## Local Graduates

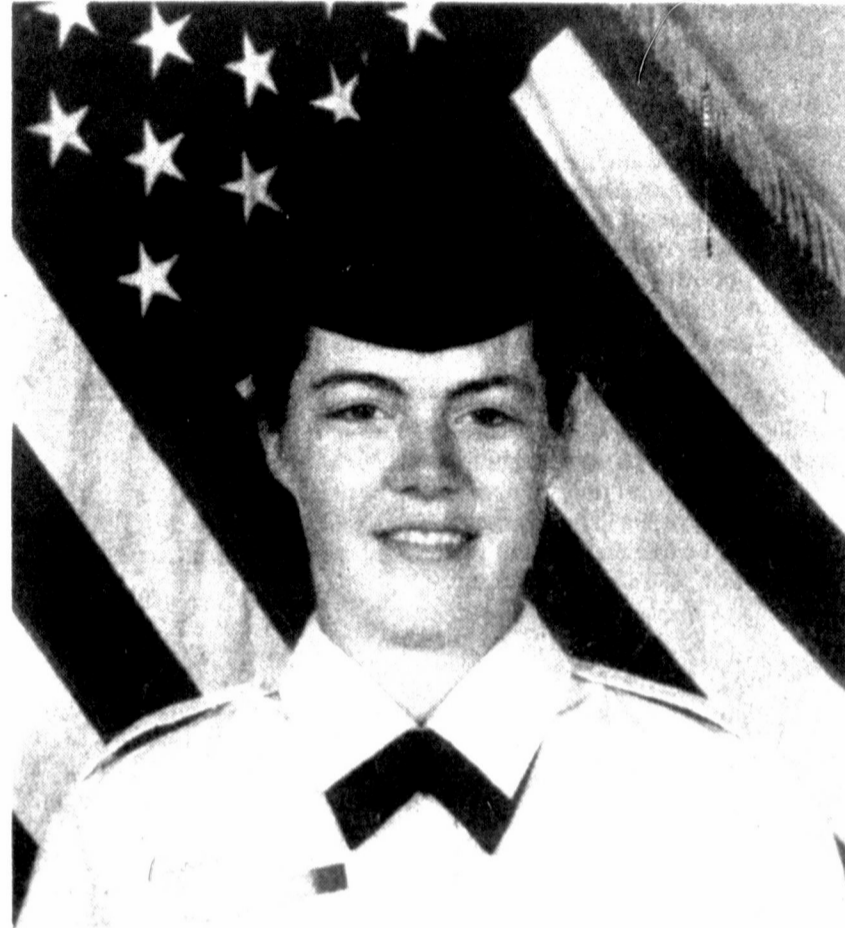
Airman 1st Class Dorcas E. Osburn has graduated from Air Force basic training at Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, Texas.

## Loan Funds Available

The Farmers Home Administration has loan funds to help members of socially disadvantaged groups, including minorities, buy land for farming or operate farms in Armstrong, Donley, and Collingsworth counties, Jacqueline E. Morgan, FmHA County Supervisor, said today.

Under this program enacted by Congress, socially disadvantaged population groups are Hispanics, Native Americans, African Americans, Asians and Pacific Islanders.

FmHA tries to find members of those groups who are interested in farming and can qualify for an FmHA farm ownership loan. The agency can sell or lease to those

## Immunization Clinic Offered

An immunization clinic offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases is scheduled to be held in Clarendon, October 17, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., at the Texas Department of Health Office, located in the Medical Center on Hwy 70 North.

Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lock jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, Rubella, mumps, and HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B).

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

Compared to international standards, however, Dr. Daggett shows how and why American students are falling further behind every year. Finally, he explains why the student performance is reaching crisis proportions when compared to the skills needed in our increasingly technological and information-based society. This program is designed for parents and the general public. It is approximately 60 minutes in length.

