Regents approve CC baseball

The Clarendon College Board of Regents gave the go-ahead for inter-collegiate baseball during their regular meeting last Thursday, July 9.

In a unanimous vote, the regents budgeted \$51,000 to kick off the new program which officials hope will boost enrollment and provide additional attractiveness to the school.

"I'm very excited about this," said CC Athletic Director Joe Mondragon. "This is just another element of growth for our community, and I believe this new program will pay for itself through increased enrollment."

CC hopes to bring in 50 to 75 new students with the program. That could increase the school's enrollment by 12% on the home campus.

If agreement can be reached with the city and the Little League, the Bulldogs would play at McClellan Field at the City Park. Some modifications to the fencing will have to eventually be made, but research done by college officials indicates that the senior league field will serve adequately.

The new athletic program will be non-scholarship during the first year to help keep the start up costs down. Research done by the college indicates that the program can be successful in its first year without providing scholarships.

CC Dean of Students Thad Anglin said students from small schools are often overlooked by the larger colleges' baseball recruiters. However, they can come to Clarendon College — paying the full amount for room, board, tuition, and fees — and still be ahead of where they would be with just a small scholarship to a large school.

"I'm really glad that this is going to happen, and we see a lot of support in the community for this program," Anglin said.

"We've seen the popularity of baseball increasing in the Panhandle," he said. "These kids just want to play ball; they live and love baseball."

Baseball at Clarendon College has been talked about for several years, but now more and more prospective students are asking about its availability. And Anglin says the program will be one more attraction to bring students to CC.

"Baseball will create an excitement on campus during the spring time when things usually slow down and will provide additional activities for our students," Anglin said.

The new program will also help diversify the student population and that, Anglin says, is good for retention. "If [the students] feel like they

belong here, they will stay and be successful. We can keep them here for two years and graduate them," he said.

Frank Phillips College and Vernon Regional Junior College have implemented successful baseball programs and are reportedly happy to

hear that Clarendon will also be fielding a team in the Western Junior College Athletic Conference.

Larger schools are also issuing words of encouragement to CC since they recruit junior college athletes for their programs since they are more

serious about playing ball.

Starting any new program involves a certain amount of risk for a college, but Anglin says that shouldn't stop Clarendon College. "Don't be scared to take a risk," he said, "because sometimes it's necessary."

Funds available for housing in rural areas

TEMPLE — Steven A. Carriker, State Director for Texas USDA Rural Development, announced today that federal funds are available for direct and guaranteed rural housing loans.

"In fact, there are more funds available today than last year," said Carriker. "We anticipate that fiscal year 1999 will be a banner year for housing funds in rural Texas. Very low, low and moderate income applicants may qualify for financing to purchase a dwelling or building site, construct, repair, or refinance homes that meet local codes and provide adequate affordable housing."

Loans are available depending on repayment ability and the location of the home or building site.

There are several programs available to provide assistance including direct and guaranteed housing loans and home repair loans and grants. The direct home ownership loan is designed to provide very low and low income families with financing to build, purchase, repair or refinance homes and building sites that meet local codes and provide adequate affordable housing. Funds may also be used to modernize or repair a home already owned by an applicant. Loans may be made for up to 100% of appraised market value which can include the closing costs. The loan term is 33 years. The interest rate is fixed for the life of the loan and is currently 6.75%. Payment assistance is available, based on family size and income, which may reduce the full note payment to as low as one percent (1%).

To be eligible for financing, direct or guaranteed, the home must be located in a RURAL community with less than 10,000 population, on a farm or in open country not closely associated with an urban area. Under certain conditions, loans can be made in towns and cities between 10,000 and 25,000 population.

The guaranteed rural housing loan may be used to finance new homes or existing homes that are structurally sound and have certified heating, electrical, plumbing, and insulation systems. The interest rate is set by the lender for an amount not to exceed the Fannie Mae 30 year fixed rate plus .6 of 1%. The loan may be for up to 100% of the market value. All loans must be secured by a first deed of trust on a residential property.

