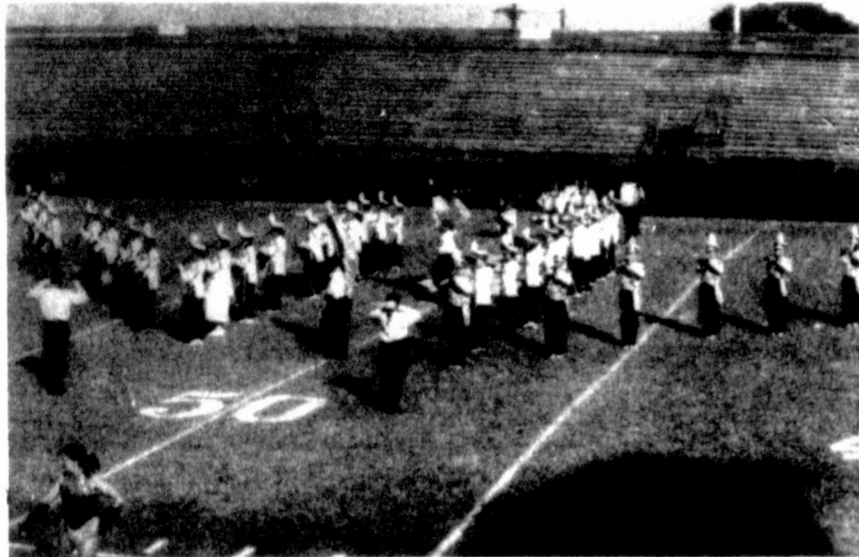

## DPS Offers Safety Tips

It's nearing the end of October, the leaves are falling, temperatures changing and children getting excited about Halloween. Although private parties have taken over for the traditional door to door "trick or treats", still many young children will be taking to our neighborhoods for that all familiar chant.

Trooper L.B. Snider of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "many disasters can be prevented this Halloween if parents and motorists will use good judgement." Trooper Snider stated, "small children should be accompanied by older children or adults and trick or treating should be confined to those areas that the parents are familiar with. Costumes should be light in color, non-flammable and any type of mask used should not prevent the child from being able to see."

Parents should also instruct their children in some traffic safety tips, insuring they look in all directions before crossing streets and to walk, never run. A flashlight carried by the child can serve as a warning to motorists and children should be instructed to use sidewalks, whenever possible.

Motorists should use extra caution in residential areas and be on the lookout for kids darting into the streets between parked vehicles. Remember, they are excited and pre-occupied with trick or treating. Drivers need to be extra alert.

For those who wish to participate in this upcoming Halloween evening and receive a visit from that little ghost or goblin, it is a good idea to remember to leave that front porch light on and to insure there are no obstructions in the walkways.

## Children's Safety On Halloween

Many parents get spooked when pint-sized ghosts and goblins begin their Halloween trick-or-treating expeditions. The evening can pose special hazards for young tricksters and scare the daylight out of parents, says the staff at Scott & White Memorial Hospital and Clinic in Temple, Texas.

Scott & White is one of the largest group multi-specialty practices in the United States with more than 430 physicians and non-physician scientists and 13 regional clinics throughout Central Texas.

"Halloween is a fun holiday for children, but it can be a devilish experience when accidents happen. A little planning will go a long way in preventing holiday hardships," said Patricia Reassign, M.D., Emergency Medicine specialist and assistant professor in the Texas A&M University Health Science Center College of Medicine.

"In the excitement of Halloween, some children forget the rules they have learned about crossing streets. Encourage youngsters to remember the traffic rules. Stress that they must obey the traffic lights—even on Halloween," Dr. Reassign said.

Remind children to look both ways and not to dash into the street from between parked cars. Instruct the children to travel with a group and walk on sidewalks or close to the curb (not in the middle of the street), she added. Let children start their trick-or-treating early so they can stop before dark. Give each child a flashlight.

