**THOUSANDS ATTEND ANNUAL CELEBRATION HERE JULY 3rd**

Clarendon was filled to the brim again last Saturday, July 3rd, when visitors from all parts of the Panhandle and distant points gathered here for the annual three day celebration.

The celebration started off with the rodeo performance Friday night, followed by two performances Saturday and the last performance Sunday afternoon. The night performances were well attended with the crowd slumped down in the afternoons due to the heat. All performances went off in quick time and the Rodeos as a whole were said to be the best to be held here in recent years. The rodeo was faster and the stock better.

Activities on the Third started with the registration of the Old-Timers at the McMurtry building. There were 99 who signed up that had lived in the Panhandle 40 to 50 years or longer.

Everyone could tell the crowd was here when the time came for the serving of the free barbecue. It was estimated that around 4500 were served in the short time of about 45 minutes. Twelve serving lines took care of the crowd in less time than last year.

Flip Breedlove and his barbecue crew did an excellent job on the barbecuing and it was described as even better than last year. The main trimmings, beans and fruit were prepared by W. W. Sandifer and his committee. Sandifer cooked the 400 lbs. of beans all at one time in a new vat he designed this year, and the finished product was described the best ever. The entire barbecuing and cooking crews are to be commended for their efforts. They put in a long number of hours and many of them were up all night of the 2:d.

W. W. Noblet, secretary of the Association, stated that a financial report at this time was not available as a number of bills had not been turned in. "If you have a bill against the Outdoor Entertainment Association, please get it to us immediately so we can balance our books and pay everyone off", he added.

**Post Office Income Shows Steady Gain**

Back in 1942 for the month of June the postal receipts at the local post office was \$1,180.45. Five years later in June of 1947, the receipts were \$1,381.68. Then five years later during the boom season, the June receipts were \$1858.13.

During the June just past, the receipts were \$2,325.14.

When Mr. Cook was postmaster back in 1894, the June receipts shows a total of \$11.04. Postage was cheaper in those days. There was much less demand for postal service too. Even at the present postage rates, several thousand pieces of mail pass through the local post office daily, according to Postmaster J. C. Estlack. The local post office offers every form of service to be found in a first class office, the postmaster stated.

**Upstream Flood Prevention Lengthens Life of Reservoirs**

"Public interest in water problems in Texas is at an all-time high," H. N. Smith, State Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service, at Temple, said today.

Many articles on water resources and water needs are appearing in newspapers and magazines, and Federal and State agencies, committees, and many cities are making water studies.

"This widespread concern about water supplies," Smith pointed out, "emphasizes the importance of taking needed steps without delay to prevent rapid

filling of reservoirs with sediment with accompanying loss of valuable water storage capacity."

Mr. Smith referred to the four major reservoirs — Benbrook, Grapevine, Garza-Little Elm, and Lavon—which are being completed by the Corps of Engineers above Dallas and Fort Worth. "These reservoirs," he said, "will give flood protection to Dallas and Fort Worth and to levee districts and farmland along the river below them. The dams also will serve the very important purposes of storing water for municipal and industrial use, recreation, navigation of the Trinity, and streamflow regulation. Foreseeing even greater needs for water in the future as Texas develops, we need to do every-

thing that can be done to protect and increase the useful life of these reservoirs."

Mr. Smith estimated that at the present rate of erosion, and soil movement in the watershed the sediment pools of the four reservoirs would be filled with sediment in 27 to 36 years.

"But this doesn't need to happen," he said. "If the needed soil conservation measures and practices were being used throughout the watershed of Grapevine reservoir—as an example—the life of the sediment pool would be increased to 50 years and the storage capacity of the reservoir maintained correspondingly. And if the proposed system of upstream flood prevention dams, which has been planned by the Soil Conservation Service above Grapevine reservoir, were built immediately the sediment pool life would be lengthened to 116 years because of the sediment deposition which would be prevented."

