

Thunder Junction is Coming!

Park Draws Closer To Reality As Concrete Is Poured and Funds Raised

Make no mistake about it. Thunder Junction is coming!

That was the message Thunder Junction officials delivered to a crowd of some 90 people who turned out for a project update Monday night in Clarendon College's Bairfield Building.

According to project construction supervisor Tim Sullivan, over 80 yards of concrete have been poured for the footings of the water slides. If the weather is cooperative, the support columns will be going up within two weeks.

Sullivan, who has moved to Clarendon from Kansas City, Missouri, announced that two antique amusement park rides have been secured for Thunder Junction. A 45-foot Ferris wheel with oak seats and a 32-foot carousel with wooden horses will be included in the park. Both of these fixtures date from the 1930s and will be completely restored to their original condition.

In addition to Sullivan, Clarendon has another new resident. Tom Gillespie has been hired as marketing director for Thunder Junction.

Gillespie is from Greenville, South Carolina, and Nashville, Tennessee. His latest accomplishment is the recruitment of 1,000 vendors for an attraction in Little Rock, Arkansas. It will be his job to find the vendors to fill the park's Western Heritage Town. He hopes to have 100 stores in place by the time the park opens next spring.

Stan McClendon reported that

negotiations are under way for entertainment facilities at the park. Among the possibilities at this point are: a Bob Wills Museum, a Johnny Gimble Theatre, and a Texas Country Artist Museum.

Thunder Junction financial advisor Ralph Hatfield announced that \$72,000 now sits in escrow thanks to the first stock offering held earlier this summer.

At the time Hatfield made that announcement, only nine slots were still open for investors to fill in the first stock offering. Before the night ended, one individual turned in a \$3,000 check to bring the remaining spots to eight.

Hatfield said that if the escrow money is added to the funds that have been loaned and funds that are secured, then the total money dedicated to Thunder Junction approaches \$1 million.

Westwood Enterprises, the managing arm of the park, has also entered into high-level negotiations with Coca-Cola and Pepsi to determine which will be the official soft drink of Thunder Junction.

Hatfield says that although Westwood likes both soft drink companies, "it will boil down to awarding the business to the company that can do the most for the park."

At Monday's meeting, a representative from Pepsi was in the audience.

Hatfield also noted that current and former personnel of the Six

Flags entertainment organization have been contacted in hopes of recruiting them to help develop Thunder Junction.

"It's like a big rock," Hatfield said. "It's hard to get it rolling. But once you do, you can't stop it."

"It is no longer a question of if or when Thunder Junction will be built. It's now a matter of how fast."

The park that some said would never be built is now becoming a reality.

Its success will depend on the support given it by the people of Donley County. If we as a community rally behind Thunder Junction, it will be unstoppable.

All around us, we can see the remnants of communities that refused to grow. Even today, we watch our young people leave town to seek opportunities elsewhere.

With Thunder Junction, economic potential will abound for Clarendon.

With Thunder Junction, our youth will have a place to seek employment.

With Thunder Junction, Clarendon can secure its future for the next generation and beyond and in so doing raise the standard of living for all our citizens.

Make no mistake about it. Thunder Junction is coming.

Its success hinges on the support (both moral and monetary) of each individual member of our community.

Archuleta Trained To Teach 'Texas Friendliness' for C of C

At a train-the-trainers seminar sponsored by the Texas A&M Extension Service, Chamber of Commerce Executive Secretary Pat Archuleta learned methods to teach Clarendon and Donley County business owners and employees the best ways to make strangers welcome. She earned the official button designating her a "Texas Hospitality Team Instructor."

"A very important part of the training is helping everyone realize how important it is to practice hospitality," Archuleta reports. "When guests visit a community they expect to be treated well and have their needs met."

Good manners make economic sense as tourists enjoy themselves and tell others about the helpfulness they experienced. Word of mouth is the most effective promotion of any product, including vacation destination.

Tourism is the third largest industry in Texas, but the fastest growing. The location of Clarendon and the opportunities Thunder Junction, the Historical Society, Clarendon College, and other efforts have initiated makes "Texas Friendly Spoken Here" even more timely.