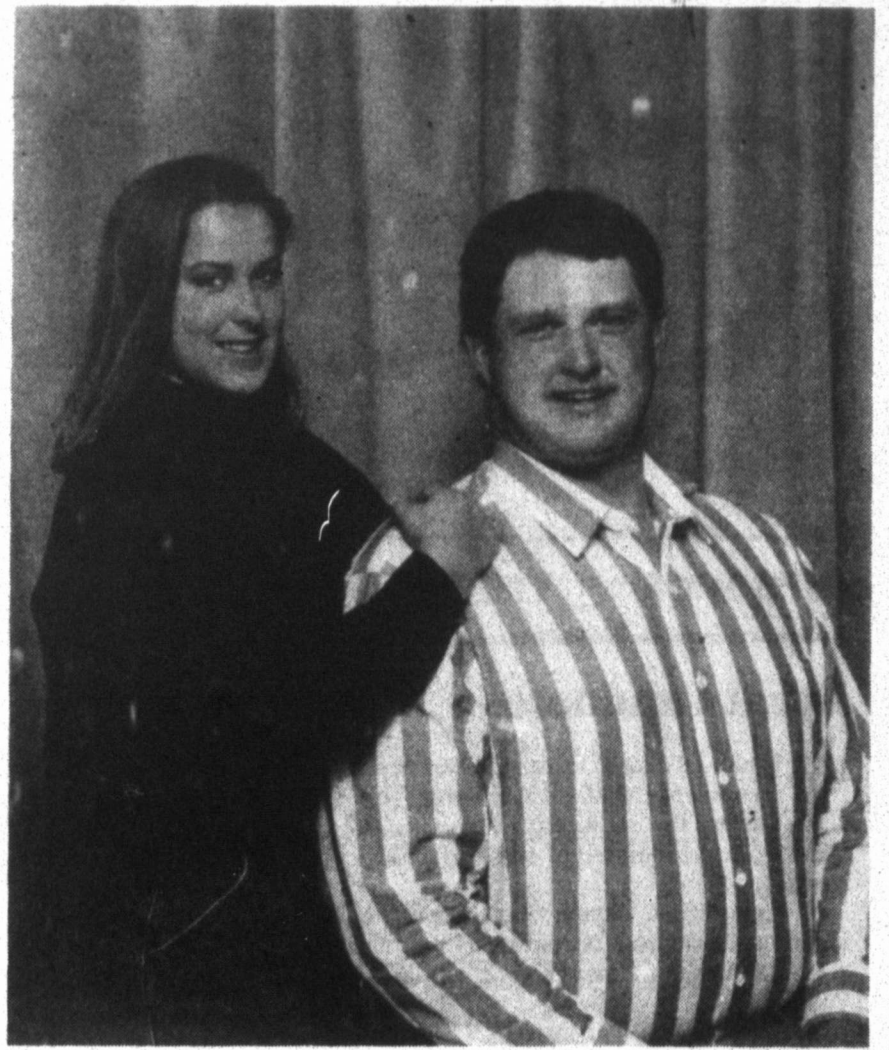

**To The Citizens Of Donley County**

The Associated Ambulance Authority wishes to apologize for any misconception that the public may have construed recently, and to let you know that they are here for anyone who needs their services without any discrimination whatsoever. The Associated Ambulance Authority does not turn anyone away in need of their services but ask that it be an emergency, and not just a ride to the hospital, as there could be an emergency that the ambulance and EMS personnel would be needed for as we have only two paid employees, Phillip Vargas, and Diane Wiggs. Clarendon ambulance service has had a very good record in the past, and plans to maintain an even better record in the future. The Clarendon Emergency Medical Service has a group of dedicated volunteers, whose president is James Thomas, and they have been trained as emergency care attendants, emergency medical technician's, paramedic's, and etc. They devote much of their time and effort to help maintain an efficient ambulance service for the citizens of Donley County. They work under the State, Panhandle Emergency Medical Service, and Associated Ambulance Authority coordinator guidelines, as does the paid employees.

**Local Official Earns Award**

Donley County Treasurer Wanda Smith was awarded the Texas Association of Counties (TAC) County Investment Officer Level I Certification on August 23, 1994.

Smith was honored for passing a comprehensive exam covering management of county investments after attending six monthly investment classes.

The course incorporates home study, classroom lecture (including computer training if needed) and field trips to various financial institutions such as commercial banks, the Federal Reserve Bank and broker/dealer firms. Level I concentrates on the provisions of the law relating to investment of public funds.

TAC first offered this program in 1992 in response to requests from county treasurers wanting to learn how to increase their counties' rates of return. Participants are concerned that changing interest rates will translate into higher taxes for their constituents-something they hope to avoid by learning more about capital markets. The goal is to make the most of the taxpayers' dollars to avoid cutting services or raising taxes.

Smith is one of only 22 people to complete the objectives for the CIO certification in 1994. The graduates are now eligible to begin the Level II course, where curriculum will include information about investment accounting and operational techniques.