"The Trinity River watershed isn't the only place in Texas where rapid filling of reservoirs by sediment is occurring," Mr. Smith continued. "The same thing is happening in other parts of the state, and people are becoming concerned at seeing mud replace water. We have had requests from many cities and towns for help in finding out the rate of sedimentation in their water supply reservoirs, and what can be done to protect them. "During recent years we have cooperated with the cities of

Corpus Christi, San Angelo, Waco and Abilene in making sedimentation surveys of their water supply reservoirs," said Smith, "and with the Bexar-Medina-Atascosa Water Improvement District in a survey of Medina Lake. We are right now cooperating with the cities of Graham and Throckmorton in surveys of their reservoirs."

Smith pointed out that good sites for reservoirs are scarce and the best ones already have been used. "When replacement dams have to be built at other locations it is going to cost a lot of money," he said. "That's why we must do everything we can to make our reservoirs last as long as possible."

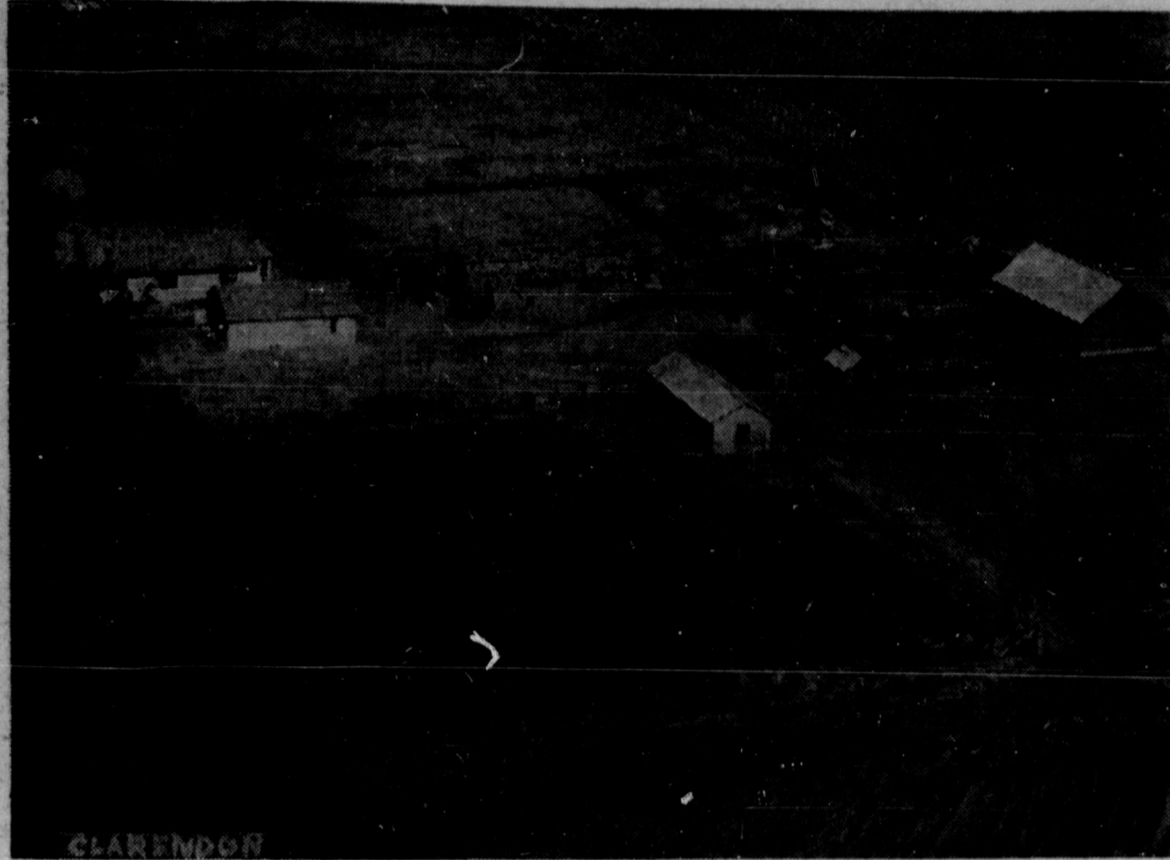

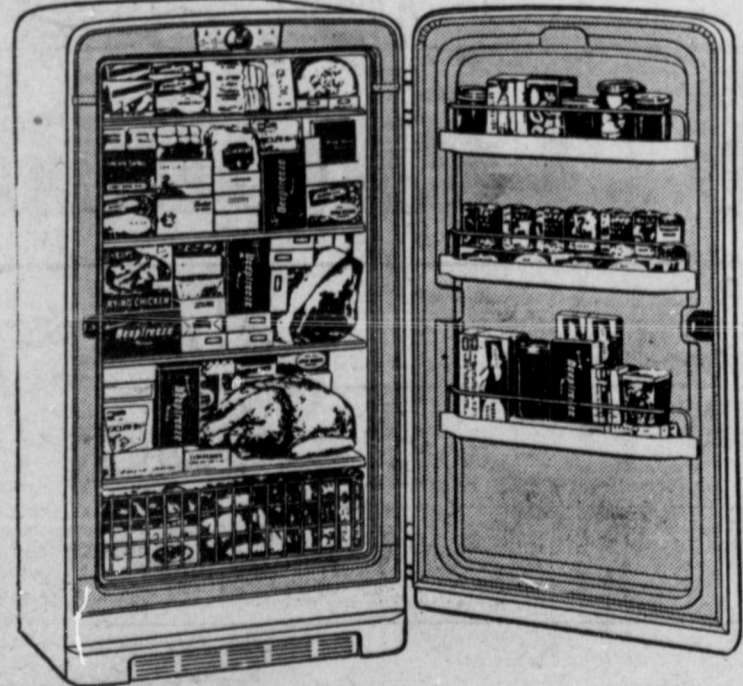

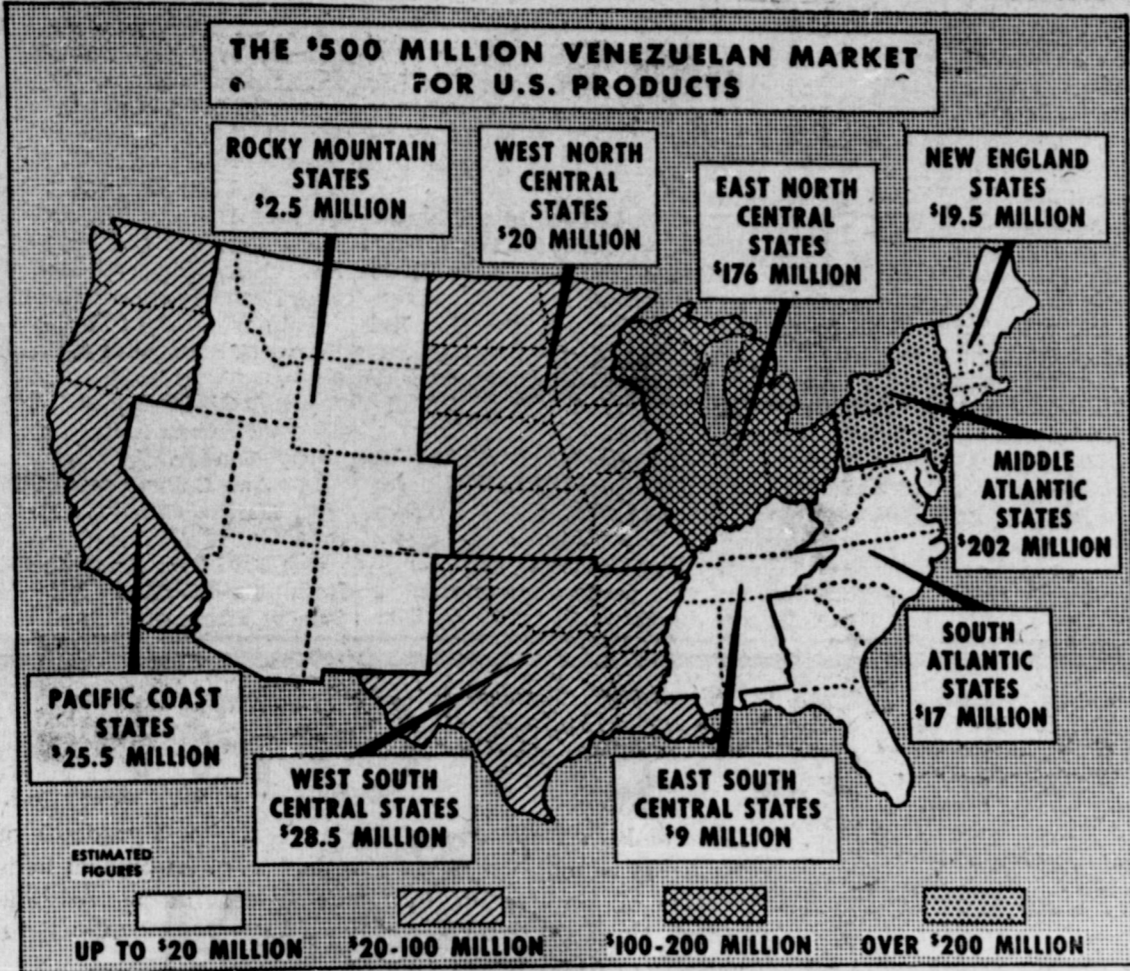