"It's amazing to discover how much tourism impacts every single business in our community," Archuleta said. Even when out-of-towners attend as sad an event as a family funeral, they are affected by the people they meet. Although no one plans to attend a funeral because it is in a particular town, if they had to attend one anyway they

may realize the area has something to offer in happier times as well.

In the day and half training, Archuleta worked through a variety of scenarios designed to emphasize the importance of using good hospitality habits. Giving accurate directions to sights and landmarks, timely and friendly service, making a good first impression, and a good last impression are some of the specific moments the training keyed in to.

The "cycle of service" includes having a strategy for "hospitality habits" that can be learned by everyone in business, owners, managers, and employees. These are the front line people who come in contact with city visitors.

Training is different for managers than for employees. The formal sessions for either group requires about two and one-half hours, using a prepared manual and videotapes, group participation, and follow up.

The Clarendon-Donley County Chamber of Commerce will offer the training in coming months with Archuleta as teacher. Training completers will also receive a button showing they are a "Texas Hospitality Team Member."

Insurance Requirements For Farmers Must Be Met

Donley County CFSA office wants to remind farmers and landlords that crop insurance requirements must be met to maintain eligibility for the 1996 farm program.

Whether you are a tenant or a landlord sharing in the crop, the sales closing date and the insurance cancellation date for 1996 wheat is September 30, 1995. This is also the final date to change to another insurance company, change from catastrophic to buy up, or change from buy up to catastrophic insurance.

Catastrophic insurance policies sold through the Donley County CFSA office last year are continuous contracts and you will automatically be covered for 1996 unless a written notice of cancellation is filed in the CFSA office by September 30, 1995. The administrative fee of \$50 will be required by your certification date for the applicable crop.

If you have questions regarding wheat insurance for 1996, please contact the Donley County CFSA office as soon as possible.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district must own land in the subdivision he or she represents, be 18 years of age or older and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. The candidate must also live in a county all

Environmental Bulletin:

What is Composting?

Composting is a simple biological process that breaks down leaves, grass clippings, wood chips, brush and food scraps into a dark, odorless, nutrient-rich organic product. It is nature's way of recycling organic matter and returning it to the earth for reuse. Bacteria, living organisms which contribute to the natural recycling process of the organic wastes, play an important role in composting.

Why Compost? Composting preserves landfill space. Approximately 18 percent of the annual national municipal solid waste generated in the US each year is made up of yard wastes. An even greater percentage occurs in the peak months of yard waste production (summer and fall months). When these wastes are taken to landfills, they contribute to problems of methane gas, acidic leachate and settling difficulties at the disposal facilities. Diverting these wastes from landfills reduces waste collection and disposal costs.

Using compost returns organic matter to the soil. Compost is an excellent soil conditioner for even the smallest yard and garden. The organic materials in the compost improve plant growth by loosening heavy clay soils and allowing better root penetration, by improving the moisture retention and nutrients in sandy soils and by helping to regulate the pH of the soil. As a result, the need for chemical fertilizers may be greatly reduced or eliminated.

Packing Safe School Lunches

With school back in session, parents are again packing lunches for their children. Most kids like sandwiches, but you have to be careful what you pack. Lunch meats hold up well in a lunch box, and add cheese for a dose of calcium. Parents should pack the lettuce and tomato separately, and include those little packets of mustard and mayonnaise instead of putting it on the bread. This will be more convenient for the parent, and will keep the bread from getting soggy. By all means add chips as children need a certain amount of fat. Children also need fruits and vegetables, so send them whole or cut with ranch dressing for dipping. Don't pack anything that will spoil unless you have a way to keep it cold. To help keep sandwiches and yogurt cold, you can freeze juice boxes and include them in the lunch box. Or you may want to invest in one of the new insulated lunch boxes.

Keeping the lunch box clean is just as important, so wash it daily and once a week give it a really good cleaning with water and baking soda.

Meeting was adjourned and publicity for the November seminar was agreed upon.

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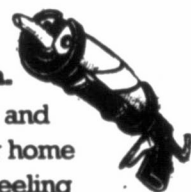

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the SWCD's programs.

