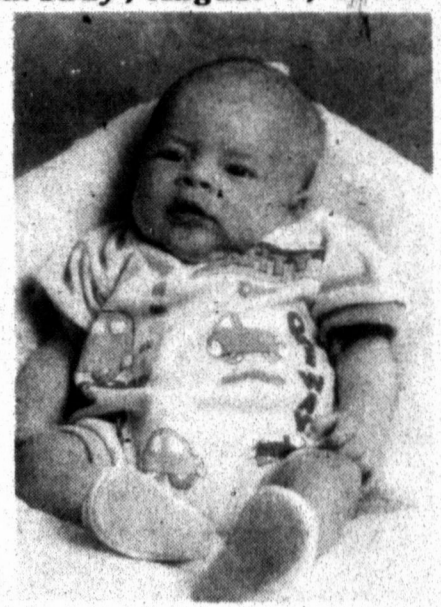

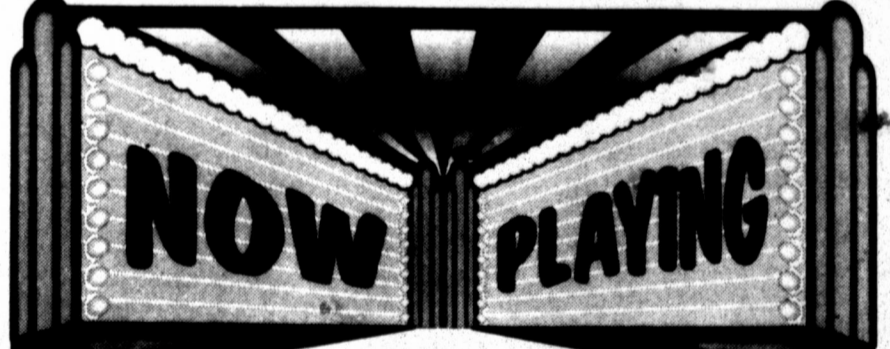

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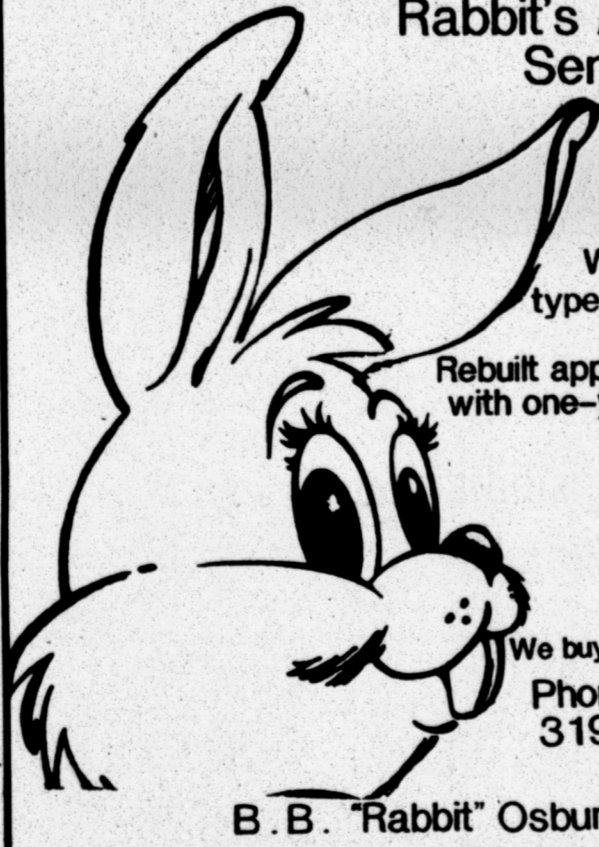

Dr. Dobson Answers Your Questions

QUESTION: What answer do you have for those who say being a mother and a housewife is boring and monotonous?

DR. DOBSON: They are right—but we should recognize that every other occupation is boring, too.

How exciting is the work of a telephone operator who plugs and unplugs switchboard connections all day long? Or a medical pathologist who examines microscopic slides and bacterial cultures from morning to night? Or a dentist who spends his or her lifetime drilling and filling? Or an attorney who reads dusty books in secluded libraries? Or an author who writes page after page?

Few of us enjoy heart-thumping excitement each moment of our professional lives. On a trip to Washington, D.C., a few weeks ago, my hotel was located next to the room of a famous cellist who was in the city to give a classical concert that evening. I could hear him through the walls as he practiced hour after hour.

He did not play beautiful symphonic renditions; he repeated scales and runs and exercises over and over and over. The practice began early in the morning (believe me!) and continued until the time of his concert. As he strolled on the stage that evening, I'm sure many individuals in the audience thought to themselves, "What a glamorous life." Some glamour.

