For more than 110,000 applicants nationwide, Greg Collins has been chosen as a semifinalist in the 1993-94 Coca-Cola Scholars Program.

As one of the 1,814 semifinalists, chosen for their balance of leadership, character and achievement in school and the community, Greg must complete by February 1 additional material, which will be screened by the Program Review Committee. If selected as one of the 150 Coca-Cola Scholars, Greg will attend the national competition in Atlanta from April 14-16 to compete for designation as a national or regional scholar. The 50 national scholars will receive awards of \$20,000 and the 100 regional scholars will receive

Stock Reduction Set

The Board of Directors of Rolling Plains PCA has reduced the stock requirements for borrowing from the Association effective January 1, 1994. The stock purchase requirement, which has

been 10% for a number of years, now will be reduced to 5%. This means that the borrowers' required investment in the Association will be just 50% of what it has been in the past, and the PCA will return some \$3,000,000 to 730 borrowers in 19 counties of the Rolling Plains.

Rolling Plains PCA serves it borrowing members from six branch offices and a central office. Its Board of Directors is elected by the member-borrowers, and its staff of 24 employees were all raised on farms, ranches, or in farming communities of the Rolling

As of the close of business December 31, 1993, the Association will enjoy a net profit after taxes of \$980,000 with a loan volume of \$57,000,000 and total capital accounts of \$17,050,000. The entity has been selected as a Teir I PAC for the sixth consecutive year based on safety, soundness and financial strength.

- Truths And Myths About **IRAs**

Many Americans won't be able to retire comfortably with just

Social Security and a company pension plan. An Individual Retirement Account (IRA) can play an important role in building retirement savings. But many

don't take advantage of this taxdeferred savings plan because of misinformation and misconceptions.

If you're age 50, for example, you can keep your IRA growing, untaxed, until you're age 70 1/2-20 1/2 years. You must begin withdrawals from your IRA by April 1 of the year after you reach 70 1/2.

3. You cannot withdraw money from an IRA until you are age 59.

False. It's your money, of course you can, but generally not without a hefty 10% IRS penalty. The withdrawal is also considered taxable income for that year (if it was a deductible IRA).





PROVIDING FOR . WEATHER NORMALIZA-TION CLAUSE; PROVIDING **FOR THE RECOVERY OF ANY** CURRENT OR RECOVERED PRIOR RATE CASE EXPENSE; PROVIDING FOR A SCHEDULE OF SER-VICE CHARGES; PROVIDING FOR A COST OF SERVICE AD-JUSTMENT FACTOR AND PROVIDING FOR A MAIN LINE EXTENSION RATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CLARENDON, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Effective with bills rendered on and after November 23, 1993 and subject to the various provisions set forth in this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Clarendon, Texas by Lone Star Gas Company, a division of **ENSERCH Corporation, a Texas** Corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as set forth in Item A in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein. This ordinance also approves the elimination of the Rate Schedule for Public Free Schools-N and Commercial Contract Public School Rate and the placement of those customers receiving said rate on the commercial rate set forth in Item A in the attachment hereto.

SECTION 2. The residential and commercial rates set forth above shall be adjusted upward or downward from a base of \$4.0200 per Mcf by a Gas Cost Adjustment Factor expressed as an amount per thousand cubic feet (Mcf) of natural gas for changes in the intercompany city gate rate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to the Clarendon distribution system, according to Item B, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

SECTION 3. The residential and commercial rates set forth above shall be adjusted upward or downward for changes in taxes and other governmental impositions, rental fees or charges according to Item C, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

SECTION 4. The residential and commercial rates set forth above shall be adjusted upward or downward by a Cost of Service Adjustment Factor, expressed as an amount per customer, for changes in the cost of service over a twelve month period ending December 31, according to Item E, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein.

SECTION 5. Company shall also receive weather normalization adjustments according to Item D, in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated, herein.

SECTION 6. In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its, business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations. The charges set forth in Items F and G in the Attachment hereto which is incorporated herein, are approved. Services for which no charge is set out may be performed and charged for by Company at a level established by the normal forces of competition.

SECTION 7. In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company is authorized to recover the current and any unrecovered prior rate case expense through a surcharge designed for a six-month nominal recovery period. The surcharge per Mcf will be calculated by dividing the rate case expense to be recovered by one-half of the adjusted annual sales volume to residential and commercial customers. The Company will provide status reports to the City to account for the collection of rate case ex-

SECTION 8. The rates set forth in this ordinance may be changed and amended by either the City or Company in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on

file in the Company's office.

SECTION 9. It is hereby found and determined that said meeting at which this ordinance was passed was open to the public,

as required by Texas law, and that advance public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given.


