running, allowing our metropolitan cen-

ters to operate on par with other major cities across the nation that have received federal support.

There are scores of other initiatives that have been equally important to communities across Texas, and I believe that by supporting them, I have done the right thing for our state, its citizens, and our servicemen and women — and helped create jobs for Texans that contribute to the economic prosperity of America. Without our Congressional delegation prioritizing Texas, much of this would not have been achieved.

But, the fact is that overall government spending is out of control and our focus must be to cut spending across the board.

On November 2, American voters sounded a clarion call against President Obama's big government agenda — particularly the massive health care reform bill, the stimulus, his agencies' overregulation, and his continual push for more deficit spending. Voters are demanding that Congress get the nation's financial house in order, and Republicans are willing to take steps large and small to achieve results.

However, our reform efforts in Congress will be inconsequential if we aren't also stringently overseeing executive branch earmarks. If Congress does not direct any spending, the president will have total discretion over all federal programs. The president will set all the priorities for spending our taxpayer dollars.

In just two years, the Obama Administration has proven to be a poor and partisan steward of funding. The

\$800 billion so called "stimulus" — allocated solely at the discretion of the Obama Administration — is teeming with examples of waste and abuse. Some standout projects include \$3.4 Million to the Florida Department of Transportation to build an "Eco-Passage" to allow turtles to safely cross under a roadway; \$450,000 for 22 concrete toilets in the Mark Twain National Forest; \$325,000 to study the mating decisions of female cactus bugs; \$300,000 to buy a helicopter equipped to detect radioactive rabbit droppings; and \$500,000 to study the impact of global warming on wildflowers in Colorado. Further, it has been reported that, on average, Democratic Congressional districts received 81 percent more stimulus funds than Republican districts.

Unelected bureaucrats and political appointees in Washington are not accountable to the people. They should not be empowered to arbitrarily distribute taxpayer dollars with little or no intimate knowledge of a state, district, or community's need — or worse, guided by a political agenda that will serve some and neglect others. States like Texas could be severely impacted if the Obama Administration has complete control over agency budgets.

Thus, it is critical that we eliminate the waste and abuse of earmarks both in Congress and the executive branch, and Republicans are trying to start the process of reform that is essential to address the crushing national debt.

The best way is to set spending caps at 2008 levels. At a recent meeting of Senate Republicans, I offered a resolution that was unanimously adopted to make it our policy to return all unspent stimulus funds. I will be working on this and other proposals to restore fiscal sanity in Congress.

also provides both counties with exceptional service.”

Linley was indicted by the Collingsworth Grand Jury on November 1, 2010.

After being indicted, Linley picked up another felony charge of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, a state jail felony offense, which was taken into consideration pursuant to his plea of guilty to the third degree endangering offense, according to Inman.

In addition to the sentence, Linley is also required to pay \$376 in court costs, and a \$1,000 fine to Collingsworth County.

Wade William Langenbacher was convicted and sentenced to 10 years in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. Langenbacher was sentenced for the second degree felony offense of possession of certain chemicals with intent to manufacture a controlled substance.

Langenbacher, 25-year-old resident of Channing, Texas, was arrested with three other individuals in Carson County by Panhandle Police Assistant Chief Taner Blackburn for the offense that took place on September 24, 2009.

“Taner [Blackburn] does excellent criminal interdiction work on our local highways,” said Inman. “This is one of several cases that Taner has made on Highway 60 where local drug dealers and traf-

fickers, as well as local methamphetamine cooks, have been taken off the streets and out of the community.”

The driver, Joshua Mullen, is currently serving shock probation in the Institutional Division of the TDCJ. The front-seat passenger, Christina Ann Mullen, pleaded guilty on January 4, 2010 and received six years in the Institutional Division of the TDCJ. Christi Thryselius-English, the back-seat passenger next to Langenbacher, is also currently serving in the Institutional Division of TDCJ for shock probation.

Langenbacher was indicted by the Carson Grand Jury on October 29, 2010.