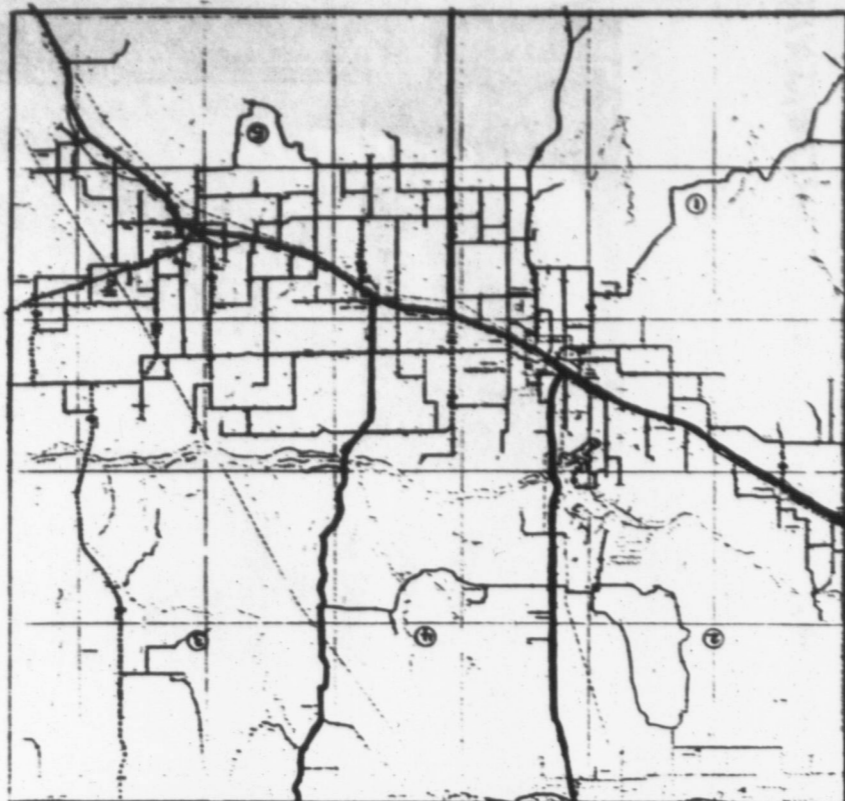
Women's Health Fair And Planned Parenthood Open House Scheduled

Texas Cattle Dealer Charged

Firm Allegedly Without Bond Coverage

WASHINGTON -- Lawson Alford Cattle Company, Amarillo, Texas, has been charged by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture (USDA) with operating without bond coverage.

Calvin W. Watkins, deputy administrator with USDA's Grain Inspection, Packers and Stockyards Administration, said that

under the Packers and Stockyards (P&S) Act, those involved in they buying of livestock are required to file a bond as a measure of protection for livestock sellers.

Watkins said Lawson Alford Cattle Co. has a right to a hearing on the federal administrative charge filed under authority of the P&S Act. If the charge is proven, Lawson Alford Cattle Co. will be placed under a cease and desist order, similar to a permanent injunction. The company could also be suspended and ordered to pay a civil penalty.

Time to Renew Certification

AUSTIN -- Private pesticide applicators who were certified before Jan. 10, 1989, have until Dec. 31 of this year to renew their certification or apply for a private license. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires that certification be renewed every five years for private pesticide applicators, such as farmers who use restricted or state-limited use pesticides on their crops.

Two options for renewal are available. Applicators may obtain 15 continuing education units including two credits in laws and regulations and one credit in integrated pest management by Dec. 31, and repeat this process every five years.

Or applicators who cannot meet the Dec. 31 deadline have the option of applying for a license. To become a private licensed applicator you must take the Texas Agricultural Extension Service's private applicator training course; pass the Texas Dept. of Agriculture's private applicator test; and apply for a private applicator license which includes a \$50 fee.

Continuing education units may be obtained by completing TDA accredited courses or by applying for credit through appropriate college credit courses or training held by out-of-state sponsors including universities, national associations or the federal government.

