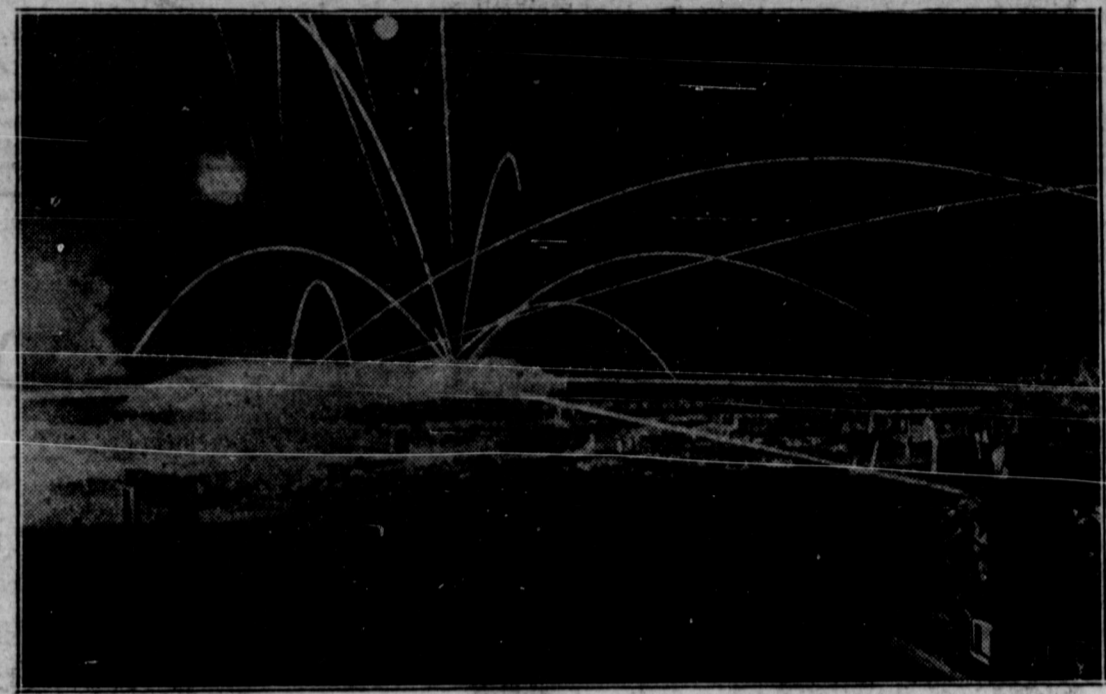

### Boyd Meador Elected Head Lion, Dist. 2T-1

### \$1200 Added To Celebration Fund; More Needed To Offset Debts

Another \$1200 was added to the Outdoor Entertainment Association's building fund this past week, but between four and five thousand dollars is still needed to complete the entire grounds free of debt when the celebration time rolls around. If you have not bought shares in the organization, now is the time to get your money in. The idea is to try to pay for the entire set-up right now and then it will be possible to put on bigger and better celebrations in the future without financial worries.

At the latest report, a contract has been let to the West Texas Utilities Company for the lighting which will be adequate in every respect. The arena fence should be completed within the next day or so and the outside fence around the grounds will be started. The arena has been bladed and leveled and plans call for grading work on the race track as soon as machinery can be moved in. The race track will set to the south side of the arena and part of the track will pass between the proposed bleachers and the arena. If funds are in sight, the contract for the bleachers will probably be let within the next few days.

The Rodeo committee has been authorized to go ahead and contract for good rodeo stock and complete arrangements in this category so that the program may be announced within the next week or two. Early announcement in this respect will allow entrants to make their plans to enter the rodeo here instead of some other place.

Those who are not acquainted with the location of the rodeo grounds are invited to drive by and see what has been accomplished so far. The grounds are located north across the railroad tracks from the Consumer Station which is located on the east edge of town.

