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Thornberry Wins Election

William "Mac" Thornberry, born and raised in Donley County, unseated incumbent Congressman Bill Sarpalius on November 8th in the 13th Congressional District race by maintaining a substantial 56 to 44 percent lead in the vote tally. Thornberry credited his win to a broad base of support throughout the district and voter discontent with the current Democratic policies.

Thornberry has begun selecting staff members in preparation for his move to Washington and will be ready to assume his position on January 4th. Thornberry supports the GOP's "Contract with America" that calls for votes on ten key issues during the first 100 days Congress is in session. The contract includes proposals for a balanced budget, a \$500.00 per child tax break along with other tax cuts, and limits of three terms for House members and two terms for senators. Mac says, "I am responsible to the people of this district and I will do my very best to prove myself worthy."

Mac is the son of Don and Tookie Thornberry and grandson of Carrol McClellan of Clarendon. His parents will be attending his swearing-in ceremony at the U.S. Capitol on January 4th.

Editorial

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A Thank You, **A Suggestion** and A Fact

Dr. Jerry Stockton, President of Clarendon College, is retiring. Virtually all of the community will want to say "Thank you!" to Dr. Stockton for his very real contribution to the com-

Jerry Stockton became involved in the community almost as soon as he arrived. He served as a board member on the Chamber of Commerce. He helped in the effort to start a theme park. He was sympathetic, supportive or active in almost every community project.

Yet Dr. Stockton's greatest service to the community was strengthening Clarendon College.

When Dr. Stockton arrived, morale at the college was at an alltime low. He began the process of developing a more collegial atmosphere. He started the institution looking to the future.

Dr. Stockton and Royce Bodiford began the first steps toward securing a permanent endowment for the college, to put it on a sound and secure footing for the future. That job is not completed (and perhaps can never be completed), but there has been a very large amount of progress in a relatively short period.

When Stockton arrived, Clarendon College did not even have a student center, which probably made it unique among Texas colleges, but in a negative

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way. While he was president, the school built the Bairfield Student Center. But the college also built two other buildings, one with badly needed classroom space and one to provide additional dorm space.

Every area resident should shake Dr. Stockton's hand and say "Thanks".

Dr. Stockton has reportedly recommended to the board that they immediately begin a search procedure for a new president. That, too, is a superb suggestion.

In December of 1992, the Texas Association of School Boards outlined a search procedure to assist Clarendon Independent School District in finding a new superintendent. Their technique is well proven and quite successful. The college board would do well to adopt a similar ap-

That procedure begins with the hiring of an expert to conduct the advertising and search process. Perhaps the Texas Junior College Teachers Association or the Association of Junior Colleges has a similar service. If not, perhaps Tom Jarboe would conduct the search process of Clarendon Junior College as he did for the public school.

The second step in the process begins when the consultant holds hearings. The consultant will schedule meetings with area residents, with community organizations, with students, and with the board. He will consult with the faculty, the group that has the most "on the spot" experience with the day-to-day operation of the college, and the group with the best educational credentials. After he has listened to everyone's opinion as to what kind of candidate is needed, the consultant will study all the input that he has received. This requires wisdom and experience, but is probably the key ingredient in making the process work.

The consultant then will analyze what characteristics the constituency has outlined. He or will develop a profile that describes the kind of person that is needed for the job.

While the first three steps are proceeding, the consultant will be advertising, soliciting as many applications as possible. The college will receive an abundance of applications to choose from.

The consultant would then do the initial screening, selecting those applications that most closely match the profile of the ideal candidate. He will then submit the top dozen or so applications to the

board, and will be available to advise the board as they select the top four or five candidates. He then will schedule interviews for those candidates. The ultimate selection, of course, is up to the board.

This process works. It can reasonably be expected to produce the best possible candidate for the office. Support for this process would be as universal as anything could ever be.

Clarendon College is very important to Donley County. It is one of the major pillars upon which the local economy rests. Each year the students and faculty of the college bring literally hundreds of thousands of dollars from out-of-county into the community. Without that influx, every merchant would be poorer and taxpayers would have to dig deeper to pay for city and county government. Without the college, many area young people would not be able to pursue their education

beyond High School. Clarendon College is so vital that every resident and every local organization should work at every opportunity to build as dynamic and secure a future for the college as possible.

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



Your small business is not going to bankrupt Sam Walton's legacy, but it can compete, and compete effectively.

The super stores have some advantages that small stores cannot copy. However, many of the ideas and techniques that the big boys have used are available to well-managed small businesses. And in some areas--such as product knowledge and customer service-- smaller stores should have a big advantage.

Taylor and Archer stress the importance of getting an accurate picture of "what's happening". A retailer should know, on a day-today basis, whether he is making money or losing it. What do his customers like about his business? What turns them off? What merchandise do they want? Every retailer should conduct a customer survey periodically to find out.