Home repair loans and grants may be used to pay for needed repairs and improvements to dwellings of eligible very low income families. Grant funds are available for homeowners 62 and over who cannot repay a loan and must be used to remove health and safety hazards such as repairing roofs, heating, electrical and plumbing systems, water and waste disposal, installing screens, windows, insulation and other steps to make the home safe. Home improvement loans may include similar purposes but may also be used to modernize and bring a home up to standards, make changes for convenience, add a room, remodel and make overall improvements to the home. The home must be owner-occupied. The loan amount cannot exceed \$20,000 and grant assistance may not exceed

\$7,500. There are a number of restrictions including using funds to move a mobile home, make off-site improvements or refinance existing debts. Loans under this program are made with an interest rate of 1% and have a maximum term of 20 years.

All applicants must meet basic eligibility requirements such as being unable to obtain a loan from other conventional lending sources on terms they can afford, being without ownership of decent, safe and sanitary housing, have sufficient income for loan repayment, taxes, insurance, living expenses and other existing debts, possess the legal capacity to incur debt, and have an acceptable credit history. There are other criteria that must be met depending on the type of program an applicant is interested in.

Currently there are 26 local offices throughout Texas. To find the office that serves your county, please call the Single Family Housing section at (254) 742-9770.

Everyone who lives in a rural area and meets the basic eligibility qualifications is encouraged to apply for these funds.

Perry says TxDOT allows mowing/baling along highway rights-of-way

AUSTIN — Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry announced today that the Texas Department of Transportation has notified the Texas Department of Agriculture that farmers and ranchers can mow and bale forage along Texas highway rights-of-way. Procedures covering mowing and baling are in place in each TxDOT district office.

Dry conditions across the state have made this forage a source of fuel for potential wildfires.

"Texas farmers and ranchers appreciate TxDOT's cooperation during these adverse conditions," Perry said. "Mowing and baling of these rights-of-way help remove a fuel source for potential wildfires plus allow producers access to additional forage for their livestock."

The Texas Forest Service has classified more than half of Texas as being under high or extreme wildfire danger.

Farmers and ranchers wanting to mow or bale rights-of-way adjacent to their property should contact the district engineer in the appropriate TxDOT district office. TxDOT usu-

Perry briefs Ag Secretary on drought conditions

WASHINGTON D.C. — Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry recently briefed U.S. Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman on drought conditions in Texas and its impact on farmers and ranchers.

In a meeting at U.S. Department of Agriculture headquarters, Perry shared economic impact figures compiled by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service which project direct income loss for agricultural producers of \$517 million and an additional \$1.2 billion in lost economic activity for the state as a result of ongoing dry conditions.

"It's time to put the lessons learned from the drought of 1996 into play for 1998," said Perry. "Secretary Glickman is now well aware of the serious situation we're facing in Texas, and he has vowed to work with me and our congressional delegation to help our farmers and ranchers during this rough time."

Deputy Secretary of Agriculture Robert Rominger, Farm Service Agency Administrator Keith Kelly, and other USDA officials were also present during the meeting. Perry strongly urged Glickman to streamline

the disaster declaration process. In 1996, applications from Texas counties seeking declarations took as long as four months to make it through the system. Perry told Glickman that Texas producers simply can't afford to wait that long.

Perry advised Glickman that backlogs for producer operating loans are severely impacting Texas agricultural operations. Perry cited an example of one Rio Grande Valley producer who applied for a production loan in November of last year. That producer has yet to receive an answer from FSA on the application.

Perry thanked the Secretary for quickly approving a request allowing grazing on Conservation Reserve Program lands, but suggested he also allow dried grasses to be harvested from CRP lands. Authority to hay CRP lands would provide needed forage while eliminating a major source of fuel for wildfires across the state.

