Over 1,000 attend CC contest

More than 1,323 students from across the state of Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico tested their judging skills in the 15th annual Clarendon College Contest on Saturday, March 30.

Twenty 4-H clubs and 124 FFA chapter teams competed in more than 13 judging contests. According to Jerry Hawkins, coach of Clarendon College's award-winning judging teams, the annual event was a success.

"Clarendon College's judging contest is one of the best in the state. The size of the event is proof of that," Hawkins said. "Agriculture instructors and 4-H leaders across the state and surrounding states know that our contest is a top-notch event."

Teams competed in contests ranging from livestock and horse judging to entomology and land judging.

Donley County 4-H and FFA do well in competition

Donley County Senior 4-H and Clarendon High School FFA members took home honors in several competitions at the 15th annual Clarendon College Judging Contest, held on March 30.

The Donley County Senior 4-H team took home top honors in the Livestock Judging competition. They competed against 14 teams and 63 individuals. Taking top individual honor in Livestock Judging was Drew Jeffers of Clarendon. His teammate, Josh Talley, placed third.

Clarendon High School FFA members took home fourth place honors in the Agricultural Mechanics competitions. They competed against 11 teams and 39 individuals. Walker McAnear placed fourth in the individual Agricultural Mechanics competition.

Two Clarendon FFA members

received honors in the Plant Identification contest. Nathan Sears placed first while Donny Owens placed third. One team and nine individuals competed in this contest.

Clarendon College athletic director Joe Mondragón was selected to direct the first-ever Adidas Texas vs. Tennessee High School All-Star Game held at St. Edwards University in Austin on Saturday, April 6, 1996.

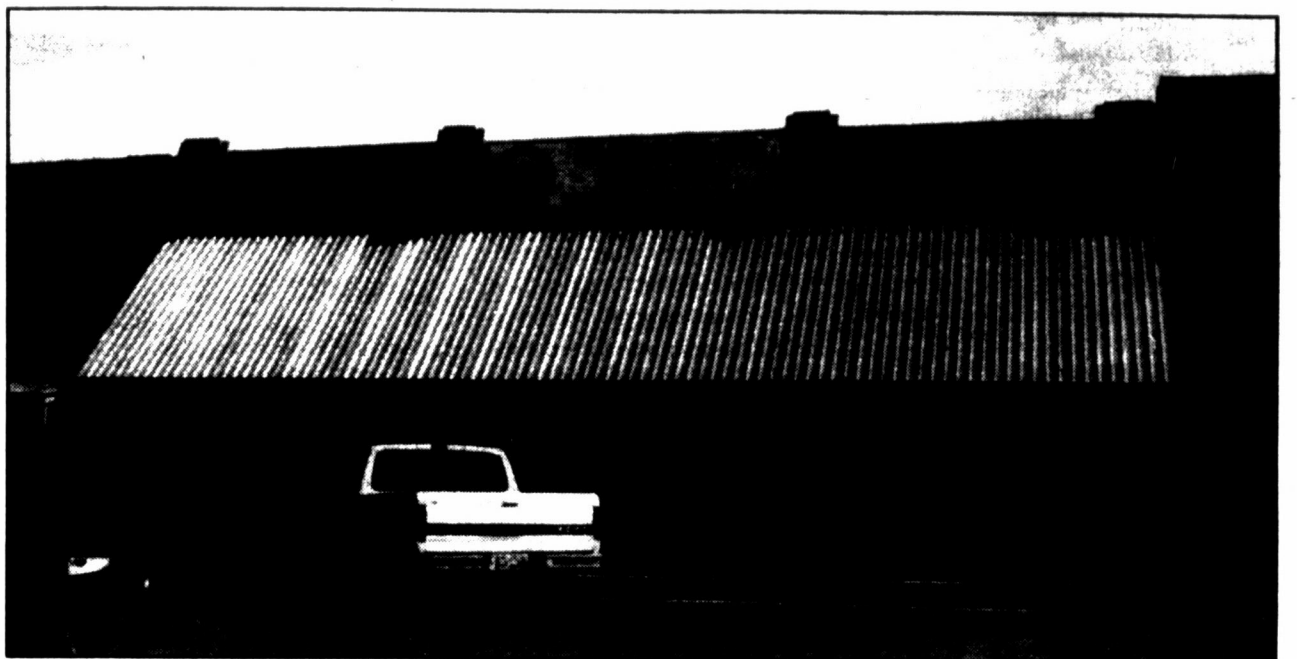
Mondragón, who also coaches CC's men's basketball team, was selected from among high school, community college, and university coaches to lead the Texas All-Star team. Clarendon's coach showed his winning ways and led the Texas All-Stars to a 104-92 victory over Tennessee.