Halloween safety also includes using seat belts and child safety seats while driving through neighborhoods on trick-or-treating expeditions. Dr. James A. Gilbert Jr., Emergency Medicine specialist and assistant professor in the Texas

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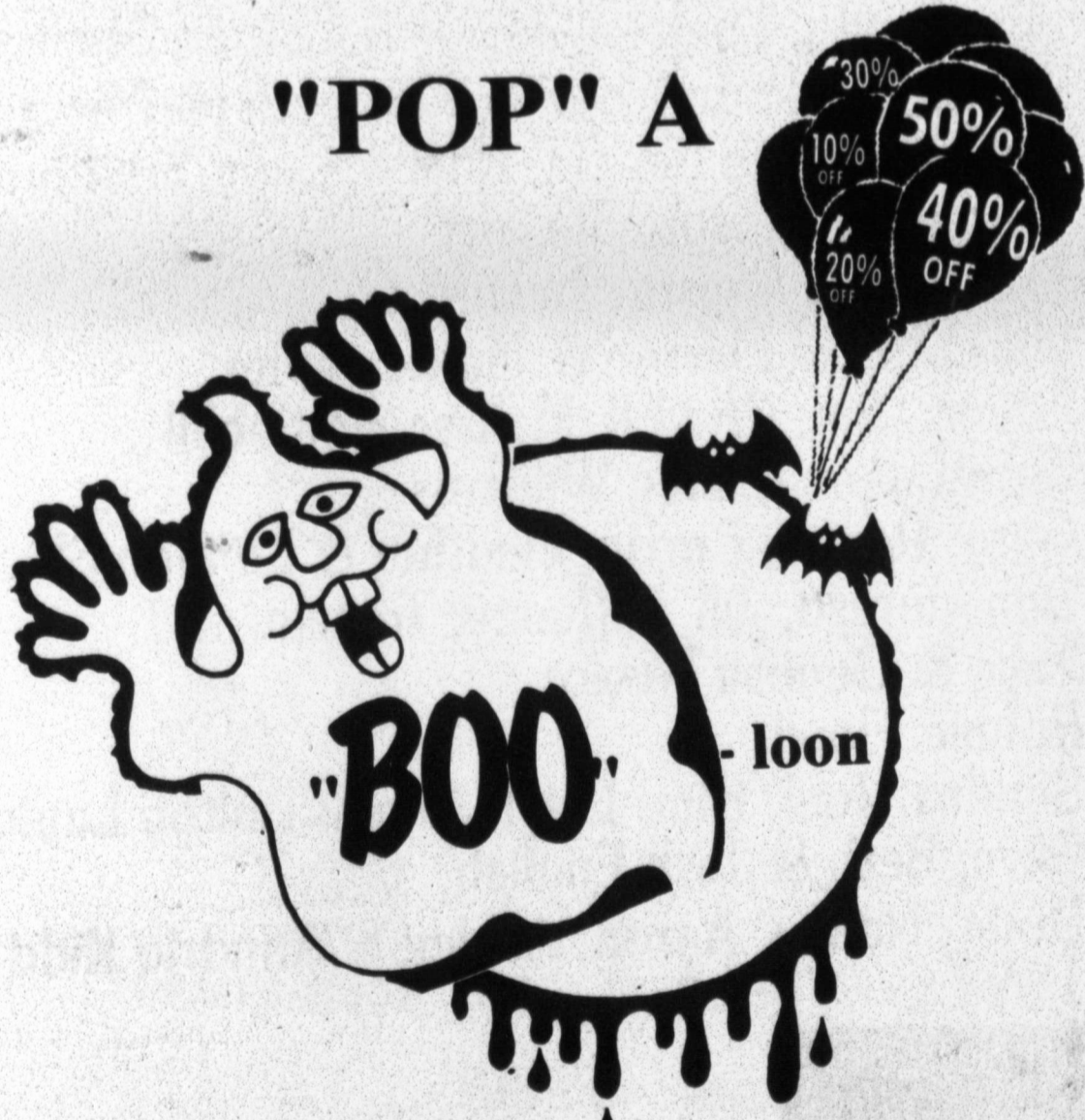

