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Lady Bulldogs bring home second place trophy from NSCAA tourney

Thomas, Alfred receive All-Tournament and All-American honors

Clarendon's Lady Bulldogs narrowly missed being crowned national champions of the National Small College Athletic Association Tournament Saturday falling short in their final game, 80-57, to the home-court Kansas Wesleyan team.

The four-day tournament ran March 5-8 in Salina, Kan.

Clarendon trailed 37-30 at half-time as both teams exchanged a series of runs. "They would get up 14 or 15 on us, and we would cut the lead," head coach Joel Zehr said. "It was really a well-played first half."

Zehr noted that Kansas Wesleyan shot 10-for-13 from the free throw line in the first half while the Lady Bulldogs were 6-for-11.

"They were hitting free throws, left and right (in the first half)."

Clarendon held the home team during the first five minutes of the second half, but the women couldn't capitalize on their inside game. "We missed five inside shots in the first 5:00 of the game; then they started scoring, so instead of cutting the lead, they extended it."

With 7:00 remaining in the game, Clarendon was down seven points and never could get any closer.

"It became a free-throw shooting contest for them," Zehr said. "They were 20-for-24, and we shot 4-for-8 in the second half."

"It was a huge advantage just playing on their home court (for Kansas Wesleyan). There was some talk that you can't win on a home court with home referees, but I didn't buy that. We had every opportunity to stay in the ball game and didn't handle it."

Scoring for the Lady Bulldogs was Brandy Thomas with 21, who was named to the all-tournament team. The sophomore from Wellington also was named to the NSCAA All-America team.

Other scorers were Maria Hernandez, 9; Angie Kepley, 9; Maxi Flores, 8; Charmaine Alfred, 5; Jodi Card, 2; Jeanne Tubbs, 2; and Chimira Williams, 1.

Alfred also was named to the all-tournament team and received an honorable mention on the

NSCAA All-America team.

"They were pretty heartbroken; they were really disappointed," Zehr said of the loss. "They wanted it really bad. This was one of the teams I've had that really had a goal; they had an opportunity to reach it and didn't make it."

"The girls would like to thank everybody who came up. A lot of the players' parents and people from town showed up. It was really neat; we haven't had that support in some time."

Clarendon finished its season at 25-5.

The Lady Bulldogs opened the tournament with a March 5 morning showdown with Mount Senario out of Ladysmith, Wis. Clarendon trailed 31-27 at halftime before pulling away with a 52-44 win.

"We were sluggish the whole game," Zehr said. "We were only allowed five minutes of warm-up time because the game before went into double overtime, and we just really weren't ready to play."

The difference in the second half was Clarendon quit fouling. "They scored a lot of fouls from the free throw line," he said. "Our pressure defense changed a bunch, and we held them to 13

points in the second half."

Scoring for Clarendon were Thomas, 19; Alfred, 10; Tiffany Wilcox, 8; Hernandez, 4; Card, 4; Kepley, 3; and Flores, 2.

Clarendon had a day of rest before meeting Michigan Christian Friday in a 3 p.m. start. The Lady Bulldogs led 33-28 and never looked back, rolling to a 70-52 win.

"The first half, I thought our whole game was better," he said. "We came out with intensity. With :50 to go, we were 10 ahead and then made three errors to cut it to five at halftime."

Clarendon held the Michigan team's barrage of three-point shooters, who made 14-of-30 three-pointers in their opening round game.

The Lady Bulldogs had Michigan Christian down by 25 in the second half before Zehr cleared the bench.

Scorers were Thomas, 25; Alfred, 17; Card, 8; Flores, 6; Hernandez, 6; Wilcox, 4; Tubbs, 2; and Williams, 2.

The Clarendon College men's team came in fifth at the tournament. The details of the Bulldogs' games will be in next week's issue of the Enterprise.

"You never know when little eyes are watching" is the advice Bulldog Coach Joe Mondragon likes to give his players when admonishing them always to be role models.

His words were certainly true this past week during the National Small College Athletic Association's national tournament in Salina, Kansas.

A few families in the host city had volunteered their time to 'adopt' an out of town team who might not have many fans at the tourney to cheer for them.

