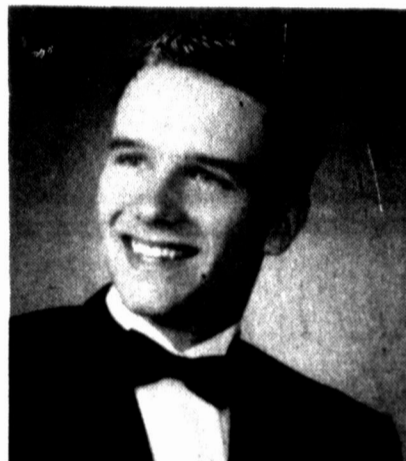
## Masonic Lodge Awards Scholarships

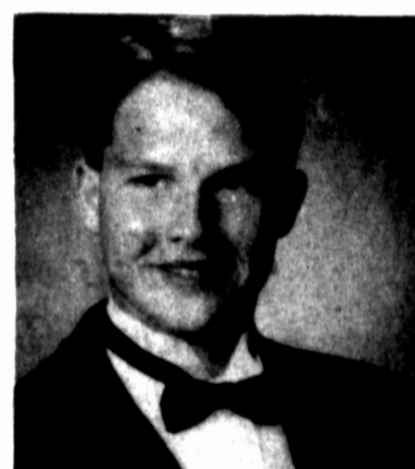

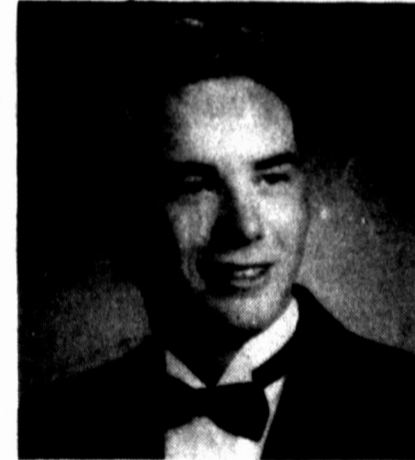

## Buckle Up For Safety

If you could save thousands of lives with a simple click, would you try?

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is trying. TxDOT announced today that May is the month for Texans who don't buckle up!

Buckle Up Texas! Month will spotlight the importance of safety belts, air bags and child safety seats. The month will also be celebrated with increased education and enforcement of efforts. Translated, that means you are more likely to get a ticket for not wearing your safety belt, so you'd better learn to like it.

"Many people just don't realize how much your chance of serious injury or is death is reduced if you wear safety belts," said Bill Burnett, TxDOT executive director.

Every state has a child safety law, and 46 states require drivers to wear seat belts. TxDOT is providing police departments with grants to conduct a special enforcement effort during May.

"Safety belts saved an es-

imated 34,794 lives from 1983 to 1992," said Burnett. We plan to culminate this awareness month on Memorial Day weekend, the opening of the tourist season, so more lives can be saved.

"It's too bad that the risk of getting a ticket is the only thing that will make some people buckle up," he added, "but TxDOT supports safety-belt use and the laws requiring it."

State law requires all drivers and front seat passengers buckle up. State law also requires all children under the age of two to be restrained in a child safety seat belt. Fines for not buckling up range from 25-50.

More than 60 percent of the 3,037 people killed in accidents last year in Texas we're not wearing a safety belt.

