



Shelton To Run For DA

James T. Shelton formally announces his filing as a Democratic candidate for the 100th Judicial District Attorney. Shelton has served as the 100th Judicial District Attorney since September 27, 1993, after being appointed by Governor Ann Richards to replace David McCoy. McCoy was appointed 100th District Judge to fill the unexpired term of retiring Judge John T. Forbis. Prior to becoming District Attorney, Shelton was Assistant District Attorney under David McCoy, as well as Donley County Attorney Pro Tem.

Shelton and his family have lived in Clarendon since 1984, when he first returned to the area to practice law. Shelton was born and raised in Childress and married the former Cindy Trollinger of Pampa. They are the parents of Lindsey, 11, Taylor, 9, and Lauren 1-1/2. Shelton has lived and maintained a private law practice in Clarendon since August, 1984.

"After graduating from law school in 1983, I always knew that I would move back and live close to my home of Childress. My wife and I have lived in Clarendon for over nine years and this is the area we have chosen to raise our three children. The counties making up the 100th Judicial District-Carson, Childress, Collingsworth, Donley, and Hall-are great places to live. Economy **Holds Steady**

Texas' economy is steady to slowly improving. December Sales Tax receipts were up 5.6 per cent statewide. The State Comptroller states that "Employment in Texas overall is continuing to expand, reflecting a 1.9 percent rise between October 1992 and October 1993." The figures are released in December over receipts sent to Austin in November, but represent sales taxes collected in October. Donley County was up by 2.15 per cent for the year-to-date



eliminate the need for commercial vehicle operators to have their commercial vehicles undergo dual inspections. The new inspection, program, to be overseen by the



Texas Department of Public Safety, will combine the U.S. Department of Transportation inspection with the State of Texas safety inspection.

Beginning January 1, inspections obtained at other than an official commercial Texas State Inspection will not be accepted.

Commercial motor vehicle means any self-propelled or towed vehicle except a farm vehicle with a gross weight, registered weight or gross weight rating of less than 48,000 pounds used on a public highway to transport passengers or property when: the vehicle or combination of vehicle has a gross weight, registered or gross weight rating in excess of 26,000 bounds: or the vehicle is designed to transport more than 15 people including the driver; or the vehicle is used to transport an amount of hazardous materials requiring placarding under the federal Hazardous Materials Transportation Act.

Survey Shows Parents Want Simplified Immunization Process

(NAPS)-A recent Gallup survey confirms that public understanding of preventable childhood diseases needs to improve if the U.S. is to increase its national immunization rate, which lags behind 69 other countries for children under age two. The survey also reveals that many parents would be more inclined to have their children fully immunized if they could get the same protection with fewer injections-a wish that recently became reality with the U.S. introduction of a new four-inone combination pediatric vaccine.

'The lack of awareness and education for diseases such as Haemophilus b disease is just one of the hurdles we face as the incidence of certain childhood illnesses in this country rises," said Virginia Burggraf of the American Nurses Association (ANA), which co-sponsored the survey with Lederle-Praxis Biologicals. "Beyond education about disease, parents need to know more about pediatric vaccines, how often they should be administered and their side effects.

The survey found that many parents are not knowledgeable about vaccines, and are not aware that multiple doses are needed to provide adequate protection. In addition, some parents are reluctant to immunize their children because of the trauma a child may experience with immunizations. Survey respondents overwhelmingly (86 percent) said they would be more inclined to have their children immunized if they could get the same protection with fewer injections. In the hopes of increasing immunization rates, a new vaccine was developed to protect against four diseases with one

injection. Recently licensed by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), TETRAMUNE" (Diphtheria and Tetanus Toxoids and Pertussis Vaccine Adsorbed and Haemophilus b Conjugate Vaccine (Diphtheria CRM₁₉₇ Protein Conjugate) protects against diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough) and Haemophilus b disease with a series of single injections.

"Fewer shots-four instead of eight—are required with TETRA-MUNE, which will cause less anxiety for both children and their parents," said Jill Hackell, M.D., director, Clinical Research, Lederle-Praxis Biologicals, the company that developed and distributes the vaccine.

Minor and temporary side effects after the administration of TETRAMUNE are similar to the single entity vaccines. As with the individual vaccines, more serious adverse reactions may rarely occur.

While significant steps are being taken to address low immunization rates in the U.S., a real need remains for better and more education about the importance of immunization and the seriousness of childhood disease.

SURVEY HIGHLIGHTS

A majority of parents were not aware that their child requires immunization against nine serious diseases soon after birth. For example, 59 percent of respondents didn't know that children should receive their first immunizations against pertussis (whooping cough), a potentially fatal disease, by two months of age.

Thirty-six percent of parents mistakenly believe that Haemophilus o disease (meningitis) vaccine protects children in one visit.


Forty-seven percent of respondents were not aware that polio is contagious.

Thirty-six percent and 32 percent, respectively, of parents surveyed did not realize measles and pertussis can be fatal.