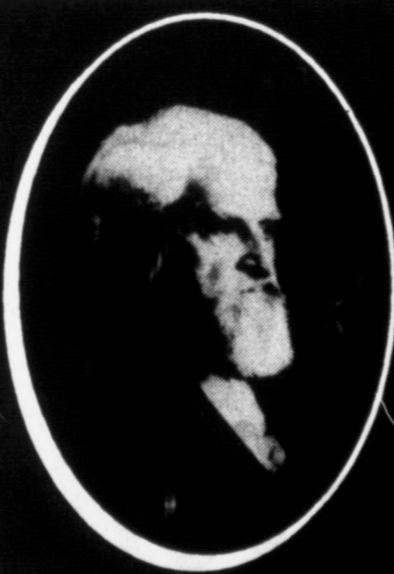

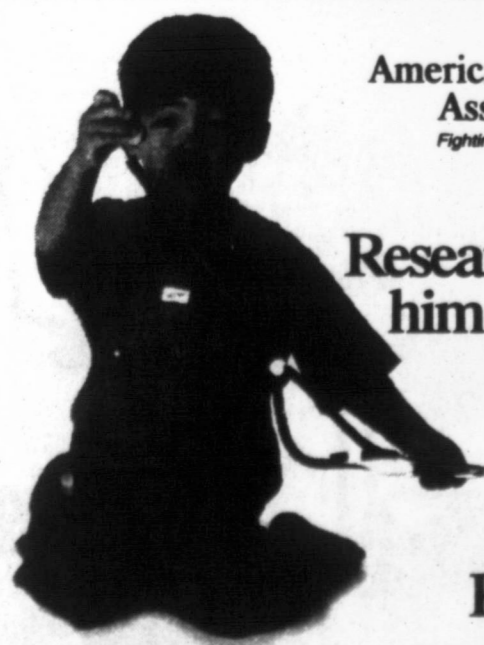

Broncos Stumble Against Lynx

The Spearman Defense stalled the Clarendon offense to a standstill Friday night before a Spearman homecoming crowd as the Lynx got the best of the previously undefeated Broncos, 22-8. The Broncos dropped to 2-1 for the season as Spearman improved its unblemished record to 3-0. Clarendon heads to 1A White Deer (0-3) Friday at 7:30 p.m. - a half-hour earlier start than most non-district games. The Broncos' lone win last season came against White Deer, 40-20, but Clarendon Head Coach Kent Allison said the Bucks are better than they were last year despite their winless record. "They've lost two ball games that they could have won, and they easily could be 2-1 right now," Allison said. "The have a great throwing game, a good quarterback, some running backs, and a couple good receivers."

Bronco Junior Varsity to Host Wellington

Still looking for their first win, the Clarendon High Junior Varsity Broncos will play host to Wellington Thursday night. The Broncos will take an 0-3 record into the contest, but some things are looking up for Coach Kent Allison's team. For instance, the Broncos tallied their first touchdown of the season last week at Panhandle when Keith Kidd barreled into the end zone and scooped up a fumbled punt with 30 seconds left in the half. Kidd's defensive gem got the Broncos with 14-6 at halftime on a frigid night. Sophomore tailback Oren Shields continues to lead the team on offense, having rushed for 125 yards on 42 carries. Shields had a 58-yard touchdown run called back against Panhandle because of a holding penalty. Blake Bass ranks second on the team in rushing with 49 yards on nine attempts. In passing, freshman quarterback Scotty Elliot remains the lone Bronco signal-caller with a completion this season. He is two of five for 14 yards and no interceptions. Defensively, tackle Ronnie Tabor leads the way with 11 solo tackles, five assists, two fumble recoveries, and a pass knock down. Jeremy Shelley has recorded 10 tackles, and Scotty Elliot has 10 tackles and an interception. Kidd and Clifford Alexander also have recorded interceptions.

Bronco players must go back to fundamentals of blocking, tackling, and making holes for Clarendon's stable of running backs, Allison said if they are going to win against White Deer. "We just made a lot of mental mistakes," he said reflecting on the season's first loss to Spearman. "We were in a big ball game, and I don't know if that had anything to do with it or not."