Perry also shared concerns voiced by producers in the Rio Grande Valley regarding crop insurance flexibility by the Federal Crop Insurance Corp. during the drought. Citrus and sugarcane producers who have long-term investments in their crops fear

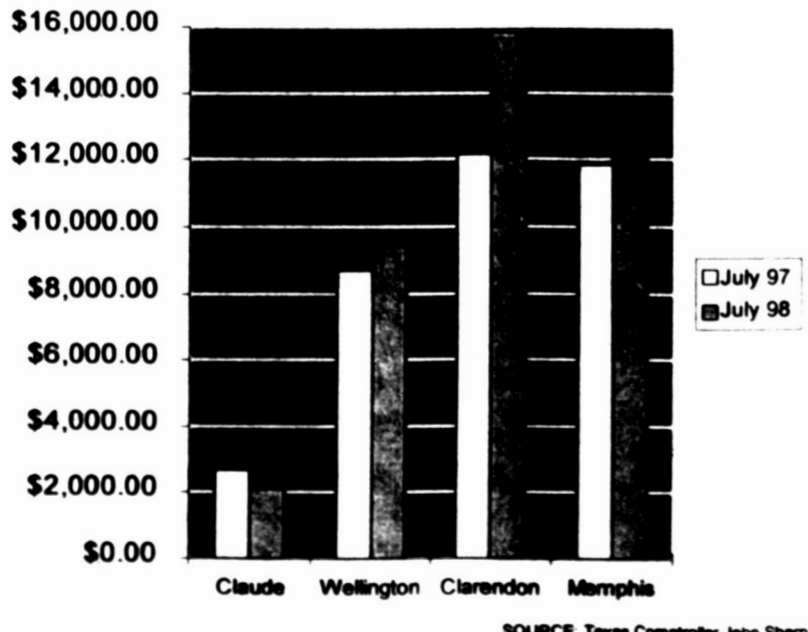
they may be denied crop insurance due to water reservoir scarcity. Valley cotton producers are also concerned that they will be forced to take non-irrigated crop insurance for their crops, which provides less coverage than irrigated crops insurance.

Earlier in the day, Perry met with U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm (D - Abilene) and U.S. Rep. Ruben Hinojosa (D - McAllen) to discuss drought issues and possible assistance from the congressional side. Talks focused on problems faced by producers statewide, but especially in the Rio Grande Valley where a fifth straight year of weather-related crop losses is expected.

"Through the leadership of Rep. Hinojosa, Rep. Stenholm, and other key members of the Texas congressional delegation such as Rep. Larry Combest, Rep. Henry Bonilla, Sen. Phil Gramm and Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison, I am confident the concerns of our Texas farmers and ranchers will be voiced loud and clear in Washington," said Perry.

"Such a coalition is important to the future of Texas agriculture if our state is to receive its fair share of the limited disaster assistance available."

Clarendon sales tax rebate up thirty percent

AUSTIN — State Comptroller John Sharp last week delivered a total of \$174.5 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,091 Texas cities and 118 counties, a 13.5 percent increase over the \$153.7 million allocated in July 1997.

This month's sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in May and reported by businesses filing monthly returns in June.

"A robust economy, driven in large part by high employment in the Texas job market and a steady demand for construction of housing and apartments, continues across the state," Sharp said. "Year-to-date, rebates to cities and counties are up 11.3 percent over last year."

Locally, the city of Clarendon saw an increase of 30.4% for a total rebate of \$15,807.97. Hedley was up 47.54% to \$221.24, but Howardwick fell 71.03% to \$314.14.

Harmon sounds off on issues

Lubbock Democrat Mark Harmon is running for the thirteenth congressional district seat this November.

Last week, Harmon stopped by the *Enterprise* to discuss his views on running for office and his positions on the issues facing this district.

Harmon, who has been a journalism professor for ten years at Texas Tech University, says he has always been interested in politics and has served as the Lubbock County Democratic Party Chairman. He has also been a Big Brother to three boys, a mentor in a scholars program, and a member of several community boards including Planned Parenthood.

If elected this November, Harmon says he will only serve six years in the House of Representatives.

The biggest issue facing the 13th district, according to Harmon, is to

protect and preserve Social Security. "We have a large number of people from this district who are on Social Security," he said. "Any budget surpluses should go toward shoring up Social Security."

The next two biggest issues facing the district are full funding of Head Start and making sure our veterans are well cared for, he says.

