

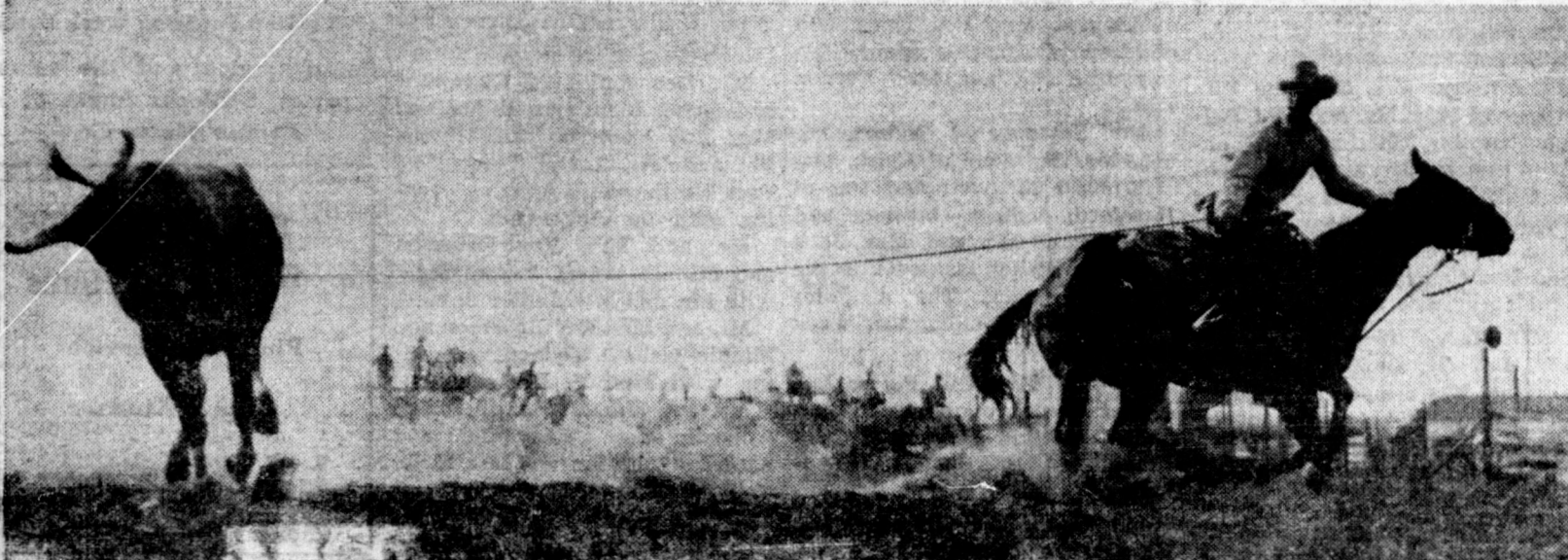

James R. Cox Is New College President, Supt. Of Schools

James R. Cox, present Superintendent of the Panhandle schools, has accepted the position here as President of Clarendon Junior College and Supt. of the Public Schools.

Mr. Cox is now serving his 10th year as superintendent of the Panhandle Public Schools and has had eighteen years of experience as superintendent of fully accredited public schools.

He received his bachelor of science degree and master of education degree from North Texas State College Denton and did some graduate work at Texas Tech.

Mr. Cox is a member of the Lions Club, Masonic Lodge, Methodist Church, Phi Delta Kappa, American Association of School Administrators, Texas Association of School Administrators, Texas State Teachers Association, Panhandle School Leaders Association, and the Board of City Development of Panhandle. He is a life member of the National Education Association and the National Congress of Parents and Teachers.

Mr. Cox stated that he and Mrs. Cox were looking forward to living and working in Clarendon. They plan to move to Clarendon later this summer.

Twenty of the nation's top steer ropers will match their roping ability for \$12,000 in prize money in the Gold Spread 1st Annual World Championship Matched Steer Roping and Branding here Saturday, May 14.

Two performances of the roping are scheduled, one at 2 p.m. and one at 8 p.m. Each roper will have the opportunity to rope six head of steers, three in each go-round. The 700 pound steers from Mexico have arrived here and may be seen at the rodeo grounds. The top talent in the steer roping game, representing six states, will compete in this contest. Invitations are extended only to the top 20 ropers, according to Rodeo Cowboys Association standings for 1960.

