Southwestern Bell's companion interstate tariff became effective on January 1,1994.

The transport rate elements provide for the transmission facilllies between the cutomer's premises and the end office switch(es) where the customer's traffic is switched to originate or terminate the customer's communications.

Southwestern Bell proposes to implement the revised tariffs on a revenue neutral basis. Although the proposed tarifi changes will affect all customers subscribing to Switched Access Service, the Local Transpor and Direciory Tansport categoiles of Soulwester Boirs Southwestern Bell's revenues of approximately $\$ 1682.00$ during the first year. Southwestern Bell proposes that the changes be effecitive on December 1, 1994.

$\mathbf{S}^{\text {mall business enjoys a good }}$ reputation. People usually think of entrepreneurs as honest, perience in working wical. My exof small businesses reinforces this reputation. In addition, I believe in small business success.
Our free enterprise system was founded on principies of conduct that have become blurred today. Recent Washington scandals, the savings and loan industry boondoggle, and business and political graft have become th norm. The message is clear. Chea, if you have to, but win at any cost. ners. One of the greatest joys I derive from owning my own businesses is knowing that I built them honestly. However, following the principles of honesty and integrity is not always easy.

Ethical Dilemmas
The following incidents are true-life examples that area business people have shared with us.
for reasons of conlidentiality.

Joe had an opportunity to hire his competitor's area manager. The manager promised to bring Joe the competitor's customer lists, pricing
policy and sales records. This information would help Joe's struggling usiness. Should he hire the manager?
Frequently, Mary is paid in cash
Frequently, Mary is paid in cash for her work. Her business is not very profitable, and she wonders if it would be OK to spend the cash and Internal Revenue Service is corrupt and already collects too much tax money. Should Mary report the cash?

Bill just closed a big loan at the bank. A few days after the paper were signed, he noticed a large error. The bank inadvertemyy on ped the largest piece of equipment used to collateralize the loan. Should Bill poin out the error?
THREE POINT CHECK
The answer to many ethical questions can be found in a book written by Kenneth Blanchard and Norman Vincent Peale. In "The Power of Ethical Management," they suggest using a three-question test to establis ethical behavior. The questions are: 1 is it iegablic?
Would I be happy if the whole story was made public?

These three questions make it easier to tackle any issue that involve stionable ethics. "Is it legal" establishes a minimum criteria. If it is against the law, don't get involved. The fairness question asks if it would be OK if I were on the receiving end of the deal. The third question ask if it would be all right if the local newspaper.