As far as tax cuts are concerned, Harmon says Congress should focus on cutting the taxes that affect everybody — namely payroll taxes. He said that payroll taxes should be frozen at their current levels, and that if there are any surpluses left after fixing Social Security, they should go toward reducing payroll taxes. Corporate welfare should also be stopped, he said.

Harmon says he will be visiting Clarendon again as the election grows near.

Sunday, the 28th, the group participated in services at the Chinle Memorial Baptist Church by presenting special music, teaching Sunday School classes, and leading the entire evening service. The church members treated the visitors to an ice cream

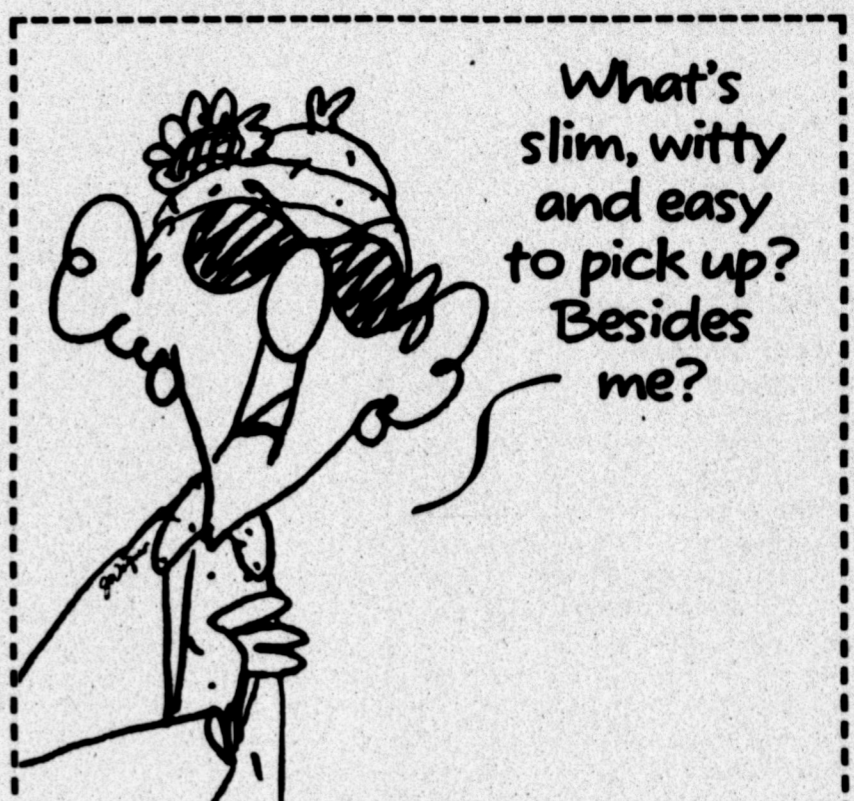

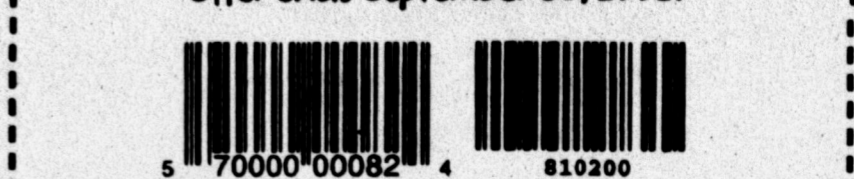

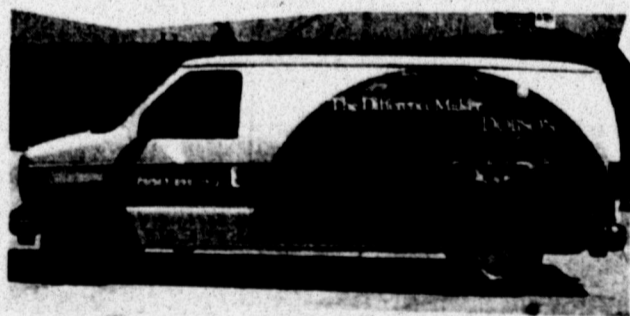

Man tells about ordeal during WWII

The following story was written by Archie Gatrost and submitted by Cleo Russell. Mr. Russell served in the same outfit as Mr. Gatrost for three years beginning in Jan of 1943.