Heading the list of ropers to compete is Everett Shaw of Stone-wall, Okla., defending champion. Shoate Webster of Lenapah, Okla., four times world champion is expected to carry away his share of the money. Ike Rude of Buffalo, Okla., Clark McIntire, Jim Snively, Sonny Davis and Troy Fort are among the better known ropers. Other ropers scheduled to compete are Bill Harris of Clovis, Harry Lynn of South Coffeyville, Okla., Jack Lucas of Dewey, Okla., Hugh Posey of Okay, Okla., Ab Deakin of Oklahoma City, Earl Moore of Clovis, Bill Harland of Clayton, Dell Haverly of Benson, Ariz., Sonny Wright of Alto, N.M., Dewey David of Guernsey, Wyo., Roy D. Barnes of Denver, Waldo Haythorn of Ogallala, Neb., and Howard Haythorn of Maxwell, Neb.

Approximately 4,500 people are expected to attend each performance. Admission will be \$2.25 per person, tax included.

Goodnight School Suit Settled

The dispute over the former Goodnight school district has finally been settled and the Clarendon Independent district can now go ahead with a much needed building program which has been held up on account of this suit the past seven years.

The suit had been tried here in district court twice, court of civil appeals one time and the supreme court. In the settlement District Judge Luther Gribble has signed an order dismissing the suit. In addition the county boards of Briscoe, Donley and Armstrong signed the agreement as did the Clarendon and Claude school districts. In the settlement, Clarendon will retain approximately 75 percent of the district with a portion of the district in the western and northwestern part going to Claude.

Truett Behrens Elected Sheriff In First Primary Election Saturday

A total of 1,859 Donley County voters went to the polls Saturday in the First Primary Election and all races on the local level were definitely decided with no run-off except in one state office.

Former sheriff Truett Behrens received the top number of votes in a come-back campaign and will be the new sheriff, tax assessor, collector next January 1st. George Bulman polled a total of 90 votes to his two opponents 83 to win the Commissioner of Precinct No. 1 spot without a run-off and F. M. Murray was returned as Commissioner of Precinct No. 3 with a 46 vote margin over his opponent.

In the State Representative race, unofficial returns gave Will Ehrle a better than 2 to 1 margin over Roy L. Taylor. Ehrle received a total of 4,414 votes to Taylor's 2,102. Ehrle received 1,656 votes in Childress, 1,362 in Hall, 1,207 in Donley and 189 in Motley. Taylor received 763 in Childress county, 363 in Hall, 310 in Donley and 666 in Motley.

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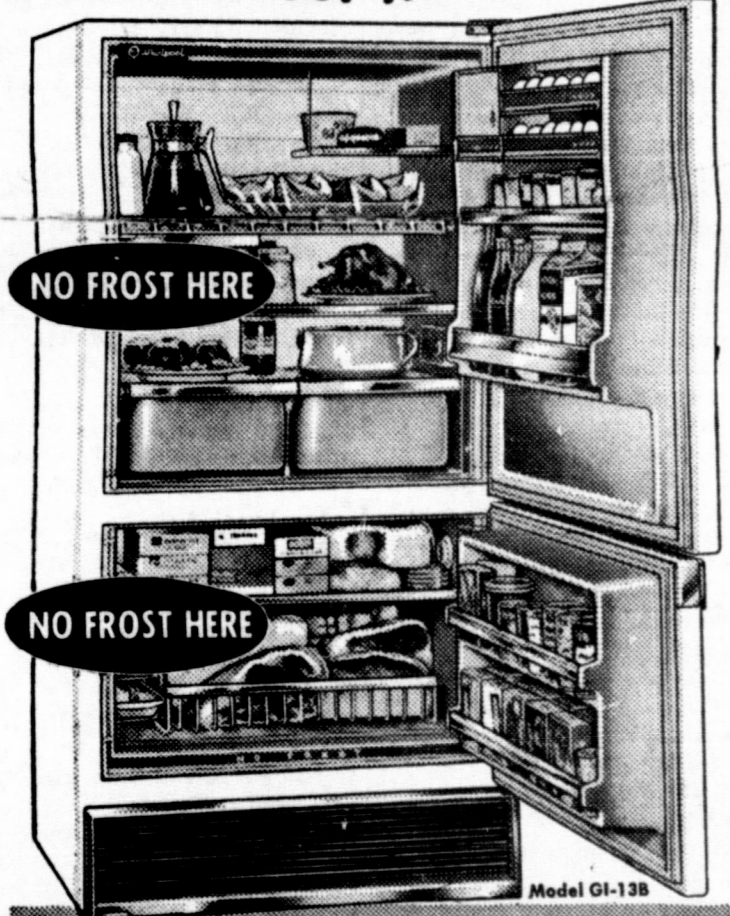

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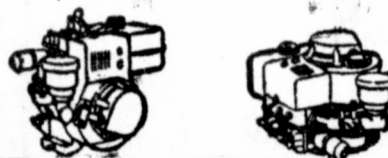