According to Mondragón, the event was an excellent opportunity to recruit players for Clarendon College's basketball squad.

"Players from both (the Texas and the Tennessee) squads would work well into our program here at Clarendon," Mondragón said. "Many had already signed letters of intent to Division I schools such as UNLV, which has earned a national championship."

Sponsored by Adidas, players were provided with uniforms and shoes. The All-Star game was the brainchild of Lufkin, Texas, resident Larry Alexander.

"The event was definitely a success — the teams were supported by a good crowd," Mondragón said. "If I'm asked to do it again, I'll be there!"

City takes steps to include theme park in city limits

Bond issue set to provide water, sewer service

The Clarendon Board of Aldermen have begun the process to extend the city limits to include the Thunder Junction theme park.

In a motion made by Alderman Shawn Barker at the March 12, 1996, meeting, the city would extend its boundaries north along Texas Highway 70 for up to one-half mile to annex the park.

According to city secretary Janice Barbee, the annexation is far from being a done deal.

Surveys are still being done, and then the affected property owners will have to be contacted for their approval.

The city must then hold two public hearings on the proposed annexation before the board of aldermen take their final vote on the matter.

The city has also called for a bond election to be placed on the May 4, 1996, ballot.

If approved by the voters, the city would be authorized to issue \$200,000 in 40-year bonds. The money raised

"In the ever-changing health care climate, hospital boards, administrators, and employees must work together to give the best patient care possible," Synek said. This can only be done in a spirit of openness as that team works to make themselves worthy of taxpayers' dollars."

In other city business, the board acted to add a 1/2% sales tax for property tax relief on the May ballot. And the aldermen also acted on the recommendation of the Wellington-based OJD Engineering to accept the bid of Triple L Utilities Company to move the water and sewer lines under U.S. Hwy. 287 for \$215,256.

Third Saints' Roost Jamboree scheduled for this Saturday

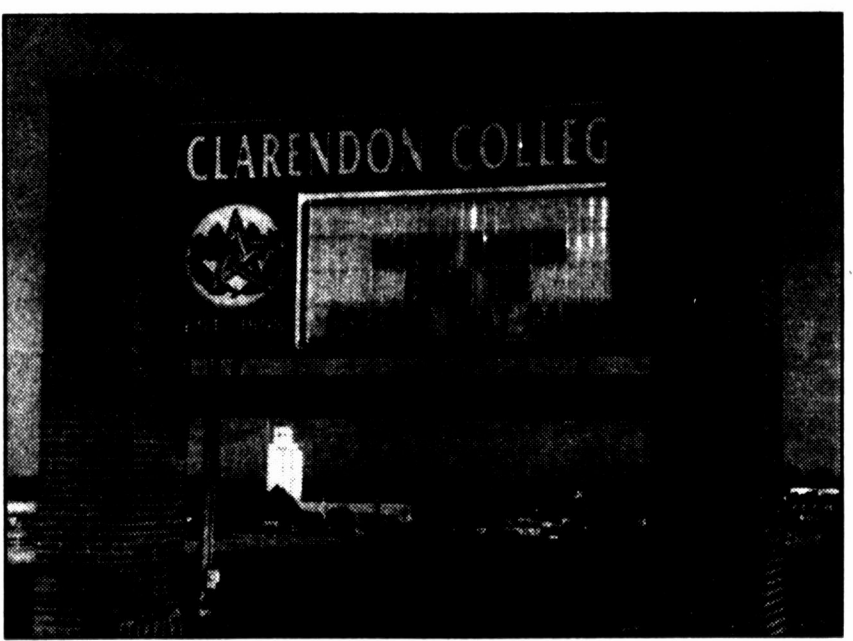
The third Saints' Roost Jamboree will be held on Saturday, April 13. This month's jamboree is sponsored by the Donley County State Bank.

Economic injury disaster loans available from SBA

Businesses depending on farmers and ranchers in some Texas counties can now apply for low interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans from the US Small Business Administration (SBA). These loans are available to help business meet normal operating expenses that cannot be met due to the effects of a disaster.

Flooding, hail, and high winds which occurred May 25 through June 5, 1995; and excessive rains, hail, and tornadoes which occurred June 2 through June 4, 1995, caused many farmers and ranchers to experience reduced incomes which may have had

an adverse economic effect on businesses depending upon these producers. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for this loan program but may be eligible for disaster assistance through other Federal agencies.

Businesses in the following counties affected by excessive rains, hail, and tornadoes which occurred June 2 through June 4, 1995, have until October 9, 1996, to apply: Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Hall, and Hardeman.

