Panhandle music and theater buffs "and anyone who just loves a rousing good time," says Mila Gibson, are invited to see Mozart's "The Magic Flute," gala Spring offering of Amarillo Opera, April 14-15-16-17 at Amarillo College Concert Hall Theater. Gibson, Artistic Director for the opera, says the tickets, \$7.50, open seating, go on sale April 11. Performances start at 7:30 p.m. and the Sunday matinee on April 17 is 2:30 p.m.

An extra performance - Thursday, April 14, has been added to the previously announced schedule. The Friday, April 15 performance is for "Magic Evening" Gala attendees only.

Soprano Erma Rush is "Queen of the Night." Steve Weber, Brenda Litner and Joe Bolin have starring roles. Gracie Eddins of Pampa is cast as Papagena. Her male counterpart - Papageno - is double cast with Amarillo Opera favorites Kelly Teal and Dale Elliot. Amarillo Symphony Conductor James Setapen is Music Director/Conductor for "The Magic Flute." Like all Amarillo Opera productions, this one will be performed in English.

Original costumes have been created for Amarillo Opera's "Magic Flute" from designs by Gene Murray. (Murray's costume for the Night Queen is attached.) Gibson says that the "innovative, brilliantly colorful costumes add much to this entertaining production."

There are several ways to enjoy Magic Flute, from Free to \$75 per person! Friday night, April 15 BRAVO! offers "A Magic Evening" for the first 225 people who make reservations. The \$75-per-person charge (\$50 for BRAVO! Members) includes the performance, followed by a catered dinner, wines, and entertainment.

Check It Out

Before recommending three exceptional youth books of special interest, Burton Memorial Library is announcing new library hours which have been approved by the joint commission. Beginning April 4, 1994, the library will be opened from 10:00 a.m.-6:00 p.m. on Mondays through Fridays, and from 9:00 a.m.-1:00p.m. on Saturdays.

Are the stories of "Cinderella" and "The Three Little Pigs" favorites of your children? Whether they are or not, your child is sure to enjoy *The Rough Face Girl* and *The Three Little Javelinas*, two of the lovely new youth books that Burton Memorial Library has recently received.

The Rough Face Girl by Rafe Martin is taken from Algonquin Indian folklore. The rough face girl parallels Cinderella who meets

similar circumstances with two cruel older sisters. She is able to succeed in a heartwarming way where her beautiful sisters failed.

The Three Little Javelinas, charmingly written by Susan Lowell, is a Southwest version of "Three Little Pigs". Instead of conflict with a wolf, their enemy is a hungry coyote. Their homes are made of tumbleweeds, cacti, and adobe with a setting in Arizona. At the end of the book, an interesting note on the story from the author mentions that some of her sources for the book include Coyote fables told by southwestern Indians.

Another appealing book for your young reader is *Brother Eagle, Sister Sky*. The message, with paintings by international artist, Susan Jeffers, is a speech given by Chief Seattle, one of the bravest and most respected Indian Chiefs of the Northwest Nations during the 1850's. He gave this speech during treaty negotiations with the United States government. He reveals the love and concern that his people felt for the earth and its environment with a simplicity and sincerity that both you and your children will understand and appreciate. The Indians' feelings concerning their relationship with every part of nature is beautifully expressed and leaves no doubt about the extent that these Native Americans valued their surroundings.

Your children's time would be well spent in reading these three books. If your elementary children are looking for something unusual to present in their next school book report, these might be exactly what they're looking for. Why not check it out?

The first thing I would like to do is congratulate the voters of Donley County, who in spite of the awful weather, on March 8, 1994, came out to the polls to exercise their constitutional right to vote.

There are 2367 registered voters in our country. There were 769 who voted in the Primary elections this is 32.5 percent, 519 voted in the Democratic Primary and 250 voted in the Republican Primary.

The Secretary of State predicted a primary turn-out of 16 to 16 percent. We understand that it was less than we predicted.

Both Republicans and Democratic Parties are having run-off elections on Tuesday, April 12th, 1994. Many of the polling places have been consolidated. The polling place locations are listed on Commissioners bulletin board.

We Republicans only have one (1) polling place for the run-off election. It will be at the Burton Memorial Library at 217 Kearney, Clarendon.

There are two (2) state-wide office races to be decided on the Republican run-off primary ballot.

