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## TWO DAY CELEBRATION IS GREAT SUCCESS

The 75th Anniversary of the Founding of Old Clarendon is now past history but talk of the events of July 3rd and 4th are still a topic of conversation in Clarendon. Jimmy Faulkner, local Chamber of Commerce manager, states that he is a newcomer to Clarendon but that he has heard a lot of comment from persons who have been around here for years. Comments like "I never saw a longer parade with so many entries," "That is the biggest crowd and the most barbecue we have ever had here on the Fourth of July," "This whole celebration is a big success and really gives us a high mark to shoot at next year," "Best celebration Clarendon ever had" are typical of the comments Faulkner says he has heard over and over again.

All of Clarendon became infected with the Celebration fever by noon Tuesday the 3rd as voting ended in the Queen of the Rodeo Contest. Results of the contest were announced at the horse races about three o'clock that afternoon. Miss Joanne Christal, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Billie Christal of Lelia Lake was the winner. Runnersup were Miss Sandra Shelton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Loyd T. Shelton and Miss Mary Edna Elmore, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fontayne Elmore, both of Clarendon. Seventeen Queen Candidates, each sponsored by a firm or ranch of Clarendon and Donley County, made a bid for the coveted title of Queen of the Rodeo. J. W. Murphy, president of the Clarendon Outdoor Entertainment Association which staged the celebration, crowned Miss Christal in befitting ceremonies at the first rodeo performance. The Queen with her attendants, the runners-up contestants, were presented at each of the rodeo performances.

Smoke from fires of hickory and mesquite wood tinged with the aroma of barbecuing beef greeted early risers on the morning of the Fourth. John Snyder of Amarillo was cooking almost 4,000 pounds of dressed meat. Regan Bain, Chairman of the Barbecue Committee, states "Five thousand people is not a publicity figure, it is actually less than the number of persons that we fed. There was about a hundred plates left out of 5,000 we had and there were a lot of people who brought their own plates. I'd say we fed over 5,000."

Beginning the activities of the Fourth was the dedication of the new American Legion home on main street. Lou J. Roberts, Past Department Commander of the Legion who lives in Amarillo, made the dedicatory address which closed just before the barbecue was served on the courthouse lawn at 11:00 A. M. Rev. L. A. Sartain, pastor of the First Baptist Church, gave the invocation before the barbecue.

The Parade, under the joint marshaling of H. M. "Flip" Breedlove and R. E. Drennan, moved down Main Street and west to Sully Street, where it turned back east and crossed the railroad tracks and proceeded on to the rodeo grounds.

R. T. Brown was chairman of the Old Fiddlers Contest held in front of Bob Moss Pharmacy at 5 p. m. on the Fourth. First place winner was Joe David, second place was Ray David, both of Clarendon. A. W. Howard of Memphis was the third place winner. Cash prizes of \$10, \$7.50, and \$5.00 were awarded by the Association to the winners. Judges were Si Johnson, Bill Crawford and Tom Melton, all of Clarendon. Almost a dozen entrants fiddled over an hour for the enjoyment of an estimated 2,000 spectators and listeners.

Willard Skelton, in charge of the gates and parking areas, stated "I never saw as many people at a rodeo and it was that way at all three performances. If

it had not been for the swell cooperation and hard work of all the men on my committee, there would still be a traffic jam out there." Skelton wanted all the men who helped him to know his appreciation.

A complete financial report will be made as soon as all the bills are in so that all may know the outcome of the rodeo and celebration, according to R. S. Brumley, secretary of the Association.

Hubert Bradshaw, local resident for a number of years and brother of G. W. Bradshaw, received serious injuries Sunday night when the car in which he was riding collided with another near the underpass on northeast 8th street in Amarillo. Bradshaw was reported getting along as well as could be expected Wednesday. He received a broken left arm, dislocated hip, cracked ribs and several bad lacerations. One man, Billy Kuykendall of Hereford, died from injuries received in the accident; five others were injured.

