Clarendon elects Selvidge as mayor

Over 400 voters cast their ballots in this year's city election for Mayor and Board of Aldermen last Saturday, May 3, 1997.

In the three-way race for Mayor, Leonard "Tex" Selvidge walked away with a solid majority of the vote defeating incumbent Steve Smith and challenger Pat Archuleta by wide margins.

Selvidge is no new comer to the job. He served as Clarendon's mayor in the late 1970s and early 1980s.

For the Board of Aldermen, voters had their choice of five candidates for two open seats. Local boot-maker James Owens was the people's top choice followed closely by incumbent James L. Kuhn. They defeated challengers Michael Tibbets and Terry Bernabe and incumbent Delmar Wiggs.

The winning candidates will be sworn in on Tuesday, May 13, 1997.

This year's turn out was down from the 1996 election which drew more than 500 people to the polls.

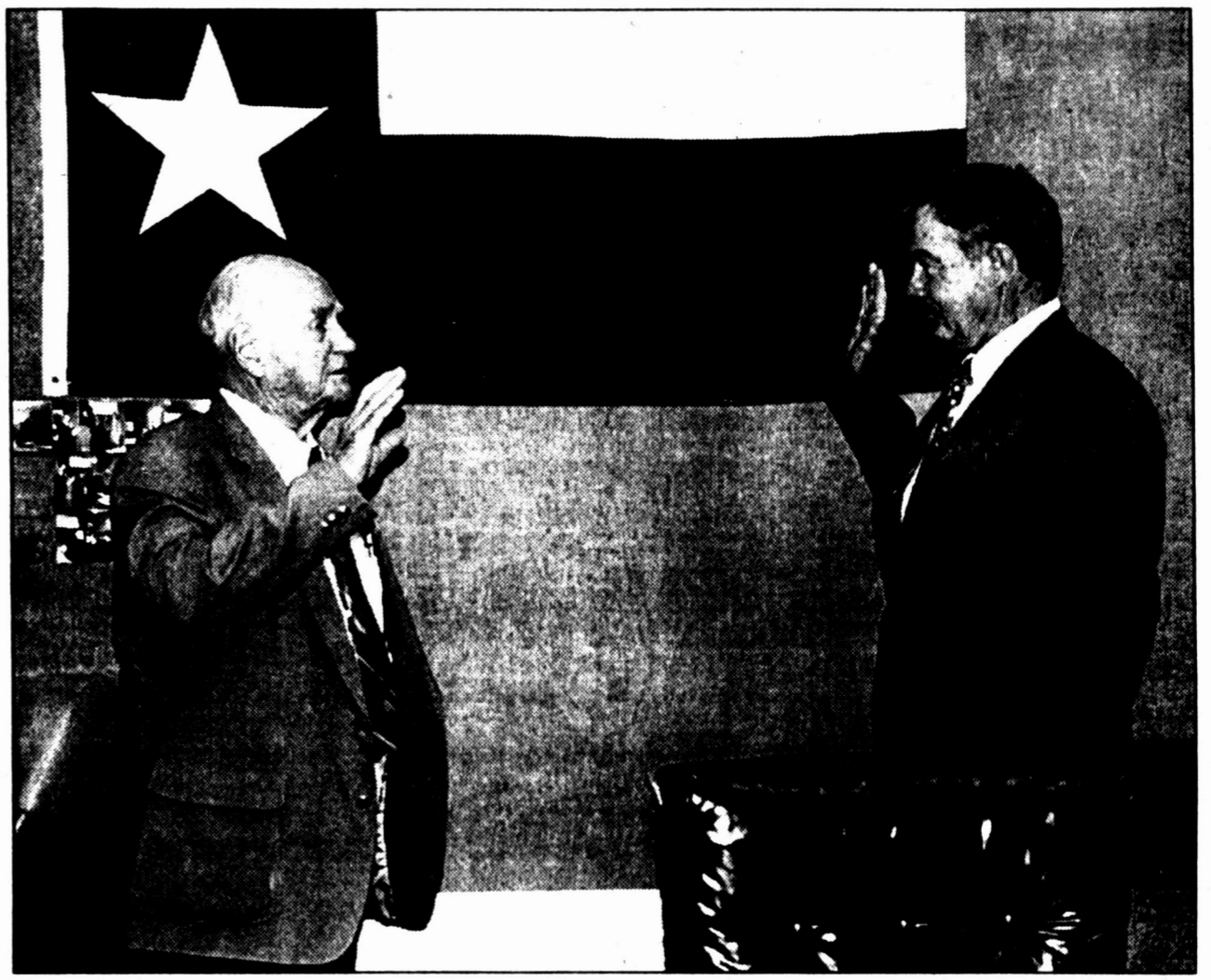

Howardwick elects Dishong

Millie Dishong narrowly held onto her position as the Mayor of Howardwick in last Saturday's city election.

