## Free Variety Show For Clarendon School Students, August 31st

Monday, August 31st is a big day in the lives of all Clarendon School students—registration day for the 1953-54 school term. Lee Bell, manager of the Mulkey Theatre, announces that there will be a free picture show for all Clarendon school students on that day, in their honor and for their enjoyment. All Clarendon school students and faculty members are invited to attend the show.

The show will begin at 12:30 P. M., on the 31st and continue until 4:00 P. M., with two showings, one at 12:30 and the other at about 2:00 or 2:30 P. M. Each showing will be about one and one-half hours long and will consist of a Nature Featurette, Cartoons, Comedies and Sports. ## Texas Warehouse Robbed Saturday Morning

The first robbery to amount to anything in recent months occurred here Saturday morning when thugs broke into the Texas warehouse which is located about 3 blocks east of the depot. The break-in was believed to have taken place between three and three-thirty, Sheriff Truett Behrens stated. Entrance to the building was gained by using tin snips, cutting a hole thru the tin on the back door.

Sheriff Behrens reported the major part of the loss as 26 tires, 12 tubes, 2 metal chairs, a small filing case, 500 rounds of ammunition, a small amount of cash and stamps. We have some good clues we are working on but nothing definite has turned up yet, he added.

## KGNC-TV Reception Better Here

Television reception was reported much better here Monday when KGNC-TV started transmitting from their new 833-foot antenna. Local TV retailers were pleased with the reception and reported stepped up buying of TV sets.

The station will operate for a period of about 8 weeks with an effective radiated power of 55,000 watts. In October the station's ERP will be stepped up to maximum power of 100,000 watts which will allow an even clearer picture.

## Johnie Johnson Opens Welding Shop

Johnie Johnson is announcing in this issue of the Leader, the opening of his new Welding and Blacksmith Shop located just north of the Farmers Exchange. The business will be known as Johnie's Welding Shop.

Mr. Johnson renovated the old warehouse building which was located on the lot for his main shop and built a new fireproof office building. He moved the equipment for his business from his former location at Lelia Lake. Johnie has been in this type of business for a long number of years and states that he is happy to be doing business back in Clarendon again.

## Cotton Boll Worms Showing Up In Some Fields

According to county agent H. M. Breedlove, cotton boll worms have been hurting some cotton fields in the county. The infestation is spotted and possibly could let up with the return of warm weather, but in some cases there has been poisoning for the control of the boll worm.

The county agent suggests that all farmers watch their cotton crops for the sign of any types of harmful insects. When six or eight boll worms are found to one hundred stalks of cotton it is time to poison and when ten to twelve leaf worms are found to each one hundred stalks it is time to poison.

The best spray for leaf worm and boll worm control, according to the county agent, is DDT and Toxaphene mix with one part of DDT to two parts of Toxaphene; the mixture to five gallons of water with about one quart of the mixture per acre. When using dust, the county agent recommends a 3-5-40 dust and to apply when the wind is very low.

The best time to dust is at night and preferably from midnight on to daylight when there is dew on the cotton. Present conditions has made dusting very favorable due to the dew at nights. All persons needing additional information on control of cotton insects should contact the county agent.

## C-R-O-P Drive Underway

At last report eight beehives have been definitely promised in the Donley County CROP drive with others promised. The CROP drive for Donley County is spearheaded by Lee Shaller of Clarendon and R. W. Scales of Hedley. CROP the better known name for Christian Rural Overseas Program is a movement sponsored by the Church World Service, an organization composed of churches of different denominations for the purpose of distributing food, clothing and livestock to less fortunate peoples of the world through their missions and missionary groups. It is estimated that the total cost of gathering and distribution is less than 10% because most of the work in gathering material is on a voluntary basis and is distributed by missions and missionaries. In fact anyone who donates to CROP may designate the church missions he wishes to distribute his donation.

The quota for the Panhandle is 10 car loads of beef with the Donley County quota at 1 car load or 30 beehives. It is hoped that the people in Donley County will better their quota. It is also hoped that most of the churches and church groups will set aside a fund or special collection to buy beef for the CROP drive which will end Sept. 10th.

