### How do the changes affect GTE customers?

Some General Telephone customers are asking: "Do all the changes mean an end of the telephone business or is it a new beginning? How do the changes affect GTE customers?"

According to E.L. "Bud-dy" Langley, president of General Telephone Company of the Southwest, his company will still provide customers with traditional end-to-end telecommunications service, if customers desire. "But," he added, "the changes brought by ongoing deregulation and the divestiture Jan. 1, 1984 of AT&T and the Bell operating companies are making new options available to customers."

although there is some

frustration among customers and companies as these changes are introduced, customers can now buy or lease telephone instruments, select from a variety of repair and warranty options, install their own house wiring or employ the telephone company or an outside vendor to install it, and subscribe to various long-distance calling services.

Langley emphasized that General Telephone of the Southwest is still a full service provider for customers who prefer to have their telephone equipment and services provided by the company. "An over simplified summary of the changes basically means General Telephone and other

local telephone companies now provide the network for completing local calls and for connecting customers to the long-distance carrier," Langley said.

"We are similar to what has been the norm for years with electric, gas and water companies. We provide and are responsible for the distribution network up to a designated point on the customer's premises. The customer is responsible for the lines and instruments beyond that designation point."

He explained deregulation has been going on for several years as state and federal controls have been eliminated and competition has been introduced, particularly in the areas of telephone instruments and long-distance service. Divestiture of AT&T changes the way all local telephone companies receive long-distance revenues.

Langley summarized and commented on the changes as follows:

#### TELEPHONE INSTRUMENTS

Since Jan. 1, 1983 customers have been able to continue leasing telephone instruments from General Telephone, or to purchase their own instruments from the company or other vendors.

Langley said customers purchasing their own telephone should be aware of the warranty and repair procedures provided with any purchased equipment, and should make sure the telephone will be compatible with the local telephone equipment and services.

As examples, he said some push button telephones do not give true touchdown call tones over the network that are required for some services, and those that do give true touch call pulses will not work on some of the switching equipment. Another problem is on party line service where exact ringing requirements are needed.

"We urge customers to check with the vendors and telephone company before purchasing equipment," Langley said.

**REPAIR AND WARRANTY**

Phones purchased from General Telephone and other vendors have warranties that vary from manufacturer to manufacturer. GTE Phone Marts can perform some minor repairs on instruments purchased from the company for a charge when the instrument is out of warranty but the repair of purchased phones is the responsibility of the customer and the manufacturer.

Phones leased from the telephone company are repaired without charge, provided they are returned to a designated repair location. A service call charge similar to those assessed by other service companies, such as plumbers, electricians and appliance repairmen, applies when an employee is requested to come to the customer's premises to do repair work.

**HOUSE WIRING**

The wiring from the point of connection at the premises to the telephone can be provided and repaired by the company at a fee as approved by the state commission, or customers can purchase the materials from the company or other vendors and do the work themselves, or arrange for a third party to do the work.

Langley explained the service call charges for sending an employee to a customer's premises and for wiring repair work were required because of the deregulation of these services. "Prior to deregulation, the costs to the company of providing these services

were spread over all customers in local monthly service rates," he pointed out. "Under deregulation where some customers provide their own phones and do their own wiring, the costs of providing the services must be paid by those requesting the service rather than all customers."

**LONG-DISTANCE SERVICE**

"GTSW facilities are used to connect customers with various long-distance companies that may provide long-distance service in an area," the president said. "In other words, long-distance calls go through our equipment to reach the facilities of the long-distance companies."

"Except for the long-distance options now available, the long-distance related changes customers are most likely to notice is in the format of the telephone bill. Long-distance calls placed over AT&T long-distance facilities will be shown separately from those long-distance calls made within the local geographic area called a LATA (Local Access and Transport Area) which

was established under the court ordered divestiture of AT&T.

"Eventually, customers will have instant access to all long-distance carriers, similar to the single digit long-distance access now used to connect with AT&T facilities."

**PRICING CHANGES**

Langley added that some price adjustments will occur because of the changes as competition increases. "For instance, in the past, regulators have established long-distance charges to be higher than the cost of providing long-distance service in order to keep local basic service as low as possible. As long-distance prices are adjusted to the new competitive market, the subsidy will decrease and local rates will increase accordingly," he said.

"The companies and regulators must see that the public is the major beneficiary of the changes taking place. As an example, long-distance rates must be reasonable so that major users will not have need to

establish their own networks and bypass the local networks. This would result in a reduction of revenues for telephone companies and drive local rates higher for the remaining customers," Langley said.

"We must have a clear understanding of the costs involved for all services, the costs of subsidies being provided for any services, such as lifeline service, and the adequacy of the returns being earned. A telephone company that must provide subsidized services has customers who elect to do business with competitors rather than share in paying those subsidies. The loss of these customers can increase the cost of telephone service for ratepayers left on the network," Langley said.

"Our commitment is to provide the highest quality of service available at rates that are affordable to all customers as the changes continue."