1. ATTORNEY GENERAL
2. JUDGE OF CRIMINAL APPEALS, PLACE 2

There are two District Judges in a face-off in the Republican primary run-off for Attorney General. I believe Judge Don Wittig is the better qualified. In the Appeals Court Judge race, my choice is Sharon Keller, a Dallas County Prosecutor, but it is your choice that counts; that is if you go vote on April 12th.


All register voters who voted in the Republican Primary, and anyone who did not vote in either primary are invited to exercise your constitutional right, and vote at the Library on April 12th. As the primary, you may vote early, if you choose, at the county Clerk's office through April 8, 1994. Remember, voting in each and every election is a good habit!

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
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Senior Citizens News

Contest Announced

Young people in Clarendon will have a chance to put their stamp on the world by participating in an environmental postage stamp design contest announced February 28, 1994, by the U.S. Postal Service and McDonald's family restaurants.

Local postmaster Lonnie Davis is looking forward to helping kids get involved in the contest. "I hope this effort opens a new world to our youth," said Postmaster Lonnie Davis. "Combining kids' interests in the environment and stamp collecting promises to be fun for everyone. I hope that many of our local youth participate in the contest, and who knows, maybe someone from Clarendon will be the winner!"

The contest invites kids from the 50 U.S. states and the District of Columbia, ages eight through 13 as of April 30, 1994, to design an official U.S. postage stamp depicting ways to protect, preserve or restore the environment.

Contest winners will join a small, select group of internationally acclaimed artists whose art has appeared on U.S. postage stamps. This contest marks the first time this generation of kids has had the opportunity to enter such a competition.

Two finalists will be selected from each of the states and the District of Columbia. Each will receive a \$100 U.S. Savings Bond (value at maturity) and a framed copy of their artwork. Four winners selected from the 102 finalists will receive the finalist prize and an additional \$3,000 in U.S. Savings Bonds (value at maturity), and a trip for three people to Washington, D.C. to attend the first day of issue stamp ceremony. Best of all, their design will be printed on millions of U.S. postage stamps.

Contest rules and entry forms will be available beginning March 4, at post offices and participating McDonald's restaurants nationwide. In addition, the Postal Service and McDonald's have sent environmental education kits to elementary and middle schools across the country. The kits include environmental education activities for teachers to use in the classroom.

Of the 50 million Americans who have ever collected stamps, most started their collections as children. Stamp collecting is the world's most popular hobby, and the environmental stamp design contest offers the Postal Service the opportunity to introduce the hobby to a new generation.

Students can participate in the contest if they are a legal U.S. residents and are ages eight through 13 as of April 30, 1994. Individuals unable to visit a post office or McDonald's may obtain official contest rules by sending a stamped, self-addressed envelope to "Stamp Rules," P.O. Box 689, Gibbstown, N.J. 08027-0689. Vermont residents need not affix return postage. No purchase is necessary. All entries must be mailed and received by April 30, 1994. Children of Postal Service or McDonald's employees are not eligible to participate.

Both the Postal Service and McDonald's have been recognized for their environmental achievements. The Postal Service operates the largest compressed natural gas (CNG) alternative fueled delivery fleet in the nation and recycles nearly 345,000 tons of waste each year, generating about \$1,350,000 million in revenue annually. McDonald's purchases approximately \$200 million worth of recycled products each year as part of an overall effort that earned the company the President's Environmental and Conservation Challenge Award in 1991.

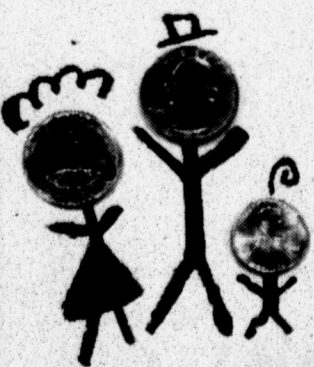
Medical Center News

"Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timber land!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the "production value" of their land rather than on its market value. This "productivity appraisal" means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber—not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property tax savings.

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal, you must apply to your local appraisal district by April 30 to take advantage of this benefit on your 1994 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it by April 30. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.

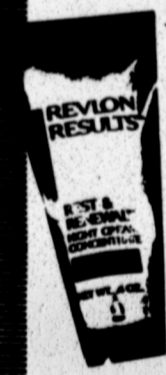

Minutes of the March 8, 1994, meeting were read, and upon a motion by Alderman McKinley Smith, seconded by Alderman Delmar Wiggs, said minutes were approved. Motion carried.