Enthusiasm is growing each day in regard to the celebration and right now everything points to one of the biggest and gayest affairs to be held here in recent years. ### Rain All Around Us, But Little Falls Here

It looks like a part of Donley County will have to wait a little longer to get some good moisture as the wind seems to be taking over at the present time. Strong winds have prevailed during the greater part of the past week and only a small amount of moisture was recorded at the official weather station at the airport. A total of .23 inch was received the past week and .22 inch of that amount fell last Friday night. At this same time the extreme east part of the county received around an inch and one-half and a strip across the northwest part of the county received around two inches over the week end. The rain which struck that area Friday afternoon late deposited some heavy hail stones that were described nearly as large as base balls. This same storm carried the heavy rain and hail across the Goodnight-Claude area. The heavier rain fall has been passing to either side of Clarendon and the center of the county, but it probably won't be long before this slighted section receives a hum-dinger - - we hope without the hail or other destruction.

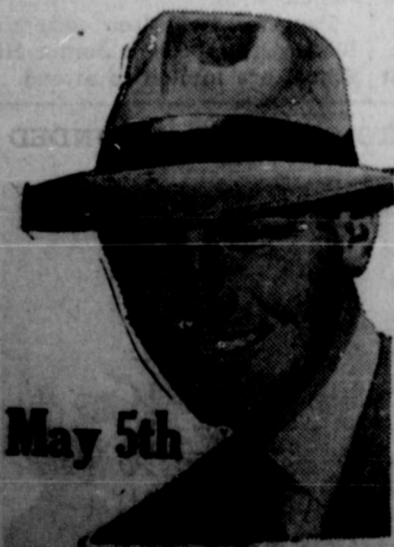

School Children Now Making Plans For Picnics In Palo Duro Canyon

School children from all parts of the Tri-State Area are making plans for school picnics in Palo Duro Canyon this Spring. "The hundreds of youngsters who visited the canyon in the past few years will number into the thousands this year," said Park Manager John McCarty.

So far, a class from Panhandle A&M College, Gyman, Okla., the seniors of Kelton, Texas, and the Eighth Grade of Rolla, Kans., have visited Palo Duro this year.

Plans are being made for the seniors of Lamesa, the entire Panhandle High School, and from 400 to 500 students from the Canyon Grade Schools.

Special arrangements for students coming long distances have been made for food and lodgings at West Texas State College in Canyon. The students stay at college dormitories for just the cost of laundering linens and they

eat in the college cafeteria at regular student prices.

The students also make tours of the college campus and the Panhandle Plains Historical Museum on the campus.

In the canyon there is to be square dancing at the first crossing; horseback trail rides, sight-seeing tours along the new paved highway, picnics and barbecues.

Charges at the gate are 50 cents for car and driver; 30 cents for each additional adult, and 15 cents for each child 12 years old and under.

You have heard the saying: "To believe nothing that you hear and only half that you see." Anyway, a friend was telling me about his friend that practiced this old rule. He said, they were driving through the country and a little ways off the road was a white mule grazing along side-ways to them. "See the white mule", said my friend. "Well", said his friend, "He's white on one side."

If I was a person that made a habit of giving out advice that was unasked for; which I am, I would advise some of the wheat farmers that are planning on going into the cotton raising business to proceed with caution. 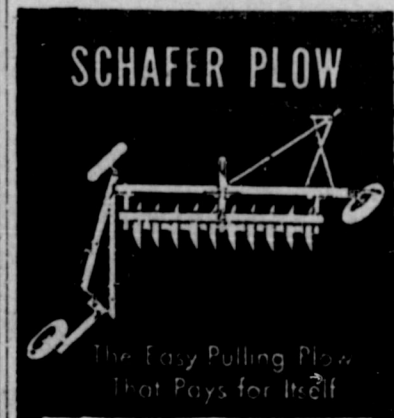

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**The Blue Jay**

How many times on these early summer mornings have we been awakened in our beds by the shrill shriek of the blue jay? Of all the birds that come to our homes each year the blue jay is perhaps the most difficult for us to understand.

While it is true that such insect pests as the wood-boring beetle, grasshoppers, eggs of the various caterpillars, make up about one-fifth of his daily meals, the blue jay is also accountable for the loss of many of the more useful birds whose beauty and value make our world a much happier place to live in.