Businesses in the following counties affected by flooding, hail, and high winds which occurred May 25 through June 5, 1995 have until October 15, 1996 to apply: Briscoe, Childress, Collingsworth, Cottle, Donley, Hall, and Motley.

Abdullah grabs 1st place in tennis tourney

Clarendon's Kareem Abdullah coasted to first place in the Amarillo Relays Tennis Tournament Boys Open Division Thursday, April 4, and Friday, April 5, in Memorial Park.

With the six wins posted in the tournament, Abdullah also guided Clarendon to a second place finish in the prestigious tournament.

Abdullah's brother, freshman Kalil Abdullah, the only other Broncho to make the trip lost his opening match in the single elimination tournament.

Kareem Abdullah won his first two pro sets against two competitors, 8-0, 8-0, and then bested an Amarillo Tascosa player, 8-0.

The sophomore sensation then advanced to the quarterfinal round where he ran over Tascosa player J. Trumbly, 6-1, 6-2.

"Just competing in the tournament was difficult enough," head coach Jimmy Avery said. "The temperatures were real low and the winds were really strong. (Abdullah) just braved it all and went after it."

During Friday's semifinal competition, Abdullah trounced a Borger player before turning around 15 minutes later and rolling over Jeff Floret of Tascosa, 6-4, 6-1 in the final round of the tournament.

"(Abdullah) stayed in his game,"

Avery said. "Tascosa is known for its powerful tennis team, and Floret was a great volleyer. Kareem knew he had to keep returning the ball against him. That guy (Floret) could return anything, but (Abdullah) just kept returning the ball."

"The most enjoyable thing about (Abdullah) is even if he is just killing someone he keeps encouraging them and helping them. He's just a class act. He's such a good kid."

Clarendon's tennis team travels to Wellington this Wednesday and Thursday for the District 2-2A tournament. Kareem Abdullah already has bested one of the top seeds in the upcoming district tournament.

Freshmen Scotty Elliott and Kalil Abdullah team up for doubles action while junior Scott Bivens competes in the singles competition.

The top two finishers advance to the regional competition April 24 and 25 in Abilene.

Broncho Golf Team

The Clarendon High School boys golf team travels to Canadian Thursday for the second and final round of the two-day District 2-2A golf meet one stroke out of second place.

Memphis leads with 318, while Panhandle is in a distant second with a team total of 360. Clarendon is in third place with a score of 361.

The first round was played April 2 at Memphis Country Club.

Chris Chamberlain shot the lowest score for the Bronchos with a round of 88, good enough for seventh place in the individual placing. Freshman Scotty Elliott placed a stroke behind in eighth place with an 89.

Rounding out the Broncho team was Trent Mooring, 92; Robert Bertrand, 93; and Wade James, 92.

"They didn't play as well as they did the first time they played at Memphis," head golf coach Joe Sexton said. "We were all right there together. I was real pleased that our number four and five guys started to shoot a lot better."

"We need to get Scotty (Elliott) and Chris (Chamberlain) to shoot a little bit lower."

The Bronchos will have to play a good round Thursday to slip by Panhandle, who Sexton believes played as well as they could. "Most of their players shoot in the 90s. They had one guy shoot an 86."

Most of the Clarendon linksters traveled to Canadian over the Easter holidays to practice on what Sexton calls a hilly course with blind spots.

If Clarendon places in the top teams in the district, they will advance to the regional competition April 21-22 in Baird, outside of Abilene.

"Having Something To Say"

When I was a boy, my mother rarely had to holler out the back door for me to scurry home. Nine times out of ten, I was already there.

Equipped with Lincoln Logs, Tinker Toys, Legos, and an Erector Set, I used to play in my room for hours on end - so reclusive that Mom worried about it.

I haven't changed a whole heckuva lot since then. I did give up Tinker Toys a couple years ago, but I'm still a flaming introvert whose idea of a big night is a bowl of buttered popcorn and Andy Griffin reruns. Heck, my wife even had to ask me to marry her. That was 25 years ago, and my mother-in-law hasn't forgiven Claudia yet.

Quiet and shy are diplomatic ways to describe my demeanor. But, all too often, it has been characterized as distant and even unfriendly.

But, you know, there's a big difference between talking and having something to say. Interestingly enough, one of the greatest compliments I've ever been paid by a student echoed that theme.

"Mr. Elliott," the young journalism student offered, "I respect you because you never say anything until you've got something to say."

I thought that was kind of profound coming from a barefoot 18-year-old wearing an earring and bowl cut.