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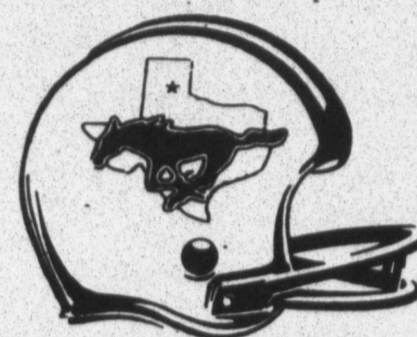
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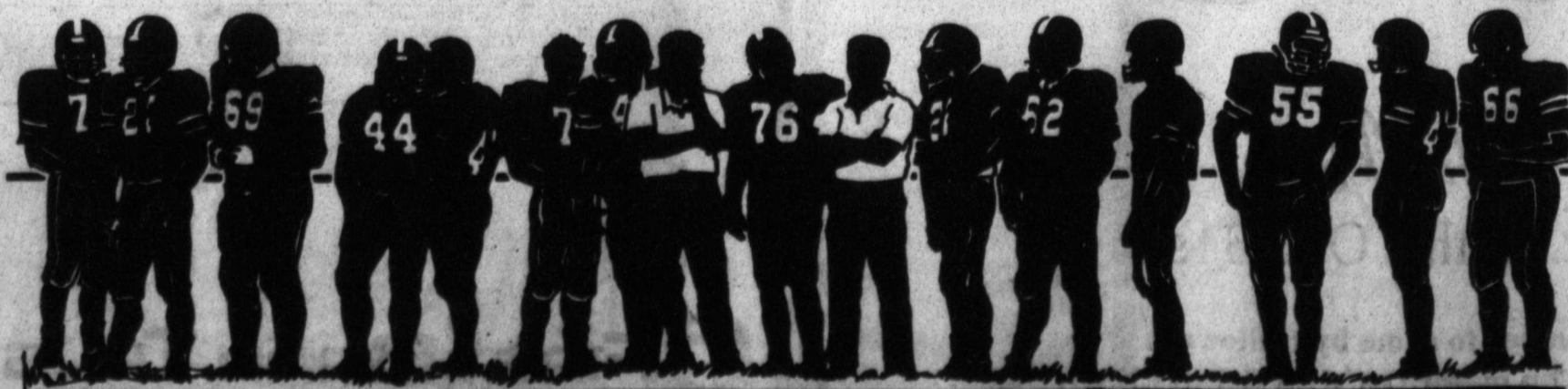

### CHILDREN'S SAFETY-FROM P.1

A&M University Health Science Center College of Medicine, emphasized that in their excitement to go trick-or-treating, children may forget to buckle-up. He also cautioned parents against letting children hang on the back of pick-up trucks and ride on bumpers as they go through different neighborhoods.

Accompany your children on their haunting journeys or enlist the aid of a responsible older sibling who can serve as an escort. Emphasis to youngsters that they should never enter any home. Tell children to avoid houses where lights are turned off.

**Trick-or-Treat Inspection**  
Don't allow children to eat any treats before reaching home. Once home, carefully inspect all treats. Throw away unwrapped or loosely wrapped items. "If your child gets sick after eating Halloween candy, try to find out exactly what he or she ate and where it came from," Dr. Reassign added. Call your doctor immediately or contact your local Poison Control Center.

For parents who want an extra-close inspection of trick-or-treat candy, many local hospitals and clinics offer free X-rays. X-rays can detect metal that could be imbedded in candy. It cannot detect other types of tampering, such as poison or glass, Dr. Gilbert added.

**Proper fiendish attire!**  
Costumes should give children maximum mobility. Dr. Reassign suggests that parents consider these guidelines before the little gremlins get dressed for their night to howl:

Make sure the costume allows for easy movement and doesn't drag on the ground. This could cause the child to trip and fall. The child should wear shoes that fit well and feel comfortable. High heels, clown feet or heavy boots could cause the child to stumble.

Since most trick-or-treating is done at sundown or at night, costumes should allow the child to see and to be seen by motorists.

Elaborate headdresses and rubber masks can block a child's vision. A good substitute for masks and headdresses is face painting. Just make sure the paint is non-toxic and designed for use on the face.

Add plenty of glow-in-the-dark decals or reflective tape so the child can be easily seen at night. Let the child help decorate the costume, shoes, trick-or-treat bag and hat with reflective tape.

Costumes made of non-flammable materials are essential. If you are buying a ready-made costume, read the labels carefully to make sure the fabric is flame retardant.

This year, accessories are the ultimate horror. Pirates brandish swords, Indians carry bows and arrows and astronauts carry lasers. Don't let your little trickster carry sharp objects. Safe and attractive replicas can be made with cardboard and spray paint.

