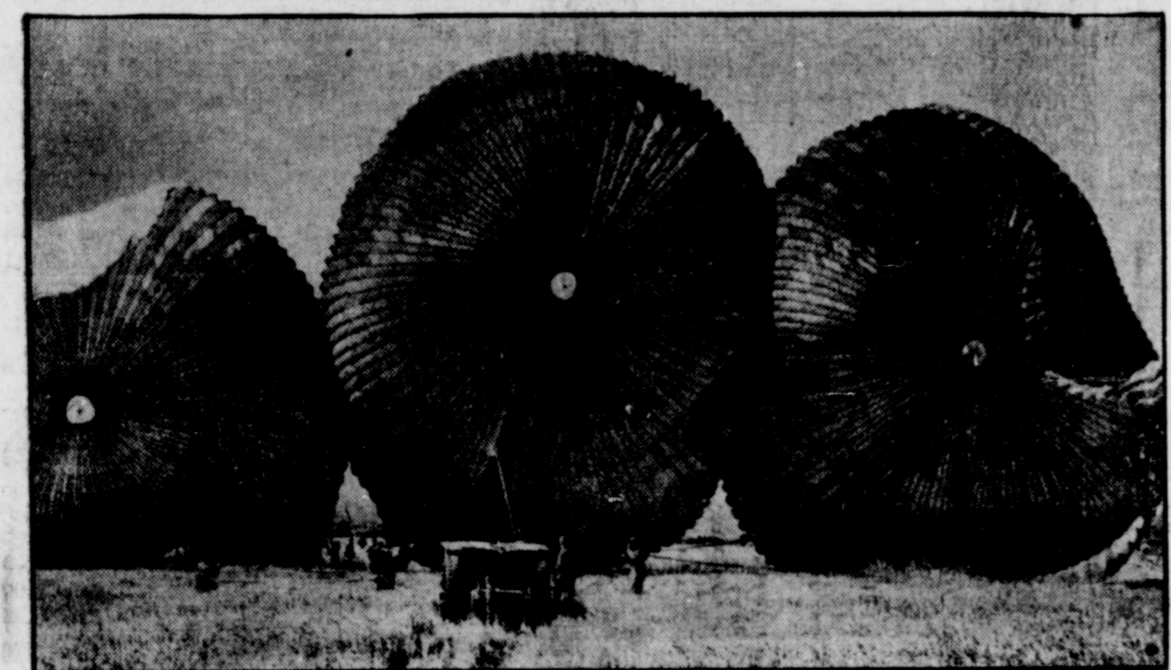

## 'Hopper Infestation Should Be Below Normal This Year

Reports from the department of entomology say the grasshopper infestation in this area this year should be below normal. H. M. Breedlove, county agent for Donley County says that poison is still on hand and in some areas there might be a small outbreak and where this is found the poison should be used when the hoppers are still in the hatch area. Early poisoning will keep the hoppers from spreading and when they are bunched at the hatching ground is sure the time to get them.

## George L. Green Is New Fire Marshall

Geo. L. Green has been appointed by City officials as the new Fire Marshall for Clarendon to succeed James Trent who resigned as Fire Marshall effective April 1st after 48 years service. Mr. Trent had to give up his position due to ill health. He organized the Clarendon volunteer Fire Department in 1904 and has been very active with the organization up until his health began to fail. He was also Fire Chief during this time up until 1942. ## C of C Committee Meeting Called For April 24th

Willard Skelton, General Chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Retail Trade Development and Promotions Committee has called a meeting of the Committee for Thursday night, April 24th at 8:00 P.M. The meeting will be held in The American Legion Hall.

"Our Committee has four main projects that need our immediate attention and consideration," Skelton said. "Next Thursday night we are going to consider (1) a town-wide retail sales promotion based on ideas expressed by local merchants, (2) the development of a solicitation control plan, (3) uniform closing hours for the businesses of Clarendon and (4) the creation of a WELCOME NEWCOMERS TO CLARENDON program," he continued.

Co-chairmen of the committee with Mr. Skelton are Bill Todd, Glenn Hoggatt, W. B. Smith, Alvin Landers and Homer Estlack. "Every business man in town should be interested in these four projects and everyone is extended a special invitation to attend and is being appointed a member of the committee," Bob Moss, C of C President said.

"This is the opportunity for the groceryman, the service station owner, the drygoods man, the druggist, the hardware man, appliance dealers and automotive and equipment dealers - - everybody in every kind of a store and service establishment, to meet and express their ideas as to how we can best accomplish these phases of the Chamber of Commerce program," Skelton concluded. "And we sure hope you will attend."