Langenbacher’s case was not presented to the Carson County Grand Jury until October 29, 2010, due to the drug laboratory report not being finalized until September 21, 2010, according to Inman.

Langenbacher was the last of four defendants charged with possession of certain chemicals on the night of September 24, 2009, all three of which have done penitentiary time pursuant to pleas to an information.

In addition to the sentence, Langenbacher is also required to pay \$355 in court costs, and a \$2,500 fine to Carson County.

Jeffrey Joe Fisher pleaded true to the allegation listed in the State’s Motion to Revoke Community Supervision of Defendant and was convicted and sentenced to five

years in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Gene Maurice Massey was convicted and sentenced to six years in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice and eighteen months in the State Jail Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

David Allen Wade was convicted and sentenced to twelve years in the Institutional Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice. Wade was sentenced for the first degree felony offense of delivery of a controlled substance.

Steven Fitzgerald Streib was placed on probation for a period of five years for the first degree felony offense of possession of controlled substance. Streib pleaded guilty for the offense that took place on April 29, 2009 and was placed on deferred adjudication for the offense.

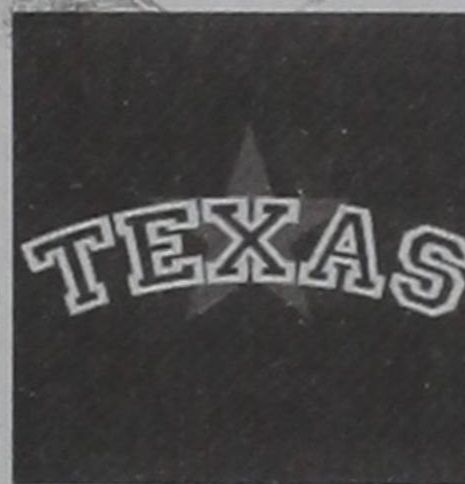

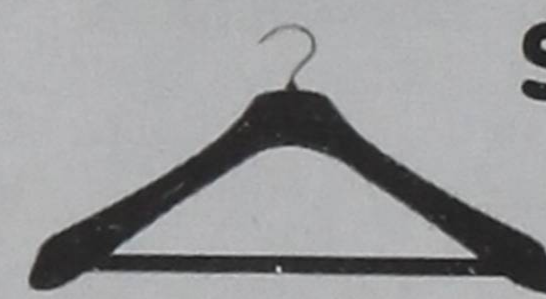

at Thriftway in Memphis and Saturday, December 11, at Lowe's in Clarendon.