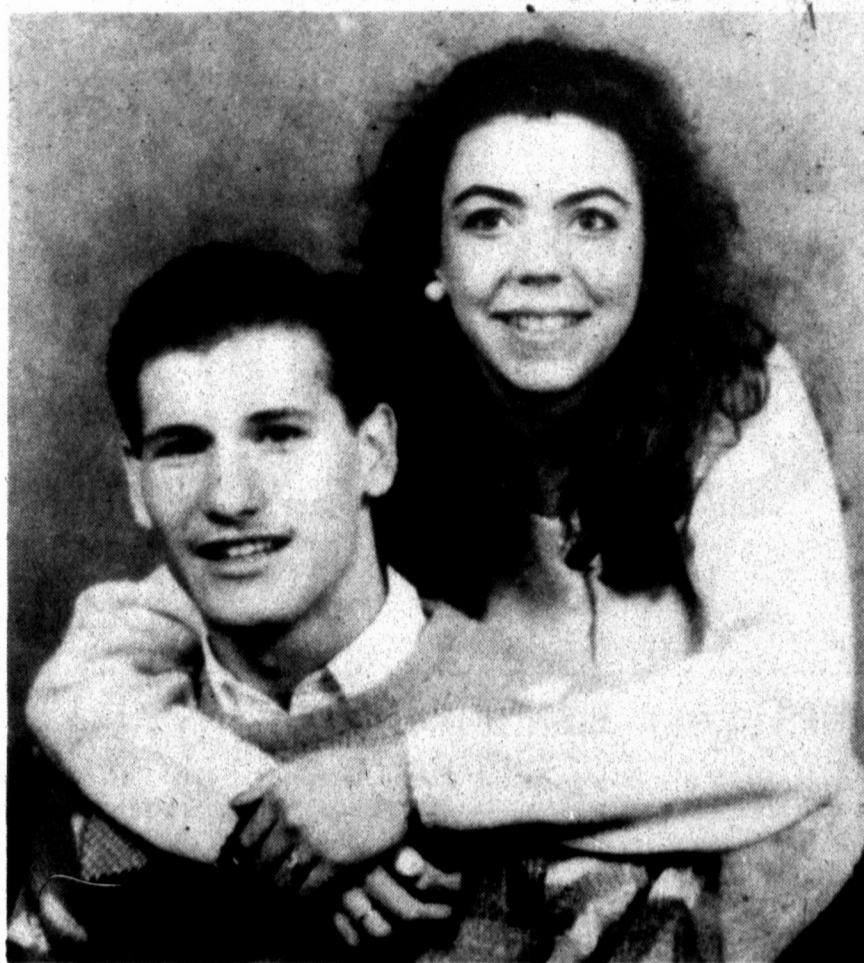

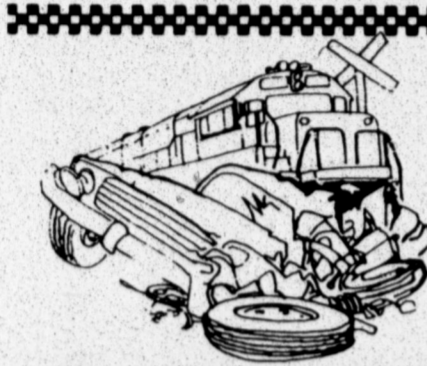

**Public Notice**

On March 23, 1994, GTE and Contel ("The Companies") filed applications with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("PUC") to restructure the Companies' Switched Transport rate category and reduce the Carrier Common Line (CCL) charge of its Switched Access Service. The tariff sheets in GTE and Contel's applications, if approved, will bring the Companies' state access tariffs into structural parity with their interstate tariffs for the Local Transport rate category, which became effective on December 30, 1993.

GTE and Contel propose to implement the new tariffs on a revenue neutral basis. The Local Transport category of GTE and Contel's Switched Access Service is primarily for interexchange carriers.

Persons who wish to intervene should file a motion for intervention with the PUC by June 17, 1994 with reference to Docket No. 12866 (GTE) and/or 12865 (Contel). 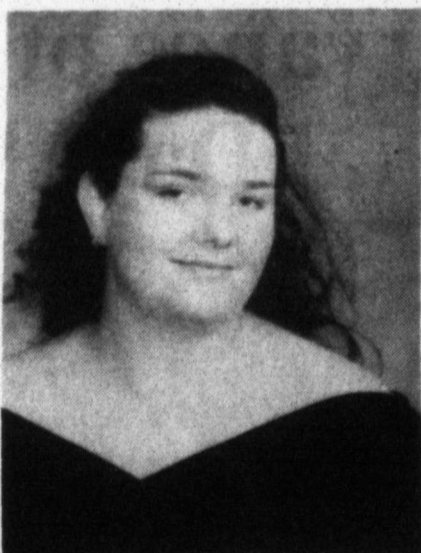
STEPHEN CHAD CAMPBELL