Our unit arrived on the island of New Guinea very shortly after Pearl Harbor. Being a maintenance repair squadron, we carried our shop equipment with us; however, we had very little metal stock of any kind. In that the US was far behind on urgent back orders from other war areas, we were put on hold. This didn't keep the Japs from their offensive action. To try and find material to work with, we searched beaches, checked with other units in the area, set up flights to Australia to purchase what we could.

We were loaded on a liberty ship headed for New Guinea by way of Australia. As we left Australia for New Guinea, Tokyo Rose came over the radio saying, "We see you, we know you are coming, and we know where you are going to set up operations." Our bombers will be there to welcome you on your first night. They did just that and for many nights to follow. She told us several times, the exact time they would be over, and they were there. At this time the Japanese were pretty well calling the shots, they had the upper hand.

At this early stage of the war, our main fighter aircraft were the P-39's and P-40's, with a few A-20's. The C-47 was our work horse. Material was needed for modifications and improved combat capabilities as well as things being needed in our own units and other units on the island. In our search, we found out from the Australians that in the northern part of New Guinea, just over the ridge and high in the mountains was a gold mine, owned by Australia and the Americans. They told us that due to the proximity of the Japanese forces, the whole area had been vacated and that there was a good supply of all kinds of material in that area. They further said they expected the Japanese soldiers to be in that area within 24 hours, so we would have to move fast. We were in such great need we decided to take a chance. We should remember here that we were not only fighting for the island

but for our lives. Our CO set up a C-47 and a pilot for us. I took two men with me. We loaded up a jeep and a trailer and left early the next morning. The small plane we were going to was called Wow. The only in and out was by air; everything in the place had to be flown in.