L. Jordan, Martin Community; Mrs. Van S. Knox, Ashitola; Miss Annie Reeves, Jericho; Mrs. D. M. Cook, Lelia Lake; and Mr. C. F. Hermsmeyer, Jericho. Chairmen for Hedley and McKnight will be announced later.

In announcing these appointments, Mrs. Lewis said, "These men and women will give their time and effort so that others may live. They have agreed to carry the cancer story to the citizens of their communities, and to help raise funds to carry on the American Cancer Society's programs of service to cancer patients, cancer education, and the research for a final solution to the causes and cures of this disease."

"The size of the job is indicated by statistics showing that cancer strikes one out of five Americans. It is estimated that 215,000 persons, among them more than 8,000 Texans, will die of cancer this year."

"Under the leadership of these men and women," she concluded, "Donley County's Cancer Crusade can be successful. Our people owe them their attention and support for their efforts in this great work."

## FOR BEST GARDENS USE FERTILIZERS SAYS COUNTY AGENT

Soon it will be time to start planting that spring garden and county agent H. M. Breedlove urges the use of commercial and barnyard fertilizers for the best production.

The garden should be planned for the needs of the family and for canning due to the high price of groceries. Good seed and a well prepared garden is the best way to get a good stand. Be sure to keep a sharp lookout for insects and control at an early stage will hold down spread of insects to other parts of the garden. You can obtain spraying charts and information from the office of the county agent.

### SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

"Don't stop too soon, but don't go too far," says John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo Social Security Office.

Sanderson's plea is directed to the bookkeeper who fills out quarterly social security wage reports. Top amount for one employee in a year used to be \$3000. Under the new law, the ceiling is \$3,600.

"Some firms still seem to be reporting no more than \$3,000 even when the worker is making more than that," says Sanderson.

"That's bad—a correction must be made or the worker doesn't get full social security credit."

"Other firms report more than \$3,600 in a year for one employee," states Sanderson. In these cases, as he pointed out, the firm, and perhaps the worker too, paid more than the required social security tax, but the worker can get old-age and survivors insurance wage credit only for \$3,600 in a year.

A representative from the Amarillo Social Security Office will be in Clarendon at the State Dept. of Public Welfare on Tuesday, April 22, at 9:00 A. M.

