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## Chuckwagon Cookoff to be held Saturday

### Red Steagall to entertain during fourth annual Saints' Roost Museum benefit

A cavalcade of chuckwagons will be rolling into Clarendon this weekend providing a unique opportunity for visitors to catch a glimpse of the Panhandle's cowboy heritage.

The fourth annual Col. Charles Goodnight Chuckwagon Cookoff will be held Saturday, September 26, on the grounds of the Saints' Roost Museum.

Estimates placed attendance at last year's cookoff at 1,500, and museum officials are hoping for an even bigger crowd this year.

Fifteen chuckwagons will begin cooking up a meal to be served at 1 p.m. A total of \$2,800 in cash prizes will be awarded for the best food, most authentic wagon, and best overall wagon and crew.

"These chuckwagons are run by people who are very serious about cowboy cooking," said Helen Parker, chairman of the Saints' Roost Museum, which sponsors the cookoff each year.

"It isn't very difficult to take a step back into the past when you're out there among the wagons."

Chuckwagon grub isn't the only attraction. The cookoff will be augmented by a Western trade show, a photographic exhibit by Brian Humek - "The Cowboys of Donley County," and a Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. exhibit on the Goodnight Buffalo Herd and the ongoing efforts to save it.

The gates will open Saturday at 8 a.m., and the Clarendon VFW will be hosting a Cowboy Breakfast concession. The VFW will also have a concession stand available all day.

The Clarendon High School Junior Historians will be providing tours of the museum throughout the day. The museum has added several new exhibits since last year's cookoff including a Model-T Ford and an art col-

lection that was formerly located in the Patching Club House. Also, a museum gift shop is now open with several items of interest available for sale.

The cookoff meal will be served at 1 p.m. this year, and there will be "open mike" entertainment throughout the day.

Relatives of Col. Goodnight will also be holding their annual Goodnight Family Reunion during the cookoff this year.

At 5 p.m. there will be a concert featuring Red Steagall, the Official Cowboy Poet of Texas, as well as cowboy poet Jeremiah Johnson, and the music of Duke Davis and his Swing Riders.

Drawings will be held for a pair of James Owens' handmade boots and for a metal artwork by Bill Brown. An alfalfa hay bale auction will also be held courtesy of Dan Sawyer.

Tickets for this all-day event sell for \$15 for everything including a chuckwagon meal and \$8 for a day pass which give access to everything other than a meal. Tickets are on sale now at Hensons and will be available at the gate the day of the event.

The Col. Goodnight Chuckwagon Cookoff is quickly earning the reputation as being the best cookoff of this type anywhere. It is held in honor of pioneer plainsman Col. Charles Goodnight, who invented the chuckwagon. Proceeds from the event go to support the activities of the Saints' Roost Museum. Tickets are tax deductible.

## CHS to face Memphis for Homecoming

The Broncos will host the homecoming game this Friday evening at 7:30 PM. The Cyclones, 1-2, are coming off a loss to Kress. The game should be a good challenge for the former district rivals.

"Memphis has some good, quick, skilled people. Their backs are not as physical as some of the kids we have played already. They are aggressive on offense and defense as far as their line goes. They run a misdirection type offense. So, we will really have to play heads up defense when they are on offense," predicted Head Coach Mark Howard.

"I think it should be a war. We shouldn't have any problem getting up (mentally) for the game because they used to be in our district. I just hope the kids can stay focused on what we're about. And that's a ballgame on Friday night."

The Broncos faced their toughest opponent so far in last Friday's game against Stratford. Although the Broncos never gave up or lacked in effort, a more physical Elks team handed Clarendon their third loss of the season, 45-6.

"This was by far the best team we have played. They were bigger and taller than anyone else, too. I think we really had a good start. We held them to three downs and made them punt which helped our confidence," said Coach Howard.

The Elks scored first, but the Broncos came right back. The Broncos converted 17 plays and held the ball for 10 minutes on their next drive. Colt Floyd went into the end zone on a quarterback sneak for less than a yard to cap off the Bronco surge. The extra point failed.

"The kids really executed well. I think, again, that if we control the ball and don't have any penalties, things go our way," said Howard.

The Bronco defense performed well in the first half, but seemed to wear down in the second half.