Not talking until you have something to say. Apart from my rather misguided attempts at humor, I have generally attempted to apply that same philosophy to writing.

Abiding by that philosophy proved difficult some years ago as a full-time journalist. I was obliged to write a minimum of two columns and editorials per week to keep bread on my family's table, and, as a result, I penned some real clinkers.

Back then I wanted to save the world, *a la* Bernstein and Woodward, and didn't feel very challenged writing canned civic editorials. To be fair, there's real merit in promoting a highway cleanup or a bake sale, but, for me, it was too easy and too safe - kind of like wearing a lifejacket in a bathtub. Likewise, I didn't feel very motivated about addressing national issues and personalities unless I could draw some sort of local parallel.

Of course, the closer to home the issue, the greater the courage required by the writer. One time I wrote an editorial criticizing the city council for granting a tax abatement to a prospective industry when virtually nothing had been done to promote existing industry in years. Moreover, the new industry didn't even meet the established criteria for the abatement.

My publisher slam-dunked the editorial into his trash can, arguing it would hurt advertising revenue. It was the darkest day of my journalistic life, but I learned a valuable lesson. I learned that for some folks integrity has a price, and sometimes that price is too high.

But back to the present - I have been humbled over the past few months that several people have complimented my "Off Campus" columns. It's gratifying for any writer to know that some folks find his or her work interesting.

Some weeks, however, I just don't have time to write a column. I'm finding the presidency of Clarendon College to be a full-time job. In fact, running the college is almost requiring as much of my time as being secretary of the Lions Club.

Then there are times when I don't write a column because I have nothing to say. I have rarely gotten into trouble for keeping my mouth shut, whereas, the opposite - whether verbal or written - has provided me with some really anxious moments over the years.

Writing is a stark thing. You can't take back what's etched on paper; you can't lie about never having said it or claim that someone misrepresented what you said. Written words are there for the world to see and judge. So, sooner or later one of my "Off Campus" columns will be an "Off Base" column in someone's estimation, if that hasn't already occurred.

It's kind of like I have often opined to the Clarendon College Board of Regents about the presidency - an absence of criticism is, in a sense, tantamount to an indictment. All it means is that you're not doing anything.

Silence may be safe, but, as the cliché goes, it can also be deafening. I've often lacked the fortitude to say or write things. For instance, I've had countless opportunities to stand up for my God, but have repeatedly failed to do so because it lacked political correctness.

But one thing that I can say for myself - whenever I've written something, I've always put my name on it. I've never written an anonymous letter to the editor, and, as a newspaper editor myself, I never published one. I always figured that if someone didn't have the guts to sign a letter, then it didn't merit publication. Moreover, anonymous letters are normally written to castigate a group or an individual, and I believe wholeheartedly in the American tenet of having the opportunity to face one's accusers.

For me, writing can be almost therapeutic at times. I recently authored a column on the passing of my grandmother, and that provided me with a kind of soul-searching opportunity. When I try to be funny in writing - which, for me, can be more ambitious than developing a philosophical statement, that's another form of release.

So, thanks to Roger Estlack for permitting me this forum, and thanks to those of you who periodically peruse it. God willing, there are a few more words within me, if I only have the time to put them down on paper.

And only if I have something to say.

"Small Businesses Face Big Bureaucratic Hurdle"

After he went to work for the federal government, rocket science pioneer Werner von Braun lamented, "We can lick gravity, but sometimes the paperwork is overwhelming."

Owners of small businesses who would like to do business with the federal government know that sinking feeling. If a rocket scientist is defeated by a bewildering maze of bureaucratic rules, how are they supposed to succeed?

Dealing with the federal government has never been easy. But small businesses face an even more daunting challenge when they pursue government contracts. Each federal agency and department has its own procedures, its own criteria for participation and its own stack of forms for would-be suppliers and contractors.

This myriad of forms and separate certification processes is enough to intimidate someone who's trying to launch a small business. Federal policy and practice ought to be uniform—for large and small businesses alike and for the sake of government efficiency.

When the Federal Acquisition Streamlining Act was under consideration last year, I saw an opportunity to set in motion the creation of a new, uniform form for the certification of certain small businesses for government work. I amended the act to require a thorough review of federal procurement policies to identify and list the various laws and regulations which define the eligibility of

small businesses to act as contractors or subcontractors on federal projects.

The law now requires the Administrator for Federal Procurement Policy (the title alone is a mouthful) to develop uniform definitions for small business contracts and uniform agency certification standards and procedures.

We want to make it easier for small businesses to find their way through the federal maze and to bid successfully on projects.

