## Underground Water Study To Be Made

On Thursday afternoon while returning to Austin from the public hearing pertaining to the designation of boundaries of the underground reservoir north of the Canadian River which was held in Dumas on May 19-20, Ivan M. Stout, Chief Engineer for the Board of Water Engineers, called on friends in Clarendon, according to Mr. C. B. Morris.

During the course of conversation it was revealed that an application has been filed with the State Board of Water Engineers for the designation of boundaries of a district south of the Canadian River. This application was filed by a group of Carson County citizens. In a preliminary hearing held in Panhandle in early March the group was advised that an underground reservoir south of the Canadian River which would include Carson County would, in all probability, extend into Armstrong, Donley, Gray and possibly Collingsworth and Hall Counties. It was recommended that the boundaries for the entire basin be determined at one time, rather than dividing the work into several segments.

In his conversation Stout stated that field work would begin during the early part of June. It is felt that this work will have a great deal of value to the local area, and that information concerning ground water conditions should be made available by those having knowledge of wells which they own or have observed. It is not the purpose of the Board of Water Engineers to assume any control or authority in the allocation of underground water. Recent legislation has placed the responsibility upon the Board of Water Engineers of making such determinations as are necessary for the delineation of underground reservoirs. All studies are made pursuant to applications from the areas affected. Following these determinations the Board holds a public hearing within the area and requests that all people who are interested in ground water conditions present

### Dusters Win 2nd Time Over Amarillo Laundry

The Clarendon Dusters accumulated eleven runs Sunday afternoon to defeat the Amarillo Laundry team by ten runs. This was a repeat job for the Dusters as they defeated the Amarillo team 16 to 6 in the first game of the season. Moisture recorded here in town since last Wednesday evening has totaled out another .62 inch which brings our yearly total to 8.22 inches. The moisture falling Wednesday and Sunday brought the final total for May to 6.04 inches. The Wednesday total was .16 and Sunday's was .39. June started out with .07 Tuesday afternoon when it appeared for awhile like we might receive a gully washer. This activity took place to the southeast where Paducah reported tornadic winds and considerable damage.

Willard Knox reported .45 inch at Lelia Lake Sunday afternoon; Sam Dale reported .33 for Goldston; Ben Lovell reported .26 for Ashtola with a heavier fall again to the northwest and Mrs. D. B. Koen reported .40 for the Chamberlain-Hudgins area.

Another duster from the north blew in early Wednesday morning to remind us of the weather experienced here the first four months of the year. Visibility improved rapidly as the fast moving front moved on southward.

their views relative to the existence of wells which will produce water in excess of 150,000 gallons per day (105 gallons per minute). Following the hearing the Board adds such knowledge to its records as was determined at the hearing and writes the boundary description. A second public hearing is then held at which time any person whose land is included or would be effected may appear and offer evidence, to contest the district creation. The District is created by public election; a majority vote by each county being required for inclusion.

In the event the public authorizes the District as designated by the Board of Water Engineers, either in whole or in part, a district organization is formed in which the Precinct rule is adopted, governed by a five-member Board of Directors. It is within the legal authority of the District to levy a tax for the purpose of employing underground water hydrologists or other technical assistants who will guide the District in such matters as well spacing, recommending favorable rates of withdrawal and other matters incident to prolonging

the life and economic development of the reservoir. The legislation was intended to place the regulation of the underground water resource in local hands, rather than leaving it to State or Federal controls.

It is believed that this investigation by the Board of Water Engineers will have great value and significance to the citizens of Donley County. While no county organization has been projected, it is felt that a meeting with the Carson County organization headed by County Attorney Frank Dove should be held and any support offered which will be of assistance to the Carson County people or the Board of Water Engineers.

**FARM NEWS**

from the County ASC Committee

**CHEMICAL & MECHANICAL CONTROL OF MESQUITE:**

Several producers have been into the ASC Office asking about the Chemical Control of Mesquite. The following information will be helpful to any farmer or rancher who plans to carry out this practice and receive Federal cost-share:

(1) The area to be treated must not be grazed from July 1 to October 1, following the treatment.

(2) For chemical treatment, provisions of Texas Weed Control Law must be followed.

(3) Spraying should not be done earlier than 40 days or later than 90 days after the first leaves appear on the mesquite. (Spraying is to be done in Donley County from the 19th of May to July 9th.)

(4) Federal cost-share is \$1.56 per acre.

Any producer who plans to carry out the Mechanical Control of Mesquite must follow the requirements listed below:

(1) Roots must be cut or broken below the bud zone. The ranch operator must agree to eliminate any growth.

(2) The time for mechanical control of mesquite is from May 19th to July 9th.

