Williams captures 2 golds at state

Roy Williams capped off his senior season Saturday with two gold medals in the 400M and 200M at the UIL State Track Meet in Austin. His time of :46.74 in the 400M was the fastest time clocked in all classifications, said head track coach Darryl Cash. "That was the icing on the cake."

"He was real ready for the race," Cash said. "Roy ran real well. He had some good competition, but he still won by about 10 yards at the end. It was a good race. He ran real strong."

The TCU-bound Williams didn't run his best race of the year in the 200M, but it was good enough to blow away the competition, Cash said. Williams ran a :21.56, although he ran faster than a :21 in a state qualifier's meet in Abilene two weeks ago, Cash said.

"He ran good, but he didn't get off to a good start and had to come from behind to win," Cash said. "The longer the race went, the better he did. At about 150 meters he started passing everybody. His start wasn't good. He didn't feel like he

ran a good race."

This year's victory concludes three years of work toward a gold medal. Williams won a silver his sophomore year and a bronze his junior year in the 400M.

"I'm proud for him," Cash said. "It's a great honor to go there and then to finish in the top three two years in a row. He's just been really focused on winning it for so long."

"He's trained hard for it, and he's worked hard, and he deserves it."

Abdullah claims top tennis title

Junior Kareem Abdullah used his endurance to survive a three-match marathon Saturday at the UIL State Tennis Championship in Austin to claim the gold medal in the boys singles competition.

This was Abdullah's second trip to the state tournament. He bowed out in the semi-final round last year to a foreign exchange student from Columbia.

Friday's quarterfinals and semifinals were moved to Saturday because of heavy rains at the tennis courts. All competitors were forced to play all their matches in one day, instead of the customary two days of competition.

Abdullah first faced freshman Jon

CC's Zehr is NSCAA 'Women's Coach of 97'

Clarendon College's Joel Zehr has been named the 1997 Women's Basketball Coach of the Year by the National Small College Athletic Association (NSCAA).

This accolade comes after Zehr led the Lady Bulldogs to a second-place finish at the 1997 NSCAA National Tournament in Salina, Kansas. The Lady Bulldogs ended their fairy-tale season with a 25-5 record.

"I'm truly honored to have received their incredible award," Zehr said from his home Thursday. "But honestly, if it wasn't for the skill, dedication, and hard work by the Lady Bulldogs, I would not have been a candidate. They are the ones who brought the college and myself to the national spotlight."

The NSCAA Coach of the Year is selected by coaches representing more than 60 colleges and universities across the nation. Based in Franklin, New Hampshire, the NSCAA selects Coaches of the Year in women's basketball, men's bas-

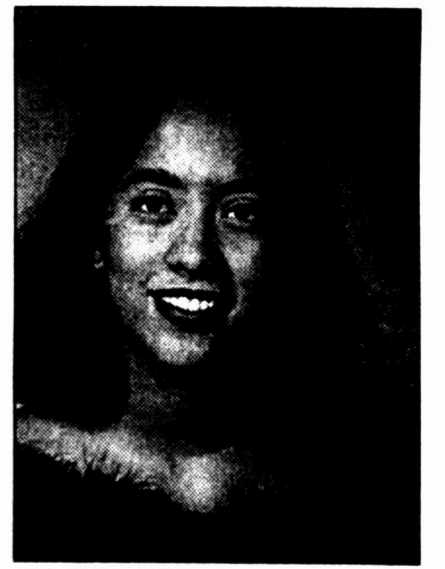

CC to offer new technology programs

Two new workforce programs have been added to the catalog listings at Clarendon College, pending approval from the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

The new Computer Technology and Office Technology Programs will be innovative, according to CC Business Chairperson Pam Denney. "We are very excited that these new programs will prepare students for careers that are in high demand."

Computer Technology students may choose from two paths, Computer Networking Technician or Computer Maintenance Technician.

After completing the program, students should be prepared to test for several nationally recognized certifications, including the Certified Novell Administrator (CNA) license or the

A+ certification. With a CNA license, students will be able to install networking software, prepare updates, administer a computer network, and troubleshoot network problems.

"By completing our Computer Technology programs, students will be capable of earning above average incomes," Frank Amon, CC Technology Instructor said. "At this time, we are one of the only colleges in the region to offer a two-year program such as this."

Computer Technology students will gain hands-on experience in Troubleshooting, Programming, Novell, and Windows NT Network Installation/Maintenance, and Internet Services.

"With our dependence on computers ever-increasing, the job de-

mands are limitless," Amon said. Another new program for Clarendon College is Office Technology.

Designed to prepare students to become administrative assistants, the program allows students to specialize in managing a legal or medical office. According to the Department of Labor's most recent statistics, legal or medical assistants at an entry-level position earn nearly \$10 per hour.