### Six Donley Boys To Attend 4-H Club Encampment

Six 4-H Club Boys from Donley County will go with county agent H. M. Breedlove to the district 4-H Club encampment at the Perkins camp near Wichita Falls. The camp will be held on July 30, 31st and August 1st.

Boys with two years club work or in their second year are eligible to go on this trip. Specialists from the A&M College Extension Service will be on hand to lecture and show pictures in the latest developments in agriculture for the boys and to also conduct demonstrations of interest to them. Besides the educational part of the camp there will be swimming, baseball, fishing and other sports.

There is a regular mess hall at the camp site and the entire expense of the trip will be five dollars per boy for the three days.

Delegates for the trip will be selected at the next 4-H Club meeting to be held on July 20th at 8 p. m. in the office of the county agent at Clarendon.

### Country Club To Hold Annual Barbecue July 24

It was announced this week that the members of the Country Club would hold their annual chicken barbecue July 24 at 7 o'clock. Club members will be allowed to invite as many guests as they like for this occasion. Herebefore each member of the club has furnished their own chickens. This year the club will buy all the chickens in order that they will be uniform and proper for barbecuing. There will be no exceptions. The chickens will average 1 lb. to the half and will cost 65 cents per pound. You can order as many chickens as you like for your party, but July 18 will be the deadline for ordering and paying for your chickens. Willard Hudson, Willard Skelton and E. L. Lowe will be in charge of the orders and collections, so you may contact them as soon as you desire. The club will furnish hot coffee and each member will be responsible for other lunch they desire to go along with the chicken.

### Spraying & Dusting Getting Job Done

Dry weather is causing the web worms in cotton to start dying says county agent H. M. Breedlove. Farmers in all parts of the county have been spraying and dusting and getting good control where the operation was started in plenty of time.

The two poisons giving the best results are toxaphene at the rate of two pints per acre of the six pound chemical and three pounds per acre of the four pound poison. This is the amount per acre regardless of the amount of water used. 3-5-40 as a dust has given good results and has been applied at the rate of eight pounds per acre. These two poisons have controlled the flea hopper, boll worm and other insects as well as the web worm. This type web worm is known as the "Garden Web Worm" says the county agent and with continued dry weather for the next few days will disappear as fast as he appeared in the cotton fields.

Breedlove urges that all cotton farmers keep a close watch of their fields and look for leaf worms and boll worms. We have plenty of dusters and sprayers in the county now and the poison is available in both Hedley and Clarendon, Breedlove stated.

Normal rain fall this summer should not give us any outbreak of cotton insects; however, with continued wet weather we can expect the presence of cotton insects in our fields, the county agent said.

Any information that you need be sure to call Breedlove and he will try to help you.

### Friday To Be Last Paper Drive

Due to the fall in the scrap paper market, the Boy Scouts and Cubs see fit to stop the collections of paper. However, the Scouts will pick up the paper this Friday, and if necessary, Saturday. They have not as yet sold any of the paper which they have collected because there is no market for it. The Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts wish to thank the people of Clarendon for their cooperation with the paper drive. If and when the price of paper advances, the Scouts will again be on the job.

### Oil Drilling Activity On Upsurge Again

All sorts of rumors have been in the air again the past week regarding the possibilities of drilling more wildcat oil wells in this area. If all the rumors are true or materialize there should be considerable activity here within the next month or so.

At the present time the Leader has been informed that the Hunt Oil Company of Dallas has had a road constructed to a location southeast of the J. A. Ranch headquarters. This road is nearing completion and equipment probably will be moved in this next week. It has also been rumored that the W. H. Hunt Trust Estate would probably drill a number of test wells on the JA while in this locality. It has been understood that leases in that area are listed under the above name.

We understood also that the Newton Oil Corporation of Fort Worth is rumored to stake a location in the area north of Lelia Lake within the next few weeks and start drilling operations around August 1st.

More details will be released in regard to the entire set-up just as soon as drilling officials arrive to start actual operations.

