

CONVENTS.

The New York Independent, that has always been more or less friendly to the Catholic church, gives some very startling facts concerning the treatment of orphan girls committed to these institutions and the sisters. It says:

"These girls are taught to read, as the law requires up to the age of thiteen, but most of the time is given to sewing, which brings in a handsome profit to the convent. They have regular hours They rise in summer at 5, and 5.30 in winter, and sew till 7, when they have prayers, breakfast and mass. Primary instruction continues from 8 to 12, when an hour is allowed for dinner and recreation. Sewing again is required from 1 to 4, after which half an hour is allowed for collation and recreation. Sewing is resumed fron 4 30 to 7 or 7 30, according to the season of the year. The food is not nutritious enough, and the little slaves grow up pale and anæmic. The morning meal is bread soup; the dinner is vegetables and salad a chunk of bread constitutes the 4 o'clock collation, and the soup with vegetables or salad is the evening meal. 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
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
