Featured Business of the Week

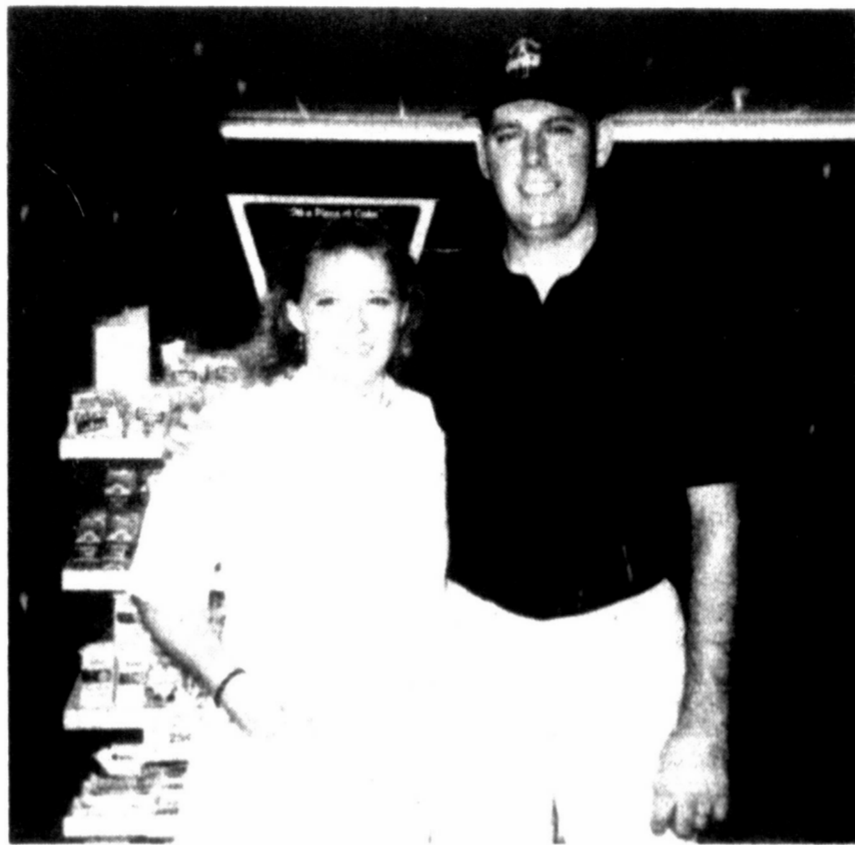

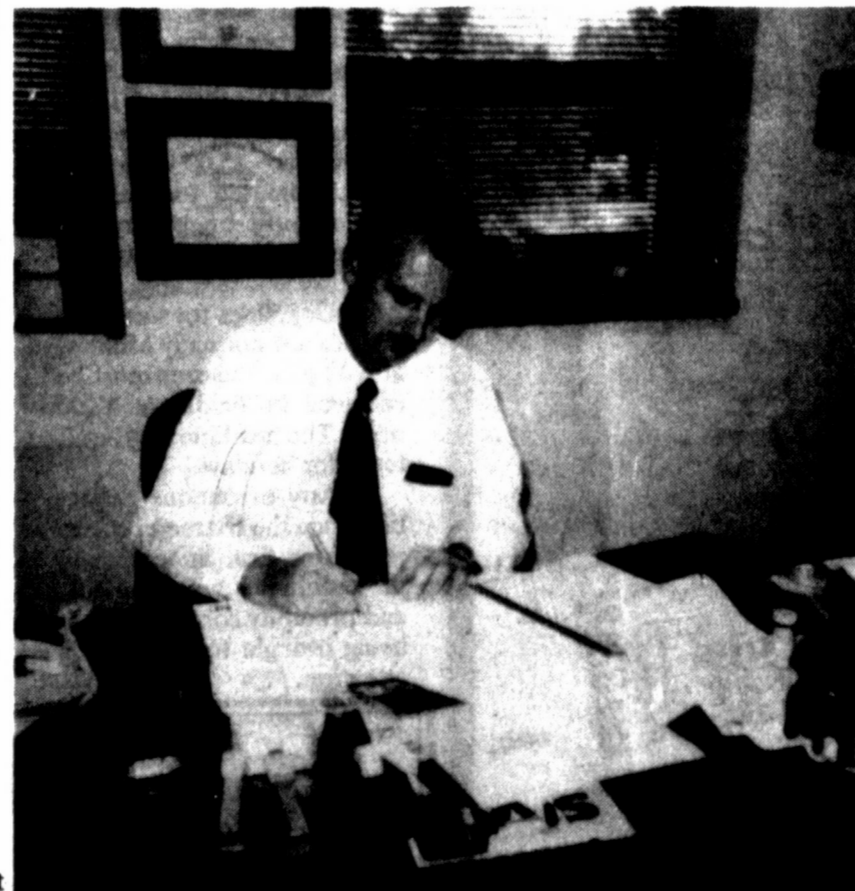
and return to Palestine at 10:00 p.m.