### Election Called By Commissioners Court For July 28th

The 51st Texas Legislature at its Regular Session, 1949, passed a bill providing that effective January 1, 1951, the levy of the 30c ad valorem tax by the State would be discontinued and authorizing the counties to levy this tax of not exceeding 30c on each \$100.00 valuation, except the first \$3,000.00 valuation of residential homesteads, for use in construction and maintenance of Farm-To-Market and lateral roads, or for flood control. This bill provides that before such a tax can be levied by the counties the question must be submitted to a vote of the resident property tax-paying qualified voters. The commissioners court of Donley County, at its July 9th meeting, passed an order providing for such an election to be held in Donley County on July 28, 1951.

The adoption of this levy will not increase the taxes in this county as the amount collected will be the same amount that was formerly collected by the State of Texas; instead of the tax being paid to the State it will be retained in Donley County for construction and maintenance of Farm-To-Market and lateral roads.

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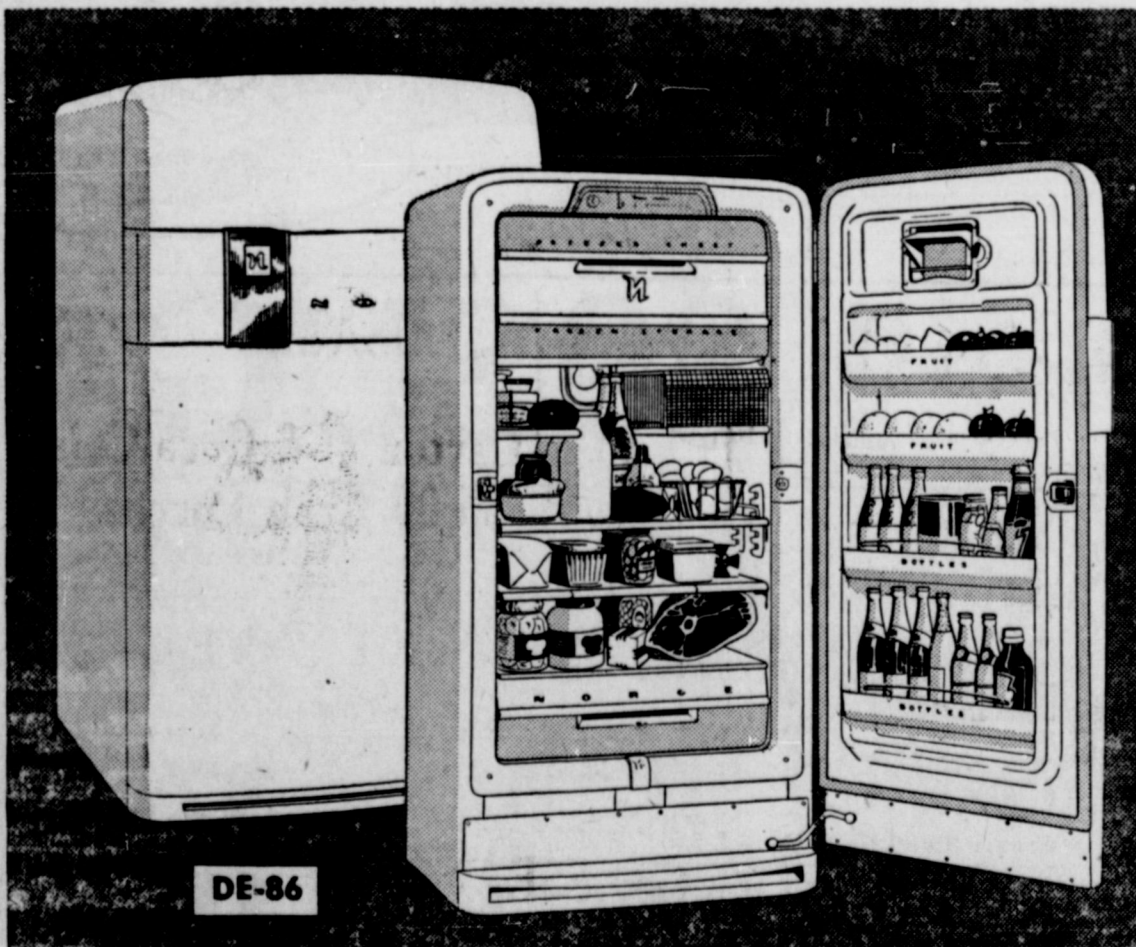

