# **Local Property Taxes Due Now**

Approximately 69% of the current year's local taxes were paid by the end of December. Taxes not paid on or before January 31 will incur penalty and interest of 7% if paid in February. The amount increases each month thereafter until the tax is paid. This notice is a reminder to those who have not paid their 1994 taxes. In an effort to cut office costs, second notices will not be mailed to individual taxpayers during January. Delinquent notices will be mailed in February to those who still owe 1994 taxes at that time. Accounts not paid by July 1 will incur and additional 15% collection penalty.

# Gifted and Talented Program **Taking Nominations**

The Gifted and Talented Program of Clarendon ISD will begin taking nominations soon. The program has recently gone through an evaluation and has been restructured in order to accommodate those exhibiting types of giftedness that were previously not identified. Nominations are accepted from parents, community members, teachers, individual students themselves and their peers.

If you are interested in nominating a students in grades K-12 for the program, you will need to go by the principal's office to complete the forms.

Students are selected for the gifted program based on the scores in five (5) areas. These are 1) parent checklist, 2) teacher checklist, 3) student portfolio, 4) ability testing (this includes tests from language arts, reading, math, critical thinking and science) and 5) creativity test.

The student must score at the district line on five (5) of the eight (8) tests in these areas to qualify. Students who test this year for the program

and do not qualify must wait two years before re-evaluation. Nominations will be accepted from January 19 to February 10, 1995.

Under the new program, students cannot simply take a zero for their homework. A student that does not turn in his or her homework will have to go to a tutorial after school and complete the missed work. Parents will be notified by their student.

Students who do not attend the tutorials will be placed on Inschool Suspension.

The new program is to prevent students from getting be-


In the past, students who took zeros instead of doing their homework often gradually fell farther and farther behind until there was no hope of their ever catching up. By not doing their homework, students fail to learn each lesson

thoroughly, and thus did not have the foundation for the next lesson.

The new program should help the school to retain students who would otherwise drop out in the future, and it should help many students graduate who otherwise would not do so.

\*Bob's Scribbles

Hobart, Oklahoma, is an impressively attractive little town. The little farming community has neatly painted houses. The lawns are covered with grass all the way to the curb. Many of the residences have attractive shrubs and flowers. There's no trash scattered around in the gutters or seedy vacant lots.

Most of us have seen clean, tidy towns. With a little reflection, we can remember places that impressed us with their pride and maintenance.

January is not an attractive month in our region. In the Southwest's winter everything seems to be gray or tan, except for the bottles and windblown paper which stand out and scream "trash". Yet January is a good time look at our real property and our community and start planning ahead.

Many hundreds of people drive through Clarendon each day. What do they see? Perhaps each of us should cruise Highway 287 and try to look at the community as though we were passing through on a trip from Dallas to Colorado.

Many January days are pleasant times to start picking up the beer cans and clearing off the dead weeds.

But January is an especially good time to plan. "Wouldn't an evergreen look good over in that corner?" "If we put a flower bed across here next Spring, it would brighten up the entire neighborhood!"

If we concentrate on shrubs and perennials in 1995 and 1996, the dividends will come back to us for several years. Liatris and Coneflower (*Echinacea*) are natives that will come back year after year. So is Yarrow (*Achillea*), a drought and heat resistant plant that comes in many colors.

Granny's hollyhocks were beautiful. They still are, and there are new, improved varieties introduced almost every year. Even plain old mint offers a pretty touch of green. And don't forget ornamental grasses like Elijah Blue Fescue and Red Baron Japanese Blood Grass. Iris are so easy to grow that they thrive at abandoned farmsteads in Donley County, often still spreading twenty or thirty years after the last human moved out. Daylilies are nearly as tough and even more spectacular.

Then there are the natives. Indian Blanket (Gallardia) is beautiful. Jack Moreman [L&M Seeds] has seed for Bluebonnets that really thrive here. Oenothera "Evening Primrose" grows along side the highways, but is so beautiful that virtually every seed rack and catalog stocks it.

There are even places where our old native bear grass (Yucca sp.) is attractive. Sand sage (Artemesia sp.) can be, too, especially when planted with native evergreens like our two or three species of junipers ("cedars").

All this is not that complicated. Randy and Bret White can answer many gardening questions. And they welcome your early orders for plants. County agents traditionally are good resources for information. And don't hesitate to talk to a neighbor whose yard or garden you admire.

Proceeds from cookie sales stay in the Panhandle and are used to help fund troop activities, council programs, camps, training and materials. They also enable girls to earn "Cookie Currency," which can be used to pay for uniforms, camp fees, programs, etc.

The Girl Scout Cookie Sale also helps girls develop sale skills, self-confidence, goal-setting and teamwork.

# **Health Tips**

Acne, whether severe. moderate, or mild can have terrible psychological repercussions. There's nothing quite so awful as having an outbreak before an important interview or social engagement. Also, acne scarring can last a lifetime and is difficult to treat. So do something positive about treating your acne; begin by going to your health care provider.

If your acne is mild (papules or lumps that have not become pustules), with no inflammatory pimples or redness, then you may start treatment with a topical agent usually containing benzoyl peroxide (Oxy5 or Oxy10). If your acne is accompanied by blackheads or whiteheads, your health care provider will probably choose a different ointment containing

retinoic acid. When the acne is moderate with pustules, pimples, and redness, treatment might start with a benzoyl peroxide agent plus a topical antibiotic preparation. In severe acne with pustules, pimples, cysts and constant inflammation, a course of therapy with oral isotretinoin (Accutane) is often indicted, providing there is no possibility of pregnacy during the period of treatment. Of course there are many variations in acne therapy, each individualized to the patient's unique circumstances and

Some general rules of thumb apply to all acne therapy. Early treatment is essential to stop the formation of additional pimple. Acne is a disease of the sebaceous (oil) glands which become clogged. So washing the skin carefully but gently at least twice a day with a mild soap and water is important. But acne is not caused by dirt, so special abrasive cleaners are not necessary and only seem to irritate the problem. More complicated factors, such as bacteria, hormones and heredity contribute to acne. When applying prescribed medication, the entire area should be covered, not merely the pimple. Remember medication is best absorbed on slightly moistened skin. There is no evidence that food can cause acne, but some people feel that certain foods make the condition worse. So if you are aware of such foods, it is prudent to eliminate them from the diet. If you wear make-up, choose a water-base type that is easy to remove with soap and water and won't clog your pores. And be sure not to stop any prescribed medication without your health care provider's permission.