Shelley Donaldson and her mother, Kathryn Nell, signed up.

When Shelley brought her sons to the tournament, they heard players in green and white chanting "Whoop! Whoop! Who Let The Dawgs Out? Whoop! Whoop! Who Let The Dawgs Out?" They were hooked. Clarendon College would be their team.

Seven-year-old Scott Donaldson, 13-year-old twins David and Christopher Donaldson, and their friend, 13-year-old Gen Gillespie, soon became more than just fans. They became part of the team.

"They supported us, and we supported them," said Coach Mondragon. "It was like a big brother-little brother relationship."

When the announcer would call off the roll for the Bulldogs, the players would run out, shake the referees' hands and the opposing coach's hand, and then run by and give their little fans a high-five or a pat on the head.

The boys were invited into the Bulldog dressing room and got their NSCAA tournament T-shirts autographed.

Scott, Christopher, and Gen are all very athletic and are involved with sports. David, however, has cerebral palsy and cannot play sports.



But he is the statistician of the family. He can tell you who scored the most points for the Bulldogs. "He plays the game in his head," Mondragon said.

For Thursday's game, Shelley pulled her sons out of school so they could be there to cheer for the Bulldogs. Shelley said her family does not even regularly attend the games of the hometown Kansas Wesleyan Coyotes. But there was no way they would miss a Bulldog game. The boys also stayed up late and made posters for the team.

"They have loved every minute of it," Shelley said before the Lady Bulldogs' game Saturday night. "This is something they will remember their whole lives."

When the Lady Bulldogs played for the national championship, their little brothers were seated right behind the team, along with the Bulldog players, cheering them on.

When the CC women lost the championship, you couldn't tell from the way the Donaldson boys reacted. They were still thrilled to have their picture taken with the team holding the second place plaque as they would have if it were a first place plaque.

As everyone gathered on the gym floor, David, in his hurry, stumbled to the ground. But before anyone could respond to help, he gathered himself back up on his crutches and scurried out to have his picture taken with what in his mind was the winning team.

Sometimes the biggest fans come in the smallest sizes and show up when you least expect them. Sometimes they can teach us all who the real winners in this world are.



Lady Broncos finish third during 50th annual Panhandle Relays

Clarendon's relay and sprint races accounted for four first place finishes as the Lady Broncos placed third place in the 50th annual Panhandle Relays Saturday in Panhandle.

The Lady Broncos travel to Paducah Saturday for a 9 a.m. meet. Finals begin at 3 p.m.

Junior Clarissa Smith was first in the 200 meters, posting a time of 27.46. Kathy Bryley was right on her heels, clocking in at 27.57.

In the 100 meters, Bryley finished first with a 12.84 effort. Freshman Niki Carter was sixth with a 13.6 run.

Clarendon's Kim Alexander, Carter, Bryley and Smith ran a 1:49.84

in the 800 relay for another gold medal, and the team of Alexander, Mandy Weatherston, Kasi Ashcraft, and Smith finished first in the mile relay with a time of 4:21.15.

"(Weatherston) had a pulled muscle, so that's all we ran her in," head coach Steve Schmidt said. "She did good, really good."

The junior Ashcraft placed fifth in the 800 meter run with a time of 2:49. Catherine Chamberlain was sixth with a time of 2:49, and Kala Holland finished seventh, clocking in

at 2:50.

Chamberlain was fifth in the 1600 meter run with a time of 6:35.

Second and fourth places in the shot put were claimed by Ashcraft and Alexander, who threw 33-9 1/2 and 32-6, respectively.

"I was real happy with it," head coach Steve Schmidt said. "We've got to be careful about injuries. We need to get in better shape. Compared to where we were last year, we're already further along at this point. I'm real happy."

Thornberry takes Smithsonian to task for anti-beef agenda

WASHINGTON, D.C. - US Rep. Mac Thornberry wrote today to Smithsonian Institution Director I. Michael Heyman urging him to end the Smithsonian's relationship with Muse magazine.

Muse magazine, a publication geared toward children which, Thornberry says, promoted a blatantly anti-beef agenda in its March issue.