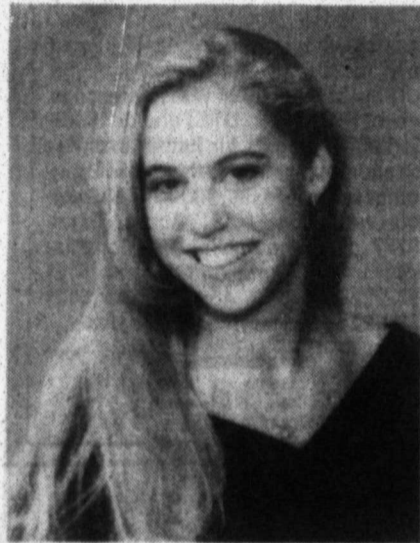


LAURA ANN OWENS

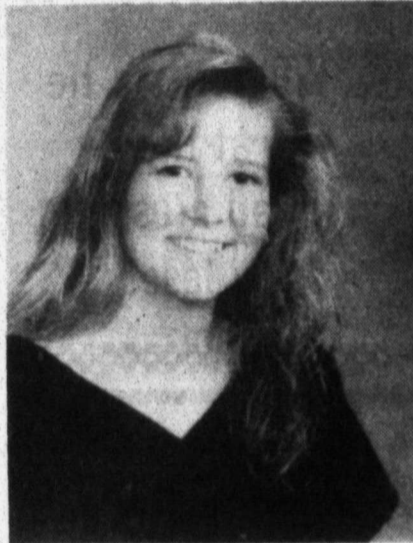
# Congratulations Hedley Class of '94'

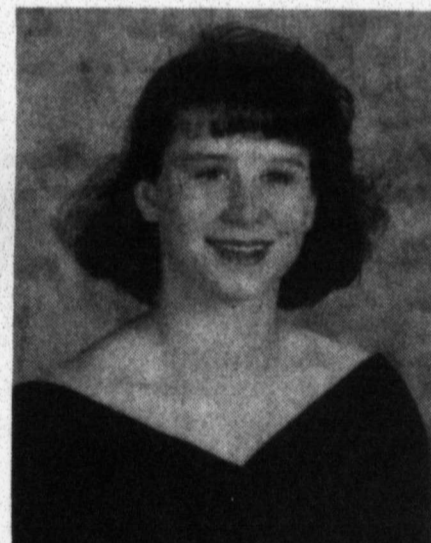
ANGIE LONGAN

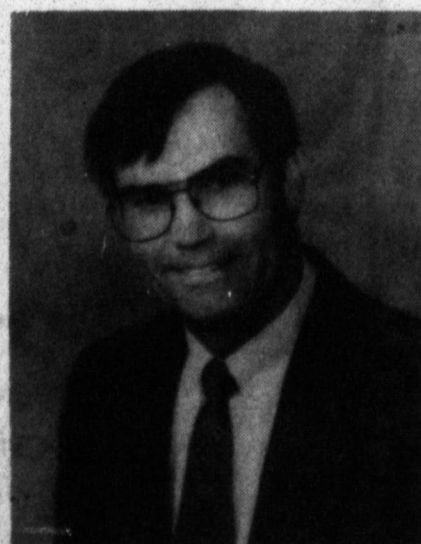

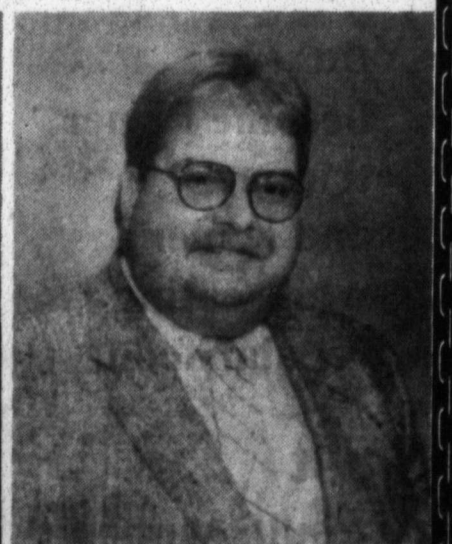

Screening charge for pictures remains \$5. Classified ads are \$5 for the first 15 words, and 10¢ for additional words. Thank-you notes are \$6. Open rate for display ads is \$3.60 per column inch. [Most local advertisers fall under preferred or contract rates.] Tear-sheets are still \$1 and there is still a \$1 charge for billing and handling. Prepayment is required for most ads.

Rates for *The Clarendon News* remain very low compared to other papers of comparable circulation, even with the increase.

## Newspaper Prices to Increase

For more than six years, every issue of the Clarendon paper has been 40 cents. Now, to keep up with rising costs, the paper will raise its rates, beginning June 1, the paper will cost 50 cents.