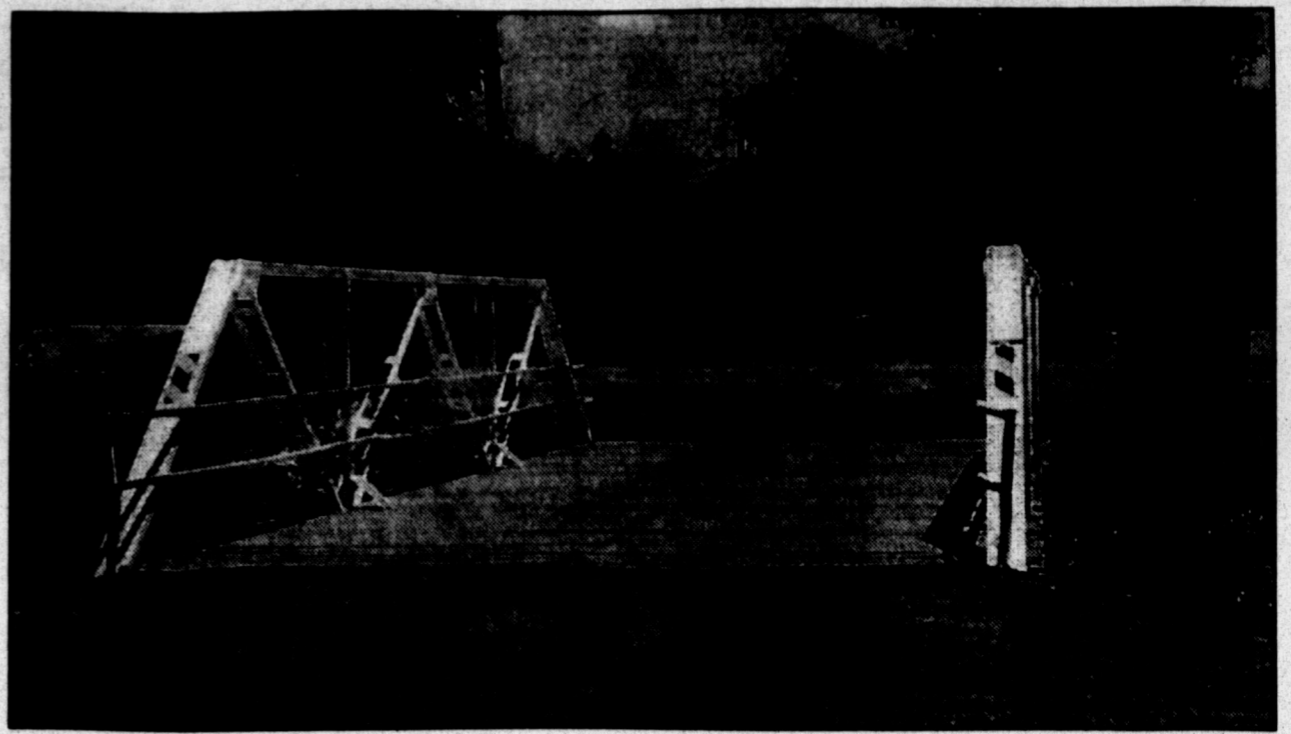
From the air we could see the little air strip at Wow; it looked like a little clearing at the base of a mountain, built on about a 15 to 20 degree incline. We landed going up hill and parked at the very top behind some bushes and trees. The plane was positioned for a quick take-off. We unloaded the jeep and trailer, checked a rough map we had, and took a small trail up the mountain. The little area of Wow was desolate; no one could be seen, two airplanes were on the landing strip but they looked to be out of commission. We traveled about 30 minutes or more up the trail and arrived at large flat area on top of small hill near a large mountain. This turned out to be a storage area, just what we were looking for. We could see the little place of Wow, and the small air strip below. Without losing any time, we started loading our trailer. It wasn't long and we heard the familiar sound of Jap Bombers above; one couldn't mistake the sound. The large flat we were on seemed to be in their flight pattern. I looked up and saw the lead plane; he had already seen us. His head was hanging out over the side of the plane watching our every move; they were so close I could have thrown a rock and hit them. The lead pilot must of thought we were harmless for he passed us up without turning his guns or dropping any bombs on us. The whole flight passed us by, all with their heads hanging out, looking everything over. The air strip must of been their mission. Shortly after they passed, they released their bombs, and we could see them drop on the air strip; it looked like a bunch of bon fires poking up. We were worried about our little airplane; that was our only way out. In fact that may have been the way they had it figured. We finished loading up our trailer and headed back to the air strip. What a pleasant sight! The other two planes were beat up, but they could of been decoys

anyway. Ours wasn't scratched. The air strip was shot full of holes. That was concern of course.

Below, in a large ravine was a dredge used for mining gold. Before leaving we wanted to go down and pick up a few things. On the way we came across a large flat field nearly the size of a football field. A battle must of just taken place in this area, as we could see where they buried the dead. They must of been in a hurry as one could see arms, legs, and other parts of the body sticking out of the ground. It was a Japanese burial as we could see the battle flags with signatures written on them. I was not able to figure this one out. We were supposed to have been in and out before they arrived. Anyway we hurried through the dredge, one could see tools and sacks of ore sitting around as if they had left in a hurry. We picked up a few things and hurried back to our plane.

We had our plane loaded pretty heavy but decided it was OK. We prepared for take off. The pilot was trying to pick a strip of land where he could miss and straddle bomb craters for a down hill take off. The end of the air strip dropped off into a canyon; with maximum RPM he took off. It took the full length of the strip to get the plane off the ground. So we were on our way back to home base. No, not yet. We saw some Jap fighter planes above us. We had little advantage as we could fly low in the valleys and work our way back. They may of been afraid to come down that low with high mountains around. Anyway, we were very happy to land at Port Moresby with a load of very precious materials and it wasn't gold.

A few coincidental side lights: If we had been a n hour or so later in our arrival in Wow, the Jap bombers would have already torn up the air strip and left before we arrived. We would of probably landed and cracked up on of the bomb craters and couldn't get out. It looks like the Jap bombers were timed (according to our information) to bomb out the air strip just prior to this expected battle so that Australian and US forces couldn't be flown in to reinforce the ones already in the area.
