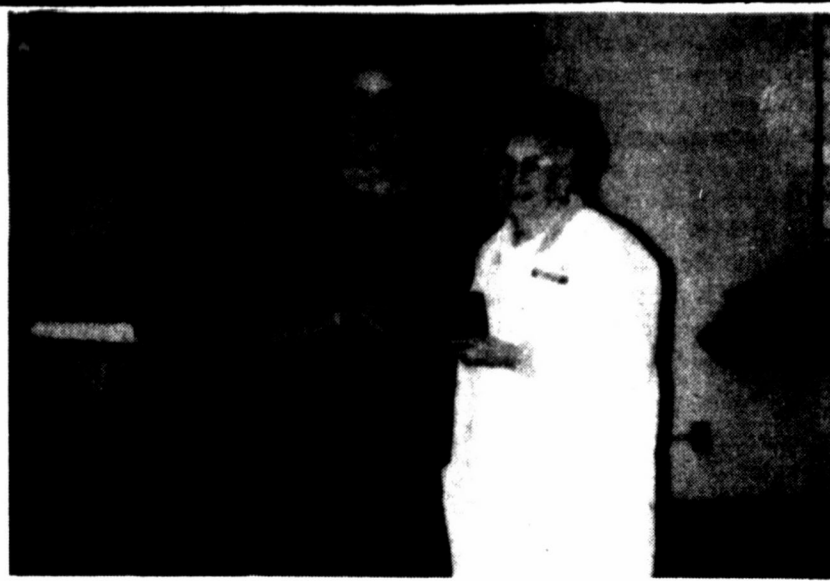
Retirement Party Held

Clarendon Bronco Danny McCampbell was named Best Player in class 2A and teammate Corey Fields was selected as a member of the state's elite "Dream Team" in the premiere edition of Lone Star Basketball.

McC Campbell, a 6-5, 185 pound senior, was featured on a two-page spread in the magazine's 224 page publication. He was cited for his dunking abilities, rebounding skills and block shots.

He is averaging 17 points, 15 rebounds, three blocks and three steals per game.

Fields, a 6-0, 190 pound senior guard, was named to the magazine's 1995 2A "Dream Team" comprised of the top nine players in the state. The magazine's editors recognized his outstanding game statistic and then added their own editorial note: "Numbers say a lot. Now add 4.6 in the 40. Eat my dust, watch me score"

Farm Program Targeting Disadvantaged

"Rural Economic and Community Development Service (RECDs), formerly Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), is reaching out to members of socially disadvantaged groups to aid them in obtaining their goals of farm ownership," stated George Ellis, Acting State Director of RECDs.

The socially disadvantaged outreach is mandated by the Agriculture Act of 1987 and defines a Socially Disadvantaged Applicant (SDA) as "an applicant who has been subjected to racial or ethnic prejudice or cultural bias because of his/her identity as a member of a group without regard to his/her individual qualities."

Applicants must be a member of the following race/ethnic origin group: black (not of Hispanic origin), Hispanic, American Indian or Alaskan Native, Asian/Pacific Islander, or women.

Under this program, RECDs will try to find persons in the SDA categories who are interested in farming. RECDs will be prepared to sell or lease to those applicants who qualify for a farm held in inventory if any are available in the county of the applicant's choice. RECDs can also provide other loan and technical assistance, if needed, to help the borrower get started.

Health Tips

Treating A Fever

The normal body temperature is considered to be 98.8 degrees Fahrenheit (37 degrees Centigrade). When it exceeds 100F (37.8 C) orally or 100.8 F (38.2 C) rectal, it is considered to be a

"fever". This elevation can be caused by many illnesses, but when there is an infection attacking the body, the higher temperatures do have a role in fighting the invading bacteria. Bacteria thrive best at the normal body temperature, and they are slowed down by higher levels. The higher temperature, or more pronounced the fever is, the more vulnerable the bacteria become. That makes it easier for the body's own defenses, such as the protecting white blood cells, which literally

eat up the bacteria, to reduce the spread of the infection and eradicate the foreign bacteria. Unless the fever becomes uncomfortable high, (generally 101.4 oral) or provokes a convulsion, it can be allowed to run its course. Fevers are generally higher in the afternoon or early evening and are higher and more frequent in children than adults. As you get older, the body reaction to infection is lessened and the level of the temperatures are also reduced. There are a few things you can do to make a fever more tolerable. Drink plenty of liquids when a fever is present. Bathing in a tub of warm water is helpful, and it is unnecessary to subject yourself to the uncomfortable experience of a cold or luke warm sponge bath. When considering children or teenagers with infections, particularly those caused by viruses (such as chicken-pox or flu) acetaminophen (Tylenol) is the drug of choice in reducing fever, especially since we

Return of the Natives.

Landscape architects nationwide have started urging people to use native plant materials. Several of us in Clarendon are also persuaded that it is a good idea to use native (or well adapted) plants. Normally natives thrive in local weather, soil and moisture conditions. They tolerate our native critters, including insects. And they look natural and "at home". By contrast, those plants that look so beautiful in pictures of English gardens are often difficult to keep alive in the wind, heat, drought and gypsum of Donley County. Of course, many plants will adapt to this area, but if the backbone of your plantings is native, there is more time to baby the imports.