How can one kind of bird be all these things? The answer may easily be found in the records of the National Wildlife Federation,

which has carefully charted the history, growth and habits of America's birds and wild animals, so that we may have a better understanding of both the two and four footed friends whom we see from time to time each day.

A resident of the Eastern United States and Southern Canada, and who is quite often seen as far west as the Dakotas, Colorado and even Texas, the blue jay actually has two personalities. He is cautious and silent in his own home, or nest, but once away from his own home and family, he is noisy and bold.

He will cry "Robber!" for the slightest cause. That cause is generally himself, as the broken eggs of the nests of other birds will grimly testify. During his mating season, he steals unmercifully from other birds, thus

depriving us of other members of the feathered legion who could and would do us a lot more good than the blue jay himself.

About three-fourths of his daily meal is composed of vegetables. This does not mean spinach, string beans and other table greens, but more likely acorns, chestnuts, beechnuts and the like. But if you do have ears of corn growing in your garden, beware of the blue jay!

From the tip of his bill to the end of his tail the blue jay is about 11½ inches long. He is a

pretty brilliant blue of wing and tail, and these colors are combined with the black crescent of the upper breast and the crested head. He is a fast flyer and has actually been known to swoop down and attack his greatest enemy, the cat.

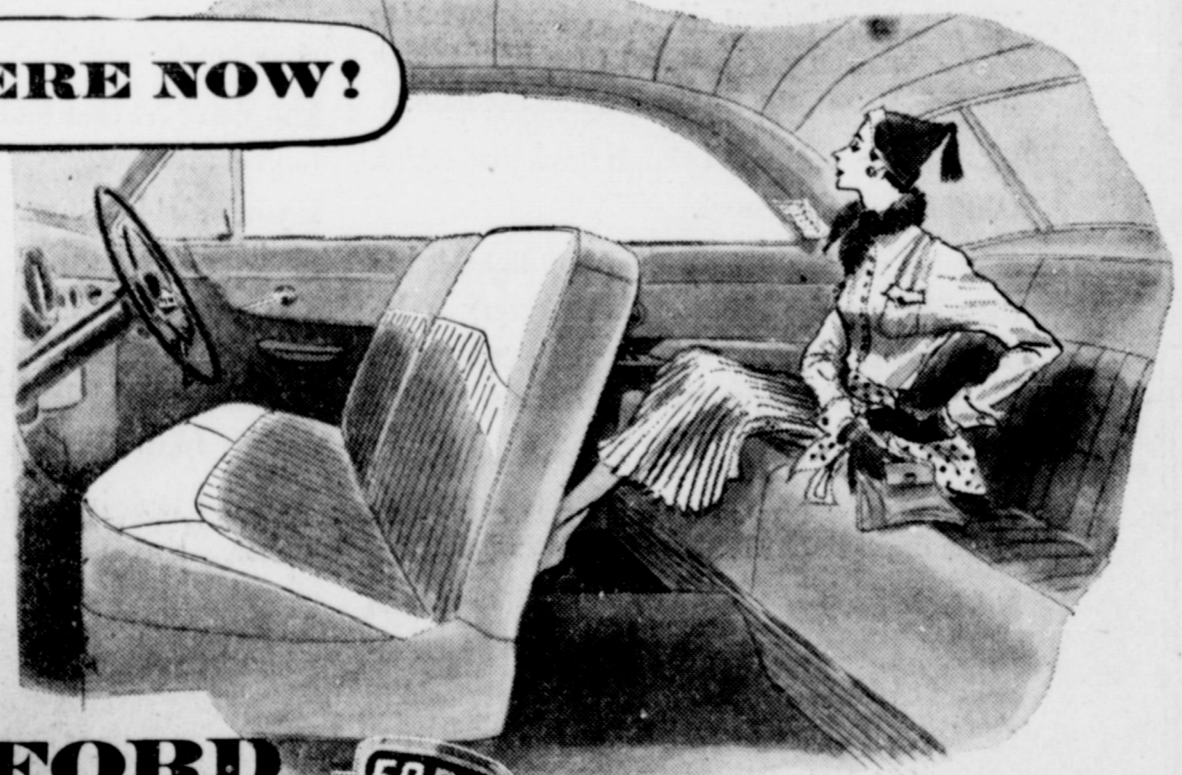

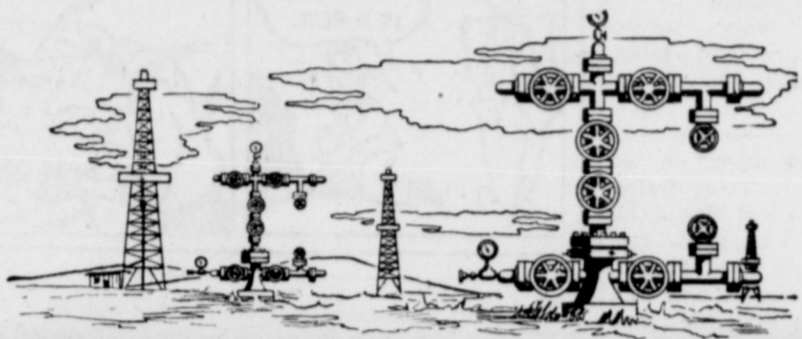

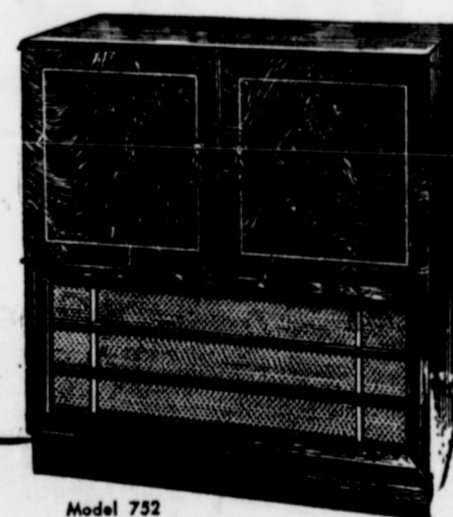

### PURCHASE ORDER AIDS SMALL FARMER

The family farm—particularly the small family-size farm—is especially benefited by the provision under the Agricultural Conservation Program for the use of purchase orders in obtaining conservation materials and services. Although the use of the purchase order is not limited to any size of farm it does fit more particularly into the needs of the small farmer.

The purchase order, in actual operation, amounts to an advance of the ACP share of the cost of the materials and services to be used. Otherwise the farmer would pay for these materials or services and be reimbursed for the ACP share several months later. The program is especially designed to aid those with limited cash and those who cannot wait for reimbursement who otherwise could not carry out needed conservation practices.