"I was really proud of our defensive aggressiveness. We stopped a much better offensive line than we did the previous two weeks. We had people in the right positions, we just didn't wrap up. I also think we got tired in the second half and started falling off tackles."

"Ultimately, our young players are still a little green. For some of them this was only their second varsity game. We had close to nine kids going both ways. And that takes its toll later in the game, especially when it's such a physical ballgame," said Coach Howard.

## Thornberry pushes disaster relief plan for farmers, ranchers

WASHINGTON, D.C. — U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) threw his support Monday behind a disaster relief plan that will provide farmers and ranchers with nearly \$4 billion dollars in federal assistance to help them cope with the drought and low commodity prices.

"The Monica Lewinsky scandal may be the number-one thing everybody in Washington is talking about right now," Thornberry stated, "but the drought and low commodity prices are things which farmers and ranchers around the country are struggling with everyday. Congress can't lose sight of its obligation to do the people's business, and helping producers who are trying to make ends meet ranks high up on

the list. "The plan announced today will help us meet that obligation by providing farmers and ranchers with nearly \$4 billion in federal disaster assistance."

The plan was announced at a news conference this afternoon at the U.S. Capitol. According to Thornberry, the plan includes \$2.25 billion in total funding to address crop disaster losses.

This funding is divided into three parts: \$1.5 billion to assist producers who have been hit by crop losses in 1998; \$675 million to provide assistance to those producers who have suffered a multiple year crop loss; and \$75 million in livestock feed assistance to assist live-

stock producers who lost their 1998 supplies of feed to disaster.

In addition, the plan also includes \$1.65 billion in market loss assistance payments to producers who are eligible for Freedom to Farm contracts. This assistance will come in the form of a one-time payment similar to the Agriculture Market Transition payments. All of the payments under this disaster relief plan will be determined and administered by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Thornberry noted that the disaster relief plan goes hand-in-hand with a tax relief package the House of Representatives is currently considering that will also benefit farmers and ranchers. The tax relief package, which could

be voted on as early as next week, includes such producer-friendly provisions as: expanding the health insurance deduction for self-employed individuals to 100 percent; making income averaging for farmers permanent; increasing the net operating loss carry-back period for farmers; providing an immediate \$25,000 per small business expense deduction; and providing an immediate increase in the inheritance tax exemption to \$1 million dollars.

Thornberry is the author of legislation that would abolish inheritance taxes entirely. He said the disaster relief plan and tax relief package, taken together, could provide farmers and ranchers with benefits — both in the short and long term.

## Master marketer program returns to the Texas Panhandle

AMARILLO —The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is looking for a few good agricultural marketers who want to sharpen their skills and help their neighbors do the same, said Dr. Steve Amosson, farm management economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Extension's Master Marketer Training Program will be returning to the Panhandle after a three-year absence. It was premiered here in 1996 before going statewide. Since then, producers have been trained in Vernon, Wharton, Lubbock, and Waco.

"Improved marketing techniques

is one of the few areas left where producers can make great strides in upgrading their bottom line," says Amosson, program coordinator. "The Master Marketer Program provides the information necessary for producers to take a major step to improve their marketing practices."

The effort was designed to enable farmers and ranchers to develop a marketing plan, evaluate all their selling alternatives, and gain the skills necessary to execute their objectives for profit. A recently completed survey of the program's 1996 graduates also underscores its value, the economist explained.

"Ninety percent of the respon-

dents indicated an average increase in net receipts of more than \$30,000 annually as a direct result of what they had learned," he said.

"Our goal is to train 60 area producers at a higher level than any previous program. We'll be laying the groundwork for at least one marketing club in every county in the High Plains area," he added.

Graduates are expected to share their newly acquired skills and knowledge with other producers as part of the marketing club effort.

"This interaction, coupled with the investment in training by the Extension Service and the other supporters of the program, effectively spreads

agricultural marketing expertise to a much larger group," he said. Each enrollee must agree to share what he or she has learned by assisting the county agent in starting and leading a marketing club.

"This year's program is geared toward wheat, feed grains and cattle marketing," he added. The trainings will be offered in a series of four 2-day, 1-night sessions, and taught by outstanding speakers from across the country. Topics will be approached from a real world standpoint using numerous case study examples and simulated problems.

The first two-day session will be held January 6-7, 1999, followed by

the rest every two weeks on January 20-21, February 3-4, and February 17-18 at the Texas A&M Research and Extension Center in Amarillo.