**Friendly Haunts**  
Many parents nowadays are considering alternative to the traditional trick-or-treating treks through the neighborhoods, say Scott & White Child Life Specialists. Several families join forces to have a costume party in the backyard or recreation room with games, pumpkin carving con-

tests, apple bobbing and ghost stories. Renting vintage scary movies, such as the original version of "King Kong" or more upbeat fare such as "Young Frankenstein," can add just the right spirit to the evening.

**Make your house ghost friendly**

Neighbors should also make sure their homes are welcome. If you expect a gaggle of spooks and specters to haunt your neighborhood on Halloween night, make sure your yard is free of hazards, Dr. Reassign suggested.

Remove obstacles in the year, such as hoses, sprinklers, lawn furniture and potted plants. Turn your porch light on to let children know they're welcome.

\* Keep lighted jack-o'-

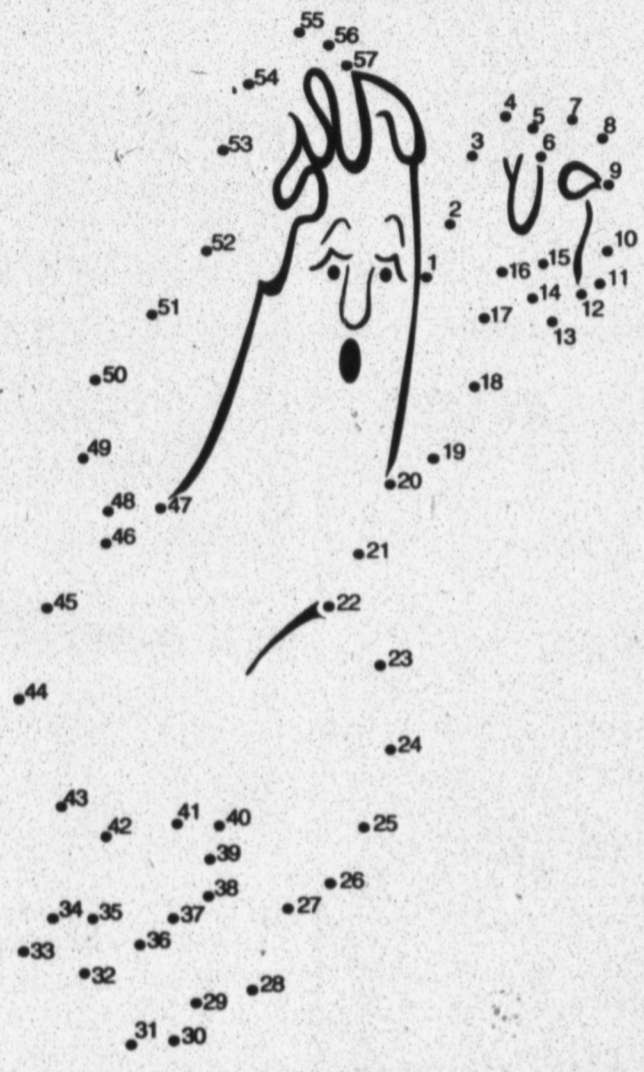
lanterns or candles away from the steps of the front door. A child's costume could possibly brush against the open flame and catch fire.

\* Pets, especially dogs, may become agitated with so many visitors. Keep your pets indoors or out of harm's way for a few hours.

\* Treats don't have to be full of sugar and fat. Consider giving healthy treats such as boxes of raisins, prepackaged granola bars and sugar-free bubble gum. Some families give away pencils and colorful erasers for school and inexpensive toys.