**Safety Course Offered**

**BN, Santa Fe to Merge**

Burlington Northern, Inc. [BN], and Santa Fe Pacific Corporation [Santa Fe], jointly announced on June 30, that they have signed a definitive agreement providing for the merger of the two companies subject to receiving approval from the Interstate Commerce Commission. The combination will create a rail network covering the midwestern and western United States and provide shippers with single-line service connecting all principal West Coast ports with major midwestern and western markets and with ports and markets in the Southeast. Clarendon is located on the BN mainline between Fort Worth and Denver.

Santa Fe stockholders will receive 0.27 of a share of Burlington Northern common stock for each Santa Fe share. Separately, Santa Fe announced that it will distribute to its shareholders on September 30, 1994, the remaining stock which it owns in Santa Fe Pacific Gold Corp. That dividend was to be paid prior to the merger, and is not dependent on it. Both transactions are expected to be tax-free to shareholders.

Upon completion of the merger, Burlington Northern will change its name to "Burlington Northern Santa Fe Corporation", and the railroad will be called The Burlington Northern and Santa Fe Railway Company. Gerald Grinstein, Burlington Northern's chairman and chief executive officer, will be chairman of the merged company. Robert D. Krebs, chairman, president and chief executive officer of Santa Fe will be president and chief executive officer of the new company.

"The combination of Burlington Northern and Santa Fe is a predominantly 'end-to-end' merger that will benefit shippers and the public," Grinstein said. "There is very little overlap between our two rail systems."

"The merged BN/Santa Fe network will provide single-line service across the key transcontinental corridor from Central and Southern California to the Southeastern gateways of Memphis and Birmingham. It will provide Midwestern grain shippers with a new single-line access to the West Coast and Gulf ports, and it will enhance shipping options to Canadian and Mexican gateways," he said.

Grinstein said that shippers prefer single-line service because it is more efficient, gives them one point of contact, and eliminates the costs and delays associated with interchanging traffic from one carrier to another. Enhanced single-line service also will open new markets for shippers.

"This merger will create a strong, new rail carrier with a diversified traffic base and excellent financial prospects. For example, Santa Fe's strength in intermodal traffic will complement BN's strength in coal and grain," said Krebs. "This will benefit employees, customers, shareholders and communities where both railroads operate."

Krebs continued, "The combination of BN and Santa Fe will help U.S. industries compete more effectively in world markets by linking the heartland more closely with the West Coast and Gulf Coast ports, providing better access to the Pacific Rim nations and other trading partners."

The merger has been approved by the boards of directors of both companies. It is subject to approval by the shareholders of both companies. The companies will file their merger application with the ICC and ask the ICC to rule on an expedited basis. While the ICC is reviewing the merger, BN and Santa Fe will operate as independent companies as before. "We expect the merger to result in substantial cost savings,"

said Krebs.

Burlington Northern Railroad is one of the world's largest transportation and information services. It operates the longest rail system in North America, with rails in 25 states and two Canadian provinces.

The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad operates in 12 states and offers service to Mexico at several ports-of-entry.

Friday, October 21, is National Fan Appreciation Day - A time to thank the spectators who support your programs throughout the year.

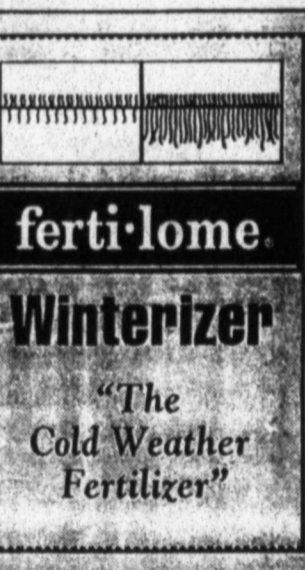

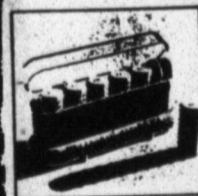

# Dr. Dobson Answers Your Questions

**QUESTION:** Would you comment on the violence in our society at large, and the forces which are propelling it? What do you think can and should be done about it?

**DR. DOBSON:** There are few subjects that cause me greater concern than the exposure being given to crime and violence in America today.