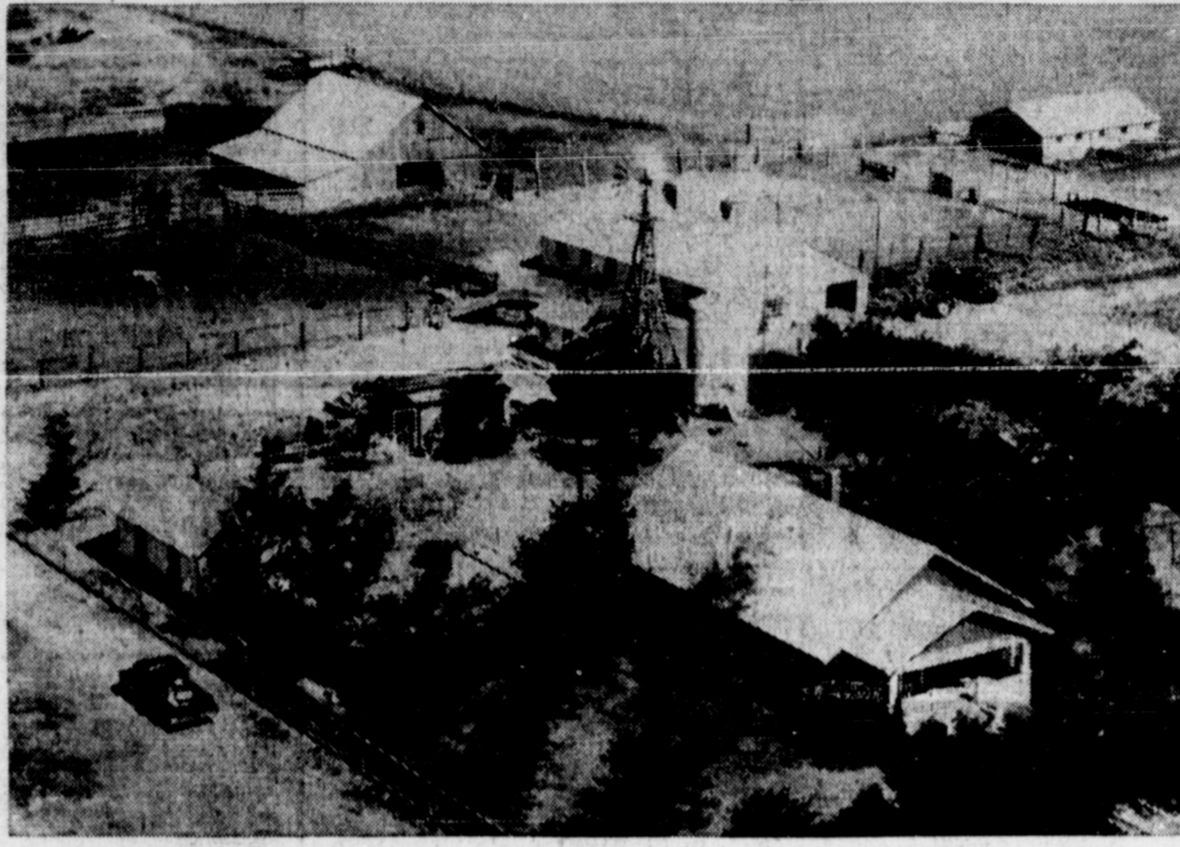
## Slats DeBord Elected President of Donley Old Settler Picnic