Registration will be limited to 60 individuals, with a fee of \$250 per person to help offset a small portion of the total cost, according to Amosson.

"The program is being underwritten by the Texas Wheat Producers Board, Texas Corn Producers Board, Texas Farm Bureau, and the Extension Service," he said.

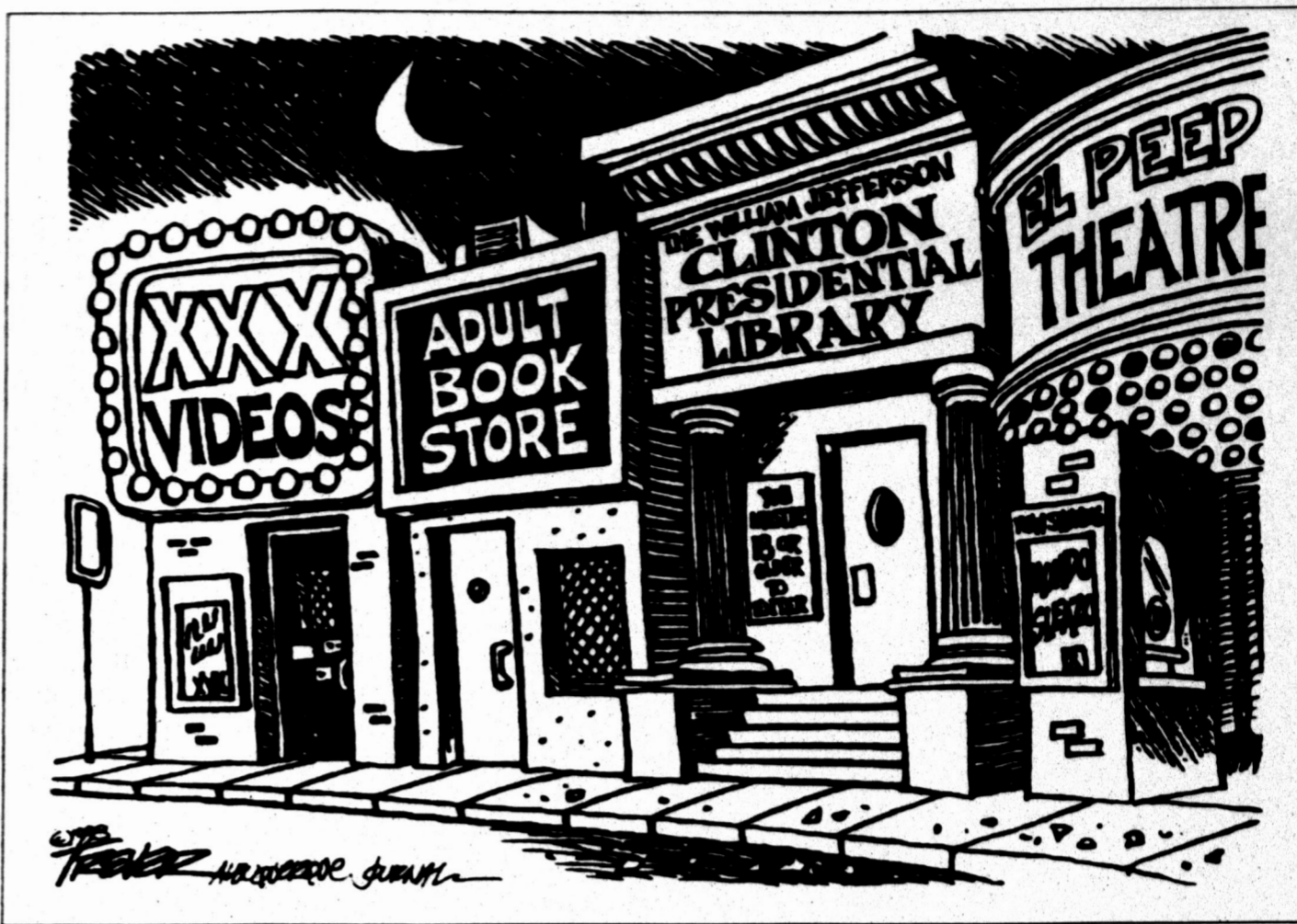
Congress has a responsibility, and they must take it seriously. For the good of the country, and the good of the Constitution, the Congress should impeach President Bill Clinton.