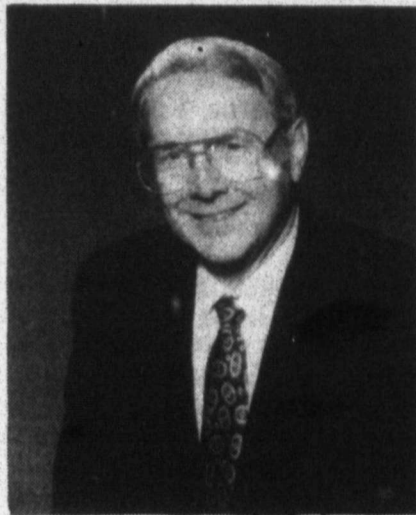
A squadron of Los Angeles police cornered a desperate gunman in a residential area of the community. The fugitive had barricaded himself in a small house, and held three juvenile hostages inside. Television crews were on hand to photograph one of the children, a teenage boy, as he was forced outside and then shot in the head by his abductor.

The pathetic young victim died on the sidewalk in a pool of his own blood. I sat stunned, literally sick to my stomach, while the drama was broadcast in full color.

A flood of emotions ran through my mind as I gazed into the immobile, unfocused eyes of the dying adolescent. Mixed with deep pity and remorse was a sudden outpouring of indignation—a revulsion that had been accumulating for years.

I was angry at the profiteers who have nurtured violence in our society, and at those millions who seem to thrive on it. I was angry at movie producers like Sam Peckinpah, who have smeared blood and guts all over the silver screen. I was angry at theater patrons for demanding a dozen disembowelments per hour in their visual entertainment. I was angry at television networks for giving us continuous police stories, with their guns and silly automobile chases and karate chops and SWAT teams.

I was angry at the Supreme Court for legalizing 1.5 million abortions by American women last



sanction is the most powerful tool available to influence our free enterprise system, and we should use it. We have sat on our hands long enough!

**QUESTION:** How common is the desire for extramarital sexual encounters in men, even among those who would never be unfaithful to their wives?

**DR. DOBSON:** Dr. Robert Whitehurst from the Department of Sociology at the University of Windsor, Ontario, was once asked this question: "Do most men at some point have extramarital desires?"

His reply, published in the journal "Sexual Behavior," included these comments: "...All men from the first day of marriage onward think about this possibility, although these tendencies toward extramarital sexual activity diminish in later middle age and beyond, they never entirely vanish or disappear in normal men."

These strong statements leave little room for exceptions, but I'm inclined to agree with their conclusions. The lure of infidelity has incredible power to influence human behavior.

Even men who are involved in a church and are committed to their wives must deal with the same sexual temptation.

year. And I was particularly angry at the pathetic system of American justice which makes crime so profitable and punishment so improbable.

But my indignation will change nothing, and the wave of violence and lawlessness will continue unabated. We have become so desensitized to human suffering and exploitation that even the most horrible events are accepted as part of our regular evening "entertainment" on the tube.

I think it's time that millions of decent, law abiding citizens rise up with one voice to oppose the industries that are profiting from violence.

A valiant campaign of this nature was waged in 1977 by the National Parent Teacher Association, directing their efforts at television networks and companies that support the most damaging programs. Of course, this pressure from the PTA brought an anguished cry of "foul play" from the greedy profiteers whose pockets were lined with blood-stained money.

Nevertheless, Sears Roebuck, Union Oil and other large companies pledged to sponsor no more violent programs on television. This form of economic

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### Legal Matters

#### HOW TO BUY A USED CAR

Most of us, at some point in our lives, have bought a used car.

Although it may be a dependable source of transportation - there are many reputable dealers - we have all heard the occasional horror story. In fact, we receive more complaints about defective used cars than any other consumer complaint.

Know before you go. Although there are no absolute guarantees, there are some

things you can do to maximize your chances of satisfaction and minimize the likelihood that you'll end up with a lemon. Cars are high-ticket items. When making any major purchase, you should look before you leap. A bit of research up front can save headaches later on.

Before you begin looking at used cars, think about what car models and options you want, and how much you are able or willing to spend. Check out your local library - it has books and magazines that compare and contrast car models, reliability statistics, and prices. Libraries also can provide information about safety tests and mileage. Many on-line computer services have discussion forums where people trade information.

When you settle on what you want, shop around. More than one place will offer you the car you want, but the price may vary.

**Kicking the tires**  
Once you find the car you want, check it out thoroughly. You should consider having a knowledgeable friend or mechanic look over the car before you buy it. Some cities even have "lemon-busting" services that will come out and do a thorough and professional inspection of the auto for a reasonable price. An initial investment of a few dollars can conceivably save you from making a mistake worth thousands to you bank account.

If the seller refuses to allow you to inspect the vehicle, that's a

clear sign that you should walk away from the deal!