Core courses for Office Technology students include Legal Terminology, Legal/Medical Transcription, Accounting, Medical Terminology, Office Procedures, Business Math, Finance, Internet Services, Computer Applications, and Human Relations in Business.

"Managing an office is not an art;

it's a science," Pam Denney said. "Our Office Technology program will give individuals the practical knowledge and experience to be successful in this fulfilling career."

"State-of-the-art" and "innovative" are just two of the many words that can describe these two new programs, according to Denney.

"We already have more than articulation agreements with area high schools which have tech prep programs. The feedback has been wonderful, and we are looking forward to serving the needs of our area residents."

Thornberry marks Tax Freedom Day in Amarillo

AMARILLO — US Rep. Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) paid a visit to the kitchen of an Amarillo home Saturday, May 10, 1997, to make a pitch for tax reform on Tax Freedom Day, the day which most Americans pay off their total tax burden and start working to pay themselves.

"For most Americans, April 15th is the day when the full effect of the nation's tax system hits closest to home," Thornberry stated. "But April 15th is only part of the story. To understand the true effect of the tax system and the impact it has on our lives, you've got to take a look at how long it takes us to pay off our total tax burden each year."

"In 1997, Americans worked 128 days to pay off this burden. It's also another reason why we need to scrap the current tax system and replace it with one that's flatter, fairer, and

easier for people to understand," Thornberry said.

According to Thornberry, Tax Freedom Day is a fiscal barometer designed to measure the portion of the American budget that goes to pay for taxes. Over the years, Tax Freedom Day has gradually fallen later and later on the calendar.

In 1922, for example, less than a decade after the Revenue Act of 1913 imposed a federal income tax on the American people, Tax Freedom Day fell on February 17.

Shortly after America's entry into World War II, Tax Freedom Day fell on March 30, 1942. When Lyndon Johnson introduced his Great Society program in 1965, Tax Freedom Day fell on April 14. By the time President Clinton took office in 1993, Tax Freedom Day had moved to May 2.

This year, Tax Freedom Day fell

on May 9.

"When people sit down at their kitchen table and figure out their budget, it quickly becomes apparent that too much of our money and time goes to fund government at all levels," Thornberry said. "The typical family of four pays more in taxes that it does

on food, clothing, and shelter combined."

"If Tax Freedom Day symbolizes anything, it's that the current tax system not only takes too much of our money but also takes up too much of our time."

Keeping an eye on Texas

Unclaimed property easy to find

Texas currently holds more than \$700 million in unclaimed property. Last year, the state returned \$32.8 million in abandoned assets to their owners. Unclaimed property can include utility deposits, interest payment on insurance policies, family jewelry, stocks and bonds, among other property valued at \$50 or more. Texans may now search an interactive data base located at <http://www.window.state.tx.us> with their name, address, Social Security number or Federal Employer Identification number to find property that has been forwarded to the state. Texans also may call toll free 1-800-654-3463 to inquire about lost property.

Voters passed a school bond issue by an almost four to one majority. The funds were to be used to repair and renovate a building that had been damaged by fire. When completed, the building would house a gym in the center, have two large class rooms for Home Economics and Ag classes, a band room, dressing rooms, concession rooms, and a lobby in the front of the building. The gym was to have a stage and a seating capacity of about 1,750 people. [Editor's note: Today this structure, located south of the junior high school, is known as the Old Gym and is still used by the community.]

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CHS students participate in Texas History Day Fair

Four Clarendon High School students competed in the 58th annual Texas History Day Fair in Austin on Saturday, May 10. The four students were Marci Moore, Paula Jackson, Chandra Ford, and Mark Howard.

Marci Moore presented her paper entitled "Capital Punishment: A Tragedy to Some, A Triumph to Others." Miss Moore's paper, which cites cases from the Panhandle during the past two decades, won first place in the regional competition. Her paper did not receive a rating in Austin.

Chandra Ford and Mark Howard competed in the group project category. Their research project, "Charles Goodnight, 'The Burbank of the Plains,' Saves the Buffalo" gives both the beginnings of the Goodnight herd and the present consequences on the JA Ranch. They placed first in the Regional Group Competition held at West Texas A&M. At the state competition they received a clearly outstanding rating but did not advance to nationals.

Paula Jackson submitted her individual project "Mary Goodnight Brings Higher Education to the Texas Panhandle," and received a clearly outstanding rating but did not advance to nationals. Miss Jackson's research of Goodnight College's founding and growth received both first place at regionals and the Jane McCallum Award for Outstanding Study of Women in Texas History. Miss Jackson will be interviewed for the statewide McCallum award.

These students competed against 52 of the top projects in Texas.