**FARM NEWS**  
From the County PMA Committee  
**NO ACREAGE ALLOTMENTS, NO MARKETING QUOTAS ON 1952-CROP WHEAT**  
Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan announced today there will be no acreage allotments and no marketing quotas on 1952-crop wheat.  
Department officials stated that the supply of wheat during the 1952-53 marketing year is expected to be below the quantity specified for marketing quotas in existing legislation, and that the continuing need for food in the uncertain world situation makes it advisable not to establish acreage allotments for the 1952 crop. Legislation requires that the determination as to marketing quotas be made before the beginning of the marketing year—July 1.  
**1951-CROP WHEAT PRICE SUPPORT ANNOUNCED**  
Wheat price support at a national average of \$2.18 a bushel to farmers for the 1951 crop was announced recently by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Last year's average was \$1.99 a bushel. Loans and purchase agreements covering the 1951 crop will be available through the Commodity Credit Corporation in accordance with the general program provisions announced by the Department August 21, 1950, pending determination of the specific support level announced recently.  
The 1951 average price support rate per bushel for U. S. Grade No. 1 Heavy of the class Hard Red Spring and U. S. Grade No. 1 of the classes Durum, Hard Red Winter, Soft Red Winter, and White wheat is \$2.19.  
The price support for the 1951 crop, in accordance with applicable legislative provisions, is 90 per cent of parity at the beginning of the marketing year, July 1. July 1 parity is \$2.42 a bushel. For the same date last year the wheat price parity was \$2.21 a bushel.  
Only wheat grading No. 3 or better, or No. 4 or No. 5 because of test weight or because it con-

tains wheat of the classes Durum and/or Red Durum will be eligible for loan or purchase. The loans will be available through January 1952, and will mature April 30, 1952 or earlier on demand. Terminal market price support rates per bushel for U. S. Grade No. 1 Heavy of the class Hard Red Spring and U. S. Grade No. 1 of the classes Durum, Hard Red Winter, Soft Red Winter, and White wheat are \$2.37, Galveston, Houston and New Orleans. Loan rates will be established on wheat stored in all Texas wheat producing counties. The loan rate for Donley County for the 1951-crop wheat is \$2.17 per bushel. One wheat loan has been made in Donley County this year and that was for Mr. E. L. Littlefield of Jericho, Texas.

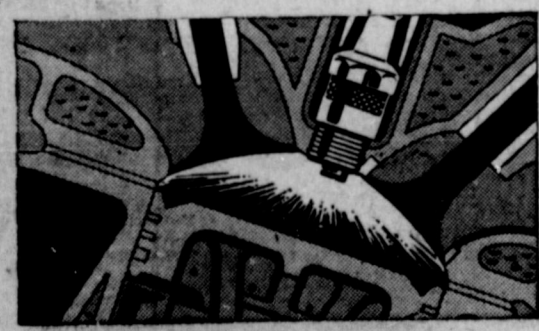

14,105,640 Dimes Used For Polio Patients In 1950

AUSTIN — "It took a lot of dimes in 1950 to take care of Texas polio patients," Ralph Frede of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis declared today.

14,105,640 of them, to be exact. County Chapters of the March of Dimes organization spent \$1,410,564 for patient care in 1950, \$65,943 more than was spent for

this purpose in 1949.

Assisted directly with hospital and other bills were 1,645 polio patients stricken before 1950 and 1,196 who contacted the disease during the year. Chapters ended the year owing \$306,326 to hospitals and doctors in Texas.

Frede said that total receipts from the 1951 March of Dimes approximately equalled the amount spent for patient care. Figures on expenditures, he noted, did not include money spent by the National Foundation's state and national offices for iron

lungs and other equipment, for training of medical personnel and health education, and for other expenses which were applied to patient care.

