## Ribbon Cutting Ceremony Held

On May 26, 1994 the Texas Panhandle Mental Health Authority, hosted an open house at the Clarendon Center. The center is located at 111 South Kearney.

The Texas Panhandle Mental Health Authority is a network of services available to a 21 county area in the Texas Panhandle providing programs to meet community needs in mental health and substance abuse. This is accomplished by qualified mental health care professionals on staff plus the contracted services of psychiatrists and a clinical psychologist.

Their mission is to provide help and hope to the people of the Texas Panhandle who strive to overcome the problems and disabilities of mental illness and to enhance the mental health of others in need. TPMHA will accomplish its mission by providing opportunities, resources and the support necessary to empower people with mental illness to live satisfying, independent and productive lives and to enjoy the same rights, freedoms, and responsibilities of other persons.

The Clarendon Regional Outpatient Center provides mental health services for a four county area serving Hall, Armstrong, Donley and Collingsworth counties. The Clarendon Center is the only regional center in TPMHA that houses both clinical and community rehabilitation services under one roof.

The clinical program provides mental health services for crisis counseling, evaluation, monitoring, and outpatient care directly within the communities served. A TPMHA psychiatrist travels to the Clarendon Center for medication clinic guaranteeing quality mental health care to the regional clients who are on medication.

The Clarendon Community Rehabilitation Program provides Psychosocial and Supporting Housing Services for those clients who qualify. Transportation to and from the program is provided by Panhandle Transit for those who do not have a means to travel.

The 18 Clients of the Clarendon Community Rehabilitation Center aptly named their program "Our Place." The doors are open from 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Monday through Thursday. Each day at noon the clients fix a hot meal within the limited resources of the kitchen area of "Our Place." In 1993 the TPMHA Rehabilitation Center formed a sports network. The "Our Place" baseball team was called "The Stinkers," and they won 2nd place in the TPMHA play-offs. All the clients participated either playing or cheering. This year's newest project was gardening. A small plot of ground was plowed, planted and maintained by the clients. The flowers in front of the building were also planted and cared for by the clients.