New Principals Join Clarendon Administration

Clarendon ISD has many new additions for the 1994 - 95 school year. Two of these additions are the High School Principal, Larry Jeffers, and the Junior High Principal, Donny Carroll.

Mr. Jeffers was born and raised in Memphis, Texas. He went to Clarendon College for two years, and then he attended West Texas University. He graduated from college in 1976. His first job was in Crowell, Texas, where he coached and taught Jr. High Science. After leaving Crowell, they moved to Anson, Texas, where they lived eight years. At Anson he was the Athletic Director for four years. When they left Anson they moved to Stanford. He was an assistant coach. After 16 years of coaching he decided to get into administrative work, so he became assistant principal at Stanford for two and a half years. Larry and his wife Jamie moved to Clarendon this summer with their three children Drew, who is a Junior at Clarendon High School, Arron, a seventh grader, and Jeremy, who is in kindergarten. Jamie is teaching third grade at Clarendon Elementary. Mr. Jeffers stated, "I came in here to do the job and was impressed with the facilities, the facilities are just great. It was a challenge. They wanted me to emphasize discipline. I consider myself a disciplinarian. In two and a half years as assistant principal I was dealing solely with discipline I learned quite a few tricks of the trade. I believe that all kids, all young people, want to know where the limits are. They all want structure. You're always going to have those young people that go over the line, no matter where the line's drawn. But if you draw the lines and you're strict enough there's a lot of young people you're going to save. A lot of these young people are going to stay in school. That's why I want Clarendon High School to be a place where they're not afraid to come to school. Where they can come for a good, solid education. We want kids to take a risk and know that they can succeed."

Junior High Principal, Donny Carroll graduated from Memphis High School. He attended Clarendon College where he received his associates degree. He then attended Texas Tech University. There he received his bachelor in Science degree in education. He began teaching in Lubbock High School, where he was a Social Studies teacher and Sophomore Football coach. From there he moved to the Permian Basin area where he lived for several years where he worked for a major oil company. He attended Angelo State University and received his masters degree in school administration. He then went to Higgins ISD and started back as lead teacher and head football coach, Social Studies, and science teacher. After leaving Higgins, he went to Spur as Elementary Principal. Mr. Carroll and his wife, Linda have been married for nineteen years. They have two sons, Jon is a fifth grader at Clarendon Elementary and Ryan who is a second grader. Linda teaches several High School math classes and accounting. Mr. Carroll stated "We are very happy to be here in Clarendon. My goal for Junior High is to have a very safe environment for all the students to learn in."

Former Martin residents who died during the past year were memorialized and the reunion closed with the singing of "God Be With You" by everyone.