In Memory Of

Officially Memorial Day is the last Monday in May, this date was designated a federal holiday, by law, in 1971.

The origins of Memorial Day or Decoration Day was first recognized in 1866 to honor the memory of those who served in the Grand Army of the Republic, (Federal Army) and has been a day revered by many since.

Perhaps the most beautiful memorial event took place at Columbus, Mississippi on April 25, 1866, when four women at Friendship Cemetery decorated the graves of their fallen Confederate soldiers. Here the additional act of decorating the graves of 40 Federal soldiers, buried there, brought about the writing of the poem, "The Blue and Gray", by Francis Miles Finch. The last stanza of his poem quoted here:

"No more shall the way cry sever,  
or the winding rivers be red;  
They banish our anger forever  
When they laurel the graves of our dead!

Under the sod and the dew,  
Waiting the judgment day,  
Love and tears for the Blue,  
Tears and love for the Gray."  
1867

In 1868, May 30 was designated a special day for honoring the graves of deceased soldiers - both Union and Confederate. From the Secretary of the Army, May 5, 1868, General Order No. 11 begins - "The 30th of May 1868 is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers, and otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in the defense of their country and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village and hamlet cemetery in the land."

How appropriate the sentiment of G. O. 11 is today. I do not believe there is a cemetery in the land which does not contain the remains of persons who died in the military service of our country.

Though Memorial Day was originally to honor those soldiers who died in battle, how very fortunate we are to have one day each year to remember and honor those loved ones who offered themselves that we might live in peace and freedom.

How may we show our thank-you for those who were called upon to serve? Proudly display and respect our national flag!

The Stars and Stripes; the most popular name for the red, white and blue national flag of the United States, has been our national symbol - in one form or another - for over 200 years.

Members of the Veterans of Foreign Ways and American Legion Posts all across the nation will honor their dead comrades on Memorial Day by placing the Stars and Stripes upon each veterans grave.

Memorial Day will be a holiday for most of us. A day for picnics, cook-outs, ball games, etc. Enjoy this holiday to it's fullest, every veteran wishes this for you. But, it is also appropriate that each one of us show respect for our military dead as an honorable and desired event.

Display our national flag on Memorial Day. There is a published set of rules for handling and displaying the Stars and Stripes: Some of these rules are emphasized here;

1) No other flag or pennant should be placed above or, if on the same level, to the right of the U.S. Flag. 2) On Memorial Day, the public flags should be displayed at half-staff until noon only, then raised to the top of the staff. 3) The U.S. Flag should never be used as drapery, never festooned. The Flag should always be allowed to fall free. Blue, white and red bunting should be used for decorations. 4) When the Flag is placed upon a grave, see that it will not touch the ground and do not leave it there indefinitely.

On Sunday morning, May 29th, members of our local VFW Post 7782 will place individual flags on each veterans grave in our Citizens Cemetery. The VFW members will remove all flags from the graves at the close of Memorial Day, Monday, May 30th.

Any American Legion members in this area are cordially invited to take part in decorating the cemetery.

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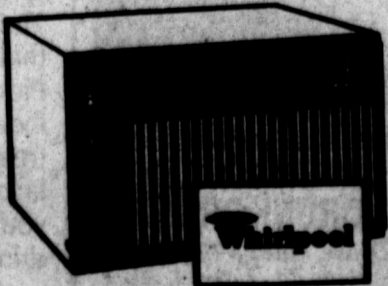
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# Mesquite Control

It's about that time again: mesquite spraying season.

Now is a good time to review guidelines and "rules of thumb" for mesquite control. Some have changed in recent years because of new research, products and methods. Though nature sometimes makes exceptions to our rules of thumb, the following are based on research, demonstrations and commercial experience.

### Broadcast or hand-treat?

For sites with less than 150 plants per acre, individual plant treatment usually is more cost-effective than broadcast treatment.

For sites with more than 150 plants per acre, broadcast treatment usually is more economical.

Individual plant treatment delivers better control than broadcast-spraying the same type of brush with the same herbicides.

Foliar applications -- either broadcast or hand-sprayed -- are more dependent on proper conditions for success than basal bark treatments.

### Foliar application

In foliar applications, thorough coverage of foliage by the spray solution is critical for control.

Proper conditions are critical in foliar application, especially with broadcast treatments.