"It has come to my attention that the cover story in the March 1997 edition of Muse magazine presented what can only be described as the virtue of vegetarianism and the vice of eating beef," Thornberry wrote.

"It's not much of a presentation. From the magazine cover depicting photo of a calf and the words, 'Please Don't Eat Me,' to the story itself which leads off with the sentence, 'Every time you put meat in your mouth, you're eating a slaughtered animal,' the article is blatantly one-sided."

"As a rancher and someone whose family has been in the cattle business for more than 115 years, the article obviously disturbs me. But what disturbs me even more, as a

member of Congress and an American taxpayer, is the fact that Muse magazine is published in cooperation with the Smithsonian Institution."

"That the Smithsonian Institution is involved in the publication of such a biased and misleading article is outrageous. That the publication is targeted toward children between the ages of 6 and 14 is simply irresponsible. Even if no federal funds were used in publishing Muse magazine, the fact that the Smithsonian Institution lends its name to this publication lends credence to its articles and legitimacy to its agenda."

"The Smithsonian Institution has no business giving credence to the views set forth in the March issue of Muse. Accordingly, I am requesting answers to the following questions:

What is the nature of the relationship between the Smithsonian Institution and Muse magazine? Specifically, have any federal funds been used to establish, promote, or

Clarendon Trustees hold regular meeting

The Board of Trustees of the Clarendon CISD met in regular session on Feb. 13, 1997, at 7 p.m. in the Administration Building.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved as was the financial statement for the month of January.

No presentations were made in Open Forum.

Mike Green gave a construction report on the new gym. The weather has caused some delays, but walls were expected to be going up in two weeks.

Jennifer Tubbs, Sandy Anderburg, and Claudia Elliott reported on the Creative Educational Institute Program (CEI). They outlined basic components of the program in elementary through high school. Students were reported to have shown improvement in a wide range of academic subjects.

The trustees approved a motion by Wayne Hardin, seconded by Weldon Sears, to approve "Starting Points" on instruction as presented.

Sandy Thornberry moved, seconded by Wayne Hardin, to set the trustees' election for the first Saturday in May (May 3, 1997) for the purpose of electing two full-term trustees (seats held by Wayne Hardin and Joe Lemley) and two unexpired term trustees (seats vacated by Johnny Floyd and Kelly Hill).

Willard Skelton will be election judge, Cula Jo Trout will be absentee clerk, and Mary White will be deputy. Motion carried.

The trustees voted to authorize one cheerleading squad of eight students with one representative guaranteed from each class and to take four additional cheerleaders with the next four highest number of votes.

The board approved graduation requirements as presented for minimum requirements, advanced, recommended, and distinguished achievement requirements.

Wayne Hardin moved, seconded by Weldon Sears, to approve a weight of five points added to the semester average in academically weighted courses for rank in class effective with the 1997-98 school year.

The enrollment report showed 245 students in elementary, 134 students in junior high, and 146 students in high school.

The board then went into Executive Session to discuss personnel.

Following Executive Session, the trustees approved a motion by Lynne Williams, seconded by Weldon Sears, to extend for one year the contracts of high school principal Larry Jeffers, junior high principal Donnie Carroll, and elementary principal Mike Word and giving each of them a \$1,500 salary increase for the 1997-98 school year.

Wayne Hardin moved, seconded by Joe Lemley to offer athletic director Darrell "Tooter" Draper a two-year contract commencing August 1, 1998, and ending June 30, 1999. Hardin, Sears, Lemley voted in favor. Williams and Thornberry voted 'no.'

Lynne Williams moved, seconded by Wayne Hardin, to approve a \$1,500 salary increase for Darrell "Tooter" Draper. Motion carried unanimously.

Administrative Reports were heard from Larry Jeffers, Donnie Carroll, and Mike Word.

Coach Draper and Superintendent Phil Barefield also gave reports to the board.

The next board meeting will be March 13, 1997.







Breast Cancer Screening Clinic to be held March 20

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and Baptist/St. Anthony's Health System will conduct a Breast Cancer Screening Clinic at Clarendon Medical Center Nursing Home, Hwy 70 North, in Clarendon on March 20, 1997.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram, and performing a breast self-exam each month.