I happen to know that he spent the entire day in his lonely room in the company of his cello. Musical instruments, as you know, are terrible conversationalists.

No, I doubt if the job of a housewife and mother is much more boring than most other jobs, particularly if the woman refuses to be isolated from adult contact. But as far as the importance of the assignment is concerned, no job can



compete with the responsibility of shaping and molding a new human being.

May I remind mothers of one more important consideration: you will not always be saddled with the responsibility you now hold. Your children will be with you for a few brief years and the obligations you now shoulder will be nothing more than dim memories.

Enjoy every moment of these days—even the difficult times—and indulge yourself in the satisfaction of having done an essential job right!

QUESTION: Some parents feel guilty about demanding respect from their children because it could be an underhanded way of making themselves feel powerful and important. What do you think?

DR. DOBSON: I disagree. It is important that a child respect his parents because that relationship provides the basis for his attitude toward other people.

His view of parental authority becomes the cornerstone for his later outlook on school authority, police and the law, the people with whom he will eventually live and work, and for society in

general. Another equally important reason for maintaining parental respect is that if you want your child to accept your values when he reaches his teen years, then you must be worthy of his respect during his younger days.

When a child can successfully defy his parents during his first 15 years, laughing in their faces and stubbornly flaunting their authority, he develops a natural contempt for them.

"Stupid old Mom and Dad! I've got them wound around my little finger. Sure, they love me, but I really think they're afraid of me."

A child may not utter these words, but he feels them each time he outsmarts his adult companions and wins the confrontations and battles. Later, he is likely to demonstrate his disrespect in a more open manner. His parents are not deserving of his respect, and he does not want to identify with anything they represent. He rejects every vestige of their philosophy.

Parents must first sell themselves. If they are not worthy of respect, then neither is their country, their morals, their governments, their religion or any of their values. This becomes the "generation gap" at its most basic level.

Hedley ISD Lunch Prices Given

Reduced price meals for children served under the National School Lunch Program, Commodity School Program and School Breakfast Program. The School Administration office has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The household size and income criteria identified below will be used to determine the eligibility for free and reduced price benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals. Foster children that are the legal responsibility of a welfare agency or court may also be eligible for benefits regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Eligibility for the foster child is based on the child's income.

Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced price meals for their children. Applications also are available at the principal's office in each school. To apply for free and reduced price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Applications may be submitted anytime during the school year. The information households provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and verification of data. Applications may be verified by the school officials at any time during the school year.

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced price benefits, households receiving food stamps or AFDC only have to list their child's name, food stamp or AFDC Case number and an adult household member must sign the application. Households who do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, how often the person receives it and the social security number of either the primary wage earner responsible for the care of the child on the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If neither household member has a social security number, the household member must indicate that a social security number is not available. The application must be signed by an adult household member.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price meal policy the reviewing official will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling, or the official, may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to Superintendent Philip Dodd in the School Administration Office or phone 856-5323.

Households that list a food stamp or AFDC case number must report when the household no longer received these benefits. Other households approved for benefits based on income information must report increases in household income or over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, nation origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

Cosmetology Program Enters Final Months of Operation

This year will see the final chapter of Clarendon College's Cosmetology Program come to an end. The program has been a part of the college's vocational offerings for 21 years. A tentative close date of December 1 is planned.

The Clarendon College Board of Regents and Administration based the program's closing on three major factors. The most important being the retirement of Cosmetology Instructor Virginia James. James plans to retire after completion of her current class. The following factors were derived from a site visit to the cosmetology program by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) in January of 1992.

The need for equipment updates and renovation of the cosmetology facilities. Estimates indicate that the THECB mandates would cost between \$40,000 and \$50,000 to implement.

The cosmetology program's "institutional effectiveness" in the area of student placement rates. THECB adopted criteria and standards in 1991 that require successful student outcomes for each active technical program in order to receive state funding an average student placement rate of 85% must be achieved. The cosmetology

program has recorded a placement rate of only 79% of its graduates.

The site visit was a routine evaluation of state-funded technical programs. Following the visit, THECB recommended a "sunset review". This status allowed the college to continue offering cosmetology while addressing the areas of concern in the report.

Following the report, the Board of Regents and College Administrators discussed at length the THECB review and the future needs of Clarendon College. It was determined that closure of the program was inevitable due to the monetary mandates of the recommendations, the unforeseen turnaround in student placement rates resulting in a total loss of all state funding for the program and retirement of the program's instructor.

Decisions of this nature and magnitude are difficult for the Board and Administrators. Both bodies fully understand the impact closing cosmetology or any other technical program would have on

those within the college's community. However, one must remember that in order to maintain an efficient and frugal institution decisions must be made that are in the best interest of the college's future.