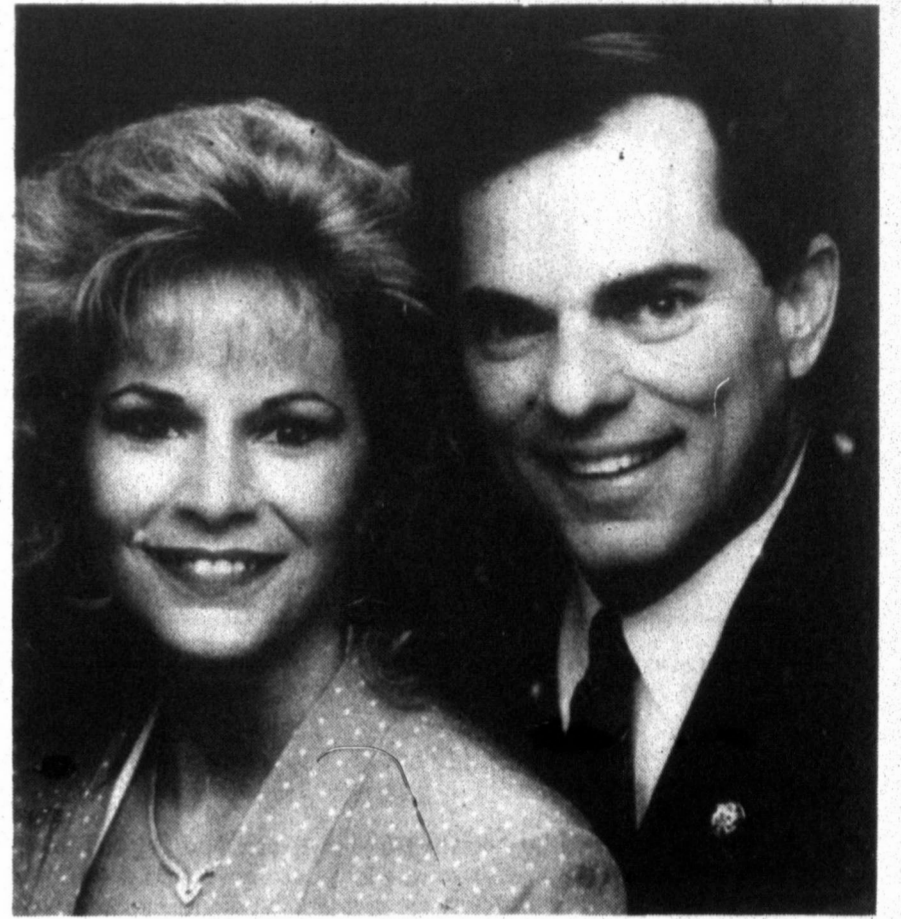

Dr. Dobson Answers Your Questions

QUESTION We live in what you can describe as "routine panic" in our home. I have three children under 6, and I never get caught up with my work. How can I slow down when it takes every minute of the day (and night) to care for my children?



DR. DOBSON: There may be a helpful answer in the way you spend your money.

Most Americans maintain a "priority list" of things to purchase when enough money has been saved for that purpose. It is my conviction that domestic help for the mother of small children should appear on that priority list. Without it, she is sentenced to the same responsibility day in and day out, seven days a week.

For several years, she is unable to escape the unending burden of dirty diapers, runny noses and unwashed dishes. She will do a more efficient job in those tasks and be a better mom if she can share the load with someone else occasionally. This seems more important to the happiness of the home than buying new drapes or a power saw for Dad.

But how can middle-class families afford house cleaning and baby-sitting services in these inflationary days? It might be accomplished by using competent high school students instead of older adults. I suggest that a call be placed to the counseling office of the nearest senior high school. Tell the counselor that you need a mature third- or fourth-year student to do some cleaning. Do not reveal that you are looking for a regular employee.

When the referred person arrives, try him or her out for a day and see how the responsibility is handled. If the student is very efficient, offer him or her a weekly job. If the student is slow and flighty, thank him or her for coming and

get anything. 2.) You can guarantee that the most important jobs will get done first. 3.) The tasks are crossed off the list as they are completed, leaving a record of what has been accomplished.

QUESTION: Should parents force a child to eat?

DR. DOBSON: No. I am no expert in nutrition, but I believe a normal child's appetite is governed by the amount of food he needs. He will get hungry when he needs nourishment.

However, I do believe a parent should carefully guard that appetite, making sure that he satisfies it with the food his body requires. A bit of sugar in the afternoon can make him disinterested in his dinner. Or he may sit down at the table and fill his stomach with juice or one item on his plate.

Thus, it may be necessary to give him one kind of food at a time, beginning with iron-rich meat and other protein, followed by the less important items.

Once he is satisfied, I can see no value in forcing him to continue eating. Incidentally, the parent should know that a child's appetite often drops off rapidly between two and three years of age. This occurs because his time of maximum growth rate has subsided, and his need for food is reduced.

call for another student the following week. There is a remarkable difference in maturity level between high school students, and you'll eventually find one who works like an adult.

Here are some further suggestions to help you tolerate the pressures of your life:

1. Reserve some time for yourself. At least once a week, go bowling or shopping or simply "waste" an occasional afternoon. In addition, a husband and wife should have a date every week or two, leaving the children at home, and even forgetting them for an evening.

