

The first Pink Bollworm was discovered in Texas near an oil mill in Robinson County in 1917. Since then, it has become the greatest threat our cotton industry has ever faced, with 193 counties now under quarantine.

The worm comes from an egg laid by the moth on the cotton plant. The larva burrows into the fruit, square or boll and reaches maturity in 10 or 15 days.
