The big Canadian Wildcats Announced spoiled all hopes the Clarendon Bronchos had in sharing the Dis-

The Bronchos fought their opponents from beginning to end. in statistics, but their mistakes cost them the game. The Bronchos made 16 first downs to 15 for Canadian and piled up 236 yards rushing and 66 passing for a total of 302 yards from scrimmage as compared to 265 rushing and seven passing for a total of 272 for the Wildcats. However, the Bronchos also led in the yards-lost-by-penalties department which helped bring on their defeat. Clarendon was penalized 60 yards as compared to 20 for the Wildcats.



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

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THE COLOR OF THE TIE The State of Oregon has long used yellow dividing lines on its highways. The evidence indicates that most motorists feel that they provide much better visibility than white lines, particularly in bad weather, and so are an important safety factor.

But now Oregon's Highway Department announces that white lines will replace the yellow. Reason: The Federal government dictates that states must adopt white lines - or lose their share of the funds allocated to the multi-billion dollar interstate highway system.

The significance of this goes far beyond any merits and demerits of white-lines-vs-yellowlines. The Portland Oregonian makes the big point with admirable clarity: "When one accepts a 'gift' from Washington, one gives up the free choice that states, as well as individuals, hold dear. When Uncle Sam puts up the money for a new suit, he not only decides what kind of suit it shall be but also picks the color of the tie."

This truism should surprise no one - the principle is as old as government. Centuries ago, someone remarked that "he who pays the piper calls the tune." Now a swollen central government pays more and more pipers, and calls more and more of our tunes.

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

By Congressman Walter Rogers The Tripod's Extended Leg

Most of us have observed a surveyor at work along the streets and roads of communities and rural areas. Many of us have also noted a movie-cameraman at work. Bith of these professions often employ a device called a tripod upon which rests the instrument to be used. In order for the survefor and the cameraman to accurately draw their sights, it is necessary that the tripod be adjusted so that the instrument presents a level and steady view. If one of the legs of the tripod is too short or too long, the surveyor gets an inaccurate sight and the cameraman a distorted picture.

This is the same principle upon which our Federal Government functions, and it is the embodiment of principles incorporated in our Constitution by its framers. When one branch of our tripartite system - either the executive, legislative or judicial -either falls short or extends itself, an inaccurate or distorted situation exists and an imbalance of constitutional powers occurs. Many believe that recent decisions handed down by the Supreme Court - the Judicial branch of our government - indicate an extension of the powers granted that body constitutionally. Then analogy is that one leg of the tripod is extended. Certainly, many of these recent decisions of the Court have produced an inaccurate or distorted sight or view of the system of checks and balances which we enjoy as our governmental heritage. 
