State Purchases Property Near Lelia Lake

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) is pleased to announce the purchase of 530 acre property near Lelia Lake known to local residents as Taylor Lakes. The property is located in Donley County approximately 5 1/2 miles southeast of Clarendon or approximately 1/4 miles northwest of Lelia Lake on U.S. 287. It will be managed by TPWD's Wildlife Branch as a unit of the Playa Lakes Wildlife Management Area.

The Playa Lakes Wildlife Management area now consists of three units: Armstrong Playa and the Dimmitt Unit in Castro County and the new Taylor Lakes Unit. According to Jim Ray, TPWD's Regional Waterfowl Biologist and Area Manager of the Playa Lakes WMA, the prominent features of the Taylor Lakes Unit are three natural lakes plus other "wet areas as well as typical Rolling Plains habitats. "The three lakes," Ray said, "have long been recognized by biologists, hunters and bird watchers as important to a variety of wildlife, especially ducks and geese, and occasionally swans."

TPWD's Wildlife Management Areas are managed to protect and enhance Texas' natural resources, allow for research and demonstration and to provide for public use where appropriate. According to Ray, the Taylor Lakes Unit can provide a quality place for all of these.

According to Ray, the Taylor Lakes acquisition is special because it will serve as one of the focal points for the Playa Lakes Joint Venture as part of the prestigious North American Waterfowl Management Plan.

The North American Waterfowl Management Plan is a continent-wide, cooperative effort of federal and state agencies, and private interests dedicated enhancement of waterfowl numbers and wetland habitats. The Playa Lakes Joint Venture was formed as a cooperation effort of these interests to address issues in that area known as the Playa Lakes region of Texas, New Mexico, Colorado, Kansas and Oklahoma.

The TPWD and the Playa Lakes Joint Venture will dedicate the Taylor Lakes acquisition on February 1, 1994, at 4:00 p.m.