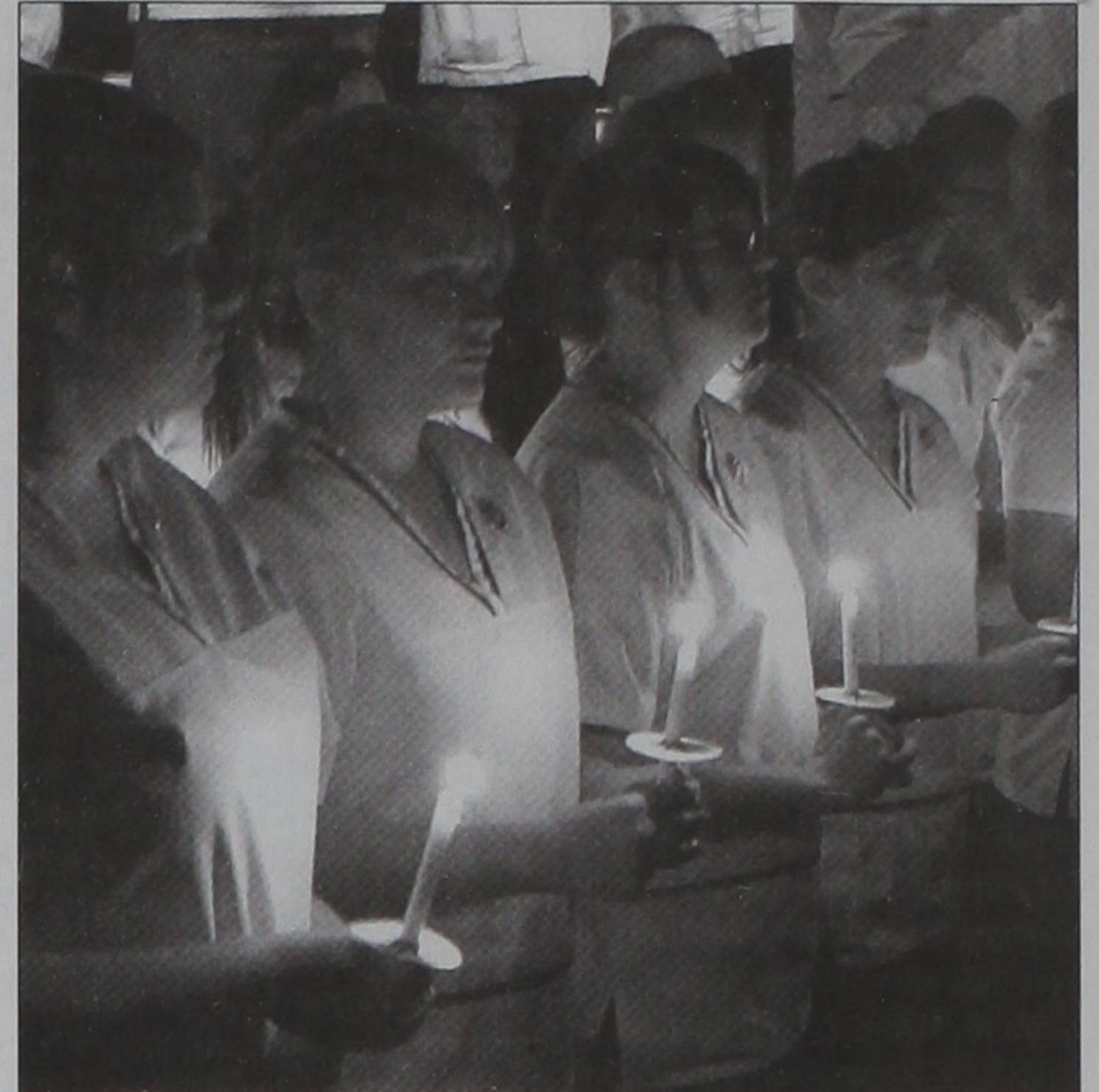

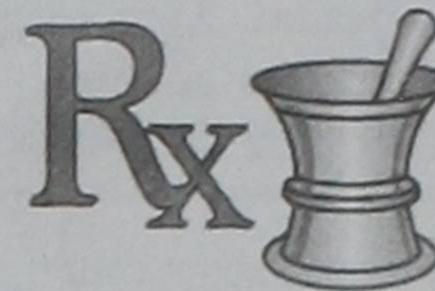

According to Lockhart, the Colts fell short defensively on Quannah's last possession.