Dishong, as well as incumbents running for Board of Aldermen, had been dogged by the continuing controversy involving the Howardwick Volunteer Fire Department. But by a ten-vote margin, the incumbent Dishong defeated challenger and former mayor H.C. Clark.

Five candidates appeared on the ballot for the two open seats on the Howardwick Board of Alderman. Incumbent Bob Hall garnered the most votes, and Weldon King had the second highest number. They defeated challengers Dean Arnold and D.R.

"Cotton" Leffew and incumbent Bob Thompson.

Sixty-five percent of Howardwick voters went to the polls according to city officials.

The winning candidates were sworn in on Monday, May 5.

Clarendon CISD reelects two trustees

The make up of the Clarendon CISD Board of Trustees won't change much after last Saturday's election.

Voters returned incumbents Wayne Hardin and Joe Lemley to the board out of a field of six candidates and approved Sandy Thornberry to continue serving out an unexpired term. Hardin and Lemley both outpaced their closest opponent, Gene Denney, by more than 120 votes.

One new face will be added to the board. Terry Ashcraft will be filling an unexpired seat on the board.

The winners will be sworn in on May 8, 1997.

Local Angus Breeder recognized nationally

Gunboat Mountain Ranch in Clarendon has been recognized nationally by the American Angus Association for having three registered Angus cows included in the American Angus Association's 1997 Pathfinder Report.

Only 1,662 of more than 30,000 members of the American Angus Association are represented in this year's report, according to Richard Spader, executive vice president of the American Angus Association with headquarters in St. Joseph, Mo.

The Pathfinder Program identifies superior Angus cows based upon recorded performance traits that are economically important of efficient beef production. These traits include

regular calving and heavy weaning weights, says John Crouch, director of performance programs for the American Angus Association. All registered Angus cows that meet the strict Pathfinder standards are listed, along with their owners, in the Pathfinder Report that is published annually by the American Angus Association.

The 1997 Pathfinder Report lists 6,692 individual cows. It is published in the May issue of the *Angus Journal*, and extra copies are available from the American Angus Association. The largest number of Pathfinder cows from a single herd this year is 67, and several hundred breeders have a single cow that qualifies for the exclusive listing.

The fact is despite the some 24 years that the Endangered Species Act has been on the books, it has failed to truly protect wildlife. And according to this EDF report, it's because the Act has declared war on landowners — the very people who can play the biggest role in protecting wildlife.

Now I'm not about to say I told you so. If anything, Texas landowners should welcome the Environmental Defense Fund's endorsement of our efforts with open arms. It's a lot better than getting poked in the nose.

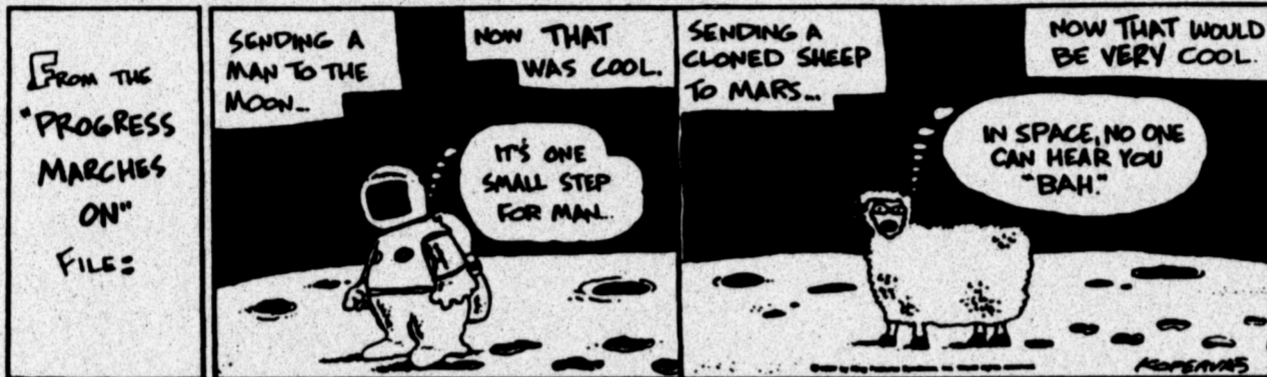

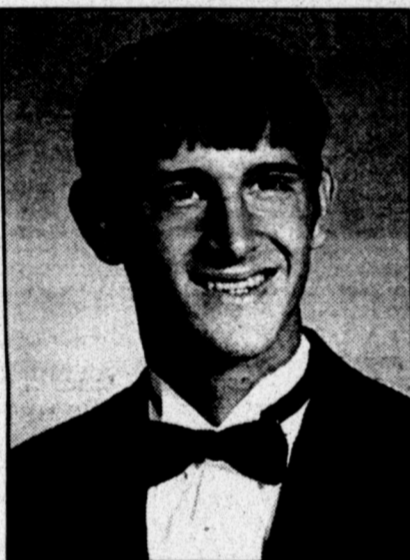

Abdullah to begin second quest for state tennis title

Junior Kareem Abdullah begins his second quest for a Class 2A State Tennis Title Friday at 11 a.m. in the 1997 UIL State Tennis Championships in Austin.