Clifford Johnson is executive vice-president and is now starting his 35th year with the bank. Arthell Gibson, cashier, has been with the bank over four years. 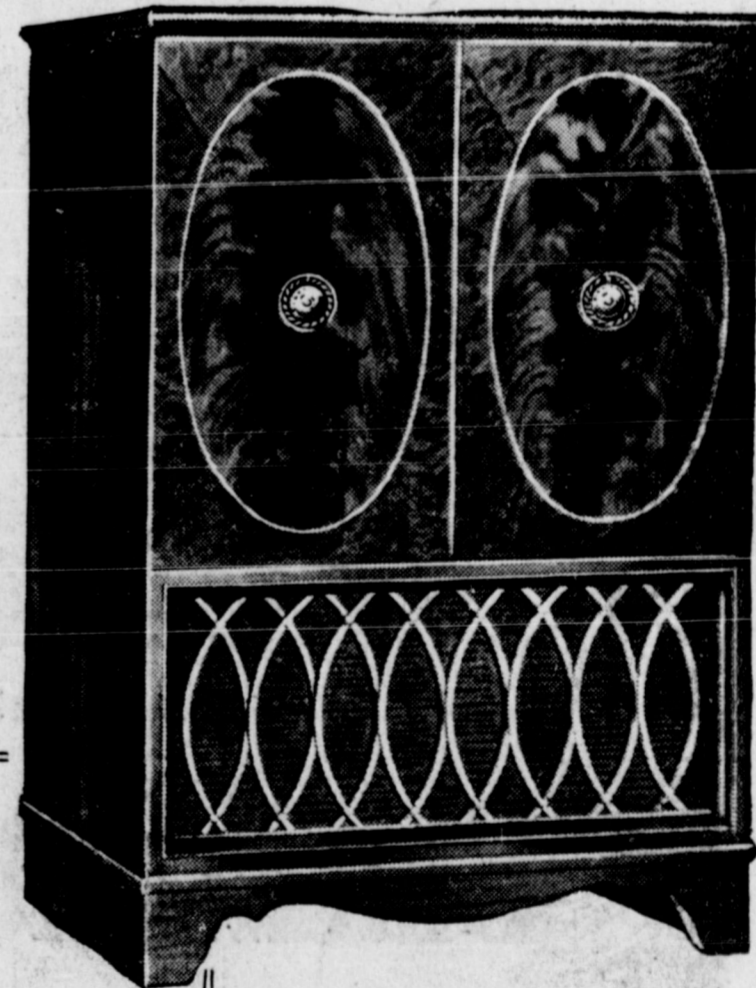