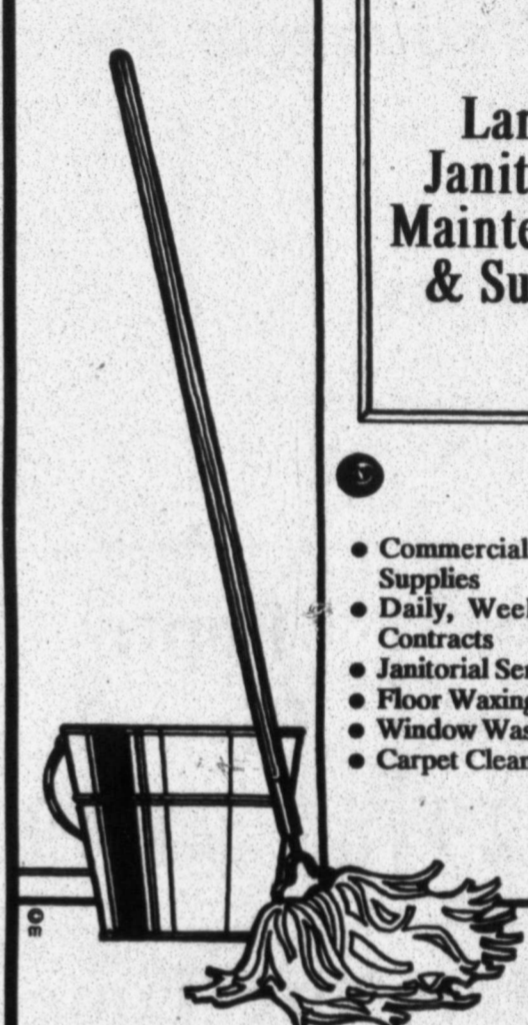
"With a little foresight, Halloween can be a safe and enjoyable holiday for both children and parents, alike," Dr. Reassign said.