Congress can't lose sight of its obligation to do the people's business. And as it stands now, helping producers who are trying to make ends meet ranks pretty high up on the list. I've spent

the past few weeks working with members of the House Agriculture Committee on a plan to provide some relief from these dual disasters. We introduced this plan last Thursday, and it should be voted on by the end of the month.

It will provide farmers and ranchers with nearly \$4 billion dollars in federal disaster assistance. This includes over \$2 billion dollars for producers who have suffered current and multiple-year crop losses, and additional livestock feed assistance for livestock producers who lost their 1998 supplies of feed to disaster.

The plan also includes over a billion and a half-dollars in market loss assistance payments to producers who are eligible for Freedom to Farm pay-

ments. This disaster aid goes hand-in-hand with a tax relief bill that's expected to be voted on soon in the House. Among other things, this bill will provide for an immediate increase in the inheritance tax exemption to a million dollars and make income averaging permanent.

It will also increase the net operating loss carry-back period for farmers and let small business owners write off 100 percent of their health insurance costs.

In short, it will help make the lives of farmers and ranchers a little easier — which, after the year we've gone through so far, is the least that Washington can do.

**CISD financial condition important to community**

Clarendon CISD continues to be a vital part of the Clarendon economy by employing ninety (90) full-time employees and maintaining a payroll of over \$2,500,000. Clarendon CISD also continues to play a vital role in the lives of over 520 students by providing an "exemplary" educational experience. Because of the central community role the district assumes, the financial management and position of the district is very important. While it becomes more expensive to provide a quality education each year, Clarendon CISD has been able to maintain a relatively low tax rate while maintaining an adequate surplus fund position.

The estimated final budget for 1997-98 reveals a budget surplus position of \$213,102. This is great news because the original budget estimated a deficit of \$226,159. This was accomplished even though there was a \$260,544 increase in payroll costs, primarily because of state mandated salary increases. The state provided the district with only \$18,850 in transition aid to offset these state mandated salary increases.

The budget that Clarendon CISD adopted for the 1998-99 school year reflects the increased cost of payroll expenses while reducing total expenses from the previous year. The total budget for 1998-99 is \$11,801 lower than the estimated final expenditures for 1997-98. This reduction in total expenditures was accomplished even though payroll expenses are expected to increase \$178,710, primarily due to state mandated salary increases. The state will provide the district with only \$29,860 to offset the mandated salary increases for the year. It is most difficult to maintain a positive budget position when the state mandates salary increases without providing the funds. The local district is then required to dig deeper into its own pockets. The table accompanying this article provides a comparison of the 1998-99 budget with the budget figures for the previous two years.

When the district is required to provide the funding for state mandated salary increases, it is important that the district maintain an adequate

fund balance. This means the district must collect and retain funds ample to meet the increased payroll needs. As the chart below indicates, the district has maintained a healthy, though not exaggerated, fund balance over the past several years.

The district has been able to maintain a healthy fund balance, provide an "exemplary" education, and maintain a relatively low tax rate. The tax rate for Clarendon CISD for the coming year will remain \$1.20. This ranks the district in the lowest 25% of school district tax rates in the panhandle

region. The chart below provides a history of the Clarendon CISD tax rate since 1994.

Topics that were discussed were "New Extension Program in the Panhandle," "How Panhandle Counties are Obtaining and Using State Surplus Road Material," and "County Costs Associated with Trials and Court Reporters."

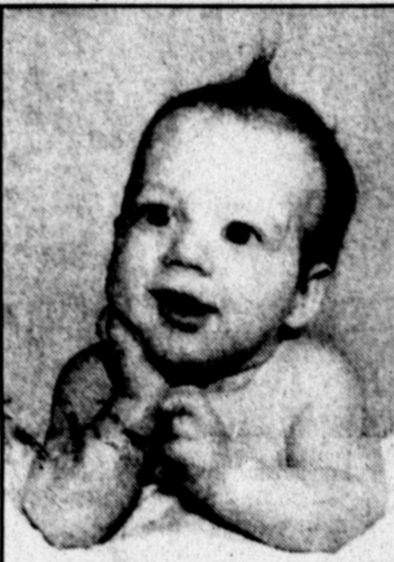
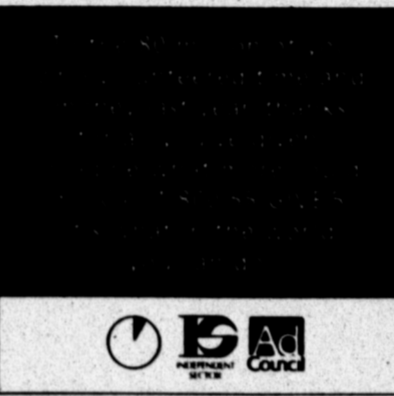