### Scientific Study Of Night Cooling May Prove Beneficial To Agriculturists

AUSTIN — Scientific facts of interest to truck farmers and fruit growers are expected from a University of Texas investigation of night cooling.

Egyptian Graduate Student Mahmoud Mahamed Mahmoud is studying the natural phenomenon, known to his ancestors as far back as 2,500 B. C.

Night cooling or radiation is a process responsible for many freezes. Here's what happens: Air in the earth's outer atmosphere always is cooler than air near the ground. In the daytime, the sun heats up the earth and that in turn helps heat the lower atmosphere.

When the sun disappears, cool rays from the upper atmosphere replace hot daytime rays, dropping temperatures on the earth and in the lower atmosphere. Any object slows night radiation—clouds, other moisture, smoke, trees—but on a dry night the cooling process lowers temperature considerably on any object it strikes.

That's why cloudy nights usually are warmer than clear nights and why truck farmers and fruit growers light smudge pots when a freeze is predicted. Mahmoud's research is expected to provide more detailed knowledge of night radiation to help agriculturists prevent freezes more efficiently and economically.

Night radiation also offers possibilities for summer air-conditioning through a system which provides a water-covered roof with night-cooled water run through wall-sized radiators during the day.

## SECRETARY BENSON ANNOUNCES 1955 WHEAT PROGRAM AND DIVERTED ACRE PROVISIONS

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson June 21 announced preliminary steps in the administration of the 1955 wheat pro-

gram and also cross-compliance provisions to influence the use of land diverted by wheat and other acreage allotments. The Secretary:

1. Proclaimed a national marketing quota for the 1955 wheat crop, in accordance with legislative provisions.
2. Announced a national wheat acreage allotment of 55 million acres for 1955—the level specified in the controlling legislation under conditions of excessive surplus.

3. Set July 23 as the date for a national referendum among wheat growers on acceptance of the proposed marketing quota.

4. Announced that in 1955 wheat growers and others would have to comply with all acreage allotments established for a farm, and that bigger producers—with larger totals of diverted acres—would also have to comply with a "total acreage allotment", in order to be eligible for price support on any crop produced on the farm.