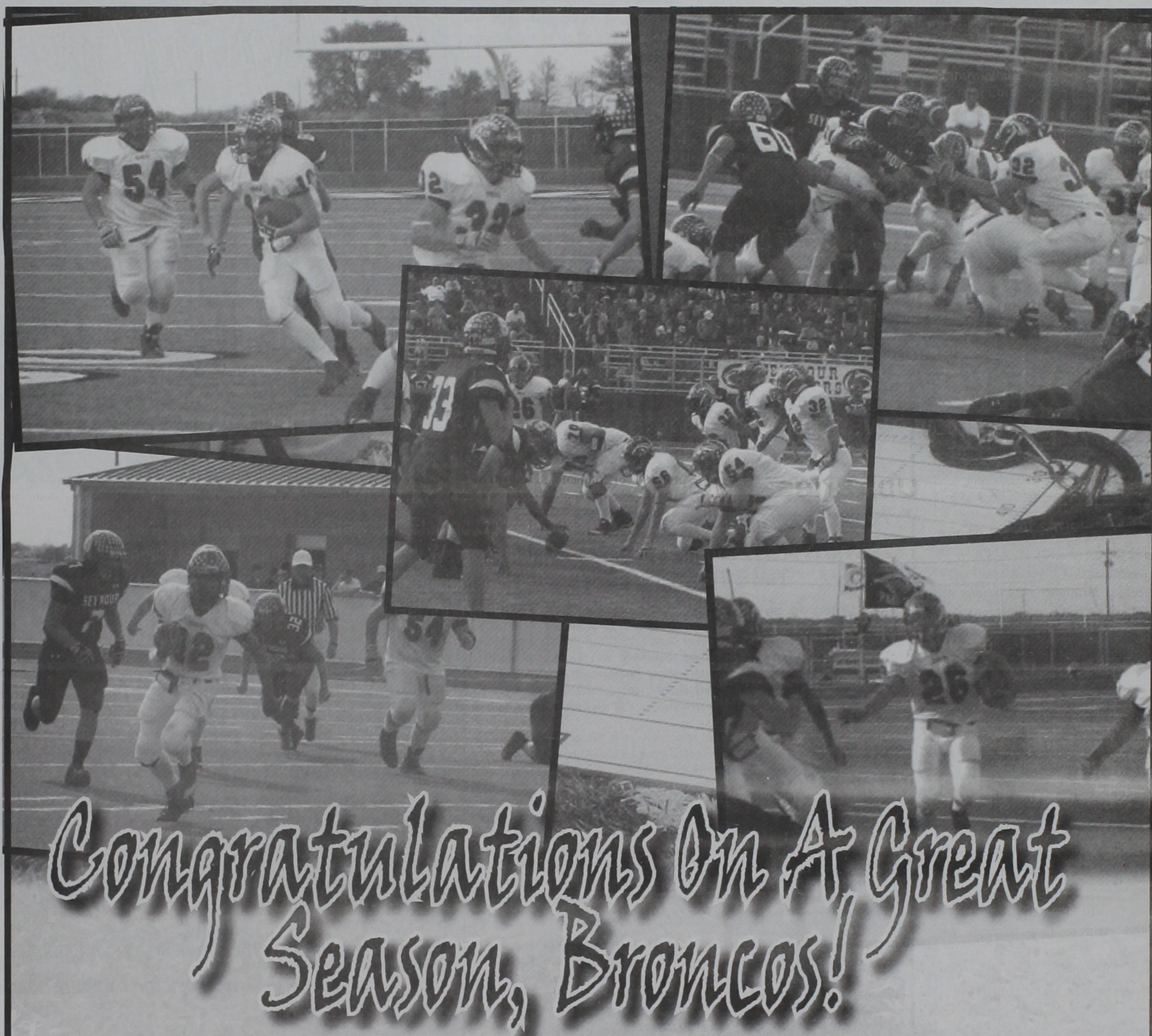
"We did a good job of coming back in the fourth quarter and taking the lead," Lockhart said. "We could not get a stop on their last possession.

CISD Board votes to purchase new bus

The Clarendon Consolidated Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session on November 15, 2010.

Superintendent Monty Hysinger presented a public report on the District and Campuses 2010-2011 Highly Qualified Teacher Status and percentage receiving high quality and professional development.

The board voted to accept the bid on tax delinquent property from David Caffereata on Lots 74-75, Cherokee, for \$1,200; and a bid on tax delinquent property from Merwin Clark, Lots 8-10, Block 147, OT, Clarendon for \$5,135.00.

Debbie Thompson, SHAC Chairperson, reported on the SHAC board discussion on bullying pre-

vention initiatives. Hysinger demonstrated how the online report form would work. Discussion was held with the board members about this topic.

Trustees approved a motion refunding lease purchase revenue bond series 2008 (the "project"); approving the reissuance of bonds by the Clarendon CISD Public Facility Corporation consenting to the execution and delivery by the corporation of all necessary and proper documentation in connection therewith; and authorizing other necessary actions relating thereto.

