

Weatherization Assistance Program Offered

The Texas Department of Community Affairs provides services to make homes warmer in the winter and cooler in the summer through the Weatherization Assistance Program of Panhandle Community Ser-

The Weatherization Assistance Program is not a renovation nor rehabilitation program; therefore the program does not address cosmetic improvements or other work which does not directly affect the energy efficiency of your house.

The condition of every home is different. An assessment will be made of your house to identify the location of cracks, holes, and areas where air escapes. In winter, this means cold air entering the house and warm air escaping. Naturally in summer, this works in reverse, hot air enters and, if you use an air conditioner or evaporative cooler, expensive cool air escapes.

The Weatherization Assistance Program limits the amount of money that can be spent on a house for weatherization improvements. Weatherization costs and the work done on a house will vary based on the condition of the house and the availability of funds.

For one time only, the State of Texas is providing Weatherization services for people who have not qualified under the regular low-income guidelines. This special program is now available for families who have income up to 175% of poverty income guidelines. If your gross yearly income is less than the amount listed on the chart below, you may qualify for this special program.

All applications must be made no later than June 20, 1995.

Local Nurse Honored At **Convention**

Shana Brownlee, R.N.C., Director of Nursing Services, of Golden Plains Care Center in Hereford will be honored today at a statewide health care convention as one of twenty-six Certified Gerontological Nurses working in texas nursing facilities. 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

If you've ever longed for tall pine trees around your home but thought that they wouldn't do well here or were too slow growing then you

The Afghan pine was first introduced to Texas for commercial Christmas Tree production. It gained popularity as a windbreak tree and is now considered the most popular pine species in the southwest. The Afghan pine is unique because it is an arid-land pine. It is adapted to the alkaline, sandy soils of west Texas. It is also extremely drought and heat tolerant. The Afghan pine also happens to be the fastest growing species of pine. 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Ag News

Hay feeding time is approaching and it's important to know the quality of hay for a sound feeding program.

Different kinds of livestock have different nutritional requirements, and that's where hay quality enters the picture. For example, cows with young calves have higher nutritional requirements than dry cows. So it's all the more important to have a knowledge of the quality of hay being fed.

A forage test is the best way to determine the quality of hay and what supplements, if any, will be needed to meet nutritional requirements of livestock consuming that hay. Producers can mail forage samples to the Extension Service's Forage Testing Laboratory at Texas A&M and get results within a week.

Forage test include protein, fiber and mineral analysis, with charges based on the number of specific test requested. A few dollars invested in forage test, can mean savings in several ways. First, it can be the savings in amounts of supplements fed each day and the cost of those supplements. But the greatest savings could be in livestock weights. For example, livestock consuming low quality hay could lose weight and value during the winter months.

Information sheets and guidelines for collecting forage samples and interpreting analyses are available at the County Extension Office. So take a few minutes now to collect a hay sample and get it tested. It could make a big difference in your livestock feeding program this winter. High Plains Health Notes

Colic, a symptom of early infancy, is characterized by paroxysms of crying, apparent abdominal pain, and irritability.

Colic may occur shortly after baby comes home from the hospital, but often begins some weeks later and may persist to age three to four months. The term "colic" suggests intestinal origin but the specific mechanisms of infantile colic is unclear. The colicky infants cats and gains weight well, may seem excessively hungry, and often sucks vigorously on almost anything available but has paroxysms, sudden intensified, crying that turn a peaceful home into chaos and strains family members tempers.

Colic often occurs at a certain time of day or night but a few infants cry almost incessantly. Excess crying causes aerophagia, which causes abdominal distention and gas. Crying as such may be an early manifestation of an insistent, impatient personality.

Treatment for colic includes holding, rocking, or patting gently for infants who cry for short periods. An infant with a strong sucking urge may need more sucking especially if the infant fusses soon after feeding. If bottle feeding takes less than twenty minutes, new nipples with smaller holes should be tried. A pacifier may quiet the infant. A very active, restless infant may respond to be swaddled tightly in a small sheet and placed on his stomach. A change in milk formula may demonstrate a milk intolerance. In exceptional circumstances, a judicial use of a sedative may be helpful.

Parents need to know that the infant is basically healthy, that his behavior will cease in a few weeks and that too much crying is not harmful.

Insomnia is defined as difficul-ty in steeping or disturbed sleep patterns leaving the perception of insufficient sleep. Insomnia is a common symptom that may be due to several emotional and physical disorders.

With advancing age, the total amount of sleep tends to shorten. The changes, although normal, may be distressing and lead to request for treatment. There is no evidence that it leads to changes in overall health. In early morning awakening, the person falls asleep normally was awakens several hours prior to his or her normal waking hour and

restless, unsatisfying sleep. This pattern is usually associated with aging but sometimes may be due to depression.

Initial insomnia is commonly associated with emotional disturbances such as anxiety, a phobic state, or depression. Tendencies to anxiety, self reproach and self punitive thinking are generally more pronounced in the morning.

Reversal of sleep patterns usually are due to jet lag, disease or damage such as encephalitis or a head injury, sedative misuse, or irregular night-shift working

Some normal persons sleep less than others. Insomnia may be primary, for example long-standing without emotional or phsychic event or secondary to acquired pain, anxiety, drug-alcohol withdrawal, or depression. Recent onset of insomnia is usually due to current anxieties. Other than rare primary sleep apnea syndrome, there are almost no direct physical causes of otherwise asymptomatic insomnia.

Treatment of insomnia is generally toward the underlying cause. Therapy may require anything from reassurance, to stress reduction, to pain management, to drug therapy for emotional and depression related insomnia. Persistent unexplained insomnia may be helped by evaluation in a sleep laboratory.

Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (SWBT) has filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) to restructure the current PLEXAR I and II service offerings. This restructure will significantly change PLEXAR I and II services.


The restructuring of PLEXAR I will, among other things: (1) reduce the maximum line size from 30 to 9; (2) obsolete and grandfather certain optional features; (3) eliminate the requirement to subscribe to Feature Package Two in order to subscribe to certain optional features; (4) reduce the nonrecurring and monthly rates of certain features; and (5) increase the nonrecurring charges for the PLEXAR I System Charge (\$2.10 to \$8.00), Call Transfer Disconnect feature (\$3.00 to \$8.00), and Convenience Dialing I feature (\$6.35 to \$8.00). All current PLEXAR I customers will have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR I service, switching to the new restructured PLEXAR I service, or switching to PLEXAR II service with ten or more lines.

The proposed PLEXAR II restructure will, among other things: (1) change the tariffed offering to serve the market segment of 10-74 stations; (2) create two station pricing structures, one for customers with 10-29 stations, and one for customers with 30-74 stations; (3) reduce the sensitivity for the loop portion of the rate to two price bands: 0-2 miles, and beyond 2 miles; (4) offer a PLEXAR II basic station that can be flexibly configured, from a number of standard features, to meet the individual customer requirements; (5) change the way the termination liability is calculated so the customer is responsible for 65% rather than 56% of the present worth of the remaining monthly payments in the contract; (6) create an option that allows month-to-month customers to convert to long term contracts of at least three years and receive a credit or "contract signing bonus"; and (7) establish a System Subsequent Change Charge which applies per serving central office when changes are made that affect the entire system.

Current PLEXAR II customers will also have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR II service, or switching to the new restructured PLEXAR II service. PLEXAR II customers with at least 75 stations also have the option of switching to PLEXAR Custom service in cer-





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