"This action obviously means further controls on farm production and marketing", Secretary Benson said in commenting on the announcement. "I greatly regret this fact. The long-range interests of agriculture and the national economy will best be served when we can have less—and not more—government regulation and control.

"Under present conditions, however, we have no immediate choice. With approximately a two-year's supply of wheat expected to be on hand when this year's crop is harvested, there is no question at all about the requirement for marketing quotas and the establishment of a national wheat acreage allotment at the level prescribed by law. Neither is there any question about the need to require cross-compliance with established acreage allotments. It doesn't make sense to encourage the building of new problems through the unwise shifting of acres from one surplus crop to another.

"Farmers under these regulations have a choice of action. They can approve or disapprove marketing quotas. As for acreage allotments, they can either:

- (1) Comply and get the protection of price support, or
- (2) Not comply and forego the benefits of price supports and sell their products on the 'free' markets.

"The wheat supply situation, which forces us into these control measures, is the result of a decline in exports, failure to invoke acreage controls in 1952, relatively high yields, and outmoded method of computing parity, and long-continued use of rigid price supports. Such supports bring unbalanced production, restricted sales and use, result in waste, and inevitably lead to regimentation and restrictive measures. Variable price support levels, adjusted with the supply, can strike at the roots of this surplus problem. "In the meantime, our job is to make the most effective possible use of the controls and measures which are available. We must halt the build-up of surplus and start the trend toward a better balance between supply and demand, using the tools at hand."

 The Under Secretary of Agriculture and President of the Commodity Credit Corporation, Honorable True D. Morse, addressed the National Poultry Improvement Plan Conference in Washington, D. C., on June 22, 1954. The notes he used in addressing this group contained the following statements which disturbed me very much. I give them to you as I obtained them from the Department of Agriculture:

"The prosperity of the United States in 1955 will be put under further pressure as more of the farm business is closed down. In accordance with existing laws, Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson, on June 21, announced,  
 "The wheat acreage will be cut to 55 million - -  
 "Acres taken out of wheat cannot in general be planted in other grain or cotton without foregoing price supports.  
 "A farmer must comply with all acreage allotments to get price supports, and farmers with more than 10 diverted acres must hold their crops within a 'total acreage allotment.'  
 "For 1955, with few exceptions, diverted acres cannot be planted in other cash crops. In general they can only be put to such uses as pasture, hay, cover crops, green manure crops, summer fallow, or be left idle.  
 "If farmers choose to comply in order to get price supports, there may be 35 million acres diverted out of high income crops. These will include some of the nation's most fertile and productive lands.  
 "It will tend to slow down the expansion of the total economy. That is why you as leaders, gathered from 47 states, share the concern about this growing problem.  
 "There will be less profits for farmers.  
 "All those who sell to, or serve farmers, will transact less business - - sell less farm machinery,

fertilizers, chemicals, gas and oil, and all other supplies and services that are required to keep farms in full production.  
 "There will be less for labor to do - - less crop work, harvesting, processing, transportation, storage and sales.  
 "To the extent farm production is cut back and restricted - - it tends to weaken the consumer demand and national prosperity on which profitable farm markets depend.  
 "Agriculture should be making its full contribution to the future national welfare. Farmers are greatly dependent upon full employment, and a vigorous, productive and prosperous America. The degree to which we have such is to no small extent dependent upon the rate at which farms produce."

If these observations on the part of Mr. Morse are correct, it would seem that everyone is going to get along fine except the farmer and those who trade with him, which includes everybody in the United States. Frankly, I find it most difficult to understand how the best interests of this country will be served by doing the injury to each individual's economy. Of course, I am using the old-fashioned method of viewing the situation strictly from the standpoint of this country and the people who make it

up. Perhaps if I took into account the three and one-half billion dollars that has been proposed as foreign aid this year and the peoples who will be benefited thereby, my understanding might be cleared up. However, I do not intend to use any such crazy formula. If you want to know why a farmer's children do not have shoes on their feet, it is not necessary to burden your brain with a long, complex international-domestic formula. All you have to do is ask the farmer. If the farm economy of this country is allowed to sag, you won't need to ask some statistician what happened to the little businessman and the small towns and communities, and then the wholesalers and the larger towns and the cities. Just ask the farmer.

four water moccasins, three blacksnakes, a bullsnake, a coach-whip, two diamond backed water snakes and a copperhead.

