## Bible Translator to Speak Here

Dale Randolph, President of the World Bible Translation Center in Ft. Worth will speak at the Christian Church in Clarendon at 10:45 on Sunday, September 10. He will report on the work that the Translation Center has completed, and on projects in progress.

The World Bible Translation Center exists to translate the Scriptures into modern, vernacular languages. It has recently completed new translations in Russian and Ukrainian. This is of special interest to the Clarendon congregation. Local Christians have recently forwarded some of the new WBTC Russian Bibles to their missionaries in St. Petersburg.

The World Bible Translation Center is working in 19 different languages around the world. They have completed a Hindi Bible for India and in the last three years have published five different New Testaments in India.

WBTC is presently pring its new Chinese New Testament inside Mainland China, as its translation team works on the translation of the Chinese Old Testament.

Translating the New and Old Testaments into modern speech is badly needed in many areas. In Russia, for example, the traditional translation is so old that it is almost unintelligible to contemporary Russians, somewhat like Chaucer's English compared to modern speech.

Everyone is invited to come hear Randolph share the excitement of giving God's word to those who have previously not had their own translation.

## Disaster Loans Available

Lubbock - Businesses in Armstrong, Bronco, Carson, Collingsworth, Donley, Gray, Hall, and Wheeler Counties have until September 26, 1995 to file applications for low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). The SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loans are available for businesses dependent on farmers and ranchers sustaining crop losses from drought which occurred January 1 through October 28, 1994. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for these SBA loans. However, nurseries that are victims of drought disasters can apply. Applications and further information can be obtained by calling the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired.

These loans are intended to assist businesses in offsetting working capital losses which they suffered as a result of the drought reducing the crop income of the area farmers and ranchers. Small businesses claiming to have been physically injured by the weather are not eligible.

New Program Announced

Soon some of your favorite grocery stores, restaurants, schools, and other organizations will be displaying a new symbol of their commitment to the environment. As part of a new voluntary waste reduction program of the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, these businesses and organizations are posting window or door decals proclaiming them "Clean Texas Star" members.

Recognizing that the commercial sector generates half the solid waste going to Texas landfills, the TNRCC launched the Clean Texas Star program for businesses as part of its Clean Texas 2000 pollution prevention program.

"This program will have the greatest impact in diverting waste from landfills in the history of our state," said TNRCC Commissioner Ralph Marquez, who announced the Clean Texas Star program on August 25 at a news conference at Sea Word of Texas in San Antonio. "And this represents a great opportunity for every school, every business, every college, university, trade school, and nonprofit organization. In short, we are going after every recyclable in the state."

To join the Clean Texas Star program, businesses and other potential members commit to: reduce the amount of waste generated each year by 25, 50, or 75 percent; buy more products with recycled content, which will help create demand for recycled content products; and agree to sponsor at least one environmental outreach program in their communities.

Clean Texas Star member benefits include TNRCC technical assistance and recognition, including the window decals.

The TNRCC will monitor the progress of each member. In return, members will receive extensive technical assistance and recognition for being part of the Clean Texas Star program.

"This formula is very simple, but we know from past experiences how well it works," said TNRCC Executive Director Dan Pearson, who also was on hand for the announcement. "Recycling can work in Texas only if it is done on a cooperative, voluntary basis."