Participants will receive a low-cost screening that includes a mammogram and instruction in self-examination by a registered nurse. The total cost is \$75. A minimum of fifteen women needs to register in order for the mobile mammography clinic to come to area towns. Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for Texas residents who qualify for assistance. All exams are done by appointment only. 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

Shelley places third at powerlifting meet

Junior Jeremy Shelley finished third in the Region I Powerlifting meet Saturday in Sundown, narrowly missing out on an invitation to the State Powerlifting meet later this month in Houston.

Shelley - ranked fourth in the 132 lb. class before Saturday's competition - needed to lift 15 more pounds, a weight he was capable of doing, to advance.

The top 10 lifters in each weight class in the 73-school region are invited to the meet.

Classes 1A, 2A and 3A are lumped into the region. Lifters from Munday and Lubbock Cooper edged Shelley.

"He benched more than he ever had," head coach Darryl Cash said. "He benched 190 lbs., squatted 340 lbs, which is pretty good, and dead-lifted 365 lbs. He needed to do 380 lbs. to win, and he's capable."

"He gave every bit he had. He's done 400 lbs. before. It just wasn't meant to be that way that day."

"The effort and intensity were there; it just wasn't meant to be. We're proud of him, and he represented the school well."

Shelley was one of the elite 10 invited to the meet because of the dedication he has portrayed in the weight room the entire year.

"He's naturally strong to begin with, and he's done everything that's been asked and even more," Cash said.

"He's dedicated himself to being strong. He's naturally strong anyway, but he's worked very hard at it."

Making the regional tournament this year has given Shelley inspiration for next year. "He is fired up to go back next year," Cash said. "He can do it. He's determined to win state. He qualified for regionals as a freshman, and last year he didn't compete. This year he got third."

Shelley has been an inspiration to the other weight lifters, Cash said. "He's proven that you're not going to get there on natural strength. You have to work hard to get there. The 10 kids who got to regional worked hard and deserved it."

Region I has the largest region with 73 schools, but Cash expects the region to be reduced to 32 schools next year. "That will help our case," he said.

Broncos finish 11th at track meet

Clarendon's varsity boys track team finished 11th with 11 points in Saturday's 50th Annual Panhandle Relays in Panhandle.

Senior Dean Stanzione paced the Broncos with a second place finish in the triple jump. Stanzione jumped 40-8 1/2".

Stanzione also finished in the top six in the long jump. Junior Brent Gaines finished in the top six in the high jump.

Senior James Hoggatt competed in the 400 meter run for the first time and ran a 55.7.

"He didn't make the finals, but it wasn't bad for the first time to run it," head coach Darryl Cash said. "The weather was bad again, so that was a factor."

Clarendon's junior varsity squad finished fifth with 48 points. Junior Oren Shields won the 100 meters in 11.4 and the 200 meters in 24.1

Freshman Carey Thornberry breezed to a first place finish in the 400 meters with a time of 55.6, and Blake Bass won the pole vault,

clearing 11-6".

Hunter Spier was fourth in the shot put, heaving it 38 feet.

Clarendon's relays also racked up points. The mile relay team of Zach Butts, Thornberry, Cael Shields, and Garrett Bains ended up with a sixth place finish.

Oren Shields, Cael Shields, Wes Ritchie and Butts placed sixth in the sprint relay competition. Jr. Rodriguez ran in the preliminary heat.

Clarendon travels to Paducah Saturday to break in the Dragons' newly constructed eight-lane track. Field and preliminary running events begin at 9 a.m. while finals kick off at 3 p.m.

"Hopefully, we'll run into (District 2-2A rival) Quanah (in Paducah)," Cash said. "Maybe, we'll get some good weather down that way."

"The Smithsonian Institution was founded by James Smithson for "the increase and diffusion of knowledge among men." I don't consider the contents of the article in question knowledge. I consider it propaganda. As such, the Smithsonian should not be contributing to its diffusion.

"I urge you to terminate all ties with *Muse* magazine, examine the relationship with Carus Publishing, and review the policies of employees use of the Smithsonian name. I look forward to your response."