(3) Federal cost-share is to be based on the following infestations:

1. Light infestation—10% - 26% —\$1.50 per acre.

2. Medium infestation—27% - 45% —\$3.00 per acre.

3. Heavy infestation—46% and up—\$6.00 per acre.

If any producer needs further information concerning the Control of Mesquite, he may inquire at the County ASC Office.

**University of Texas Boosts New Locations For Textile Industries**

AUSTIN — The University of Texas has gone to bat for the state's agricultural areas and small towns as locations for new textile industries.

Such areas particularly are suitable for new cotton textile mills, University researchers declare in a 145-page publication, "Cotton Textiles, an Opportunity for Texas."

The University's Cotton Economic Research division prepared the book, giving industrialists details on Texas markets, labor, water, cotton, climate, waste disposal outlets, taxes, fuel and power and other competitive advantages.

Additional textile mills would provide new and diversified job opportunities for special population groups.

Also new mills would permit up-grading of both skills and wages and encourage the location of complementary and supplementary services and industries,

the researchers assert.

Growing apparel markets in the Midwest, Southwest and Far West increase Texas' value as a strategic textile industry location, the researchers say. Other Texas advantages pointed out are increasing population, favorable geographic position and freight rates, large and varied cotton supplies and extensive state research and technical services.

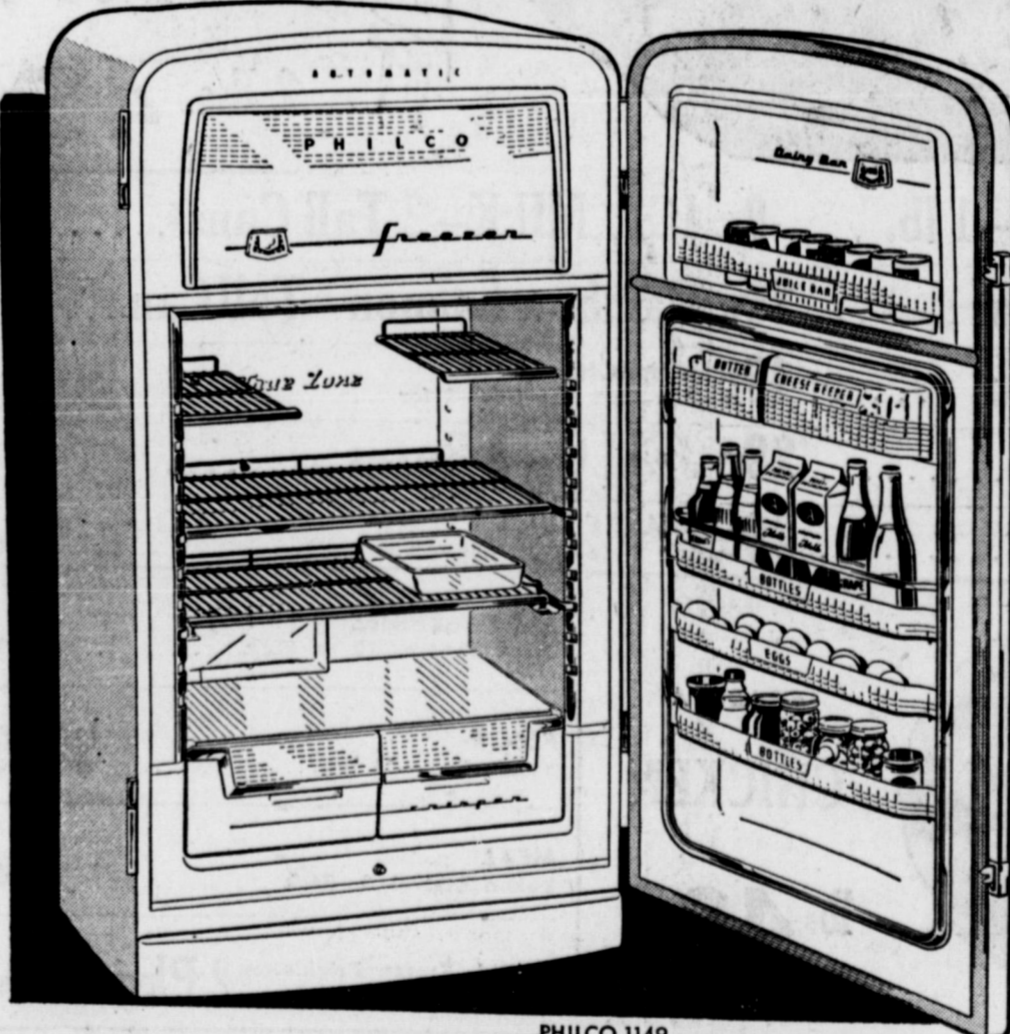