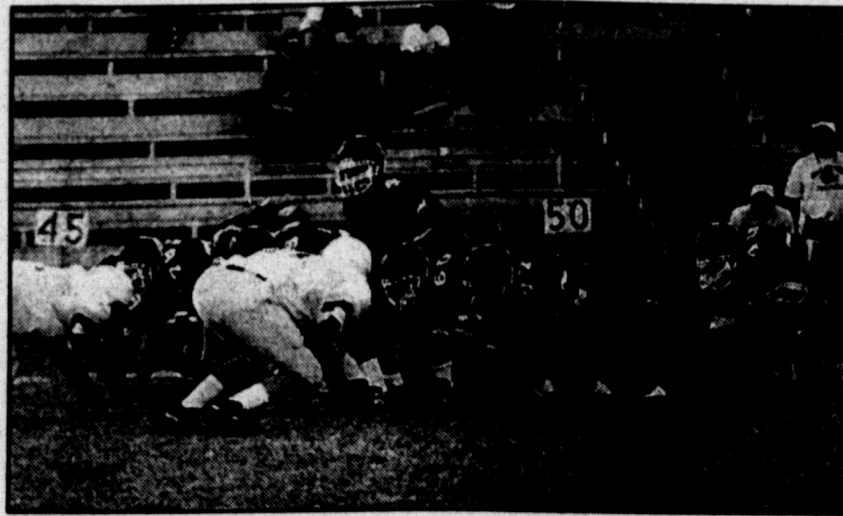
G.J. Martindale.