There are some big things that small retailers can do to improve their business. Perhaps none is more important than becoming customer oriented. That is a fact that everyone knows, yet it is so easy to overlook. "All busi-

common bond: they exist solely to serve and satisfy their customers. Neglecting or losing sight of this one fact has caused the early failure of millions of small businesses. ... In analyzing the assets of businesses, you'll find the only asset with lasting value isn't even listed on the balance sheet. The only asset with lasting value is the

Taylor and Archer stress the importance of advertising. They point out-correctly-that advertising should be the last place that is touched in budget cutting. But they also show that not all promotion costs money. There are many ways to get good publicity without spending barrels of money.

Are your employees creative? Are they motivated to solve problems? Taylor has plenty of suggestions that are time-tested. They work.

Many of the factor that contribute to success are "little things". There are thousands of little things that mount up to big

Every merchant in Clarendon should purchase Taylor and Archer's Up Against Wal-Mart. The retailer who reads the book and thinks about what it says will profit in a big way.

The restructuring of PLEXAR I will, among other things: (1) reduce the maximum line size from 30 to 9; (2) obsolete and grandfather certain optional features; (3) eliminate the requirement to subscribe to Feature Package Two in order to subscribe to certain optional features; (4) reduce the nonrecurring and monthly rates of certain features; and (5) increase the nonrecurring charges for the PLEXAR I System Charge (\$2.10 to \$8.00), Call Transfer Disconnect feature (\$3.00 to \$8.00), and Convenience Dialing I feature (\$6.35 to \$8.00). All current PLEXAR I customers will have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR I service, switching to the new restructured PLEXAR I service, or switching to PLEXAR II service with ten or more lines.

The proposed PLEXAR II restructure will, among other things: (1) change the tariffed offering to serve the market segment of 10-74 stations; (2) create two station pricing structures, one for customers with 10-29 stations, and one for customers with 30-74 stations; (3) reduce the sensitivity for the loop portion of the rate to two price bands: 0-2 miles, and beyond 2 miles; (4) offer a PLEXAR II basic station that can be flexibly configured, from a number of standard features, to meet the individual customer requirements; (5) change the way the termination liability is calculated so the customer is responsible for 65% rather than 56% of the present worth of the remaining monthly payments in the contract; (6) create an option that allows month-to-month customers to convert to long term contracts of at least three years and receive a credit or "contract signing bonus"; and (7) establish a System Subsequent Change Charge which applies per serving central office when changes are made that affect the entire system.

Current PLEXAR II customers will also have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR II service, or switching to the new restructured PLEXAR II service. PLEXAR II customers with at least 75 stations also have the option of switching to PLEXAR Custom service in cer-


The 4-H Gold Star Award is



The Clarendon Chamber of Commerce sent Pat Archuleta to a Grant Writing I workshop held November 8, 9, and 10, at the National Guard Armory in Amarillo. Dr. Don Udell of Oklahoma led the event. the term "defensive driving"; however, it seems few know what it involves. "Much of the art of defensive driving comes from common sense and your own instinct. Training and knowledge of the proper procedure make these senses more effective," Snider explained.

Defensive driving can and should become a way of life for all drivers regardless of age or experience. Don't assume the other driver will make the right decision. Be prepared for anything. Defen-

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sive drivers are in tune with their minds and bodies, as well as the road. They're ready for any situation the road might hand them.

But some drivers are out of tune. They give in to distractions, daydreams, fatigue, anger, stress, frustration or perhaps alcohol. They are not prepared to react when a dangerous situation arises.

Defensive drivers also make fewer mistakes. Drivers on the average make one error for every two miles they travel. While not every mistake leads to an accident, about 85% of all collisions are the result of driver error. "The most common mistake is probably speeding. Most people don't match an appropriate speed with driving conditions,"Snider added.

Once again, State Troopers will be highly visible during the Thanksgiving holiday trying to make the roads as safe as possible. Let's all do our part to make this a safe and happy holiday

prooper L.B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the **Texas Department of Public Safety** said, "Winter driving is more hazardous than most people realize. There are more hours of darkness, often less visibility, and sometimes freezing temperatures with ice, sleet or snow. These are real challenges for drivers and test a

person's ability to drive.' "Safe winter driving, when it's all said and done, is largely the

application of common sense to come basic driving facts," Snider added. "Drivers must be able to see all around their vehicles to drive safely. Make sure all ice and snow is removed from all windows. Don't be a "peep hole" driver. Keep windows from fogging by using the defroster. If necessary, stop and knock ice or snow off wiper blades to keep the windshield clear."

Too much speed on slippery roads is the mistake that breeds the most trouble. Adjust your driving habits to match the weather and road conditions. Trips on icy roads are going to take longer. Face the facts, don't be in a hurry. If the road is covered with ice or snow, start your vehicle moving slowly and gently. When stopping, apply your breaks lightly and much earlier than usual. Make your turns slowly and smoothly.

Most loss of control comes in the form of skids. Skids don't just happen, they are caused by the driver in most cases. To recover from a skid, back off the accelerator, stay of the brakes and steer your vehicle in the direction you want to go.