Once uniformity is achieved, the rules and requirements will be the same whether you are dealing with Department of Defense catering operations, the US Fish and Wildlife Service, OSHA or the Venetian Blinds Department of the Architect of the Capitol's office.

The deadline for this report on the simplification project is May 1, when it is to be delivered to the House and Senate Small Business Committees.

I will do all I can to see that those committees keep this matter on the front burner. Small businesses are responsible for more than half the new jobs created in our country each year. Anything government can do to get out of their way and let them get on with the job should be a priority.

The sooner all agencies begin reading from the same page of the bureaucratic book, the better—for government, for small business, and for the taxpayer.

Simpson Wins at Greenbelt

Other top finishers in the forty-four angler field included Tim Parker (5.52 lbs.) of Canyon, Raymond Ruthardt (5.27) of Groom, Gordon Cummings (5.15) of Spearman, Ron Smyer (4.28) of Amarillo, Larry Erwin (3.91) of Wheeler, John Hawley (3.61) of White Deer, and John Steffey (3.83) of Wheeler.

For the record, thirty anglers out of a field of 44 brought legal bass to the scales. Following the weigh-in ceremonies, all bass were successfully released.

The big bass in our local lakes are starting to be more active. Last Saturday, a new lake record bass at Lake Greenbelt was caught by Amarillo angler Butch William. Butch's 10.9 lb. trophy bass couldn't resist a black jig-n-pig and, after official certification at the Marina, was released back into Lake Greenbelt.

Shallowater edges out Bronchos at meet

The Clarendon boys track team were edged by Class 3A Shallowater April 4 in the Golden Spur Classic in Spur as the Bronchos competed in their last meet before last Friday and Saturday's District 2-2A contest.

The track team heads to Panhandle at 3 p.m. Friday for the district contest. The meet continues Saturday morning.

The Clarendon Colts 7th and 8th grade track teams will compete in the district meet. Field events will be Friday afternoon for the Colts, while prelims will take place Saturday morning.

Preliminary running events will be Friday afternoon and field events will occur Saturday morning for high school participants.

Chris Brown threw the discus 127 feet - good enough for third place. Mark Barefield finished just behind the senior Brown for a fourth place spot.

Both probably need to throw farther than 150 feet to win the district meet and advance to the regional round of competition, head track coach Kent Allison said.

Brown turned around and threw the shot put 48 feet, 6 1/2 inches for first place in the Spur track meet.

Cold weather hampered many of

the results, Allison said. Despite the frigid temperatures, Junior Roy Williams placed first in the long jump with a jump of 20 feet, 8 3/4 inches. Dean Stanzione was fourth with a distance of 14 feet, 8 inches.

The triple jump also was Williams contest as he walked away with another gold medal with a jump of 41 feet, 4 inches.

Clarendon put out a new team in the sprint relay and placed fourth with a time of 45.6 - less than 1 second out of first place. Oren Shields, Evan Williams, Clint Green, and Stanzione competed in the 400 meter relay.

"We've run 44.7, but we never have the same people on it ever," Allison said.

Junior James Hoggatt - a mainstay on the track team - equaled his best time of 2:06.5 in the 800 meters. He placed first with the finish - 2 seconds ahead of his nearest competitor.

Runners from Memphis and Panhandle both run a 2:03 pace, and Allison said Hoggatt will need to run a personal best to win the district crown.

Roy Williams placed third in the 100 meter dash with a time of 11.07. The two runners ahead of him clocked in at 11.05 and 11.06.

The junior Roy Williams ran a

50 flat in the 400 meters for a first place finish. Evan Williams ran a 56.23 for third place. Hoggatt placed fourth with a 57.1 mark.

Roy Williams placed second in the 200 meters with a time of 22.71 - the first place finisher clocked in at 22.70.

"It was as good as any meet that we could have gone to," Allison said. "We just have to put a mile relay and sprint relay together that will go to region."

Clarendon's junior varsity squad did a good job at the meet, Allison said. Blake Bass won the pole vault with a vault of 9 feet and 6 inches. Jason Archuleta jumped 6 feet and 2 inches in the high jump for first place. If he had competed in the varsity division, he would have grabbed second place.

Archuleta also ran an 18.4 in the 110 meter hurdles, which would have earned him third place in the upper division.

The 400 meter relay team of Wes Ritchie, Robert Bertrand, Josh Allred, and Bass got second place. The 1600 meter relay squad of Archuleta, Bass, Allred and Bertrand also competed.

The junior varsity team finished in fourth place.

Lady Bronchos place second in Amarillo Relays

The Clarendon Lady Bronchos finished second Thursday, April 4, and Friday, April 5, 1996, behind a deep Sanford-Fritch team for second place in the Amarillo Girls Relays in Dick Bivins Stadium.