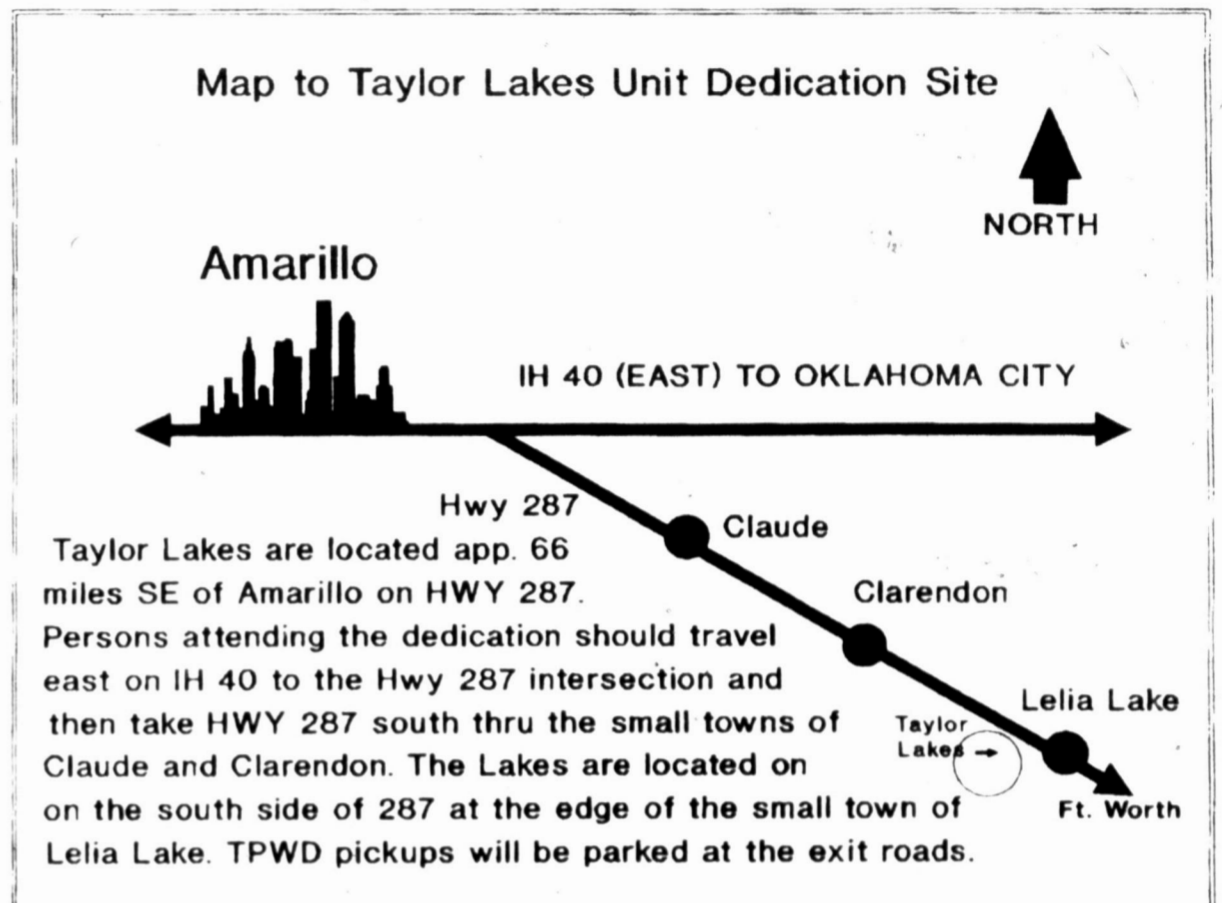
Computer Shortcourse Offered

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service is offering a computer shortcourse in Quicken7 February 9-10. Quicken7 is an inexpensive, easy to use record keeping program that is widely used by agricultural producers. In this two day course participants use a case study to learn to use Quicken7 in a hands on setting. Participants will enter transactions in the register and write check screens. They will learn to categorize by type of income and expense, to split and memorize transactions, and to develop meaningful reports. Tips for use will be discussed throughout the course. No prior computer experience is necessary.

Registration fee is \$75 for the two day course. The registration fee covers computer lease payments and teaching materials for the course. Couples are encouraged to attend and will be charged only one registration fee if they share one computer. Registration will be limited to the first 14 participants to provide hands on experience for all participants.

The shortcourse will be held at the Clarendon College Barfield Building. Participants must register by February 1, by calling the Donley County Extension Office at 874-2141. You must send a check when you register to Box 682 Clarendon, Tx. 79226 to reserve your place in the course. If there is not adequate participation the course will be canceled and the checks returned.

Taylor Lakes are located app. 66 miles SE of Amarillo on HWY 287.

Persons attending the dedication should travel east on IH 40 to the Hwy 287 intersection and then take HWY 287 south thru the small towns of Claude and Clarendon. The Lakes are located on the south side of 287 at the edge of the small town of Lelia Lake. TPWD pickups will be parked at the exit roads.

Students Fare Well On Tests

Students at Clarendon CISD performed above the state average on the state mandated achievement tests at every level and in every subject area tested. The Texas Assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) results are used in the evaluation of school districts. These results infer that Clarendon students are learning at at satisfactory or superior level. Results are expressed in terms of the percent of students passing each part of the TAAS. Students in grades 3, 7, and 10 or EXIT Level took the TAAS in the 1992-93 school year.

In grade 3, students not only scored above the state average in every category, but increased their scores over the previous year's local levels. Math and reading scores were above the state goal of 90% of all students passing those sections.

Grade 7 also scored above the state average in all areas while scoring above the previous year's local scores on the math and writing sections.

Grade 10 or EXIT Level students exceeded the state average in every area and surpassed the 90% state goal in reading and writing. EXIT scores also increased over the previous year scores in each category.

These statistics and other information about the school district were included in the Academic Excellence Indicator System (AEIS) Annual report as presented at the public hearing prior to the board meeting on Thursday, January 13. Copies of this report are available at the school, Clarendon Public Library, Clarendon City Hall, as well as being provided to the news media.

FMHA Moves To Speed Up Processing


"Texas Farmers applying for assistance from Farm Home Administration (FmHA) will experience a breath of fresh air this year," George Ellis, FmHA Texas State Director, said today.

"I have today taken action to delegate the full loan approval authority allowed under the Federal Regulations to FmHA County Offices in Texas," Ellis said.

This action means that FmHA Supervisors at the County level will be able to exercise loan approval authority up to the full County limit without prior reviews being required at other locations or even by FmHA officials at the same location.

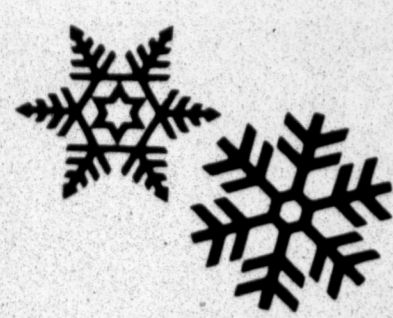

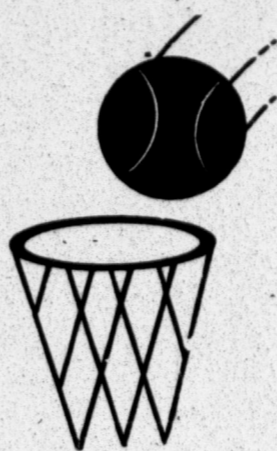