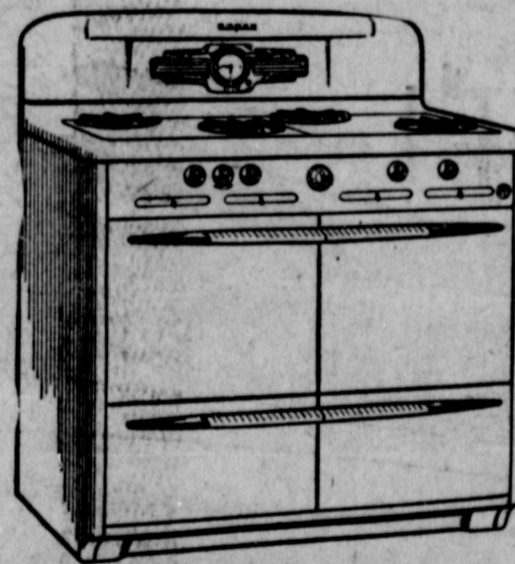

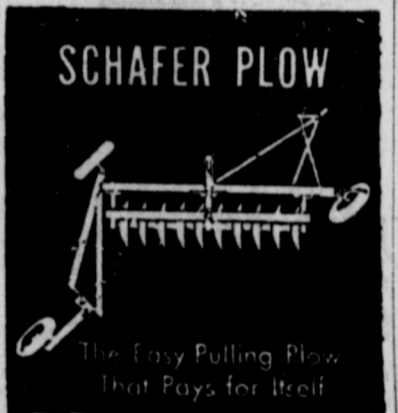

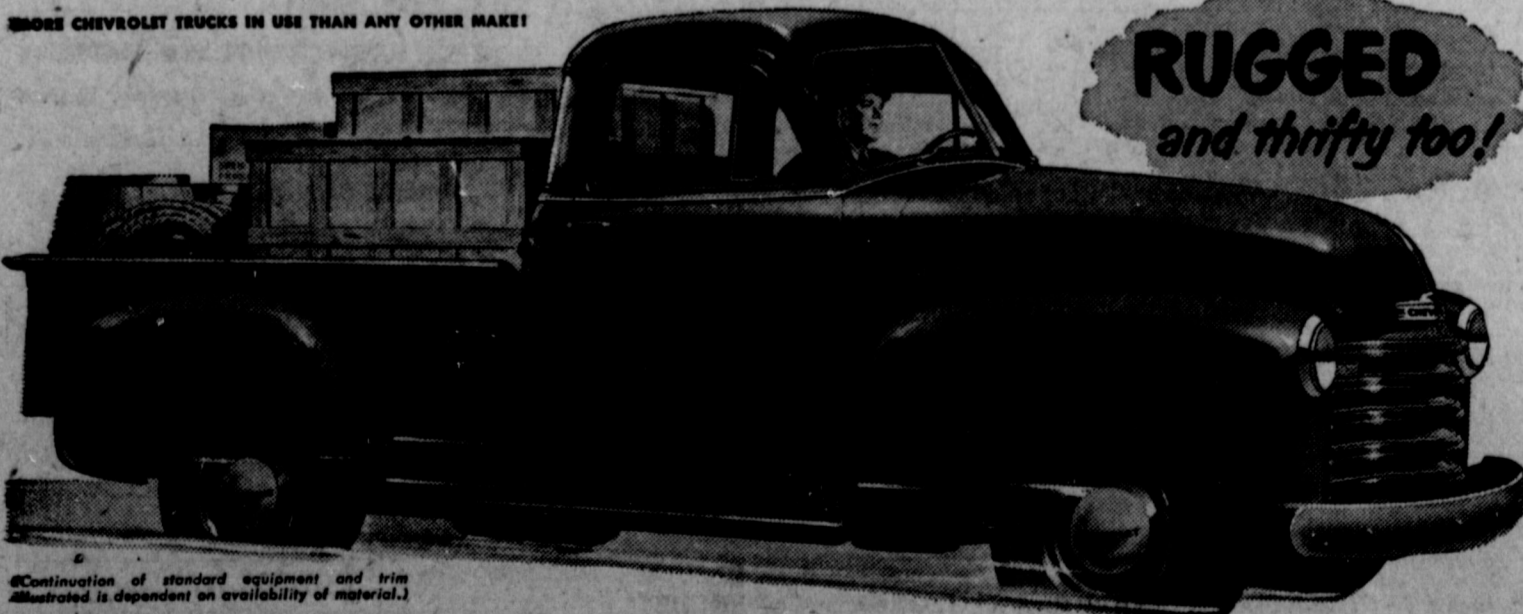

The trees are preaching! Let's listen! What is that twisted tree saying to you and to me? What is the second and smaller tree telling you of life, as it twists about the other? "Only God can make a tree"; but even God's purpose to make a strong and straight tree sometimes fails. Why did not this tree grow tall and upright and sturdy? Why ill-formed and crooked and misshapen?

And so are some of us. Why do not women and men grow upward toward God and the good? Why have lives become twisted and gnarled and unattractive? Has the tree a lesson for us here? The neglected child of the street or of the lane gets an early twist; the storm of human wickedness and evil is too great for the young life to take; he is subjected too early to the sights and sounds of the women and men who have wrecked themselves.

The pampered child of the foolish parent who is too busy or too careless to guide the developing spirit gets twisted too soon. There are rules that must be learned if one is to play the game of life successfully; there are good habits that must be formed under patient discipline and by good example.

The frightened child who has been compelled to listen to quarreling and scolding elders gets an unhappy fear and disrespect for human contact. He has a right to live in an atmosphere of patient good will and of forbearance, but he is misdirected by selfish and unkind words and deeds.

The sour and the surly children of loveless homes and communities bear the marks of misdirection forever; every child has need of love and kindness and justice and patient understanding; these make the healthful air of human development.

Prayer and reverence for God and the good, loving fellowship in ways of integrity and of helpfulness make the right soil for straight-growing persons. As the twig is bent, so grows the tree.

## Southwestern Associated Telephone Company Announces Plan To Change Name Soon

The name of Southwestern Associated Telephone Company will soon be changed to General Telephone Company of the Southwest, Roy Autry, president,

He added that this involved no change in the management or operations of Southwestern Associated.

The name changes will affect 12 subsidiary operating companies of the General Telephone System serving more than 1,435,000 telephones in 3600 communities from coast to coast. In each case, the new name will include the word "General". In an announcement made in

New York at the same time, Donald C. Power, president of General Telephone Corporation, explained that the purpose of the changes was to achieve uniformity and to make General Telephone System better known to the investing public. Mr. Power pointed out that, although the System is one of the nation's largest public utilities, with plant in operation of about a third a third a billion dollars, the name "General Telephone" is known to relatively few people other than the parent company's 25,000 stockholders.