Three Lady Bronchos, including first place finisher Clarissa Smith, placed in the long jump. Clarissa Smith jumped 15 feet, 1 inch while Mandy Weatherton was fourth with a distance of 14 feet, 5 inches. Stephanie Smith was sixth with a jump of 13 feet, 11 inches.

"It was the first time Mandy jumped," head girls track coach Steve Schmidt said. "They all have natural ability, they just need to keep working on the technique."

Kim Alexander threw to a sixth place finish in the shot put with a throw of 29 feet, 2 inches.

Clarendon picked up 14 points in the April 4 field events for fifth place heading into Friday's competition. But Schmidt was encouraged for a strong finish going into the final day of competition because the Lady Bronchos had people qualify in almost every running event in the preliminary competition.

Schmidt fielded a new team in the 400 meter relay, and they ran good enough for second place - a half a second off of first place. Tangelia Smith, Stephanie Smith, Kathy Bryley, and Kim Alexander competed for the Lady Bronchos.

Stephanie Smith and Kim Alexander substituted for Mandy Weatherton and Clarissa Smith.

"In the sprint relay, the hand-offs are the most crucial," Schmidt said. "I thought they really did a good job and competed well."

Sophomore Kasi Ashcraft was second in the 800 meters with a time of 2:34.50. Freshman Tracy Hankins placed seventh with a time of 2:57 - two seconds out of sixth place.

Laura Finch ran her best time in the 100 meter hurdles posting a 17.79. "She had a little injury earlier in the week, and I was afraid it was going to set her back. She looks like she's getting stronger and getting more confidence each week."

Clarissa Smith posted a "real good time (of 12.30) especially considering the temperature outside," Schmidt said. "It was about 40 degrees."

Clarissa Smith placed first while Tangelia Smith was fourth with a 13.34, and Cindy Hearn was fifth with a 13.69.

"The 100 meter dash is a pretty technical race, and a lot of things could happen (in district)," Schmidt said. "She's (Clarissa Smith) got a good shot (to advance)."

Clarissa Smith advanced to the state meet in the 100 meters in 1995.

When Schmidt tinkered with the sprint relay team, he also toiled around with the 800 meter relay fielding a new team. The team of Alexander, Weatherton, Bryley, and Clarissa Smith blew away the competition finishing two seconds ahead for a gold medal.

"This is the first week I put some of these girls in there to see what would happen. I want to make sure we have our talent where it should

be."

"It was a good time. I just don't know what I'm going to do for district."

Weatherton, always the trooper ran the 400 meters for the first time and walked away with first place and a time of 66.20. She ran an even better time during the April 4 prelims. Weatherton ran to a 63.56 pace.

"She has to decide whether she's going to compete in it," Schmidt said. "She ran the relay right before it, and it altered her time."

Finch placed in the 300 meter hurdles with a time of 54.72 - a pace off her best mark but good enough for fourth place.

Bryley was first in the 200 meters. She ran a little faster April 4 than her official posted time of 27.42 mark. "She seems to be getting stronger," Schmidt said.

Lolli Menchaca placed second in the 1600 meters with a time of

6:27.77. The 1600 meter relay team of Alexander, Weatherton, Ashcraft, and Clarissa Smith placed first with a time of 4:24.70.

The Lady Bronchos have a good chance in finishing in the top three in the District 2-2A meet Friday and Saturday in Panhandle. "We can pretty much count on a lot of top performances, and what we need is a lot of fourth, fifth and sixth places to pick up the team totals."

"Canadian has so many performers, so much depth. Panhandle is strong, and Memphis is strong in the sprints and the jumping events."

"We need to try to get some fan support there. All the junior high and high school divisions will be taking place at the same time. It will be a good time for people to come out to support Clarendon kids. And I think the weather is going to cooperate."

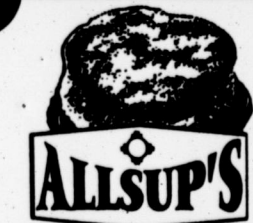

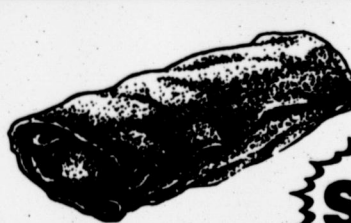

Nutrition & health, reduce fat & cholesterol

A U.S. Department of Agriculture nationwide three-year food survey found that Americans consumed 33 percent of calories from fat in 1994, the first year of the study, continuing a downward trend.

In the late 1970's Americans consumed 40 percent of calories from fat and 34 percent of calories from fat, according to a 1989-1991 survey.