To illustrate how it works, the county PMA committee issues

purchase orders to cooperating farmers who request them for eligible practices.

The purchase order then is taken to the dealer who supplies the conservation materials or the contractor or individual who can supply the services needed. The difference between the amount of the purchase order and the cost is borne by the farmer.

### 'PLANT GUIDE ACREAGE' GEISSLER URGED

G. F. Geissler, Administrator, Production and Marketing Administration, has urged Chairman of State Committees to "take such measures as necessary to assure that every PMA county and community committee does its utmost to have farmers at least meet the county guides which have been established and even surpass them."

"Indications are that unless farmers revise their planting plans we shall not meet the feed production objective," reads the Administrator's message. "Failure to do so will have serious consequences."

"I wonder if everybody concerned has a full realization and appreciation of the fact that anything short of the feed supply requested in 1951 will mean a drastic reduction in reserve stocks and inability to maintain livestock numbers at the level necessary to meet minimum requirements."

"The immediate job is to get at least as much as the guide acreage planted to corn, barley, and grain sorghums. To influence farmers' plans between now and planting time will require prompt and vigorous action."

"National defense demands that we fulfill this responsibility."

FARMERS WITH 1948-CROP COTTON IN CCC LOAN

### TO GET CHECKS

Cotton producers who placed 1948-crop cotton under Commodity Loan Program and did not pay off their loan or sell their equity before August 1, 1949, will soon receive a check from CCC for their share in the profits from the cotton. No action of any kind need be taken by the producer unless he now has an address different from that shown on the loan agreement. Where change in address has occurred, the producer should notify PMA Commodity Office, Masonic Temple Building, New Orleans 12, Louisiana, furnishing both the old and new address, number of bales involved, name of warehouse in which cotton was stored and, if possible, the warehouse receipt number.