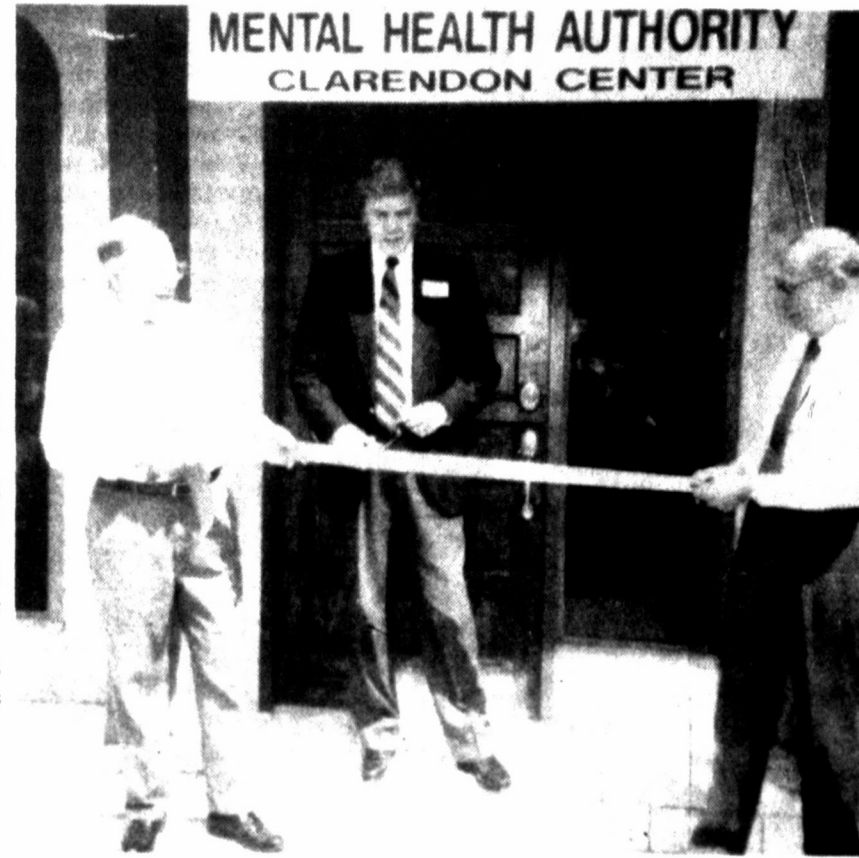
## Summer Reading Club Planned

## Clarendon College Growing for the Future

Enrollment numbers at Clarendon College took a positive turn this year as the main campus saw an 8% increase in students registered at the beginning of the 1993-1994 school year. Trends indicate that an influx of students at the junior college level is likely due to the costs and enrollment requirements set by many four-year institutions. Clarendon College is striving to meet the challenges of increased enrollment with the expansion of current facilities, visions of new facilities in Pampa and Childress, teaching of academic courses in the prison system, addition of vocational offerings, and an increase in endowed scholarship funds. Listed below are details about these possible "growth generators" for Clarendon College.

**New Dormitory Facility:** The college is undergoing its first housing addition since 1970. Last fall's enrollment increase created a housing shortage and led the college to the construction of an 8 room 16-bed facility to be completed this fall. This dorm will allow the college versatility and flexibility for overflow housing. It will also provide the option of married couple housing. The new facility design will pattern the architectural style of all campus buildings and is designed for expansion.

**Pampa Center:** Clarendon College is considering the option of building a new facility or using existing facilities in Pampa to improve the potential of class offerings. The college received a land contribution. This contribution will serve as the foundation for writing grant proposals for additional money to fund the building project. All money to build the structure will be raised privately through foundations and support from the community of Pampa. Current law states that money from the Donley County taxing district can't be used to build or renovate facilities out of the taxing district.

**Childress Vocational Center:** With the possible expansion of vocational offerings in Childress, the college is looking at facilities to house two programs. In Childress, the college offers licensed vocational nursing and is in the process of seeking grant approval to add secretarial science. All academic

## Open House Held

The Panhandle Community Action held an Open House and Ribbon Cutting Ceremony, Thursday, May 26.

Panhandle Community Service is an advocate and supporter for families needing assistance. They maintain a watchful eye in the Panhandle communities to gaps in basic human needs. They strive to promote programs for insuring personal independence.

Panhandle Community Services is a private, non-profit Community Action Agency chartered in 1966 under the provisions of the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964. Some programs are limited by income qualifying guidelines while others do not.

The Panhandle Community Service agency has many programs available, some of these programs that are available in Clarendon are: Temporary Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP), commonly called "Commodity Program", distributes USDA food surplus products to supplement family tables; Emergency Nutrition/Temporary Emergency Relief Program (ENTERP), provides vouchers for perishable and non-perishable food for home consumption. After all other resources are exhausted, utility service payments can be made for clients with

The Groom is a former Clarendon resident and the Grandson of Dan and Edna Perdue.

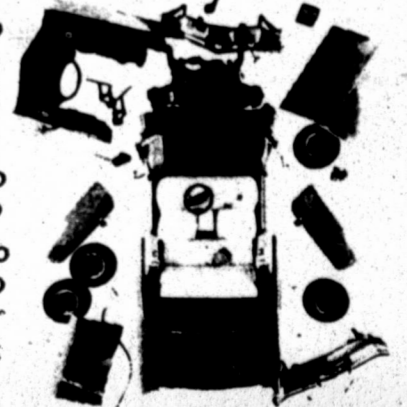

The Psychosocial Program provides the opportunities needed to work on socialization and community living skills by interaction with staff, volunteers, speakers and other "Our Place" participants. The educational and instructional programs such as crafts, cooking, personal hygiene, housekeeping, sports and games provide social events and/or structures learning programs within not only the local center and community, but throughout the entire TPMHA network of centers and communities.

The Supported Housing Program assists clients who are homeless or have recently returned to the community and have no other

means of support and/or housing.

The educational and instructional programs offered by the Community Rehabilitation Centers are limited by the amount of the support and resources that area available within the communities in which they serve. Future programs are developed as individual and group need are ascertained and resources become avail-

able. Clients and staff work together to establish "Our Place" rules, policies and future goals. Listed is a "Wish List" compiled by staff and clients addressing current unmet needs and their wish to fulfill those needs in order to live satisfying, independent and productive lives and to enjoy the same rights, freedoms and responsibilities as other person. The items needed are: 1) A fully operational kitchen. 2) A pantry for emergency food items to assist clients who have no income or other means of support. 3) A supply of personal hygiene items. 4) Pet food for clients who enjoy the companionship of pets. 5) Sports equipment to assist in the sports program. 6) Craft items. 7) Board games, cards, etc. 8) New and good used clothing.

