Greg Collins Chosen As Semifinalist

For more than 110,000 applicants nationwide, Greg Collins has been chosen as a semifinalist in the 1993-94 Coca-Cola Scholars Program.

As one of the 1,814 semifinalists, chosen for their balance of leadership, character and achievement in school and the community, Greg must complete by February 1 additional material, which will be screened by the Program Review Committee. If selected as one of the 150 Coca-Cola Scholars, Greg will attend the national competition in Atlanta from April 14-16 to compete for designation as a national or regional scholar. The 50 national scholars will receive awards of \$20,000 and the 100 regional scholars will receive \$4,000.

This program, which is the largest business-sponsored scholarship program in the country with an annual outlay of \$1.4 million, is funded by participating Coca-Cola bottlers and The Coca-Cola Company.

Stock Reduction Set

The Board of Directors of Rolling Plains PCA has reduced the stock requirements for borrowing from the Association effective January 1, 1994. The stock purchase requirement, which has

been 10% for a number of years, now will be reduced to 5%. This means that the borrowers' required investment in the Association will be just 50% of what it has been in the past, and the PCA will return some \$3,000,000 to 730 borrowers in 19 counties of the Rolling Plains.

Rolling Plains PCA serves it borrowing members from six branch offices and a central office. Its Board of Directors is elected by the member-borrowers, and its staff of 24 employees were all raised on farms, ranches, or in farming communities of the Rolling Plains.

As of the close of business December 31, 1993, the Association will enjoy a net profit after taxes of \$980,000 with a loan volume of \$57,000,000 and total capital accounts of \$17,050,000. The entity has been selected as a Teir IPAC for the sixth consecutive year based on safety, soundness and financial strength.

Noble, a former member of the Wharton City Council, is chairman of the division of health and natural science at Wharton County Junior College. She is a past president of the Wharton Chamber of Commerce and headed the Leadership Wharton program.

For the statewide women's program, Noble attended a year-long series of sessions during 1993 and explored such topics as efficiency and service in government, critical needs along the Texas-Mexico border, standards of living in the 21st century, and balancing economic and environmental issues in Texas.

As an alumna of the program, she will have the opportunity to continue her leadership development experience through participation in the Leadership Texas Alumnae Association which offers development and networking opportunities to its membership of 900 women.

On December 10, 1993 I was traveling from Denver, Colorado to Florida. I had left Denver at 5:00 a.m., and was just

one mile from Clarendon when I felt very sleepy with the sun coming in the window and the long driving time. I thought to myself that I would stop in Clarendon, take a break, get some coffee and stretch awhile. The next thing I knew I was off the right side of the road trying to get my car under control. I real-

ize now I had just gone to sleep and all just happened so quickly. I was in the process of moving to Florida so I had a U-Haul I was towing. When I got the car stopped I was in the median and the U-Haul had evidently turned over but then it had righted itself. It has burst open on impact. My possessions were scattered over a large area on both the median and the road. I was not hurt and my car was not badly. I did not know how I was going to clean up that awful mess.

The people began stopping to help. Someone had a car phone and called the State Patrol. Officer Jerry Morris arrived and after assuring himself that I was not injured, radioed in that help was needed to clear up the area. I was and still am amazed at the response from the people of Clarendon. Fifteen wonderful folks brought boxes from stores in town, their cars and trucks and pitched in. We put all the broken dishes, etc. in large boxes and someone took it all to the dump for me, others loaded everything that remained into more boxes and them into a horse trailer. Jim Formway, from Chamberlain Motor Company towed the wrecked U-Haul into his warehouse and stored it and the horse trailer until I could arrange for another to be brought in from Amarillo. I went to the sheriff's office in town to call U-Haul and the two ladies there offered me a cup of coffee and help in any way I may have needed. I regret I did not get their names but I want to thank them at this time also. The Western Skies Motel was recommended and after I registered there I was called by Mr. Formway to assure me he would help me as soon as the new U-Haul arrived. Later that evening he and his son-in-law and the U-haul worked for hour putting all my things into the U-Haul. The next morning as I was ready to leave,

officer Morris met me with a few things we had missed the day before in the clean-up. He was so very concerned and assured me he and others had gone back to the site and made sure everything and been located and returned to me.

I want to thank all of the people who helped me on that day and tell them that their generous efforts will never be forgotten. I and my family will always keep you in our prayers.

I have most of the names of the people I wish to thank and if any are not noted please know I mean this for all of you.

First, Jerry Morris, your caring and support was given to me when I really needed it the most. I appreciate so very much. God Bless you.

Next, Ruby Jewel Hardin, you were the first person to answer officer Morris' call. You graciously offered your pickup truck for whatever need I had. You came to help and you remained with me until the very last thing had been done. You gave me a big hug and wished me the best for the rest of my trip. I thank you and wish you a wonderful New Year.