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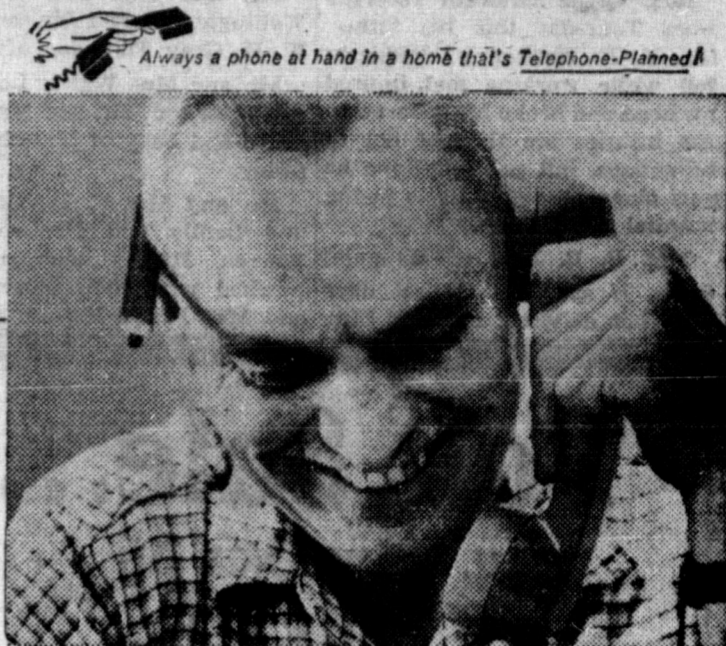

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

Brush Spraying Time Near
According to Bland Draper, local conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service, the time for spraying shin oak, sagebrush, and mesquite is very near. Within a week, or by May 10, shin oak and sagebrush will be making vigorous growth, and will be almost fully leaved. This is the best condition in which to spray brush to get the best kill. The best time for mesquite will be approximately thirty days later. Alfred McMurtry, Charles Hall, and James Doneghy are among those who sprayed brush in the Donley County Soil Conservation District last year. The Miller Ranch, Chas. Williams, L. R. Hagy, Rhode and Gould, J. H. McMurtry, Ray Holland, James Doneghy, Calvin Dorman are among SCD cooperators who plan to spray brush this year.

Greenbelt Water Ahead Of Similar Authorities

The Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority is progressing much faster than similar projects in the state it was reported at a special meeting of directors at Childress last Friday night. Attending the meeting from here were Carroll Knorpp and C. A. Pitts.

Joe Carter, Executive Director of the Texas Water Development Board, and Marvin Shubert of Petersburg, a member of the

board, met with the authority. "We asked them to see how our progress compared with other similar authorities and learned that we are above average," said Dr. S. H. Townsend, Authority president.

The Greenbelt directors were told that it was possible that the Water Development Board would be authorized to be more liberal by the Legislature at its next session in the participation of financing of water districts.

"Talk now is that the Legislature will be asked to grant the Board permission for it to partici-

ciate up to \$5,000,000, regardless of the cost of the project." The cost of the project has been estimated between eight and ten million.

Clifford Johnson of Hedley has informed us that the core drilling equipment was moved to the dam site last week but moved out again on account of high water. The coring is expected to be delayed a week or ten days. About 7 working days will be required to complete the coring.

The Leader received a letter from Editor Kenneth Tooley, Paducah director of the Authority stating that Paducah was definitely in the Authority contrary to information that has been distributed that they were not interested in the project. He said Paducah had voted to go into the Authority by an overwhelming majority and would stay in until the project was completed.

1961 Wheat Allotments

1961 Wheat Allotments are being computed in this office. Plans are to mail wheat allotment notices to producers in the near future. The Wheat Marketing Quota Referendums will be held in July.

The 1960 Wheat Marketing Cards will be prepared as soon as possible and will be mailed to wheat producers who are in compliance.

Conservation Reserve Land

All Conservation Reserve farms will be inspected soon to see that you are carrying out the terms of your contract. Your land under contract will be checked to see that it is not being grazed or harvested, that noxious weeds are being controlled, and that an eligible cover has been established.

Each dollar spent by the government as rental for Conservation Reserve land brings a much higher return in value of crop adjustment when all eligible cropland on a farm is retired than when only part of the cropland is placed under contract.

One of the primary purposes of the C.R. contract is to divert land from the production of surplus crops. This purpose would be defeated if released allotments from C.R. farms become available for distribution to other farms.

Any adjustments which are made in allotments and base acreage of farms outside the C.R. are also made for farms that are in the program, even though allotments on the latter are not being used. The acreage history credit for C.R. farms will be considered just as though the commodity had actually been grown.

The ASC Committee assures that no allotment acreage is diverted from C.R. farms to other farms and that the maximum crop adjustment is obtained under the Reserve program.
