T-Rex Named Sue

On August 12, 1990, Susan Henderson, collector for Black Hills Institute of Geological Research, Inc., Peter Larson, President of the institute, Terry Wentz, a staff member at the institute, Peter's son and his nephew were out looking for dinosaur bones, on a ranch near Faith, South Dakota, on land adjoining pasture leased by DeJuan Strickland of Clarendon. They had a turn of bad luck when they noticed their truck tire was flat, the spare was flat and the tire pump was not working. Everyone, except Susan went to town to have the tire fixed. Meanwhile, Susan went exploring for other possible sites to dig, she was about two miles from camp, when she looked down and saw several bone fragments laying on the ground, she looked up to the top of the cliff, where she noticed several large vertebrae. She quickly went back to camp for the others, who had return from town. After returning to the cliff with Susan, they concluded that she had found the remains of a Tyrannosaurus Rex, which they named "Sue", after Susan Henderson because she discovered her. It took seventeen days to collect the bones from the cliff, when her skull and the sandstone was removed, huge dark teeth were discovered, which confirmed that Sue was indeed a Tyrannosaurus. Sue was the largest and most complete fossil every found, she was 90% complete. Her skull would fit in a full size pick-up. Her eyes were small compared to her head, but, the T-Rex have the largest eyes of all other dinosaurs. Because she had a large optical nerve canal, it is thought that the T-Rex had excellent eye sight, which helped with hunting. Her skull indicated that she was able to catch and hold her prey alive. Her teeth were described as huge, slightly round with minute notches or steak knife like teeth with a called Saw Teeth, which was probably used for tear up meat. She was the first T-Rex to have a complete shoulder blade and coracoid attached together and her forelimb bone was the first discovered in the world. Almost all bones in the right forelimb were preserved. There were 37 vertebrae found with Sue, there was a joint on the back of the last bone, which indicated her caudal Vertebrae (tailbone) was not complete. Her legs were 3.3 meters long.

Deidi is the daughter of DeJuan Strickland, of Clarendon, and the granddaughter of former residents, the late Clarence and Eddie Strickland.

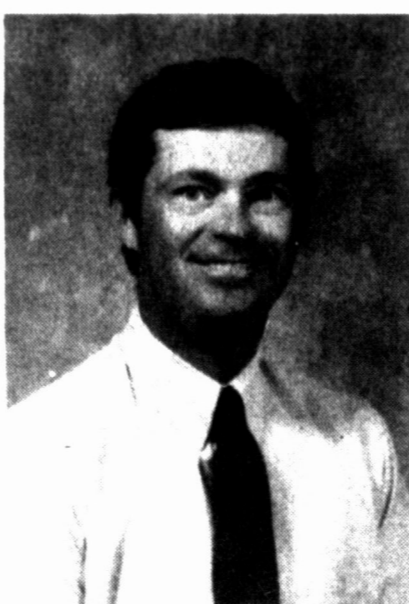

Memorial Day Report Completed

24 people lost their lives over the Memorial Day Weekend in traffic accidents across Texas, according to Trooper L. B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Department of Public Safety in Amarillo. The count is lower than the projected 35 but obviously higher than need be, says Snider. Snider credits publicity as a primary aid to the lower than expected death count.

One vehicle accidents were the leading type of fatal accidents at 11 taking 11 lives. Seven two vehicle wrecks claimed eight lives. There were three pedestrian fatalities. As expected speed was the leading cause, being a factor in 13 of these wrecks with alcohol known to contribute to at least seven. Right of way, turning and overtaking figured into five of the fatalities, which Snider advises inattention as a primary element of these wrecks.

Snider notes this is the lowest memorial day weekend death count through 1991 and asks motorists to continue to buckle their safety belts, operate at safe speeds and be alert to help ensure

a safe start for the summer weather driving season now upon us.

Sues bones show evidence of many injuries they were: 1) Her leg was broken at one time and healed. 2) The 29th and 30th vertebrae were injured, indicating they may have been broken during mating. 3) There was a tooth of another animal still lodged in her rib. 4) Her skull and lower jaws showed signs of being injured. The cause of her death was believed to be from an injury to the left side of her face. Her face was literally torn off.

The answer to what the Tyrannosaurus ate was found in Sue's stomach contents, which is believed to be a well preserved Edmontosaurs, a plant eating dinosaur.

In April of 1992, a second T-Rex skeleton was found by Stan Sacraison of the Black Hill Institute. This Tyrannosaurus was believed to be male. They named him Stan.

Sue is believed to be a female Tyrannosaurus Rex. The discovery of Sue started an investigation into the differences in the sexes of the Tyrannosaurus. Tyrannosaurus Rex's come in two different types, the Robust type (heavier built type) and the Gracil type (lighter built type). It is believed that female T-Rex's are heavier built than males.

Was the Tyrannosaurus Rex a loner, maybe but, Sue was found with a adult male, juvenile, and a baby (smallest in the world) all were Tyrannosaurus, which raises the question of did the T-Rex live in a group as a family.

Sue was confiscated by the Federal Government on May 14, 1992, and is now stored at the South Dakota School of mines Museum of National History in Rapid City.

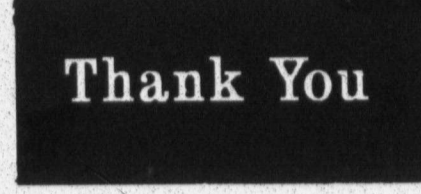