Abdullah lost in the semifinals of the state tournament last year against a foreign exchange student from Columbia.

Abdullah faces Jon Michael Cline of Elkhart in the opening round. "We really don't know anything about him, but (Abdullah) is really focused,"

head tennis coach Wade Wilson said.

Abdullah is the Region I singles champion and will play Cline, who finished as a runner-up in his region.

If Abdullah wins the first round, he will play later that afternoon in the semi-finals against the winner of the match between Chris Salmon of Stockdale and Koy Grote of Mason.

Finals are scheduled for 9 a.m. Saturday. "We went and played an eighth grader (last

week) from Amarillo that's a USTA player and he won 6-3, 6-3," Wilson said.

"(Abdullah) knows what to expect. Like he said at regional, because he won it last year if he didn't win it this year, he felt he would have let himself down and others down. He wants to try and win the whole thing (state) this year."

Abdullah will leave for Austin Thursday morning.

Williams to compete for state 200M and 400M championship

Senior Roy Williams enters Saturday's Class 2A State Championship Track Meet in Austin with the fastest qualifying time in Class 2A in the 200M and the 400M races.

Finals begin at 12 p.m. Saturday at the University of Texas track in Austin.

Williams attended a state qualifiers meet May 1 at Abilene Christian University, which attracted the top Texas high school runners in Class 1A through 5A.

Williams ran a personal best 20.9 in the 200M. A week earlier he set a Region I Class 2A record in the event

with a 21.7.

"He was being pushed, and he is just running real well," head coach Darryl Cash said. "There was some pretty stiff competition (this past weekend)."

Williams ran a 48.8 in the 400M, even though he wasn't pushed by the competition, Cash said. "He finished first by 20 meters at least. That's one of the best times in the state, but that was just an average run for him. He can do so much better."

The next-fastest qualifying time in the 400M in Class 2A is a 48.37, Cash said. "His goal is to run a :46. It

would take a good run, but he's capable of it."

This is Williams' third trip to the state meet. Williams finished second as a sophomore and third as a junior in the 400M.

"He's very focused," Cash said. "He's ready to go. He wants to run well, but he wants his time to have been the fastest in any class. He's got a shot at doing it."

Cash predicts that Williams will earn a good lane assignment because of his times.

"You want to be in the middle," Cash said. "You don't want to be on

the outside or the inside. You like to see the guys outside of you. You like to think you're running to catch up.

"He's partial to lane 3 or lane 4. He likes to chase somebody."

Williams leaves Friday morning for Austin. "Anyone that sees him this week needs to wish him well," Cash said. "He is a special runner."

Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these procedures if you have a concern about: •the value placed on your property; •exemptions that may apply to you; •cancellation of agricultural appraisal; •whether your property is taxable; •which local governments should be taxing your property; or •you think the appraisal district has done something else that adversely affected you.

If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

More information: You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at the Donley County Courthouse Annex, P.O. Box 1220, Clarendon 79226; phone 806-874-2744. You can also get a pamphlet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division at P O Box 13528, Austin, TX 78711-3528.

DEADLINE FOR FILING PROTESTS WITH THE ARB*

Usual Deadline: On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines: For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually Feb. 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or holiday.

Your Appraisal District staff urges you to review the value records of your property at any time prior to the day of the Appraisal Review Board Hearings tentatively set for July 11, 1997, in the Donley County Courthouse Annex. Some protests result from errors or misconceptions which we are pleased to correct.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board.

The appraisal review board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice a protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notification of the time, date, and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at the Donley County Courthouse Annex, P.O.Box 1220, Clarendon 79226; phone 806-874-2744.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district



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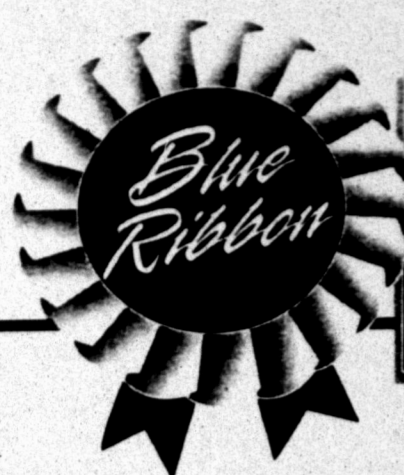

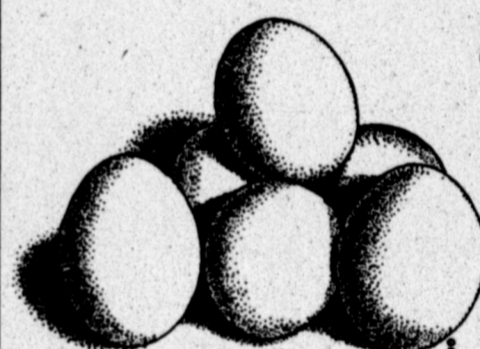
