Donley Unit Makes PACE

"American Cancer Society volunteer in the Donley unit have reached their goal in public education for PACE," said Genevieve Caldwell, unit President.

PACE, or Priority Activities in Cancer Education, is a plan that spells out a basic Society public education program for a particular size unit. PACE helps units make the best use of volunteer power and other resources for cancer education. By concentrating on PACE objectives, units can reach people who need help most and deliver information effectively. The program focuses on themes where prevention or early detection and treatment saves the most lives.

In order to reach PACE status, community volunteers must reach 40 percent of the youth population and 10 percent of the adult population with American Cancer Society life-saving information. Messages about different types of cancer are delivered through educational programs in organizations, businesses, health service sites and other locations.

"This is a large undertaking, but one that volunteers in Donley feel is important and necessary to the health and welfare of our community," Caldwell said.

Coordinator Announced

United States Senate candidate Jim Mattox today announced Hon. Jean Taylor, Donley Democratic County Chair, as his





Pesticide Container Recycling Dates For 1994

The Texas pesticide container recycling program has established the spring and summer collection dates for 1994. The recycling program is a cooperative program with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, Texas Department of Agriculture and Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The containers must be clean and totally free of chemicals to be recycled. Producers are doing a better job of triple or pressure rinsing empty containers. The 1993 rejection rate for contaminated containers was 19% for plastic and 9% for metal containers. The container rejection rate for 1993 was approximately 35% lower than the 1992 rate. The container clean-up procedure works best if completed following immediate use of the pesticide. Old containers are difficult to clean if residue are allowed to dry into a sticky scum.

The Texas Pesticide Container program is now ranked third behind Mississippi and California in recycling empty containers. State-wide, Texas recycled 220,000 pounds of containers in 1993. This amount can be increased as producers are urged to recycle instead of burning or disposal in landfills. Landfill space in Texas continues to be more expensive.

The individual collection days are coordinated with County Extension Agents in respective counties. The recycling program is helping to clean up the Texas environment. Assistance provided to coordinate the container collection process during 1993 is appreciated. SCT Environmental, Inc. will continue to be the contractor for pesticide container recycling.





An open letter to the voters of the 100th Judicial District

For the first time within the memory of most local voters we have a contested race for District Attorney of the 100th Judicial District--comprised of Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley, and Hall counties. First among the duties and responsibilities of a District Attorney in Texas is the prosecution of persons charged in State District Court with the commission of felony level crimes. Felony level crimes are the most serious kinds of crimes--crimes for which, if convicted, a person may be sent to prison, as opposed to merely being fined or sent to county jail. It is difficult to over-emphasize the value of a good District Attorney to the citizens of this district. We have been blessed in past years with quality representation.

By law, candidates for the office of District Attorney must meet only two standards in order to qualify for the office. They must be licensed to practice law in the state, and be residents of the district for which they seek office. Other criteria which voters may consider--but which are not mandatory--are ability, dedication, experience, personal integrity, life style, etc. Personal tastes of the voter notwithstanding, a candidate's ability, etc., notwithstanding, if the candidate does not meet the minimum standards mandated by law, the candidate is not qualified to serve--he or she is disqualified.

Randall Sims, one of the candidates for District Attorney of our district was not a resident of the district for the requisite period of time before the filing deadline. Mr. Sims lived and worked in Amarillo (Potter County) until the first of the year. The law requires that the candidate live continuously in the District for six months before the filing deadline--which was January 3, 1994. Therefore, to be a qualified candidate, Mr. Sims has to reside continuously in the district from July 3, 1993 to January 3, 1994. In the spring of 1993, Mr. Sims expressed his intentions to run as a Republican candidate against Randy Sherrod for Randall County District Attorney. His claims that he "intended" to reside in the 100th District are all form and no substance. By law, residence is a matter of intention, volition (making a decision), and action. His assertions that he "intended" to live in this district is directly contradicted by the factual "action" of living and working in Potter County.

If you think this qualification criterium is not a serious matter, think back to the recent highly publicized indictment of U.S. Senator, Kay Bailey Hutchinson. The indictment of Senator Hutchinson has to be redone because one of the twelve grand jurors who considered her case was disqualified by law from serving on a grand jury. Just think how the disqualification issue could disrupt the criminal justice system in this district when indictments and convictions are sought by a disqualified District Attorney.

The only qualified candidate for District Attorney of this district is Jim Shelton. Jim was born and raised in Childress and has lived and practiced law in Clarendon continuously since 1984. Not only is Jim "qualified" by law--he is qualified by any standard by which you and I, as voters, may measure a candidate. The Governor of the State of Texas selected Jim over all other applicants, including Randall Sims, for the office of District Attorney for the 100th Judicial District. Jim has all the proven ability, dedication, experience, and in-

tegrity we have a right to expect from any man or woman who ever sought a public office. If you have any questions about the fact, ask anyone who know him.