"Our subsidiaries, comprising the largest independent (non-Bell) telephone organization in the United States, operates in 19 states and serve areas with an estimated population of more than 5,500,000," Mr. Power said. "These companies are well known in their respective territories and it is hoped that, by identifying them with General Telephone, this recognition will benefit the System as a whole." "This added recognition is important to us, particularly now that we are in the midst of a heavy construction program. Since World War II, System com-

panies have added 732,000 telephones through internal growth and acquisition, an increase of 105 per cent. This has required new capital in excess of \$175,000,000. In 1951 alone, the parent company and its subsidiaries sold a total of over \$60,000,000 in new securities and similar yearly construction and financing programs will be required for years to come in order to meet the continuing demand for telephone service.

"General Telephone has always been successful in selling its securities," Mr. Power said. "However, it is generally accepted as a fact that well-known companies are able to attract new capital more readily and at a lower cost than companies which are little known."

"I would like to point out again that in no way will our name change to General Telephone Company of the Southwest affect any of our present plans," said Mr. Autry. "Since the war we have expanded our operation rapidly and there seems to be no let up in this development. A large number of our telephone exchanges have been converted to dial operation and we are continually moving ahead to meet the growing demand for telephone service. During 1952, our construction budget has been planned for an estimated \$7,000,000 program."

Mr. Autry went on to point out that his Company is presently issuing Preferred Stock securities to help finance this major expansion and construction project. As in the past, the Company is hav-

ing considerable success in attracting favorable interest in its securities.

It is expected that all of the name changes will take place during the next year. In each case, the change will be made as soon as it is most convenient.

### FARM NEWS

From the County PMA Committee

#### RYE AND WINTER LEGUME APPROVALS

The County Committee has set May 1, 1952 as the date to report your Rye and Winter Legume approvals. Remember that a stand that would justify harvesting must be obtained on the Rye before assistance can be earned. Also, remember that this crop of Rye cannot be harvested to earn

#### MORE PEOPLE, BUT FEWER FARMERS

In the past 20 years farm population in the United States has gone down nearly 7 million—from 31 million to 24 million. In that period the total population of the country has increased 31 million—from 124 million to 155 million. During that same period the acreage of harvest cropland actually has decreased. The 1931 crop was harvested from 365 million acres; the 1951 crop came from less than 350 million acres. The figures have a significance

for every consumer. Thirty years ago there were 3 1/4 harvested acres of cropland for each person. Today there are about 2 1/4 acres.

The situation boils down to this: Fewer farmers and more and more people depending on each farmer and each acre. Either our efforts to protect our land against erosion and depletion and to build up the soil will have to be stepped up or one of these days there won't be enough to go around.

This is the basic reason for the current effort to increase the effectiveness of the Agricultural Conservation Program. Each farmer is being given an opportunity to use the program to take care of the most needed conservation practices aimed at stepping up production on each farm. Nearly half of the Nation's farmers are cooperating in the program.

**GROW MORE FEED**  
Texas farmers are being asked to plant more feed grains by their PMA committee. According to the planting intentions report

that was made by the U. S. Department of Agriculture on March 1, Texas farmers plan to plant 1.5 million acres less feed grains than called for in the 1952 production goals, according to B. F. Vance, State PMA Committee Chairman.

Vance says the report shows that Texas farmers plan to plant only 92 per cent of the corn goal, 90 per cent of the oat goal, 79 per cent of the barley goal and only 83 per cent of the grain sorghum goal.

Unless the farmers change their plans, the feed grain reserve will be further reduced this year. We have been using more feed grains during the past two years than we have been producing. Vance says, "any shortage of feed grains will result in a downward adjustment in the production of animal products such as meat, milk, eggs and poultry meats."

That is the reason, PMA Committeemen say, that they are urging farmers to look for every opportunity to increase their planting of corn and grain sorghums. Vance says "that the added

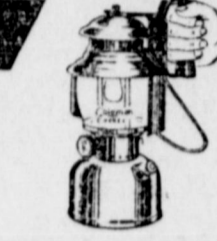

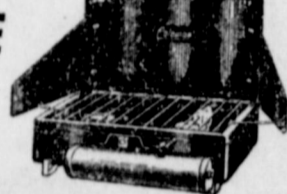