Approximately 3.8 million bales of 1948-crop cotton was pooled for producers accounts. All cotton in the 1948 loan has not been disposed of, and the amount remaining after satisfaction of the loans plus interest and expenses on conducting the pool is about \$67 million. Each producer will receive approximately 11 percent of the amount of the loan on the cotton.

First checks are already in the mail and the distribution should be completed within 8 or 10 weeks. Checks for individual producers will be prepared when the note card covering his cotton is reached.

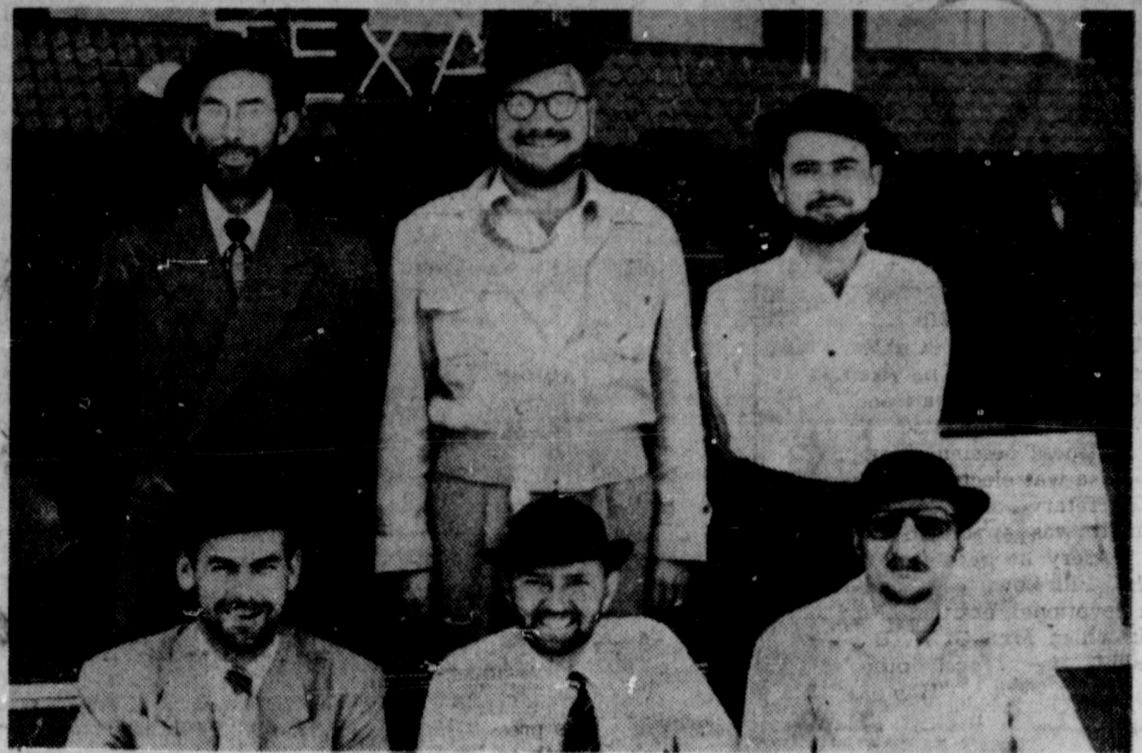

### SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

Sanderson says that many businessmen who come under Social Security as self-employed are under the impression that they should report their net income quarterly in the same manner that their employees are reported. This assumption is incorrect. A self-employed individual comes under social security only if the net income from his business is \$400.00 or more per year. In most cases, it is not possible to determine the amount of net income from a business until the end of the year, since profits in earlier months may be offset by losses occurring later. For that reason, the self-employed are required to report only once each year. This report will be made at the same time the annual income tax return is filed. A form for this purpose will be furnished by the Collector of Internal Revenue along with the income tax forms.

Although the self-employed will not report their earnings for 1951 until January 1952 Sanderson stated that they will receive credit on their social security account just the same as if they had reported each quarter.
