According to information revealed by the financial statements of Donley county's four banks an all time record high has been attained in total deposits. The total at the close of business December 31, 1951 was \$7,209,162.10. This figure is around a million dollars higher than any figure of previous years at the time of a regular bank call. The total amount of loans for the four banks was \$1,710,710.49. The increase in deposits is partially due to all-around higher prices, a fair crop year and a very good cattle year. Some of the larger cattle operators have not restocked or paid for restocking at the present time which accounts for a nice portion of the total. Local bankers report a better financial condition all the way around.

Taking the figures of the three local banks the total deposits here was \$6,401,266.95 and the total amount in loans was \$1,597,008.94. The figures for the same time one year ago showed total deposits at \$5,630,439.24 and loans at \$1,638,898.24. This shows an increase in deposits of \$770,827.71 over December 30, 1950 and a decrease in loans of \$41,889.30 covering the same period of time.

### Local Man With 40 Years Service Retires

December 31, 1951 marked the end of forty years service with Express Companies for George L. Green and he has retired. Mr. Green has been with the local Railway Express 32 years, 9 months and twelve days and during his forty years service he has worked for four different companies.

There was no pickup and delivery service when Mr. Green came to Clarendon. He first used a horse and wagon and then a Model T Ford. The model T was put into service December 6, 1923 and it was quite a ceremony when she was retired in March of 1937. The model T was replaced with the V-8 delivery truck which was still in service when the local office was closed down December 31st and moved to the Ft. Worth & Denver Depot. The express business will be handled from there in the future.

Mr. Green related how the Express business has fluctuated during the time he has been in Clarendon, stating that in the early days he worked six trains each day and had enough cargo to necessitate attaching several baggage carts behind the old model T on many occasions. At the time of retirement he was only working two trains each day and handling about as much express in a month as he did years ago in a week's time.

They also plan to visit the old home town of Ferris, Texas. After this much needed rest and vacation they will return to Clarendon where they will continue to make their home.

### Thugs Hit Local Firm For Big Loss

Hudson & Taylor, local sporting goods and paint firm, received the first big blow by burglars to hit the Clarendon area in quite some time. The burglary of the store apparently took place some time between 3 and 4 o'clock Tuesday morning (Christmas) as the thieves pulled the master switch and shut off the electric clock. The marauders made away with around \$620 in cash and merchandise estimated at between three and four thousand dollars.

Sheriff Wright stated that they apparently were professionals as they picked their merchandise very closely, taking items of greater value and quick sale merchandise. Included in the list were automatic shot guns, rifles, hunting coats, fishing equipment, knives, cigarette lighters, jewelry and other items. The burglary was a complete loss to the firm as no insurance was carried.

The break-in was discovered about 9:30 Christmas morning by Dusty Taylor, one of the owners. Sheriff Guy Wright reported yesterday that no definite clues had shown up at the present time.

Votes counted Thursday night in San Angelo by field representatives of the Board in the presence of the union and Company observers indicate that the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers failed to win a certification as bargaining agents.

Of the 152 votes cast, 45 were challenged votes. Nearly all of

the votes challenged were challenged by the Labor Board and union men. Because the number of votes challenged (mainly by these men) will necessarily determine actual results of the election, the Labor Board field men had to refuse to certify the results of the election until such votes are given proper consideration.

Lee Smith, attorney representing the Company at the election, said that in his opinion the majority of the challenged votes were votes of operators of diesel plants which the Company operates for auxiliary service in 14 towns served by the Company.

Smith continued, "The Company will do everything possible to see that its employees are allowed their democratic constitutional rights."

Donley County Soil Conservation District News

Two weeks ago, in this column, the characteristics and merits of sand lovegrass were discussed. This was the first of a series of articles on the various grasses used in the Donley County Soil Conservation District for reseeding old fields and other areas where an increase in production and soil protection is desired.

Second to be discussed is Indiangrass, a native, tall, perennial, bunchgrass. It is about equal to sand lovegrass in palatability, and like sand lovegrass has been largely grazed out of most pastures. It is the most palatable of the tall grasses, and cattle eat it well, even in winter after it has cured out.

Because of its palatability and the fact it does well on deep sandy land, it is an excellent grass to plant in a mixture with sand lovegrass. Like sand lovegrass it is somewhat slow to get started; therefore one should not plan on grazing it until the second or third year after planting. One advantage of planting it with sand lovegrass is that it makes better growth on shallow and mixed soils and on blowout areas. Since most old fields are a mixture of soils and conditions, a mixture of grasses of equal palatability is more desirable than a pure seeding of one grass. Also, cattle like a variety of grasses

better than only one. Two pounds of sand lovegrass and one to two pounds of Indiangrass per acre make a good mixture for sandy land. If this mixture is planted, plans should be made to control the grazing, as cattle will tend to graze it out. To maintain its productiveness, it should be allowed to make seed about every third year. Like other tall grasses, Indiangrass will lose its vigor and die out if a practice is made of keeping it grazed closer than six or seven inches to the ground.

Indiangrass does exceptionally well on bottom land soils and is an excellent hay grass on sub-irrigated land which will support a thick stand.

A fair supply of seed is on hand at local dealers. District grass drills are available and Soil Conservation personnel are ready to assist farmers and ranchers ready to seed a mixture of sand lovegrass and Indiangrass now. Indiangrass alone or in mixture other than sand love should be planted later — March or early April.

Financial assistance may be received from the PMA in planting Indiangrass as well as other locally adapted grasses.