Among the recommended foliar applications -- broadcast or individual plant -- the most effective spray solutions contain Reclaim herbicide.

### Foliar conditions

The optimum time period for foliar application will vary by area. Check with the Extension or Soil Conservation Service for timing recommendations.

For foliar applications, spray mesquite when soil temperatures are above 75 degrees F at a depth of 12 to 18 inches. Optimum soil temperature is 78 degrees to 83 degrees F. Don't foliar-spray mesquite when soil temperatures are cooler than 75 degrees F. Rains and cool weather will lower soil temperatures. Heavily textured, shaded and bottomland sites will be cooler than light-textured, open, upland sites.

Try to avoid foliar-spraying when most of the mesquite bean pods are elongating, usually a 7- to 10-day period in mid-season.

In foliar applications, spray

when foliage is full, healthy and mature (dark green). Don't spray when leaves appear damaged, drought-stressed or immature (light green). Avoid spraying uneven-aged leaves (some light, some dark green). Wait until all foliage is mature.

### Basal treatment

Optimum conditions for low volume basal or streamline basal applications (about 25% Remedy herbicide, 75% diesel): anytime during the growing season when the plant has mature green leaves.

Trees with slick (smooth) bark are more susceptible to basal treatment than those with rough bark. Slick bark is easier for the herbicide solution to penetrate.

Mesquite becomes less susceptible to basal treatment as stem diameter increases.

### Expectations

Given the many variables involved, expecting 100% mesquite control from a single treatment probably is not realistic. In its control ratings of various brush treatments, the Texas Agricultural Extension service (TAEX) calls plant mortality of 76% or more "very high." The ratings were determined from research and result demonstration data and from observations of commercial applications.

Though they're no guarantee, the ratings represent the control generally obtained when the treatment has been properly applied under optimum conditions. The rating categories and degree of plant kill are:

Very High Control rating has 76-100% of plants killed;

High control rating has 56-75% of plants killed;

Moderate control rating has 36-55% of plants killed;

Low control rating has 0-35% of plants killed.

Some observations from the TAEX recommendations and ratings:

Most recommended individual plant treatments for mesquite have control ratings of "moderate" to "very high."

All recommended mesquite basal treatments with Remedy herbicide have "very high" (76%+) control ratings.

All recommended individual plant treatments with Reclaim herbicide on mesquite alone have "very high" (76%+) control ratings.

Recommended broadcast treatments for mesquite have control ratings ranging from "low" to "high."

All recommended broadcast treatments with Reclaim have

"moderate" (36-55%) to "high" (56-75%) control ratings.

What does the degree of control mean?

When 2,4,5-T treatments delivered about 25% root kill, ranchers often sprayed again when the mesquite grew back to pre-treatment density in about five years.

If 60% root kill can be obtained, retreatment may not be needed for 10 years or more.

On a South Texas ranch, forage response was monitored for seven years after spraying yielded 66% root kill of mesquite. Annual carrying capacity increases ranged from 8 animal units to 80 animal units per 1,000 acres, varying with rainfall. Increases averaged 67 animal units per 1,000 acres for the first two years and 44 animal units for the sixth and seventh years after treatment.

## Safety Tips Offered

Trooper L.B. Snider with the Department of Public Safety says, "In Texas, Memorial Day weekend signals the start of the summertime season for vacation travel". There will be increased dangers to motorists because so many people are anxious to "get away from it all". Each of us should remember that due to heavier traffic, the potential of having a traffic accident on any given holiday weekend is greater than regular weekend; therefore we should adjust our driving habits for the extra crowded highways this Memorial Day weekend.

All available troopers will be out with emphasis on intoxicated drivers, speeders and other serious violations. Snider suggests that motorists use preventive measures such as being rested and alert, allow safety space with other traffic, using headlights day and night to see and be seen and taking advantage of safety belts. Snider also advised if you consume alcoholic drinks to have a designated non-driving driver if you must travel. Preventive measures include a pre-trip check of the vehicle and driver. Vehicles should be checked for defective or worn belts, hoses, cooling systems, fluid levels and proper tire air pressure and treadwear.

With Texas motorists driving friendly by using these and other common sense methods, this could be a wonderfully memorable Memorial Day weekend. Remember, drive "Texas Friendly" and enjoy the holiday.