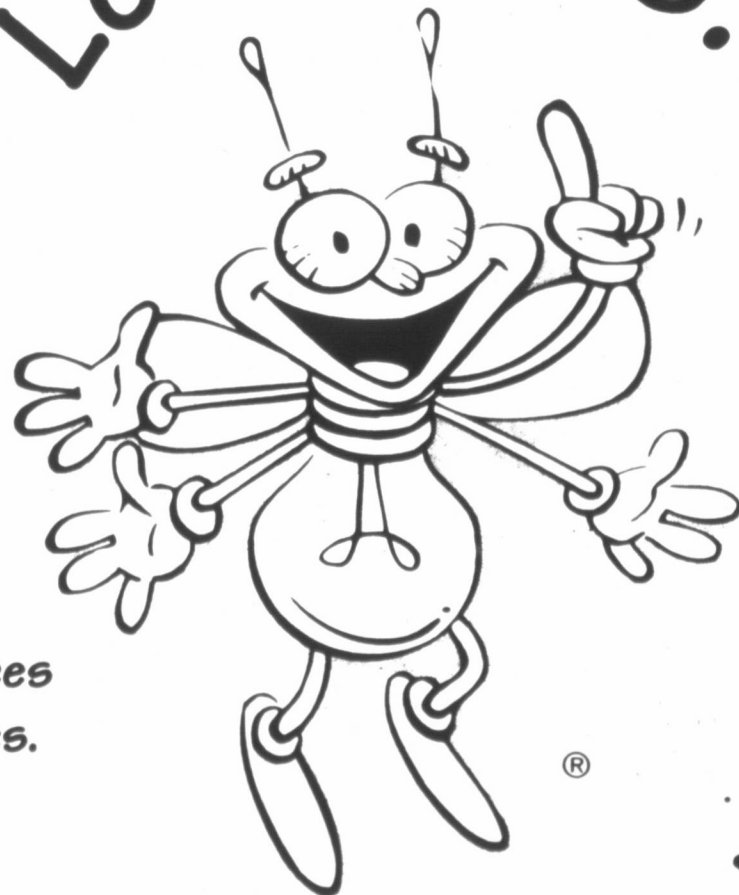

**Britt Ranch Receives Award**

The Britt Ranch, in Wheeler, won the Texas CattleWomen Environmental Stewardship Award for 1995. The award recognizes cattlemen and women whose natural resource stewardship practices contribute to the environment and enhance productivity and profitability. Begun in 1913 by S.P. Britt, the ranch was run by his son, T.M. Britt, and is currently run by his grandson, David Britt. Presently, the Britt Ranch is leased to Cameron and Cameron in Goodnight, Texas, a company that runs a cow/calf operation with limits on numbers set by the Britt family.

The Britt Ranch's stewardship practices demonstrate its owners' conservation commitment to the land. Cross fencing allows pastures to rest more frequently, which increases grass coverage. The Britt Ranch has been recognized for its conservation efforts by the National Audubon Society and the Nature Conservancy.

The ranch's windmills supply water in pastures where surface water is not found. Also, a dozen dams are built on the ranch that catch rainwater runoff and prevent erosion of low-lying areas. Bluestem grass is combined by commercial seed companies for its high-quality seed. Wildlife on the Britt Ranch is abundant with white-tailed deer, quail, dove, turkey, prairie chickens, and various freshwater fish and songbirds. Hunting and fishing rights have never been leased.

The Britts are an example of how Texas ranchers can continue to produce quality cattle and grass while practicing effective conservation efforts to protect the natural environment and wildlife with whom they share the land.

TEPSA was created to improve children's futures by bettering education at the elementary level. It is the only organization in Texas with elementary school principals and supervisors as the core of its membership.

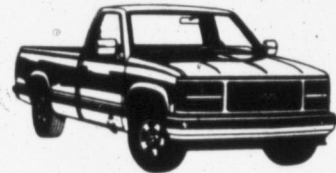
### Attendance Policy Changes

"When students are at school part of the day when missing for medical appointments, the school will be able to count the student present for state average daily attendance purposes," Barefield explained. "By having the student and parent cooperation on this, our school district should gain revenue from the state since it is based on student attendance." Students must bring a note from the health care provider and must make up any school work missed while absent in order to be counted present in each class missed. Barefield emphasized the need for parent and student cooperation in order to take advantage of this policy.

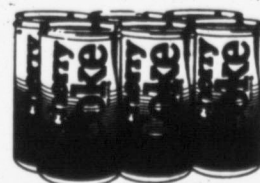

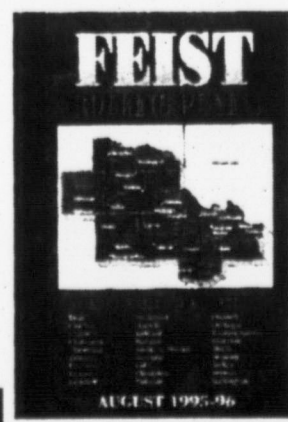

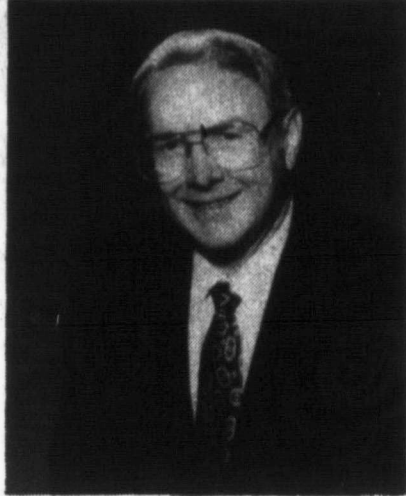


# Dr. Dobson Answers Your Questions

**Q.** My little girl is sometimes sugar-sweet, and other times she is unbearably irritating. How can I get her out of a bad mood when she has not really done anything to deserve discipline?

**A.** I would suggest that you take her in your arms and talk to her in this manner: "I don't know whether you've noticed it or not, but you have two 'personalities.' A personality is a way of acting and talking and behaving. One of your personalities is sweet and loving. No one could possibly be more lovable and happy when this personality is in control. It likes to work and look for ways to make the rest of the family happy."

"And all you have to do is press a little red button, 'ding,' and out comes the other personality. It is cranky and noisy and silly. It



wants to fight with your brother and disobey your mom. It gets up grouchy in the morning and complains throughout the day."

"Now, I know that you can press the button for the neat personality or you can call up the mean one. Sometimes it takes some

punishment to make you press the right button. If you keep on pressing the wrong one, like you have been today, then I'm going to make you uncomfortable, one way or the other. I'm tired of that cranky character, and I want to see the grumpy one. Can we make a deal?"