The students appreciate the many people of Claude, Goodnight, Childress, and Clarendon who have assisted them with their studies. Good local history projects are only possible through community support.

This popular class will begin May 10 and ends June 5. Class times will be 8:00 a.m. to noon, Monday through Thursday, in the Administration Building, room 102. Students may register at the Cc Administration Building, every Monday through Thursday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., or register at the beginning of the class on May 10. Payment is expected at the time of registration. Cost of this class is \$88 for in-district (Donley County) residents and \$94 for Texas residents. Cost of the algebra book is \$42 used and \$55 new.

To register for the College Algebra mini-course, students must have a copy of their high school or college transcript, GED certificate or a letter of permission from their high school principal or counselor, ACT and TASP scores.

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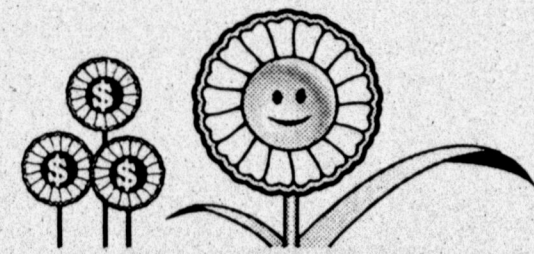

Virginia Browder

Funeral services for Hall County native Virginia Lee Browder at 2:00 p.m. on Monday, April 21, 1997, in the First United Methodist Church with Rev. Jeff Taylor, officiating. Her eulogy was given by Tom Posey, retired minister of the First Christian Church. Burial was held in the Browder Family plot of Fairview Cemetery in Memphis with arrangements under the direction of Spicer Funeral Home.

Well-known throughout the State of Texas, Ms. Browder was born on September 30, 1905, to James D. Browder and Margaret Mabel "Tude Harrell" in Amarillo. Her father, James D. Browder, came to Hall County in 1887, bringing with him a small herd of mixed breed cattle. When he got the Pot Hooks Ranch, he stocked it with Herefords as foundation stock.

Virginia inherited her father's love for ranching and always called the Old Spring Ranch, now known as Cedar Hill, home. She was an accomplished horsewoman, who loved riding side saddle, and in 1988 still had her side saddle perched on a footstool in the living room. She was a barrel racer and directed Horseback Girls Quadrilles and led rodeo grand entries. In the 1940s she rose with and helped develop one of the Panhandle's first Square Dance on Horseback groups. In 1947, she went to New England to learn to ride jumping horses. She organized Memphis Bit and Bridle Club in the 1950s.

She wrote the *Giles Chronicles* in 1956 which is a collection of poems; *Butterfly Dust* in 1956; *Donley County, Land O' Promise* in 1975; *Tude Harrell* in 1976; *Hall County Heritage Trails Volume I* in 1982 and *Volume II* in 1983. She served as the regional correspondent for the *Amarillo Globe News* in the 1960s. She also wrote and directed *Sagebrush Saga*, an outdoor drama; *Saints' Roost Saga* an outdoor drama with 135 characters. She also authored a well known hilarious comedy *Womanless Wedding* calling upon local men to fill the roles. This play has been performed many times through the years by local businessmen and civic leaders. She directed many of the plays performed by Memphis Little Theatre through the years, and she had a vast collection of costumes that were worn by many actors and actresses in the various productions.

In an interview, she said she considered one of the most enjoyable periods of her life to be when she operated the Golden Cobweb Antique Shop from 1968 to 1985, giving as the reason "her love of people and the interaction with them." When asked in the same interview what her dislikes were, her response was, "I can't think of any."

Well educated, she attended elementary school and two years of high school in Memphis. She also attended high school at Our Lady of Victory Convent in Fort Worth; Hockaday School for Girls in Dallas, where she is credited with naming the school newspaper *The Four*; and the University of Texas, Austin. She attended Chevy Chase Finishing School in Washington, D.C.

She was a part of the original pledge group for Texas Panhandle Heritage Foundation, Inc. (producers of the musical drama, *TEXAS*). She was given Life Membership status in 1982. She also served as Area Chairperson and was a member of the Advisory Board. She helped fund the *TEXAS* cast members' trip to London to promote the outdoor musical drama depicting the history of Texas.

Her memberships included a Charter Membership in the Memphis Little Theatre; Les Beaux Art Club of Clarendon; 1913 Study Club; and she was a director of the Women's Division of the Chamber of Commerce.

She served as chairman of the Hall County Historical Committee for the Hall County Centennial. She was co-chairman of the Hall County Sesquicentennial Committee, celebrating Texas' 150th Anniversary.

She organized the annual Giles Picnic, which at one time attracted as many as 1,000 people.