2. Don't struggle with things you can't change. Concentrate on the good things in your life. Men and women should recognize that discontent can become nothing more than a bad habit—a costly attitude that can rob them of the pleasure of living.

3. Don't deal with any big problems late at night. All problems seem more unsolvable in the evenings, and the decisions that are reached then may be more emotional than rational.

4. Try making a list. The advantages of writing down one's responsibilities are threefold: 1.) You know you aren't going to for-

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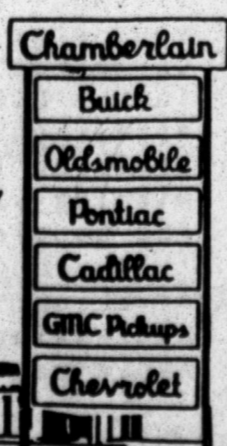
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Athletic Attendance Policy Announced For Students

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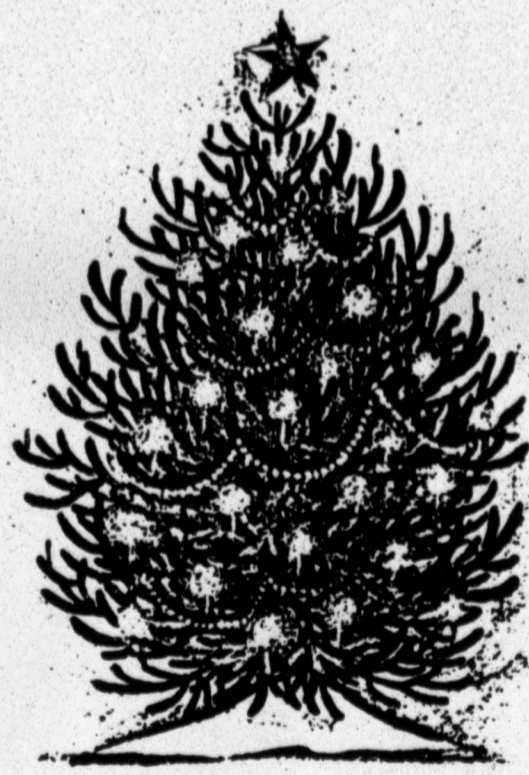

Parents' Corner
Coping With The "Home Alone" Dilemma

Never before has the need for supervised care for school-age children been so strong. Today, experts estimate that at least five million school-age children are at home alone every day, for some period of time. In fact, half of these children are left unsupervised during summer days, or before and after school. And this trend is expected to continue: within the next few years, 75% of all parents of school-age children will be in the work force.

Experts agree that for the millions of American families faced with the dilemma, leaving school-age children at home alone can be very stressful. According to Dr. Marcy Guddemi, an expert in child development and vice president of education for KinderCare Learning Centers, "many parents are often very concerned about how well their children can cope, both with routine activities and potentially unsafe situations. And while many children enjoy caring for themselves and happily accept the added responsibilities, others don't adapt so easily and often feel lonely or scared."

Many communities offer affordable programs that are designed to meet the special needs of school-age children by opening new KID'S CHOICE centers, launched in communities nationwide.

KID'S CHOICE provides children ages 6 to 12 years-old with a wide-range of developmentally-appropriate, supervised activities offered in a 7,000 sq. ft. facility that includes full indoor and outdoor recreation areas and computerized learning facilities. However, for working parents with older latch-key children who will remain at home, Dr. Guddemi suggests the following tips to help them foster independence and build their self-esteem:

Discuss the importance of responsibility with your child; set rules for behavior and activities and inform him/her about basic safety information, including the "911" emergency telephone procedures. Young children who understand why they are home alone, and what they may and may not do, will be more at ease and confident in managing themselves.


If possible, inform a neighbor or nearby relative that your child is home alone and occasionally have them check-in with your child.

Have healthy, easy-to-prepare meals and/or snacks available for children; leave a note to create a communication bond that says you are close in thought.

Be sure your child has several appropriate activities to keep him/her occupied after homework is complete. Take time with them to prioritize these activities and assign a chore for each day (i.e.: "after you walk the dog, please set the table and practice the piano"). Children should be discouraged from watching too much television!