TPMHA is funded through contracts with Texas Department of Mental Health Mental Retardation, local funding, gifts, donations, in-kind monies and client fees. Clients fees are on a sliding scale basis depending on total income and family size. No one is denied services because of inability to pay. Approximately 75 new cases are opened each month. Services are provided for an average of 2,500 clients a month.

TPMHA operates under the auspices of the Texas Department of Mental Health Mental Retardation.

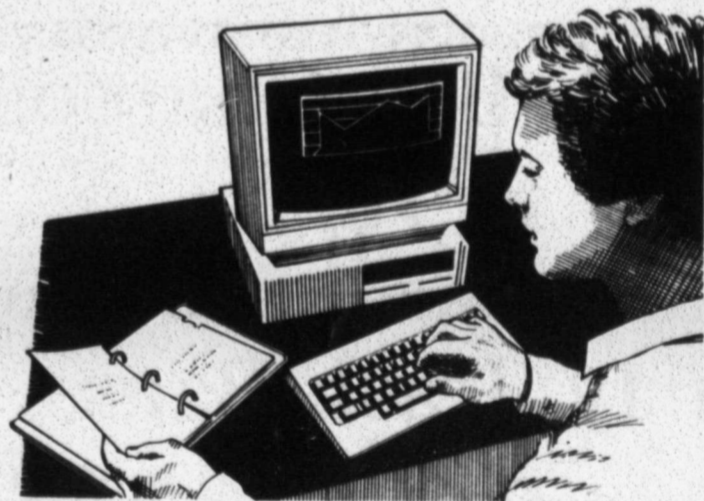

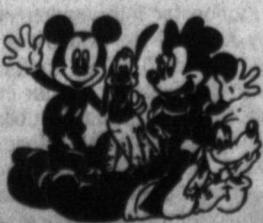

## Property Owners Receive 1994 Value Notices

Texas property owners have the right to information about changes in their property's value. On May 20, 1994, Donlev County

Appraisal District mailed 2,477 property owners notices showing their 1994 proposed value. Property owners should recognize recognize that the notice of appraised value is not a tax bill.

The appraisal notice shows the land's value and any improvement value for the property for the current year. An improvement is a building, structure, fence or any other type of fixture to the land. Some taxpayers also received notices on personal property. The appraisal notice includes current year information on exemptions

granted on the property. It also provides last year's value.

Notices to property owners whose values changed will include "estimated" taxes. These "estimated" taxes are based on the new value and last year's tax rates. Generally, taxing units set final 1994 tax rates in August and September.

Property owners should look carefully at the legal description and mailing address to be sure the information is correct. Property owners are responsible for informing the appraisal district of the correct mailing address.

Property owners in the Donley Appraisal District will have an opportunity to protest proposed appraisals of their property. The district's appraisal review board (ARB) will hear taxpayer protests on July 6, 1994. After the ARB completes its hearings and approves final property appraisals, local governments will use these appraisals to set tax rates for 1994.

The ARB is a group of citizens who live in the appraisal district and are appointed by the district's board of directors. Their responsibilities are outlined in the Texas Constitution.

In order to have a hearing with the ARB, the property owner must file a written notice to protest. The taxpayer must file this notice by June 20. Official forms for a notice of protest are available at the appraisal district office.

Each protesting property owner may offer evidence or argument, either in person or by filing an affidavit with the ARB. Property owners should know that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or spending and will not hear protests on these topics.

The ARB will schedule hearings as property owners file protests and will tell them the time, date and place of their individual hearings at least 15 days before the hearing date. Property owners also will receive a copy of the State Comptroller of Public Account's pamphlet entitled Texas Property Taxes: Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies & Responsibilities and a copy of the ARB's procedures.

Those protesting their appraisals should not contact ARB members outside the hearing. Each ARB member must sign an affidavit that he or she has had no contact about the protest with a property owner or the appraisal office staff before the hearing.