Honored for her accomplishments, she was inducted into the Panhandle Women's Hall of Fame in 1985; named Memphis Woman of the Year in 1978-79; Texas Panhandle Distinguished Service Award for Women in 1978; Amarillo Friends of the Library honoree in 1975-76. She was the recipient of the "The Distinguished Service Award" given by the Women's Forum of Amarillo, which honored Panhandle women who have made a difference, in 1978 and in 1985. She was nominated for induction in the Cowgirl Hall of Fame in 1988.

A lifelong member of the First Presbyterian Church, she served her church as an elder and president of Mizpah. She was the instrumental force in getting the Presbyterian Building's Texas Historical Landmark Designation. She was an immeasurable aide and gave her total support to the formation of the Preservation Foundation formed to protect the future of the Presbyterian Building after the church disbanded.

She is survived by her sister Cy Foxhall of Memphis and two nephews, Frank Foxhall of Memphis and Robert Roark of Wichita Falls, Texas.

This obituary is written in tribute to a remarkable woman who touched many lives, not only in Hall County and the Texas Panhandle, but also to those she met in her travels. This one of a kind woman, rancher, horsewoman, author, poet, direc-

tor, historian, and friend will be missed.

Members of Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) Post 7782 and it Ladies Auxiliary will be selling Buddy Poppies at B&R Thriftway, Donley County State Bank, First Bank and Trust, Clarendon Outpost, and Kenny's Barber Shop from May 19 until May 26, Memorial Day.

According to Post Commander James Owens, "VFW by-laws require that the proceeds from our sale of Buddy Poppies must be used to benefit disabled and needy veterans and the widows and orphans of deceased veterans right here in the community."

In 1923, the VFW was the first veterans organization to promote a nationally organized campaign for the annual distribution of poppies assembled by disabled

or hospitalized veterans. That tradition continues today, with more than 18 million poppies assembled by paid, disabled, and hospitalized veterans each year. The members of the VFW and its Ladies Auxiliary raise more than \$15 million annually from the sale of Buddy Poppies.

The VFW, founded in 1899, is the nation's oldest major veterans organization. Its more than 2.1 million members include 1.1 million veterans of W.W.II, 526,000 Vietnam veterans, and some 426,000 Korean War veterans. The remaining members come from American military actions in Haiti, Somalia, the Persian Gulf, Grenada, Panama, and Lebanon, as well as expeditionary and occupation forces.

Tax deferral available for older Texans

Texans age 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent and current property taxes on their homes according to a press release from the Donley County Appraisal District.

These senior Texans can take advantage of a tax option called "over-65 deferral" by signing an affidavit at the appraisal district office.

Once a homeowner files an over-65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can start or continue a lawsuit for collection of delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that home.

Taxpayers need to be aware that tax deferral for the elderly only postpones

paying delinquent taxes on the home; it does not cancel them. During the deferral time, taxes and interest of eight percent continue to add up. When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns or lives in the home, the taxes become due. Taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred tax and interest. Filing of the deferral affidavit does not forgive penalties that are already due. Also, if the taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends, an added penalty may be charged if the account goes to a delinquent tax attorney.

due by July 1, 1997. Poults will be picked up in College Station on October 21.

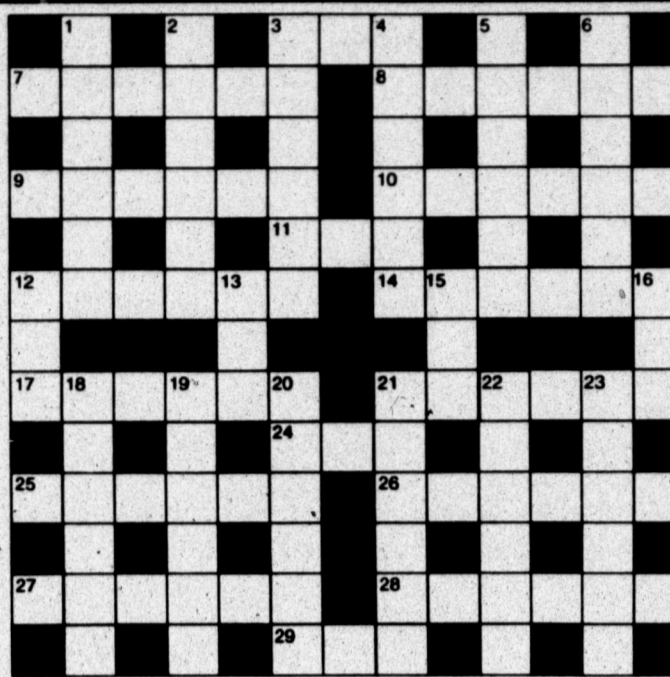