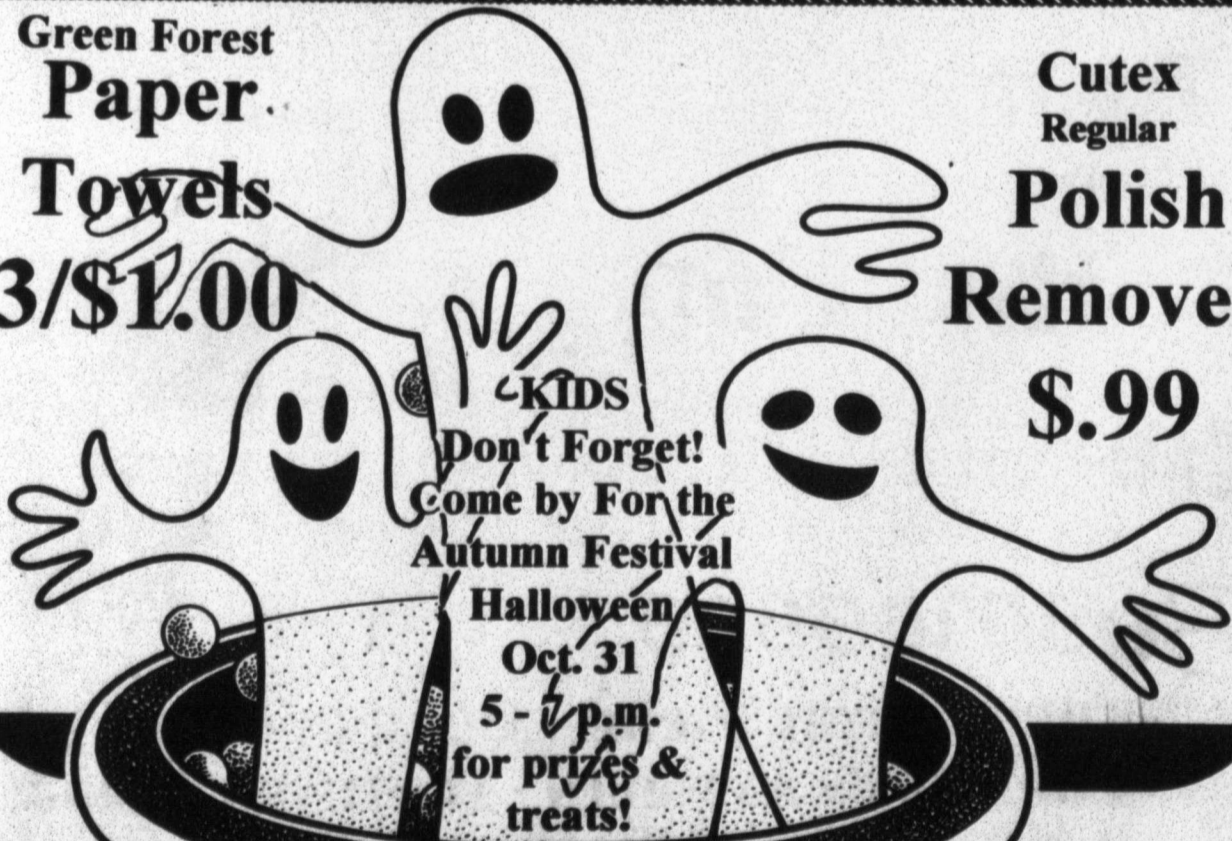

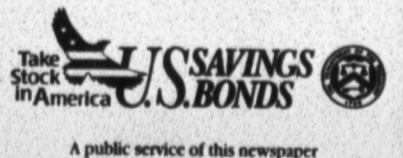

The restructuring of PLEXAR I will, among other things: (1) reduce the maximum line size from 30 to 9; (2) obsolete and grandfather certain optional features; (3) eliminate the requirement to subscribe to Feature Package Two in order to subscribe to certain optional features; (4) reduce the nonrecurring and monthly rates of certain features; and (5) increase the nonrecurring charges for the PLEXAR I System Charge (\$2.10 to \$8.00), Call Transfer Disconnect feature (\$3.00 to \$8.00), and Convenience Dialing I feature (\$6.35 to \$8.00). All current PLEXAR I customers will have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR I service, switching to the new restructured PLEXAR I service, or switching to PLEXAR II service with ten or more lines.

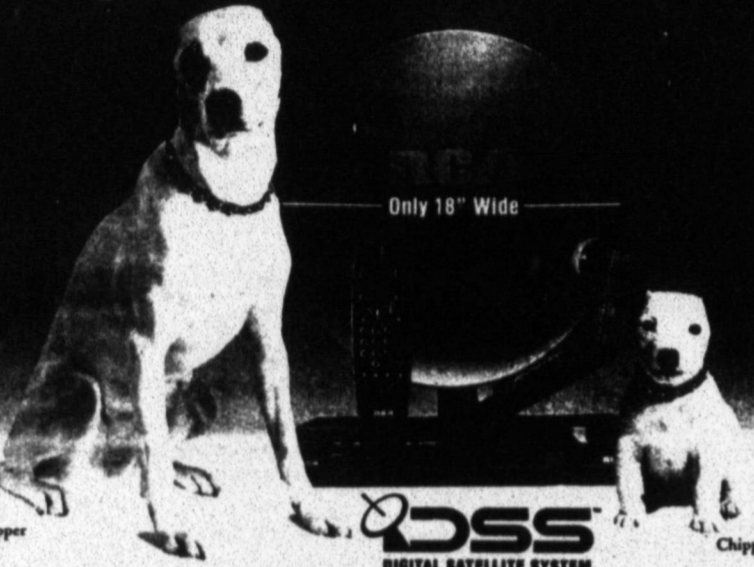
The proposed PLEXAR II restructure will, among other things: (1) change the tariffed offering to serve the market segment of 10-74 stations; (2) create two station pricing structures, one for customers with 10-29 stations, and one for customers with 30-74 stations; (3) reduce the sensitivity for the loop portion of the rate to two price bands: 0-2 miles, and beyond 2 miles; (4) offer a PLEXAR II basic station that can be flexibly configured, from a number of standard features, to meet the individual customer requirements; (5) change the way the termination liability is calculated so the customer is responsible for 65% rather than 56% of the present worth of the remaining monthly payments in the contract; (6) create an option that allows month-to-month customers to convert to long term contracts of at least three years and receive a credit or "contract signing bonus"; and (7) establish a System Subsequent Change Charge which applies per serving central office when changes are made that affect the entire system.

Current PLEXAR II customers will also have the option of keeping their current PLEXAR II service, or switching to the new restructured PLEXAR II service. PLEXAR II customers with at least 75 stations also have the option of switching to PLEXAR Custom service in certain situations.

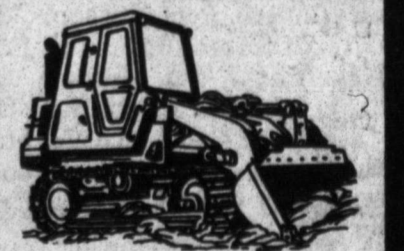