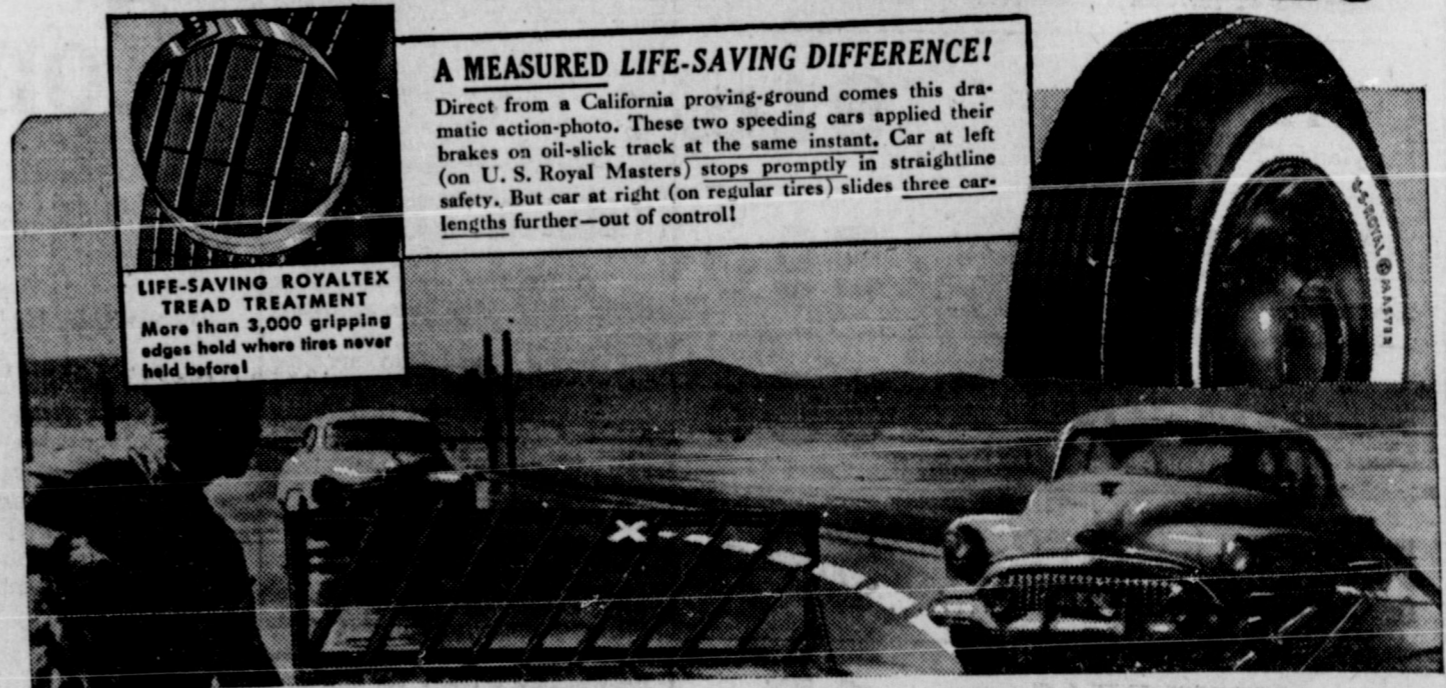

Truck Loading Law Now Effective

Texas Truckers now have a pair of new laws to bone up on and adhere to which went into effect yesterday. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, has announced that the two measures, which were enacted by the 53rd Texas Legislature, went into effect August 26.

One of the laws provides that if a trucker overloads his vehicle in excess of the gross weight for which it is registered and is caught by the officers; he will be required to apply to the nearest available county tax assessor-collector for additional registration in an amount to take care of his overload before he can continue his trip. If he is over the maximum legal weight, Garrison said, he can still be unloaded on

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the spot, under the old law, before being allowed to proceed. Exception is made in the case of livestock or perishable merchandise, in which instances the operator shall be permitted to seek the nearest practical point along his route where his load may be protected from damage or destruction before being required to secure the additional registration.

The other law, Garrison explained, provides, generally, that any operator, other than the registered owner or his agent, of a commercial motor vehicle or truck tractor must file with the State Safety Department a copy of the lease or other agreement under which the vehicle is being operated. In addition, he must carry copies of the lease and of the letter of transmittal to the Department in the vehicle.

Kent Odum, Chief of the License and Weight Division of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said that this law is designed to curb "outlaw" truckers who afford no protection to shippers. He said that a copy of a booklet, giving detailed explanations of the law's provisions, will be sent to any trucker who requests it by writing to him at Austin.