Even with this decrease, however, two-thirds of adult Americans still eat more than the 30 percent recommended limit for fat calories. The survey also found that nearly as many are consuming more than the recommended limit for saturated fat. In 1994, more than half of Americans ate away from home on the day in question, accounting for about one-quarter of their total calorie and fat intakes.

With the findings from this survey and the recommendation of the U. S. Department of Agriculture Dietary Guidelines (1996) "Choose a diet low in fat, saturated fat, and cholesterol" and the latest research-based information from the American Heart Association, there are some simple steps that you can follow to select a diet with less total fat, saturated fat and cholesterol.

The first step is to use food high in fat sparingly. Select recommended servings and lower fat options among the food groups that contain fat — meat, poultry and fish, fats and oils and milk groups. Choose poultry, lean meat and fish; eat moderate portions (about 6 ounces a day or less). When buying meats buy the red leaner cuts with less white (fat). Remove skin from poultry and trim fat from meats. Drink skim milk, 1/2 percent and 1 percent milk rather than 2 percent or whole milk and eat low-fat cottage cheese, farmer cheese or pot cheese, which are lower in saturated fatty acids. Choose low-fat cheeses that have between two and six grams of fat per ounce.

Instead, select more foods from groups with lower fat options such as breads, grains, cereals, pasta, rice, vegetables and fruit. Pasta, rice, dried peas and beans, breads and most rolls are low in saturated fatty acids. However, many other types of commercially baked goods such as doughnuts, muffins, biscuits, butter rolls and croissants are made with large amounts of fat, especially saturated fatty acids.

History Buffs to hold meeting at WTAMU

Climb into West Texas' early days at the West Texas Historical Association (WTHA) meeting Friday, April 19 and Saturday, April 20. History buffs including authors, college faculty, students, and lay people will share their perspectives on pioneer life, Panhandle development, distinguished West Texans, and other historical ideas at the two-day meeting.

"WTHA is one of the oldest historical associations in Texas and this is the first time the group has met north of Lubbock," said Dr. Garry Nall, WTAMU professor of history and a program coordinator. "This is a great opportunity for anyone interested in West Texas history to attend."

Registration begins at 12:30 p.m. on April 19 in the Jack B. Kelley Student Center (JBKSC), Room 11. All general presentations will be in the JBKSC and the Classroom Center on the WTAMU campus.

The first sessions at 1:15 p.m. will include presentations about frontier life and Panhandle development. One 2:45 session will include a presentation about Dr. Kenneth Neighbors, a retired professor of history from Midwestern State University. Several of his former students will be present. Another 2:45 session will include a presentation about adjustments on the frontier. The final afternoon sessions at 4:15 will include presentations about West Texas sports and oral history.

Friday's activities will conclude with a reception and dinner beginning at 6:45 p.m. in the American Quarter Horse Heritage Center and Museum, 2601 I-40 East in Amarillo.

Preston Lewis, manager of the News Bureau at Texas Tech Health Sciences Center, will present "Who's Fibbing About the Demise of Billy the Kid."

Lewis, a graduate of Baylor University and Ohio State University, is the author of 18 historical and western novels. For his essay, "Bluster's Last Stand: The Battle of Yellowhouse Canyon," he won a Spur Award from the Western Writers of America.

Saturday's sessions will begin at 9:00 a.m. The presentations topics include conflicts on the West Texas frontier and challenges and achievements in the Trans-Pecos region.

The final session, "The Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum On Its 75th Anniversary," will be from 10:30 a.m.-noon in the Panhandle Historical Museum (PPHM).

The concluding luncheon will begin at 12:15 p.m. in the PPHM, Hazelwood Room, Dr. Lou Rodenberger, president of the association from McMurry University, will

acids. Fruits and vegetables, frozen or canned — contain no cholesterol and are almost always very low in saturated fatty acids. Avoid frozen fruits or vegetables with added sugar or fat-containing sauces.

Choose different foods every day for meals and snacks; pick sparingly from the fats, sweets and alcohol group — especially foods high in saturated fatty acids, cholesterol, triglycerides, sugars and alcohol. Next, remember that foods with larger amounts of fat contain about twice as many calories as equal amounts of protein and carbohydrate-containing foods. Eat 30 percent or less of your total calories from fat with less than 10 percent from saturated fat. For a 2,000 calorie diet, 65 grams of fat is the Daily Value used on the Nutrition Facts Label. So, read your labels and start eating light and buying right.