The defensive struggle between the two 2A teams began early on and finally with 1:33 left in the first quarter, Spearman's Coyt Tigrett connected on a 10-yard pass to Martin Sanders. The kick failed and the Lynx lead 6-0. In the second quarter, 6'3" 315-pound tackle Chris Brown's 43-yard fumble return at the 7:03 mark brought the Clarendon sideline and stands to life. "That's the fastest I've ever seen anyone that size run," Allison said.

"That all (Brown) wanted all year, and he was wasting no time. It was fun. It was exciting." Phillip Hearn converted the extra point and Clarendon led 8-6.

Brown provided the spark, but the Lynx kick-off team snuffed out any celebration. Jake Howard returned the ensuing kick-off for 75 yards and a TD, and Mike Whitten tacked on the two extra points giving the Lynx a 14-8 halftime lead. The Bronco defense provided a back-breaking goal-line stand in the third quarter, and Allison thought that would be the turning point for Clarendon. But with 3:55 in the third quarter Whitten scampered 30 yards, and Brent Collins ran the ball in for the final score of 22-8. Whitten rushed for 95 yards on 10 carries, while Collins collected 87 yards on 21 carries. "We thought we could start it again in the third quarter after that goal-line stand," Allison said. "We were just 14-8 at that point." "But if Spearman was going to beat us they would have to stop the running game and that's what they did. We didn't think they could stop it for four quarters. Lorenzo (Moore) couldn't find the holes, and there were no holes to be found. You've got to give Spearman a lot of credit." The Clarendon offense sputtered, rushing for 51 yards on 35 carries and passing for 26 yards for a total offense of 77 yards. In contrast, the Lynx total offense netted 279 yards. Penalties hurt the Broncos as they were called eight times for 70 yards, and Spearman was whistled five times for 45 yards. The Broncos collected six first downs, and Spearman earned 17. "The (Spearman) coach said that was the best game they played all year," Allison said. "We just

had a lot of breakdowns that we shouldn't have and can't have happen." Bronco players took the loss hard, Allison said, but on a positive note he said the loss may be a good wake-up call. "We're going to have to play good football every night. If we can correct all those mistakes and play like we did against Quannah and Claude, we'll beat (Spearman) next time (in the play-offs), which is very possible."

Colts Beat PJHS

The Clarendon Colts 7th and 8th grade teams posted victories Thursday against two rugged Panhandle junior high squads improving the Colts' season record to 1-1. In the seventh grade game, quarter back Colt Floyd romped in from the 1-yard line on a quarterback sneak midway through the third quarter knotting the score at 6-6. With a minute remaining, left guard Randy Sanchez recovered a Panhandle fumble on the Colts' 1-yard line and scampered in for the TD putting the junior high squad ahead for good, 12-6. Colt players turned the game around in the second half when they became more aggressive on offense and defense, according to the Colt coaching staff. Aggressiveness also was the key in the eighth grade game, Colt coaches say. The eighth graders trailed 16-6 at halftime - their only score in the first half coming on a break-away run by tailback Cael Shields. Shields opened the third quarter with a 70-yard plus kick-off return for 6 more points putting the Colts within striking distance. Brandon Word scored the two-point conversion. Quarterback Carey Thornberry handed off to Shields again a little while later, and shields hit paydirt for another TD. Word tacked on the two points. Later Word ramblled for 30 yards on the fourth touchdown, capping off the victory, 28-16.

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Trent Mooring is also having a big year on defense with nine tackles, five assists and a fumble recovery. The Junior Varsity game will probably start around 7:30 p.m., following the 7th and 8th grad games. Against Panhandle, Coach Bryon Bass' Colt teams were both victorious, raising their records to 1-1 on the season.

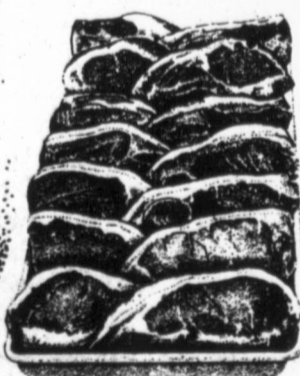