Also not included in the chapter expenditures are costs of research grants in Texas.

Advanced to Texas Chapters when their own March of Dimes funds were depleted was a total of \$783,161 from the national epidemic aid fund. A big share of this, he said, was applied to treatment of old patients, indicating the high costs of continuing care for the 20% of patients having an extensive paralysis.

Noting the low incidence of the disease so far this year as compared with the same period in 1950, Frede expressed the hope that the early trend would be continued through the critical hot-weather period ahead. He pledged that regardless of any emergency which might arise, Texas Chapters of the March of Dimes organization would be prepared to meet the challenge with equipment and funds, assuring that no patient would be without the best of care.

Channel Catfish Rank Among Big Three Of Fishdom

AUSTIN—Mr. Aristocrat—the channel catfish—is paid a special tribute in the current issue of "Texas Game & Fish."

Writing in the official publication of the Texas Game, Fish & Oyster Commission, Marion Toole, chief aquatic biologist, says:

"Channel catfish rank as one of the big three of fishdom along with bass and crappie in the esteem of the anglers of Texas.

"Almost every person who fishes has at one time or another spent the night running a trot-line, (where they are legitimate) anxiously looking toward the next hook as it comes in range of the pale gleam of the lantern to see if a catfish is hooked.

"Some anglers have been fortunate enough to have a catfish strike on their bait-casting plugs, or artificial flies.

"Channel catfish are popular for several reasons. The reasons are, first, their ability to do well in most environments, thus being fairly available to the anglers throughout the state; secondly,

the excellent quality of their flesh which is desirable to even the most finicky of the epicures; and, finally, the fact that they grow to a large size which gives the angler who hooks one something to brag about besides furnishing a large fish course for the family dinner."

Toole goes on to clear up a disputed point:

"The color of the various channel catfish misleads the majority of anglers. When channels are caught from clear water they are very dark in color, so dark in fact that even the spots on their sides do not show. Consequently all channels so colored are blue catfish to the average angler. Channel catfish seem to favor clear water and stay over bottoms made up of sand and gravel. Their foods consist of crustaceans, insect larvae and nymphs, worms, clams, snails, fish, crayfish and some aquatic plants."

Southwestern Telephone Company has signed a new Agreement for one year with the Communications Workers of America effective July 1, 1951, it was announced in Dallas today by Company President, Mr. Roy Autry. Some Facts about Texas' New Motor Vehicle Safety-Responsibility Law

1. What Is The New Texas Motor Vehicle Safety Responsibility Law?

This law, effective January 1, 1952, is designed for the protection of persons injured or whose property has been damaged as the result of the operation of a motor vehicle. Under it, motorists may be obliged to give proof of their ability to pay damage claims, which may be awarded against them for bodily injury or property damage caused to other persons by a motor vehicle owned or driven by them.

2. Who is Affected By This Law?

Everyone who owns or drives a motor vehicle in Texas is affected.

3. How Does The Law Work?

The Department of Public Safety is required to suspend the license and registration of any person who fails to satisfy, within sixty days, any judgment against him because of bodily injury or death, or damage to property due to the operation of a motor vehicle. The license shall remain suspended and shall not be renewed, nor shall any such license be thereafter issued in the name of such person, unless and until every such judgment is satisfied to the extent provided for in the law and until the said person gives proof of financial responsibility.

4. What Is The Best Way For A Motorist To Avoid Such Suspension?

By having in full force and effect at the time of the accident, out of which the judgment arose, a motor vehicle liability insurance policy with limits of \$5,000/\$10,000 bodily injury and \$5,000 property damage, issued by an insurance company authorized to do business in the State of Texas.

5. Are There Any Other Reasons For Which Evidence Of Financial Responsibility May Be Required?

Yes, in the event the motorist is convicted of or pleads guilty to certain violations of law. Upon failure to furnish evidence of financial responsibility, the motorist's privileges to register, or operate a motor vehicle, as chauffeur or otherwise, are revoked and terminate.