Also, Jim Formway, your help was invaluable. I was so relieved when you moved everything into town and then continued to help later that evening. You made all the problems seem a lot lighter for me. Thank you again.

Finally, the generous folks of Clarendon, you will never be forgotten: Mutt Graham, Terry Ashcraft, Benny Osburn, Steve Smith, Fu Benavidez, Delmer Wiggs, Shane Ashcraft, Jeremy Powell, Brendon Moffitt, Chris McKinney, Zack Robertson, Jeff Nickles.

competitions. While in school, he also clerked one summer in Childress for retired Judge John T. Forbis.

Upon graduation from Texas Tech University School of Law, Sims became a Potter County Prosecutor where he initially prosecuted juvenile offenders and handled more juvenile offenders in eight months than had been previously handled in over a two year period. Throughout his life, he has continued to work on the family owned ranch. He is a member of the Texas District and County Attorneys association, National District Attorneys Association, State Bar of Texas, Phi Alpha Delta Legal Fraternity, and the Serious

Habitual Offender Comprehensive Action Program for juvenile offenders. He has also enjoyed teaching at various police academies as well as speaking to adult and youth groups.

"If elected, it will be my pleasure to help protect the citizens of this district by aggressively prosecuting felony offenders," Sims said.

Sheriff Jimmy Thompson recommends that the City Attorney Jim Shelton write letters to Burlington Northern Railroad concerning the speed of train coming through town. Discussion followed concerning the speed limits on trains in the City limits. The railroad speed limit is 59 mph, the speed limit we would like to see enforced inside the City limits is 15 mph. The City Secretary was instructed to contact the City Attorney concerning the matter.

Discussion followed concerning delinquent water customers and the current rates for reconnection of service. The Board of Aldermen set a new policy effective January 1, 1994, reconnect fees for non-payment has been raised from \$15.00 to \$35.00.

The Lone Star Gas Company brought a copy of the ordinance concerning the rate increase set on October 12, 1993. Motion was made by Alderman David Pitts, seconded by Alderman Delmar Wiggs, to pass the ordinance. Motion carried.

ORDINANCE NO. 300
AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS IN THE CITY OF CLARENDON, DONLEY COUNTY, TEXAS; PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED, AND AMENDED; APPROVING THE ELIMINATION OF THE RATE SCHEDULE FOR PUBLIC FREE SCHOOLS-N AND COMMERCIAL CONTRACT PUBLIC SCHOOL RATE;

PROVIDING FOR A WEATHER NORMALIZATION CLAUSE; PROVIDING FOR THE RECOVERY OF ANY CURRENT OR UNRECOVERED PRIOR RATE CASE EXPENSE; PROVIDING FOR A SCHEDULE OF SERVICE CHARGES; PROVIDING FOR A COST OF SERVICE ADJUSTMENT FACTOR AND PROVIDING FOR A MAIN LINE EXTENSION RATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Effective with bills rendered on and after November 23, 1993 and subject to the various provisions set forth in this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Clarendon, Texas by Lone Star Gas Company, a division of ENSERCH Corporation, a Texas Corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as set forth in Item A in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein. This ordinance also approves the elimination of the Rate Schedule for Public Free Schools-N and Commercial Contract Public School Rate and the placement of those customers receiving said rate on the commercial rate set forth in Item A in the attachment hereto.

SECTION 2. The residential and commercial rates set forth above shall be adjusted upward or downward from a base of \$4.0200 per Mcf by a Gas Cost Adjustment Factor expressed as an amount per thousand cubic feet (Mcf) of natural gas for changes in the inter-company city gate rate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to the Clarendon distribution system, according to Item B, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

SECTION 3. The residential and commercial rates set forth above shall be adjusted upward or downward for changes in taxes and other governmental impositions,

rental fees or charges according to Item C, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

SECTION 4. The residential and commercial rates set forth above shall be adjusted upward or downward by a Cost of Service Adjustment Factor, expressed as an amount per customer, for changes in the cost of service over a twelve month period ending December 31, according to Item E, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

SECTION 5. Company shall also receive weather normalization adjustments according to Item D, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

SECTION 6. In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations. The charges set forth in Items F and G in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein, are approved. Services for which no charge is set out may be performed and charged for by Company at a level established by the normal forces of competition.

SECTION 7. In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company is authorized to recover the current and any unrecovered prior rate case expense through a surcharge designed for a six-month nominal recovery period. The surcharge per Mcf will be calculated by dividing the rate case expense to be recovered by one-half of the adjusted annual sales volume to residential and commercial customers. The Company will provide status reports to the City to account for the collection of rate case expense.

SECTION 8. The rates set forth in this ordinance may be changed and amended by either the City or Company in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 9. It is hereby found and determined that said meeting at which this ordinance was passed was open to the public,

as required by Texas law, and that advance public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given.

FINALLY PASSED AND APPROVED on this the FIRST and FINAL reading on this the 12th day of October, A.D. 1993.