Mr. William Ellerbrook is placed in the spotlight for this week's column. Mr. Ellerbrook is a very fascinating individual. To give the reader a synopsis of this man a little background must be obtained. Mr. Ellerbrook was reared in Owensboro, Kentucky. He attended Jr. High in Indiana and High School in Nacagdoches, Texas. Mr. Ellerbrook furthered his education at Stephen F. Austin State College in which he received a B.S. degree in Physics in 1958. After he obtained his bachelors he taught in Houston, Texas from 1958-1960. For a brief year he was employed for an industry. In 1961 he was offered a job teaching physics and chemistry in Childress, Texas. William accepted the offer and stayed for three years until he decided to go back to college. In 1963 he advanced his knowledge by receiving a MED from Stephen F. Austin.

In 1964 William Ellerbrook accepted a teaching position at Clarendon College. He was appointed chairman of the division in Science in 1969. Over the past twenty years he has been active in various projects. For a few years he was sponsor of the Science Club which took field trips to New Mexico, Carlsbad Caverns, East Texas and other various points of interest.

What sets Mr. Ellerbrook apart from most people is his ambition. At a young age he

set high goals for himself. He did not pick goals which were easy. Science was his hardest subject, so he decided to major in this specific area. "A major in science is next to the hardest thing except for being a doctor," stated William Ellerbrook. Of course, with science being his hardest subject, he had to study more and socialize less. Studying science is a never ending process with Mr. Ellerbrook. William decided to continue his college career as a student at West Texas State University. In 1976 he obtained a second masters. This time in physics.

"The other day a science student stated in confidence how easy it is to learn under Mr. Ellerbrook. As a teacher Mr. Ellerbrook feels science is one of the hardest areas for a student to comprehend. "The reason I work so hard at teaching is to give students a chance to learn in a hard area, such as science," stated Ellerbrook. The preceding statement describes Mr. Ellerbrook's method of teaching very precisely. He instructs the courses in such a way that the student has no other choice but learn the necessary data.

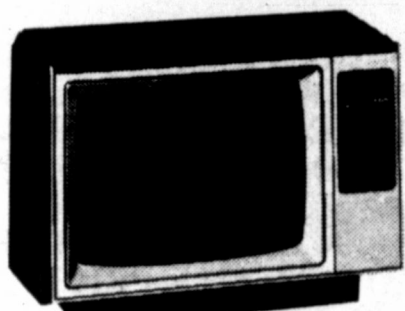

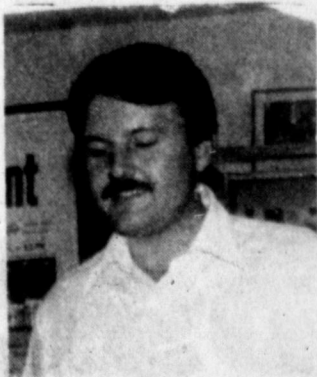
Manufacturers continue to make available an ever increasing variety of health care products that enable individuals to take better care of themselves and family members. Many of these new products are available throughout the pharmacies of North America.

Technology has improved pregnancy tests, for example, to the extent that they are accurate and easily performed in the home by untrained persons. Devices to measure blood pressure have also been improved so that little skill is needed to accurately measure blood pressure in the home. And one manufacturer has recently announced the pending availability of a simple home test for the detection of blood in the feces - a test that is potentially useful in screening for colon cancer and diseases of the stomach and intestine.

Relatively new products and devices make the home measurement of blood glucose easy to accomplish by diabetics. Persons with diabetes can take better care of themselves when blood glucose levels are known.

Technological advances will no doubt lead to other products and devices that will appear on pharmacy shelves. Each new item makes reliance on self more feasible and more attractive.

# CJC Bulldogs dominate NMMI 87-67

Thursday, January 26 at 8:00 p.m. approximately 150 fans watched Clarendon College take a conference play win from New Mexico Military Institute (NMMI) as coach Dean took his team to a 87-67 win.

The only lead NMMI possessed was at 15:50 into the first quarter when New Mexico's 6'7" Alan Tolbert

slam dunked the ball in for a two-point advantage. The Clarendon Bulldogs realized it was time to play basketball by beginning a drive which gained a 10 point lead at 9:27 in the first quarter action. NMMI called a timeout at this point in which a different course of strategy was taken. With a new game plan NMMI began to apply a more intense defense, but it somehow could not stifle the Bulldog's aggressiveness.

Fouls were predominate throughout the game. A total of 46 fouls were averaged between the two teams. The remainder of this first quarter action Clarendon College maintained a 10

point lead. With 2 seconds left NMMI fouled #22, Kent Stokes on a layup. Kent made a freethrow which left a halftime score of 37-25. Most of the first action play was slow, but steady which was indicated by the low score at halftime. The Bulldogs seemed to be lacking in the energy produced in the drive down court. Speed greatly reduced the Bulldogs usual playing ability.

Before the beginning of the second half resumed Howard Batie, #20 of the Bulldog team, was asked what he thought of his team's first play action. He replied, "We played more efficiently

than the previous two games. Coach told us to run a better offensive drive in the next half." A better offensive drive is what the Bulldogs produced at 15:29 into the second half with Clarendon leading by 20 points (51-31) after a Bulldog surge.

With 12:41 left to play #20, Howard Batie, stole the ball. He ran it up court leaving the other players down court, as he dunked the ball. At this point Howard had the fans on their feet cheering the Bulldogs on to victory.

Throughout the rest of the game, each team matched each other in the scoring drives which was almost always preceded by a foul.

It was ironic that the second half ended in a foul causing a similar replay of the ending of the first half play.