6. How Can A Motorist Furnish Proof Of Financial Responsibility?

Evidence of financial responsibility may be furnished by delivering to the Department of Public Safety:

- (a) A certificate of motor vehicle liability insurance, with limits of \$5,000/\$10,000 bodily injury and \$5,000 property damage, issued by a company authorized to do business in the State of Texas; or
- (b) A real estate bond in amount and form to be approved by a judge of a court of record, and conditioned for payment in the same manner as a Motor Vehicle Liability insurance policy for the payment of claims against the motorist; or
- (c) A receipt or certificate of the State Treasurer showing that an equivalent amount of cash or securities has been deposited with the State Treasurer.

7. What Is The Penalty For Operating A Motor Vehicle In Violation Of This Law?

Upon conviction, any motorist operating a motor vehicle, after his driving privileges have been revoked, shall be subject to fine, or imprisonment, or both.

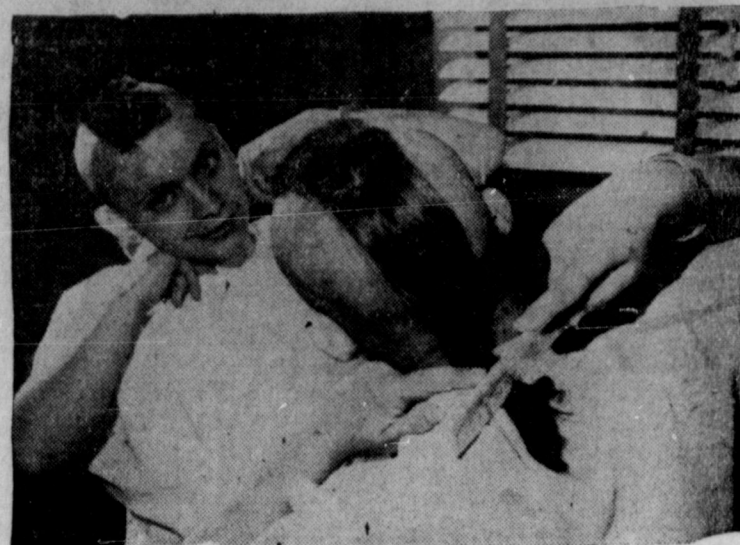

Miracle Drugs Make Childbearing Safer

Having a baby today is much easier and safer than it was even ten years ago.

As recently as 1940, babies came the slow and painful way, and very often tragedy followed in their little footsteps. But medical science is changing all this.

In a recent issue, the Journal of the American Medical Association announced that the maternal mortality rate for this nation had been pushed to slightly below the apparently irreducible minimum of one maternal death for each 1,000 live births!

Most grownups can easily remember when the corridors of maternity wards rang with anguished cries, and first labors quite commonly lasted 24 hours.

seldom less than 12. Today, prenatal clinics, pain-killing drugs, expert obstetrical care in specialized departments of hospitals, emotional adjustment of the mother, and many other factors have made Mr. Stork a tame and welcome household visitor.

Steadily increasing birth rates show that young married women appreciate these advances and are more willing to bear children.

But there has been one speck of a dark cloud on the horizon to mar this otherwise favorable picture—infection.

Sulfonamides helped the doctor considerably. Then came penicillin, which is still useful in many cases. But, like the sulfa drugs, penicillin has too narrow a range against germs which cause infections after childbirth, and against some it is totally ineffective.

Late in 1948, the discovery of a new miracle drug, aureomycin, was announced. Research at Johns Hopkins University reveals that where new mothers received aureomycin, only about 12 per cent showed bacteria on culture tests; whereas, among those who did not receive this new antibiotic drug, 75 per cent showed bacteria to be present.

Further, it was found that the drug is highly useful in treating infections of the lining of the abdomen (peritonitis), infected mis-carriages, and similar infections. This antibiotic can readily penetrate into the baby's blood supply before it is born, and is transmitted by the milk of the mother.

Aureomycin is effective against kidney infections during pregnancy. It is also highly effective against what grandmother called "childbed fever," whether the condition arises from a single organism or is a mixed infection. The antibiotics and appropriate obstetrical care minimize both the likelihood and seriousness of phlebitis or "milk leg."