Finding native flora is a bit of a problem, sometimes. One of the best sources is the Donley County Soil and Water Conservation District. They'll help you secure a variety of evergreen and deciduous trees and quite a few shrubs. Some of these plants are as attractive as any exotic, and many of them feed wildlife as a bonus. Weldon Sears is a very knowledgeable expert, a friendly resource who is enjoyable to visit. The Conservation District is currently ordering trees and shrubs in five-gallon pots, gallon pots, and seedling sizes.

David Lowrie's Felicity Greenhouse is just getting started. Some of the trees that he will sell later are now just acorns. But David is knowledgeable and enjoys visiting about his plants. Ask him for advice.

Perhaps no one else in the area knows more about the native prairie environment than Jack Moreman. Jack likes Maximilian sunflowers, a very under-utilized native plant. He stocks several wildflowers and can get others. And don't overlook grasses. The various grasses dominate the region, yet far too many of us ignore them when it is time to garden.

Randy White at White's Feed and Seed is willing to help, too. Drop by and visit with him. If you want a few specimens of a given tree (or a windbreak full of them), and the SCS Office doesn't have what you are looking for, try Gurney's Seed & Nursery Company, 110 Capital Street, Yankton, SD 57079, (605) 665-1930, FAX (605) 665-9718.

If you cannot get the wildflower seeds you want locally, there are several good sources. Turner Seed Company sells a variety of native and adapted grass seed, but they also have about the best price on wildflowers, mostly in quantities of one pound or more. Turner also carries a Spring wildflower mix, a Fall wildflower mix, a Xeric (desert) wildflower mix and several selections for wildlife. Turner Seeds has an unillustrated price list that you can order. The address is: Turner Seeds, 211 CR 151, Breckenridge, TX, 76424-9078, FAX (817) 559-5014.

If you want smaller quantities, you might like to write to: Wildseed Farms, 1101 Campa Rosa Road, P.O. Box 308, Eagle Lake, TX 77434, phone (409) 234-7353. Their catalog has a description of various plants and color pictures.

Another good source is: Plants of the Southwest, Agua Fria, Route 6, Box 11A, Santa Fe, NM 87505, FAX (505) 438-8800. These folks have a beautiful color catalog that is a good source of information.

This is the last article in this year's series on beautifying Clarendon with plants. Now lets go outside and dig some dirt! The whole town will look better as the plants grow.

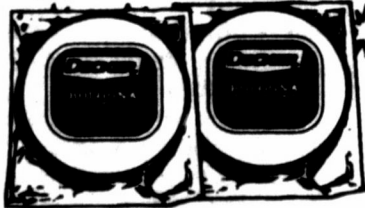

now know about the ability of aspirin to cause Reye's syndrome, a serious, often fatal disorder, for those under eighteen years of age. And it does work, but you must give the proper dosage. Did you give it

every four hours as indicated? Did you clearly read the label and give the dose recommended for your child's age, or did you underdose as is the case with so many parents? If you followed the instructions exactly, call your family practitioner for suggestions. Dose is dependent on weight not on age. If your child is heavier than the normal two year old, his dosage should be increased. Acetaminophen reduces fever, if we use it correctly. Find out the proper dosage from your family practitioner if you are unsure. Dress in light, loose fitting sleepwear, and allow the evaporation of perspiration to help make you more comfortable. Usually when intense sweating develops, the in-

fection is just about conquered, and you are on the road to rapid recovery.

James Alfred McMurtry

James Alfred McMurtry, 79, died of cancer Sunday, January 29, 1995 at Baylor Medical Center of Dallas.

Born December 22, 1915 in Clarendon, Texas, he is survived by his beloved wife of 53 years, Kathryn Westmoreland McMurtry; daughter and son-in-law Connie and Richard Anspacher of Dallas; daughter and son-in-law Mellie and Gary Bergman of Boerne; daughter Chris Craig of Dallas; twelve grandchildren; one great grandchild; and many other loving relatives and long-time friends.

Mr. McMurtry graduated from Kansas State University in 1937 where he received dual degrees in business and agriculture. During his college years he was a member of the Kansas State doubles tennis team and was elected president of Sigma Phi Epsilon, his fraternity.

Mr. McMurtry lived most of his life in Clarendon, Texas, where he was a prominent rancher, successful businessman, and active community leader. He was a charter member and director of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association, a member of the Texas and Southwest Cattle Raisers Association, and member and president of the Panhandle Livestock Association. He was a director of American National Bank in McLean, Texas, and an active member of the Clarendon school board for nine years, serving five of those years as president. He was a Jester and was also a member of the Khiva Shrine Temple in Amarillo, Texas. After his retirement from ranching in 1969, he moved to Dallas and Rockport, Texas, where he was a co-founder and director of Live Oak State Bank.

A dedicated Christian man, he served as a deacon and elder of First Presbyterian Church in Clarendon. He was a member and elder of First Presbyterian Church in Rockport, and was a chapter member of Park Cities Presbyterian Church in Dallas.

In Dallas the family will receive friends at Sparkman/Hillcrest Funeral Home on Tuesday, January 31 from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. A memorial service will be held at Park Cities Presbyterian Church at 10:00 a.m. on Wednesday, February 1.

In Clarendon, the family will receive friends at Robertson Funeral Directors on Wednesday, February 1 from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. The funeral will be held at First Presbyterian Church at 2:00 p.m. Thursday, February 2, with graveside services following.