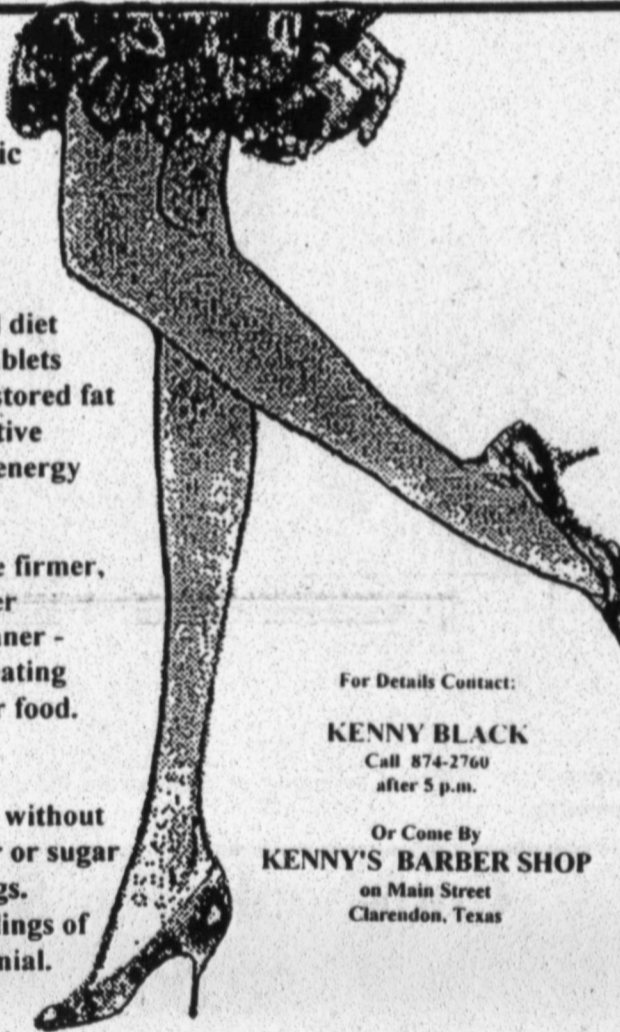

The prospect of a new facility to house all Clarendon College offerings in Childress will be considered if the funds can be raised.

**Jordan Prison Unit** - Clarendon College will begin teaching college courses at the Jordan Unit in Pampa beginning this fall. Approximately 6 to 10 classes will be taught on a tri-semester basis to the prison's inmates. The classes will be offered during the evening hours.

at the prison facility. Full-time and part-time faculty members will be used to teach the courses. At the present time, there are 194 eligible prisoners. The potential exists for prisoners, who meet the college eligibility requirements, to be transferred to the Jordan Unit to take the college offerings. The future could possibly see 300 to 400 students being taught through this program. The college could receive significant monetary benefit from this teaching avenue.

**Capital Campaign** - Competition for the outstanding prospective college students continues to increase. This factor led the Clarendon College Foundation Bard to embark upon a \$1 million endowed scholarship campaign in the fall of 1993. The five-year goal was selected so the college can secure its goal during the year in which the college will celebrate its 100 years of educational service. To date, \$160,000 has been pledged toward the capital campaign. Funds garnered will be awarded in the form of scholarships to the outstanding students of Clarendon College.

**Nursing Program Grant** - The Amarillo Area Don and Sybil Harrington foundations awarded a grant in the amount of \$52,874 for the purchase of equipment and materials for the licensed vocational nursing programs of Clarendon College. The college used the grant for the nursing programs located in Clarendon, Childress and Shamrock. The college is dedicated to providing quality instruction for students interested in licensed vocational nursing. Since 1973, the college has produced a track record of achievement in training skilled and capable healthcare workers.

**Heating and Cooling Update** - Efficiency is an important concern for Clarendon College. Some campus buildings are in need of improvements to help save money and increase the comfort of the conditioning systems in the Administration Building, Knorpp Hall, Vaughn Hall and Phelan Hall. Lighting will also be changed to enhance energy conservation.

Clarendon College must constantly look for "growth generators" to meet student needs and state mandates. The college is poised to enter the 21st century. The implementation of the college's present visions will ensure its arrival as a first-class community college in the future.