Mary Linn Bills gave the Library report. Motion was made by Alderman McKinley Smith, seconded by Alderman Mac Stavenhagen, to extend the library hours from 35 hours per week to 44 hours per week with no increase in the cost of salaries. Motion carried.

Ernie Johnston gave a report on the Solid Waste Recycling School in Lubbock he attended last week.

Motion was made by Alderman David Pitts, seconded by Alderman Mac Stavenhagen, to pass a resolution authorizing the submission of a grant application to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS, AUTHORIZING THE SUBMISSION OF A GRANT APPLICATION TO THE TEXAS NATURAL RESOURCE CONSERVATION COMMISSION (TNRCC) AND DESIGNATING THE CITY SECRETARY TO SERVE AS THE CITY'S CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER AND REPRESENTATIVE IN ALL MATTERS PERTAINING TO THIS APPLICATION.

WHEREAS, the TNRCC has established a program called Clean Cities 2000 which is intending to promote the voluntary institution of municipal programs in order to reduce the amount of solid waste being landfilled in Texas by 50 percent by the Year 2000; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Clarendon believes that as landfilling costs escalate in order to fulfill the compliance requirements of Subtitle D, the inclusion of alternative waste handling practices into the City's solid waste management system will become an effective means of curbing increases in residential solid waste fees; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Clarendon believes that programs which target the diversion and collection of materials for recycling will enable the City to control solid waste costs in the future while moving toward the TNRCC's goals of Clean Cities 2000; and

WHEREAS, a cooperative, multi-jurisdictional recycling program will also benefit the City's neighboring communities in Sub-regional Planning Area 5 of the Texas Panhandle; and

WHEREAS, funds are now available through the TNRCC's Clean Cities 2000 Community Waste Reduction and Recycling Grant Program which could be used to assist in the establishment of a multi-jurisdictional, recycling program that would serve several municipal governments in Sub-region 5.

NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Clarendon, Texas:

1. That an application is hereby authorized to be filed with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission to establish a multi-jurisdictional recycling program in Subregion 5 of the Texas Panhandle.

2. That the City, with the concurrence and consent of the Cities of Hedley and Howardwick, will serve as the lead agent and administrator for this project.

3. That should this application be funded, the City will work with the Cities of Hedley and Howardwick under a mutually acceptable Inter-Local Governmental Agreement.

4. That the City intends to support the continued operation of this program after the grant period has expired.

5. That every effort will be made to invite participation from the other municipalities in Subregion 5 not specifically mentioned as a co-operator of the project proposed in this application.

Social Security News

With apologies to Dave Letterman, here are the top ten things you should know about Social Security.

Number 10: Your Social Security benefit is based on your earnings, so make sure your employer is using your correct name and Social Security number when reporting your earnings to the government.

Number 9: Social Security is more than retirement. Disability coverage for people who can't work for a year or more and survivors benefits for the family members of a worker who has died are important and often overlooked parts of Social Security.

Number 8: When you work, you earn Social Security "credits," up to a maximum of four per year. Most people need 40 credits (10 years of work) to qualify for retirement benefits. Younger people need fewer credits for disability and survivors coverage.

Number 7: Social Security provides benefits to qualified family members of retired and disabled workers. Generally, children under 18 can get checks and so can a spouse who's 62 or older or who's caring for a minor child. In many cases, divorced spouses also get benefits.

Number 6: You can get an estimate of your Social Security benefits and a copy of your earnings history by calling 1-800-772-1213.

Number 5: Check with Social Security about a year before you plan to retire. In some cases, you can get retirement benefits even before you stop working.

Number 4: When you file for

retirement benefits, we need to see a certified copy of your birth certificate and your last W-2 form (or tax return if you're self-employed).

Number 3: Social Security should not be directly compared to private savings and pension programs because "social" objectives are a fundamental part of Social Security. For example, workers with low incomes get a benefit that represents a higher percentage of their earnings than do well-paid workers.

Number 2: You should not expect to live on your Social Security. The program was always intended to supplement, not replace, private pension plans and other savings and investments.

Number 1: Social Security will be there when you need it. Social security has changed a lot in the last 60 years and it undoubtedly will change in the next 60 years... but a basic program that provides benefits to retired people, to people with disabilities, and to the survivors of a worker who has died will always be the foundation of our society's income maintenance network.