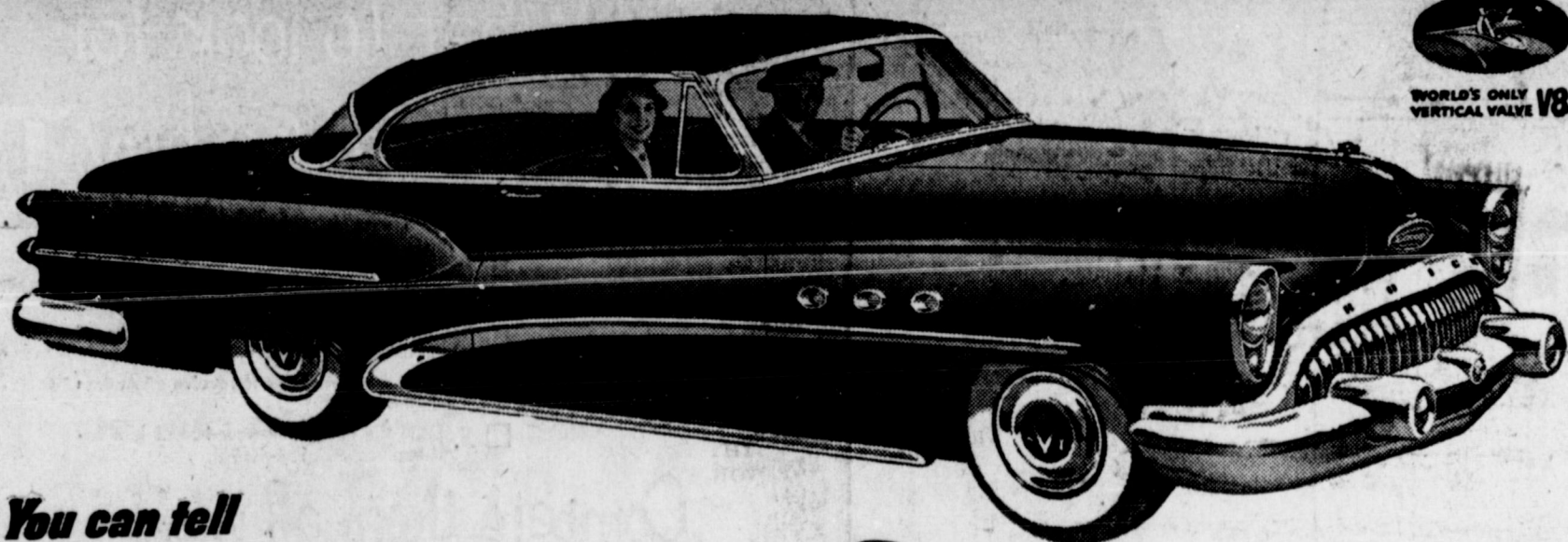

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New Seed Testing Fee System To Be In Effect Sept. 1st

AUSTIN—A new seed testing fee system will be put into effect Sept. 1, by the two seed laboratories operated by the Texas Department of Agriculture in Lubbock and Austin, Commissioner John C. White has announced.

A complete test of all seed will be made for \$2.50 with the exception of chaffy grasses, native grasses, mixtures and trashy seed. This fee can be broken down to \$1 for germination tests or \$1.50 for purity analysis, only.

A fee of \$5 will be levied for purity and/or germination tests of the four exceptions—chaffy, native, mixtures and trashy seed. During a rush season, however, trashy seed may be rejected for testing purposes, White added.

Noxious weed seed will be examined for \$1 per sample. Analysis of seed by an accredited laboratory is required before Texas Tested Seed Tags can be issued, White explained. No seed can be legally offered for sale without the tag from the Dept.

of Agriculture.

Charge for a seed tag has been increased from 1 to 2 cents. The Texas Seed Law requires that one tag be attached to each container or bag of seed sold or exposed for sale in the amount of 100 pounds or a fraction thereof.

Money for the tests must accompany the samples. Checks or money orders should be made to the Texas Seed Act Fund. Charges will be effective on all samples which reach either of the two laboratories after Sept. 1, regardless of the postmark date, White said.

This will be the first year the Texas Department of Agriculture has charged for seed tests. The fees are the result of a new plan to make the department more nearly self-supporting and less dependent on the taxpayer's money.

Commissioner White said he had not asked the Legislature to appropriate tax money for this project for the next two years. The fee system was initiated so that the expense would be borne by those who benefit from the service.

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### Duck Harvest Suits Texans

AUSTIN — Texans seem generally contented with the 1953 waterfowl harvest regulations, according to the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

He said the response to the state's season on ducks and geese, running from November 6 through January 4, has been favorable. The fact the season extends through the Christmas holidays has pleased gunners on the Gulf coast.

The Executive Secretary said north Texas hunters understandably were disappointed again at not being zoned like the mourning dove upper state shoot. He said prospects of a late flight from the north as reported in Washington should help compensate for the difference.

The United States Fish and Wildlife Service, which has final authority over seasons for migratory waterfowl, generally followed the request by the Game and Fish Commission for a sixty-day season, a limit of five and ten for ducks and a limit of five for geese.

The Executive Secretary said the barring of baiting for waterfowl will not affect many Texas hunters since the practice has not been widely followed in this State.

The extra hour tagged to the day's shooting period, extending legal gunning to sunset, will have no appreciable affect, he said. "Waterfowl are too smart," he explained. "It will be rough on them for the first few days but they soon catch on. After they get wise, they simply won't move around much until after the shooting stops. In this case, the ducks and geese simply will have

to delay moving into feeding grounds and back up their supper another hour."