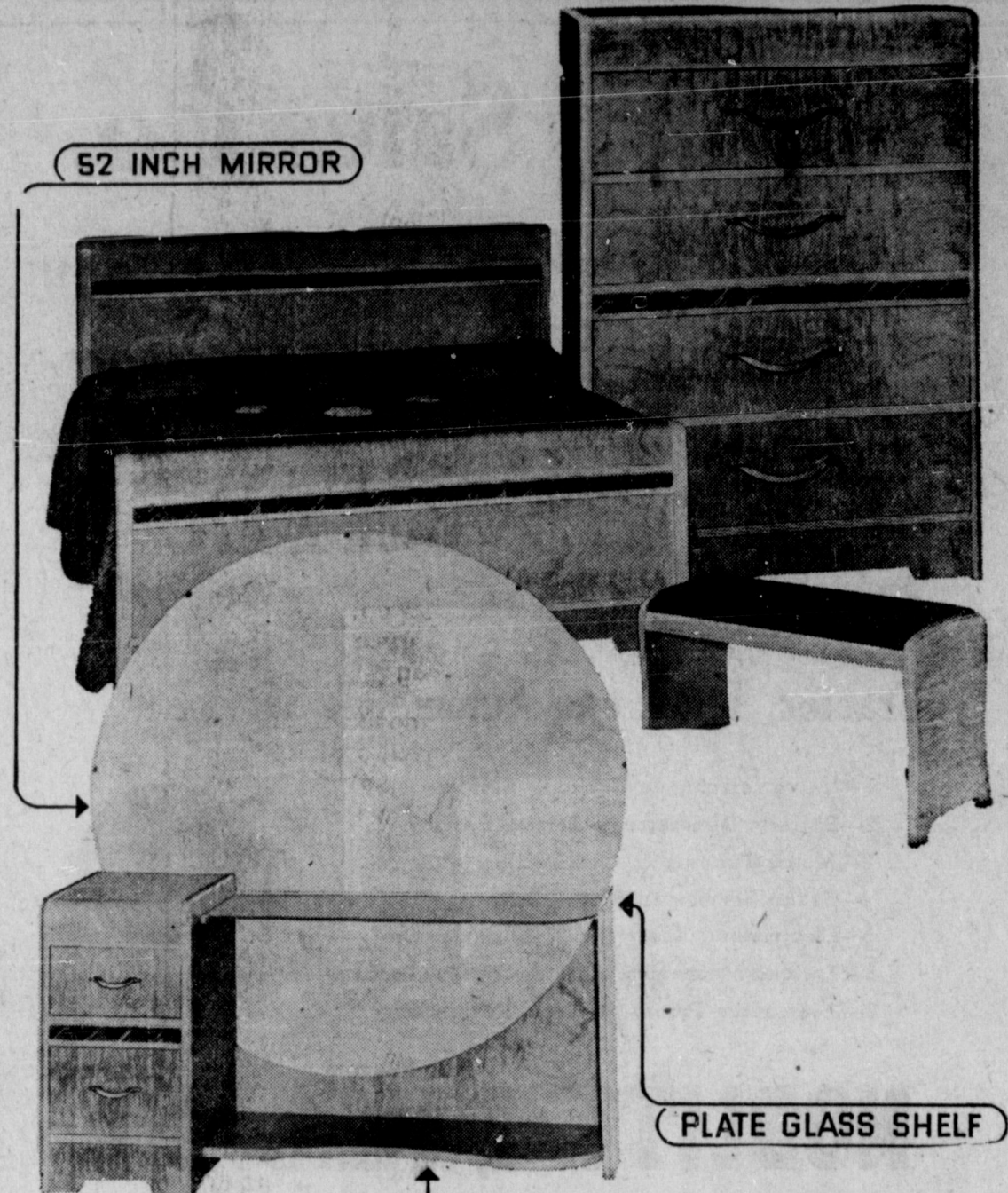