Hysinger presented the Region Tax Rate Survey for 2010. On the report, 9.6% of the Districts have the same tax rate as Clarendon; 77.42%

of the Districts have a higher tax rate than Clarendon; and 12.9% of the Districts have a lower tax rate than Clarendon CISD.

The board voted to purchase a 71-passenger school bus from Thomas Bus Gulf Coast for \$88,200.

Hysinger presented the OCR Report of Complaint investigation findings to the board.

It was determined that the district did no wrong doing in the complaint filed and that there was insufficient evidence to support the complaint. The complaint was closed.

Hysinger presented a report to the board about the Technology Mini Grant Applications received from the teaching staff.

BBB offers holiday shopping tips for Black Friday

Black Friday has traditionally been the biggest retail shopping day of the year, though last year, Cyber Monday – the Monday after Thanksgiving – officially replaced Black Friday as the most popular shopping day. Whether in the store or online, BBB has advice for your holiday shopping experience.

"Plan your time and budget wisely," said Janna Kiehl, CEO of the BBB. Set a realistic budget and stick to it. Making a list of the gifts you'd like to give helps avoid buying gifts that may be inappropriate or too expensive. Also:

- Comparison shop and carefully evaluate your purchase. This year, the buzz is about early holiday bargains and mark-downs, but approach them only after doing your homework in order to avoid paying too much.

- Get in the habit of asking for the store's refund and exchange policy. A store is not obligated to accept items for refund, exchange or

credit unless the item is defective or was misrepresented. Keep receipts until you know the gift won't be returned. Ask if there is a re-stocking fee.

- Be informed about your rights when placing orders through catalogs, mail order, TV shopping networks, and online venues. Additional information on mail and telephone order shopping is available from the Federal Trade Commission (www.ftc.gov). Ask about delivery times, delivery costs, and how returns are handled.

- If you're considering shopping on the Internet exercise the same care and judgment you would on Main Street. If you're not familiar with the online merchant or company, contact the BBB for a report. Know the web site's privacy policy before you place an order.

- Be on your guard at all times when shopping. Never leave your wallet, credit card, or purse on a counter. Don't get overloaded with

packages or lose track of your children if they're accompanying you. Shop with a companion or ask for a security escort to your car.

- Be cautious of free or very-low-price offers. Often, free offers are followed by an open-ended enrollment in a program that automatically bills your credit card account every month. Before ordering anything online, make sure you click on and read all terms and conditions.

- Give but give wisely. If you're approached in person for a donation, don't give if you're pressured or if the solicitor is vague.

Ask for written information to review. If the appeal is legitimate, your donation will be just as appreciated later.

"Ask for a gift receipt in order to avoid return problems," said Kiehl. "Also be aware of any sales that do not allow returns, such as 'all sales final' or special order merchandise.

Fill up on safety this Thanksgiving

The Department of Public Safety is urging Texas motorists to put safety first on the menu while traveling this Thanksgiving weekend.

"Texans should focus on arriving safely at their destinations and make sure this Thanksgiving is about making memories—not dealing with tragedy," said David Baker, assistant director in charge of Highway Patrol. "Impaired and reckless drivers are a given and motorists should take this into account and drive defensively."

To help target drunk drivers, speeders and seat belt violators, DPS and many other law enforcement agencies will be out in force in an attempt to save lives and keep the roads and highways safer.

During the long Thanksgiving holiday weekend last year, DPS troopers arrested 449 drunk drivers and wrote more than 10,000 speeding tickets. In addition, 820 seat belt and child restraint citations were issued.

DPS offers these tips for a happy holiday on the roadways:

- Don't drive drowsy; pull over or switch drivers if you need to.

- Slow down—especially in bad weather, construction areas and heavy traffic.

- Don't drink and drive; get a designated driver.

- Buckle up everyone in the vehicle.

- Keep cell phone chatter to a minimum, and don't text while driving.

- Make sure your vehicle is properly maintained.

- Don't give into road rage. Drive with courtesy; it's contagious.

DPS also is a participant in Operation CARE a nationwide effort by police agencies to reduce fatalities during holidays.