Choose a diet low in saturated fat. Reducing saturated fat will help lower your blood cholesterol level. Saturated fat is found mostly in fats from meat group, milk and milk products and tropical oils. Many bakery items may contain hidden fats — crackers and snack crackers, quick breads, biscuits, cheese, doughnuts, pancakes, cookies and muffins. Many foods have hidden sources of fats, so carefully read the label information when available, to check the types and amounts of fat in food. On the Nutrition Facts Label, 20 grams of saturated fat which would be 9 percent is the Daily Value for a 2,000 calorie diet.

The last step is to look for foods which are rich sources of cholesterol — foods of animal origin, such as meat, poultry, seafood, eggs and dairy products. It is not found in plant foods, such as fruits, vegetables and nuts. In fact, many foods high in saturated fatty acids are also higher in cholesterol. Selecting less of these foods will lower blood cholesterol as well. Although the vegetable fats contain no cholesterol, they still contain saturated fatty acids which still contribute to increased blood cholesterol levels. So look to your food labels to help you detect cholesterol contents. The Nutrition Facts Label lists the Daily Value for cholesterol as 300 milligrams. Eating more grain products, vegetables and fruits and limiting the high cholesterol foods can help you with this dietary choice.

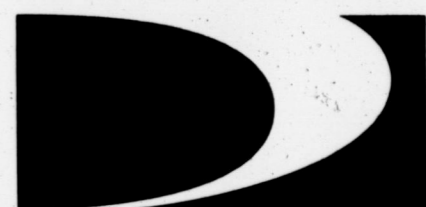

2. That the Presiding Judges shall appoint not less than two qualified election clerks to serve and assist in conduction said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge actually serves as expected, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of such clerks.

3. That early voting shall be conducted by personal appearance and by mail at the City Hall, 119 S. Sully, Clarendon, Texas 79226 through April 30, 1996; the hours designated for early voting by personal appearance shall be from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Monday through Friday, and on such other days as may be ordered by the early voting clerk with such notice to be posted by the early voting clerk as required by the Election Code. The early voting clerk shall keep said early voting place open during such hours for early voting by personal appearance. The early voting clerk for said election shall be Janice Barbee and deputy voting clerk shall be Holly Eads.

4. That an early ballot board is hereby created to process early voting results, and Bunny Owens is hereby appointed the presiding judge of said board. The presiding judge shall appoint at least two other members of the board.

5. That all resident, qualified electors of said City shall be entitled to vote at said election.

6. 7. That at said election the following PROPOSITION shall be submitted in accordance with law.

PROPOSITION

Shall the City Council of said City be authorized to issue the bonds of said City, in one or more series or issues, in the aggregate principal amount of \$200,000, with the bonds of each such series or issue, respectively, to mature serially within not to exceed 40 years from their date, and to be sold at such prices and bear interest at such rates as shall be determined within the discretion of the City Council, for the purpose of improving and extending the City's combined waterworks and sewer System, and shall said City Council be authorized to levy and cause to be assessed and collected annual ad valorem taxes in an amount sufficient to pay the annual interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund to pay said bonds at maturity?

8. That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid PROPOSITION, with the ballots to contain such provisions, markings and language as required by law, and with such PROPOSITION to be expressed substantially as follows:

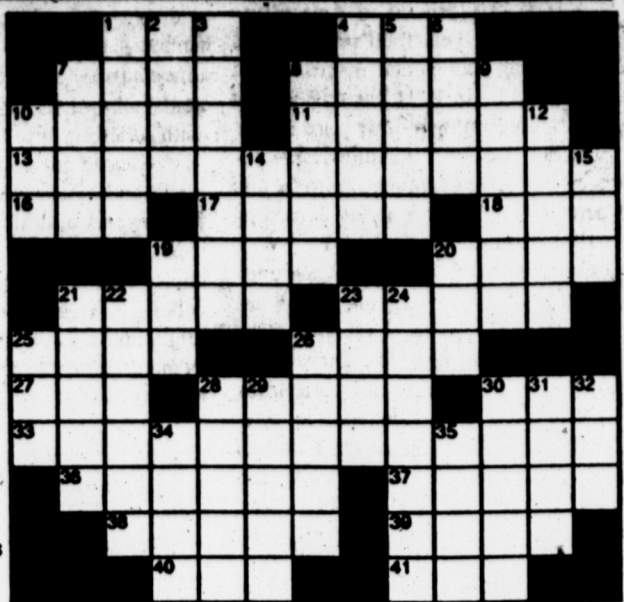

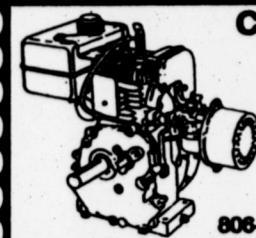