There are some things you can do on your own. Don't believe everything you read. Investigations by our office in the past have uncovered odometer shops that roll back the mileage of cars and provide "legitimate" certificates of authenticity. So when you look at an automobile, see that everything is consistent with odometer. Are the brake pedals and seat worn and slick? that doesn't gibe with a reading of 40,000 miles.

Some people say not to buy a car that has had more than one owner. While that may be extreme, you can always ask to see maintenance records. The very existence of a record of oil changes and routine repairs may indicate that a car has had good care.

**If you have problems**  
If something goes wrong with your car and it is covered by a warranty or a service contract, there are several steps you can take to get service. First, read the warranty or contract; the document should have instructions on how to get service. Try to resolve the problem with the salesperson or owner of the dealership. However, if you think you are entitled to service, but the dealer disagrees, you can take other steps.

If the warranty is backed by the manufacturer, contact the local representative of the car company. This local, or "zone," representative, has the authority to adjust and make decisions about warranty service and repairs.

You might also consider using a dispute resolution organization to arbitrate your disagreement - if both you and the dealer are willing. Under the terms of many warranties, this may be required before you can sue a dealer or manufacturer.

In addition, you may contact our Consumer Protection Division (800-337-3928), which mediates consumer complaints.

If none of these steps are successful, consider going to a small claims court, where you can resolve disputes involving amounts of less than \$5,000.

getting the vaccine when it is available, usually in September.

The vaccine is about 85 percent effective, Glezen said, and it is possible to catch a strain not covered by it. But vaccinated people who catch the flu will have a less severe case.

It is also possible to catch the flu in the two weeks required for the vaccine to take full effect, but it is not possible to catch the flu from the vaccine itself because it is made with killed virus.

Flu strikes suddenly with fever, muscle pain, weakness, sore throat and a dry, hacking cough. Victims need rest and liquids, Glezen said.

While flu can still be a killer in any year, it is highly unlikely the 1994-95 season could equal a 1918 worldwide epidemic that afflicted 500 million people and killed 20 million.

The 1918 pandemic killed more people in less time than any disease in modern history. It ranks with the 14th Century's Black Death as one of the few recorded events to reduce the earth's population by a much as 1 percent.

### Hearty Baked Macaroni

- 1 16-ounce can tomato puree
- 1 cup water
- 2 teaspoons Italian herb seasoning
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 1/2 pounds low-fat cottage cheese
- 1/2 teaspoon onion powder
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 8-ounce package elbow macaroni, uncooked
- 4 ounces part-skim mozzarella cheese, sliced

Preheat oven to 350° F. Lightly spray a 9-x-9-x-2-inch casserole with vegetable oil.

In a small bowl combine tomato puree, water, Italian seasoning and 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder. In another bowl, combine cottage cheese, onion powder and 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder.

Spoon one-third of tomato mixture into prepared casserole. In order, layer half of macaroni, all of cottage cheese mixture and one-third of tomato mixture on top. Add remaining macaroni and cover with remaining tomato mixture.

Cover and bake 1 hour. Uncover casserole and top with mozzarella cheese. Return it to the oven, uncovered, for 5 minutes, or until cheese is melted. Let stand for 10 minutes.

Serves 6.

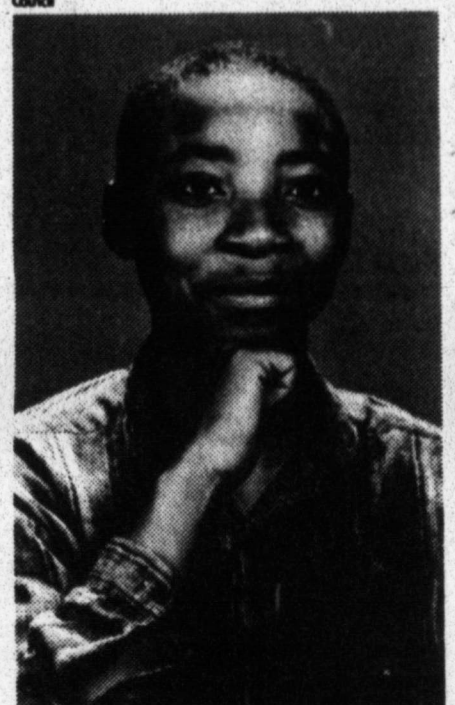

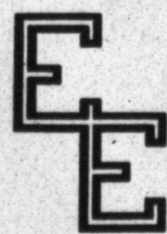