### Old Art, New Science

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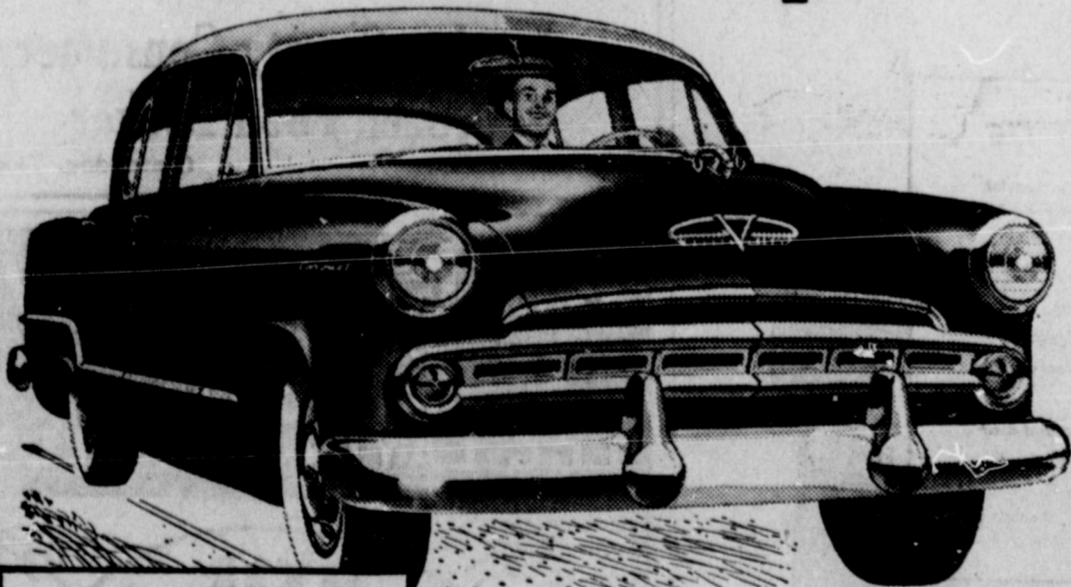

### Smoke Spending

CHICAGO—(American Peoples Encyclopedia News Service) — The American public spent \$5.2 billion on tobacco and tobacco products last year, according to a report in the 1953 Yearbook of the American Peoples Encyclopedia. This was an increase of approximately \$300 million over 1951.

Cigarette and cigar consumption accounted for all of the increase in sales, according to the report. Sales of pipe and chewing tobacco and snuff all registered declines from the previous year's sales figures.

Total cigarette production last year was estimated at 430 billion, a three per cent increase over the preceding year. Cigar output was up four per cent to 6,000,000—the highest total since 1930.

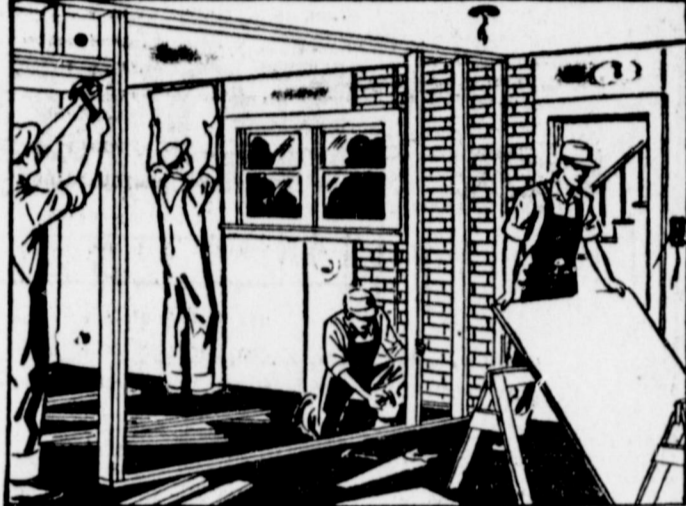
The 97 million pounds of pipe tobacco produced during the last year was about four per cent below figures for 1951. Chewing tobacco and snuff output were each off about one per cent from the preceding year. The use of snuff in the United States has declined about 30 per cent in the last 30 years.