Q: I have heard that people who are born on the first or second day of the month can collect an extra month of Social Security benefits when they retire? Is that true?

A: It's possible. According to the Social Security law, the earliest that you can be eligible for a retirement check is the full month you are 62. The law also says you "attain" your age the day before your birthday. So, if you were born June 2, for example, you legally attain your age on June 1 and you would be eligible for benefits for June because you're considered 62 for the entire month. Of course, if you were born on June 1, you also would receive benefits for June be-

cause you are age 62 the entire month.

Q: Can I use my TDD (Telecommunications Device for the Deaf) to call Social Security on the national Social Security toll-free voice line?

A: TDD use is limited to the special toll-free TDD service line. Voice calls should not be made to the TDD toll-free number and TDD calls should not be made to other Social Security numbers established for voice callers. The Social Security national TDD toll-free number is 1-800-325-0778, the Social Security toll-free number established for voice callers is 800-772-1213.

Q: Will my Social Security retirement benefit be based on how much I earned during my best 10 years of work?

A: No. Most individuals need about 10 years of work to be eligible for Social Security, but the benefit amount is based on many more years of earnings. For everyone born after 1928, it's based on the highest 35 years of earnings.

Q: If I work after I start receiving Social Security retirement benefits, will I have to pay FICA taxes?

A: Yes, and your extra earnings may increase your benefits. For additional information, call

your local Social Security office or Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213.

Q: My father, who receives Supplemental Security Income, just received an insurance settlement as a result of fire damage to his home. Must he report this money as income to Social Security?

A: No, As long as the money is used to repair the damage to his home, it doesn't count as income for SSI purposes.

Q: I found some old medical bills that I forgot to submit to Medicare for payment under my medical insurance. Can I still submit them or is there a time limit on when claims must be submitted?

A: You have at least 15 months from the date on which you receive the bill to submit it for payment under your medical insurance.

Q: My family doctor wants me to start getting pneumococcal vaccine every year. Will my Medicare medical insurance cover the cost?

A: Yes. Medical insurance will pay for the pneumococcal vaccine and its administration. Medicare will pay these charges regardless of whether you have met your annual medical insurance deductible.

On February 22, 1994, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company ("Southwestern Bell" or "Company") filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("Commission") to restructure the Company's Local Transport and Directory Transport categories of its Switched Access Service. This matter has been assigned to Docket No. 12784. The tariff sheets in Southwestern Bell's application, if approved, will bring the Company's intrastate Access Service Tariff into structural parity with the Company's interstate Tariff No. 73 for Local Transport. Southwestern Bell's companion interstate tariff became effective on January 1, 1994.

The transport rate elements provide for the transmission facilities between the customer's premises and the end office switch(es) where the customer's traffic is switched to originate or terminate the customer's communications.

Southwestern Bell proposes to implement the revised tariffs on a revenue neutral basis. Although the proposed tariff changes will affect all customers subscribing to Switched Access Service, the Local Transport and Directory Transport categories of Southwestern Bell's Switched Access Service is primarily for interexchange carriers. If approved, this application will result in an increase in Southwestern Bell's revenues of approximately \$1682.00 during the first year. Southwestern Bell proposes that the changes be effective on December 1, 1994.

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. Q: I understand that to get Social Security disability benefits, your disability must be expected to last at least a year. Does this mean that you must wait a year after being disabled before you can get benefits?

A: You do not have to wait a year after being disabled before you can get benefits. You should file as soon as you can after becoming disabled and benefits begin after a 5-month waiting period. The waiting period begins with the month Social Security decides your disability began.

Q: My two children and I have been receiving survivors benefits since my wife died. Will these benefits continue if I remarry?

A: Your remarriage would have no effect on the benefits being paid to your children. If you get benefits only because you are caring for your children, your benefits would end at the time of your remarriage unless you marry someone who is receiving Social Security benefits.

Social Security paid about \$30 billion in benefits in 1993. That's equal to about \$833 million per day or \$35 million per hour.

The average retired worker now receives \$659 monthly from Social Security.

Social Security's toll-free phone number for use by hearing-impaired callers using TDD equipment is 1-800-325-0778.

People who worked in the railroad industry for less than 10 years will have those earnings used in computing Social Security benefits.

It's estimated that 137.8 million workers will pay Social Security taxes in 1994.
