

Here are some of the ideas that may take the guesswork, and the hazards, out of the weather, and The weatherman of the future will bring rain clouds to drought

areas, when nature abandons the farmer. Man-made rain will but nog out forest fires and replenish water supplies.

Dangerous clouds will be choked off, putting an end to such terrors as tornadoes and hurricans. Controlled rainfall will prevent floods and soil erosion. And chemical mists will be used to dispel fog over air-