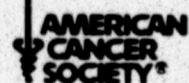

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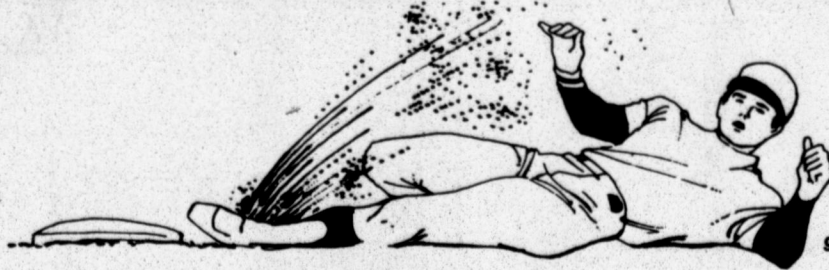

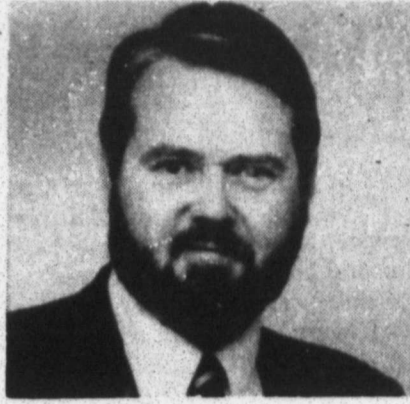

**Minding Your Own Business**

Terrific With Four T's

Over the years, I've met many pretty terrific people. Contrary to the headlines and the six-o'clock news, there a lot of wonderful folks left in the world. You know the ones I mean. They are the folks whose name's come up from

time-to-time and someone always exclaims, "Oh, what a terrific person."

Have you ever wondered what makes terrific people so terrific? Why are they so esteemed among their peers? Why are they so often sought out for advice? Why is their assistance crucial to the success of so many worthwhile projects?

I believe, if you study the lives of these terrific folks you'll find four traits that are always evident. I'd like to share them with you.

**Terrific Traits**

**The Thorough Trait.** According to my dictionary, thorough means to "carry through to the end" or to "be considerate of the details." Because so few of us ever carry out fully all the projects we start, thorough persons appear terrific by contrast.

I'll admit this is a characteristic I need to work on. Sometimes my follow through is weak. I need to work on carrying out the details.

Let me point out quickly that I'm not advocating that you should become a "detail nut" or a "perfectionist." I have seen folks who accomplish little because they focus on small, unimportant details. What I'm encouraging here is that we tackle a job and see it through to the end. If you become a stay-with-it person folks will think you're terrific.

**The Tactful Trait.** Another characteristic of terrific folks is their tactful nature. They have a

way of expressing thoughts - even negative thoughts - in a manner that offends no one.

I used to think that some folks were born with tact, and others totally without it. Now, I believe that the terrific person becomes tactful with studied practice. They carefully consider the feelings of others before blurting out the obvious. They are no less truthful than others, they just find ways to deliver the truth in non-offensive ways.

**The Truthful Trait.** Ralph Waldo Emerson said, "Truth is the property of no individual but is the treasure of all men." Terrific people share this treasure. They make it a daily part of their lives. As politically incorrect as it may be today, truthfulness is a terrific trait.

Telling the truth is often more difficult than changing facts to suit the situation. Truth is refreshing where lies are discouraging. Truth is freedom. Lies make you a slave to more lies.

Truth is tactful. The poet, Robert Browning, said, "So absolutely good is truth, truth never hurts." There are times when terrific people don't tell the truth. They don't lie either. When the truth would cause someone needless pain they say nothing. They are no less honest for keeping some thoughts to themselves. In fact, that is one more reason they're terrific folks - they're thoughtful.

**The Thoughtful Trait.** Webster defines thoughtful as "considerate of others; kind." The terrific folks we know do care about the feelings of others. They are courteous and polite. Before

taking any action that might hurt someone else, they think. Because they think, they avoid many troublesome situations. Thinking before acting and speaking is an admirable trait.

However, there is more to thoughtfulness than being considerate of others. Thoughtful can also mean to be careful and serious. The terrific person understands that you can only solve some problems by serious thought. You must carefully examine truth and facts. The person who can help you solve your problems through the wisdom of careful and objective consideration of facts is a valuable friend. In fact, they are terrific friends.