Texas Press Association AUSTIN—This year's campaign for the governorship of Texas is boiling down to an old-fashioned political battle.

Governor Allan Shivers and his opponent Ralph Yarborough are touring the state and throw-

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ing punches.

Shivers calls Yarborough the "hand-picked candidate" of the CIO political action committee.

Yarborough accuses Shivers of running an anti-labor campaign. Yarborough asks for sportsmanship and fair play in campaigning.

Shivers replies that he is happy to learn that Yarborough is going

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to quit telling "untruths and run a clean campaign for a change." Yarborough criticizes Shivers for seeking a third term and pictures him as a Democrat-Republican.

Shivers also drew a jab from the Texas State Federation of Labor at its convention in Corpus Christi. The Federation urged his defeat for re-election and termed his record "obnoxious."

Shivers says his labor opposition is originating from the big party bosses and not the rank and file of workers.

The tempo will increase with the temperature as July 24 approaches.

Meanwhile Shivers will be using newspaper ads and radio time to get his message to the public. Yarborough, on the other hand, will concentrate largely on radio and TV.

Political Pot Other state political races, warming up now, saw these developments:

Dudley T. Dougherty, candidate for the U. S. Senate, pounded away at incumbent Lyndon B. Johnson's voting record, declaring Johnson "absolutely unfit to be nominated for Senator."

Dougherty listed nine counts to "indict Johnson before the bar of Texas public opinion."

Former Governor Coke Stevenson, who now is helping to mastermind Dougherty's campaign, reports that the response to his appeal to voters to help elect

Dougherty "has been heavy".

Jabs at Vice Doug Crouch of Fort Worth, candidate for Attorney General, charged that opponent John Ben Shepperd was going easy on friends and prosecuting his enemies.

Crouch also lashed out at what he called flourishing vice organizations in Galveston and guaranteed that he would start his clean-up campaign of the Island City in 24 hours if elected.

Insurance Tangle Meanwhile Shepperd and Insurance Commission Chairman Garland Smith tangled over an issue involving the General American Casualty Company of San Antonio, latest insurance failure.

Smith held that the firm should include an unusual reason for its failure in the report to the commission—that an accusation by a political candidate had accelerated its bankruptcy.

Shepperd said he wasn't in favor of politics being injected into the issue.

General American directors, although not naming the source, had complained that many of their troubles arose when a candidate for governor had charged that a Texas Insurance firm was deeply in the red. This called unfavorable attention to their company and prevented the reestablishment of financial soundness, they said. A later check revealed that Yarborough had made a similar accusation on the date given by the company's directors.

SDX To Help Orphans

High-school age youngsters at the State Orphans Home in Corsicana will enter Corsicana public schools—for the first time—next September. The state pro-

vides these girls and boys with everything but spending money.

Members of the Austin Professional Chapter of Sigma Delta Chi became concerned about this unhappy situation and decided to do something about it.

"A little spending money, that's all they want," said Bill Gardner, chapter president. "Just enough to jingle in an otherwise empty pocket. Enough to buy a coke, or an ice cream cone, or a candy bar—just like the other boys and girls."

So SDX invited Robert Boyd, superintendent of the school, to come to Austin and talk to the chapter.

As a consequence the journalists have promised to raise enough cash to keep these 60 young orphan boys and girls in spending money until they finish high school. And it will be a continuing program for the benefit of the new ones who enroll each year.