When discipline becomes a game, as in a conversation such as this, then you've achieved your purpose without conflict and animosity.

**Q.** How can I teach my teen the value of money?

**A.** One good technique is to give him enough cash to meet a particular need, and then let him manage it. You can begin by offering a weekly food allowance to be spent in school. If he squanders the total on a weekend date, then it

becomes his responsibility to either work for his lunches or go hungry.

This is the cold reality he will face in later life, and it will not harm him to experience the lesson while still an adolescent.

I should indicate that this principle has been known to backfire. A friend of mine has four daughters, and he provides each one with an annual clothing allowance when they turn 12. It then becomes the girls' responsibility to budget their money for the garments they will need throughout the year.

The last child to turn 12, however, was not quite mature enough to handle the assignment. She celebrated her 12th birthday by buying an expensive coat, which cut deeply into her available capital. The following spring, she exhausted her funds and wore shredded stockings, holey panties and frayed dresses for the last three months before her birthday. It was difficult for her parents not to intervene, but they had the courage to let her learn this valuable lesson

about money management.

Perhaps your son has never learned the value of money because it comes too easily. Anything in abundant supply becomes rather valueless. I would suggest that you restrict the pipeline and maximize the responsibility required in all expenditures.

**Q.** Do you believe that genuine love between a husband and wife is permanent, lasting a lifetime?

**A.** It can be, and indeed, should be. However, even genuine love is a fragile flower. It must be maintained and protected if it is to survive. Love can perish when a husband works seven days a week... when there is no time for romantic activity... when he and his wife forget how to talk to each other.

The keen edge on a loving relationship may be dulled through the routine pressures of living. Where does your marriage rank on your hierarchy of values? Does it get the leftovers and scraps from your busy schedule, or is it some-

thing of great worth to be preserved and supported? It can die if left unattended.

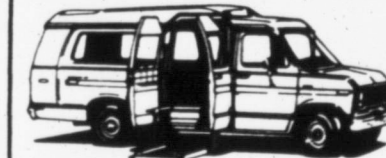

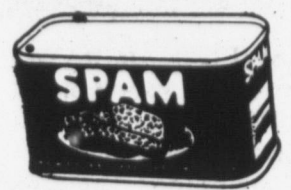

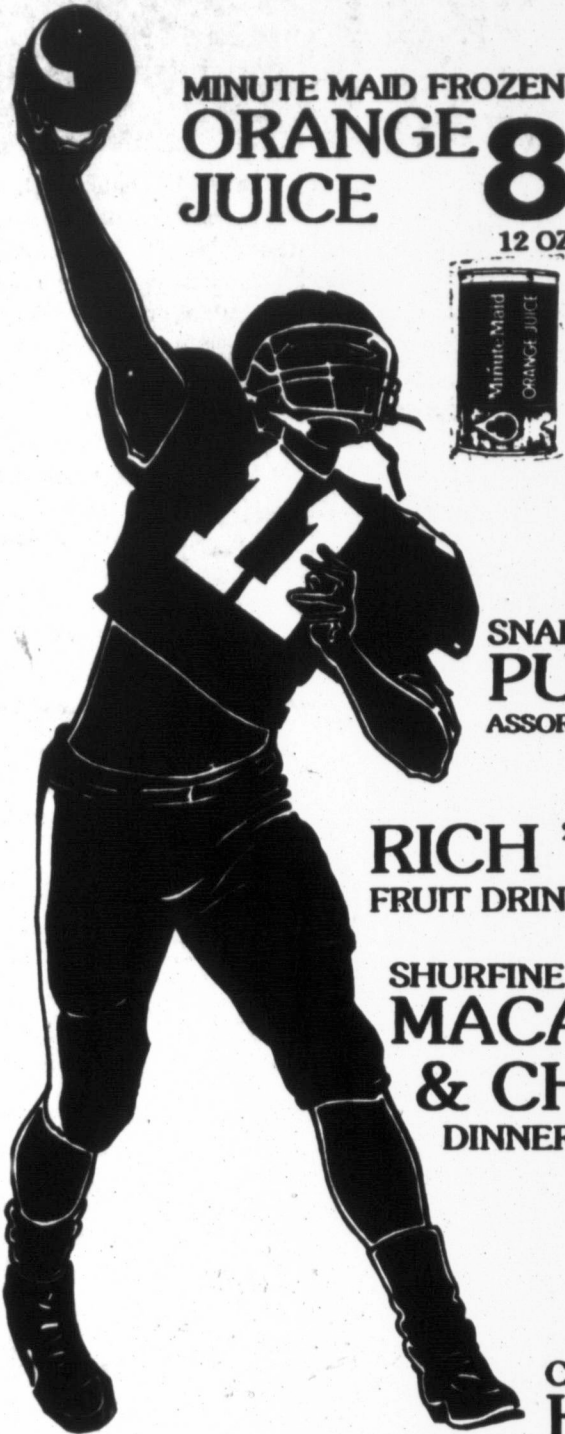