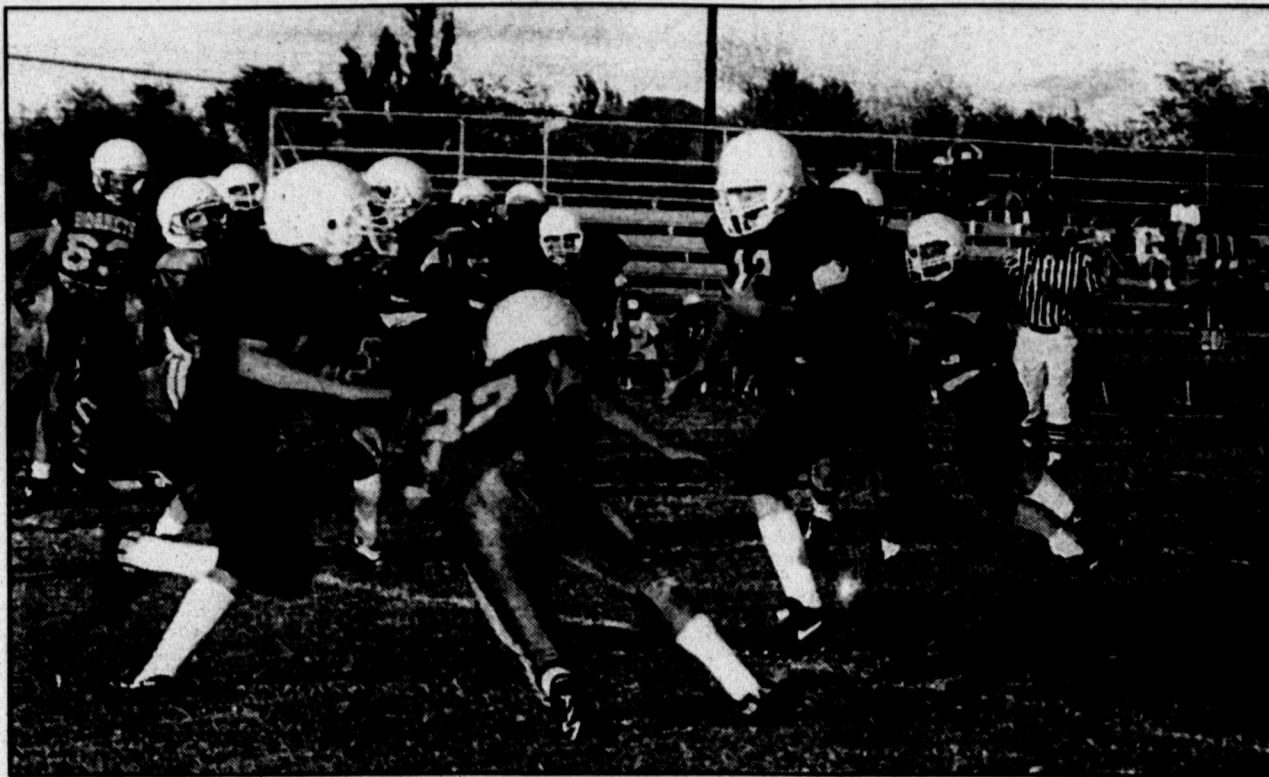

### TNRCC offers method of disposing pesticides

The Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission is offering rural Texans the opportunity to dispose of banned or unwanted pesticides, properly rinsed plastic pesticide containers, used motor oil, oil filters, and lead acid batteries free of charge.

The purpose of the cleanup campaign is to offer rural areas disposal and recycling opportunities for farm ranch wastes and recyclables. Since 1991, 11,475 participants have disposed of 2 million pounds of pesticides and recycled five million pounds of material.

A collection will be held at the Clyde Carruth Pavilion, one mile east

of Pampa on Hwy. 60 at rodeo grounds off Recreation Park Drive, Friday, Oct. 2, from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Empty plastic pesticide containers must be clean, triple-rinsed, or high-pressure rinsed to be accepted. Tires will not be accepted.

Disposal costs for one 55-gallon drum of pesticide could cost a farmer \$1,500 to \$2,000 at a commercial facility. All agricultural chemicals will be accepted excluding pesticides or herbicides containing 2,4,5-T - Silvex; explosives; compressed gas cylinders; fertilizers or nutrient materials that are neither hazardous nor contain pesticide admixtures; or pesticide

or wood preservatives containing Pentachlorophenol. Chemicals will not be accepted from chemical manufacturers.

Agricultural Waste Pesticide and Texas Country Cleanup Collections are co-sponsored by the TNRCC's Clean Texas 2000, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and the Texas Dept. of Agriculture. The following local recyclers have donated their time services for this collect: Interstate Battery of Amarillo; E&E Enterprises and USAg Recycling.

**A Saddle, Photographs, and a "Cyclopedia"**

Recent donations to the Museum collection include a saddle once belonging to JA cowboy and rancher

W.J. "Buffalo" Heim. The fine saddle was custom made for Heim by noted leathersmith Bud Dolcater of Amarillo, himself a former JA ranch rider.

"My dad was one hell of a cowboy," said Raymond Heim, now a ranch owner near Amherst, Texas. "He could do it all!"

Raymond Heim, who brought the saddle from Amherst to the Museum himself, recalled the time his father was stricken with appendicitis at his Lazy "H" Ranch on the other side of the Palo Duro Canyon and had to be brought to the Adair Hospital by horse and buggy.

"There were no roads through the canyon at that time, only trails," the younger Heim recalls. "When the doctor here looked at him, he said he had one chance in a thousand of making it. But he did. My father was a tough old bird."

Ruth Lindley has donated four photographs to the Saints' Roost collection. One large photo shows JA cowboy and hunter Bill Cross with his greyhound pack and a recent kill. Another photo shows part of a JA Ranch roundup with the photographer's vehicle in among the cattle. A smaller photo is of a group of unidentified women visiting the JA chuckwagon at supper time, and the final small photo is of a Cross family baby, which was snapped in front of a ranch log cabin, possibly the first building built by Charles Goodnight when he came to settle in the canyon.

The "Cyclopedia" was donated by Mary and Sam Combs and is a book of and about the railroad. This volume makes an important addition to our railroad collection, which we hope will eventually fill a good portion of the depot. The Combs family

also plans to donate two old stoves that were once in the depot.

All of these donations are greatly appreciated. Donations form the basis of any collection, and the people of Clarendon and Donley County have shown great support for their museum through donations such as the ones mentioned.