YOUR CHILD'S HEALTH **Survey Shows Parents Want**

Simplified Immunization Process

vey confirms that public understanding of preventable childhood diseases needs to improve if the U.S. is to increase its national immunization rate, which lags behind 69 other countries for children under age two. The survey also reveals that many parents would be more inclined to have their children fully immunized if they could get the same protection with fewer injections-a wish that recently became reality with the U.S. introduction of a new four-inone combination pediatric vaccine.

"The lack of awareness and education for diseases such as Haemophilus b disease is just one of the hurdles we face as the incidence of certain childhood illnesses in this country rises," said Virginia Burggraf of the American Nurses Association (ANA), which co-sponsored the survey with Lederle-Praxis Biologicals. "Beyond education about disease, parents need to know more about pediatric vaccines, how often they should be administered and their side effects.'

The survey found that many parents are not knowledgeable about vaccines, and are not aware that multiple doses are needed to provide adequate protection. In addition, some parents are reluctant to immunize their children because of the trauma a child may experience with immunizations. Survey respondents overwhelmingly (86 percent) said they would

(NAPS)-A recent Gallup sur- be more inclined to have their children immunized if they could get the same protection with fewer injections. In the hopes of increasing

immunization rates, a new vaccine was developed to protect against four diseases with one injection. Recently licensed by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), TETRAMUNE" (Diphtheria and Tetanus Toxoids and Pertussis Vaccine Adsorbed and Haemophilus b Conjugate Vaccine (Diphtheria CRM₁₉₇ Protein Con-jugate) protects against diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis (whooping cough) and Haemophilus b disease with a series of single injections.

"Fewer shots-four instead of eight-are required with TETRA-MUNE, which will cause less anxiety for both children and their parents," said Jill Hackell, M.D., director, Clinical Research, Lederle-Praxis Biologicals, the company that developed and distributes the vaccine.

Minor and temporary side effects after the administration of TETRAMUNE are similar to the single entity vaccines. As with the individual vaccines, more serious adverse reactions may rarely occur.

While significant steps are being taken to address low immunization rates in the U.S., a real need remains for better and more education about the importance of immunization and the seriousness of childhood disease.

SURVEY HIGHLIGHTS

A majority of parents were not aware that their child requires immunization against nine serious diseases soon after birth. For example, 59 percent of respondents didn't know that children should receive their first immunizations against pertussis (whooping cough), a potentially fatal disease, by two months of age.

Thirty-six percent of parents mistakenly believe that Haemophilus disease (meningitis) vaccine protects children in one visit.

Forty-seven percent of respondents were not aware that polio is ontagious.

Thirty-six percent and 32 percent, respectively, of parents surreved did not realize measles and pertussis can be fatal.





End Of Year Reminders

As the end of the year approaches, there are certain Social Security related matters you should know about.

If you have a child age one or older who doesn't have a Social Security number, make sure you get one before you file your tax return next year. The law requires you to list a Social Security number on your tax return for all dependents over age one.

If you changed your name this year (through marriage, divorce, or any other reason), make sure your new name is listed on your Social Security card and in Social Security records. If you don't do this, there may be problems posting your earnings to Social Security's files. (This could reduce your future Social Security benefits.) Also, the Internal Revenue Service may have problems processing you tax return. If you're getting Social



Security benefits and you moved this year, make sure we have your correct address. (Sometimes people who have their checks sent directly to their bank forget to tell us about a change in their mailing address.) It's important we have your correct address because early next year we're going to send you a form that shows the total benefits you received in 1993. You may need this form for income tax or other purpose

If you receive Social Security and work, remember that you can earn more money in 1994 before your benefits are reduced. If you're under 65, you can earn up to \$8,040 next year with no reduction in benefits. If your 65 to 69, you can earn up to \$11,160 in 1994 with no reduction. If you're 70 or older, there is no limit on your earnings.

If you receive benefits and worked inn 193, you need to report your earnings to Social Security be April 15, 1994. The 1993 limits were \$7,680 for people under 65 and \$10,560 for people 65- 69.

Operation Lifesaver Urges Caution At R.R. Crossings

Winter brings expectations of "blue northers," festivals and gatherings of holiday celebration. Winter, however, is also the season when vehicle-train crashes significantly increase in Texas and the nation.

In each of the past ten years, December and January have been the months with the highest number of highway-rail grade crossing crashes, according to the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA). This sharp activated crossing gates is both illegal and deadly increase deviates from other types of highway collisions which most fre-Traffic Safety Administration.

"The increase in vehicle-train crash frequency during these months may be attributed to more severe weather conditions, decreased daylight hours, holiday traffic, increased drunk driving, but it's hard to attribute to one factor," said Thomas D. Simpson, president of Operation Lifesaver, Inc., a national non-profit, public education program dedicated to reducing crashes, injuries and fatalities at highway-rail grade crossings. "Vehicle-train crashes are notably different than other accidents

involving motor vehicles in that they are eleven times more likely to result in a fatality. Vehicle-train crashes are almost always preventable," said Simpson.

Every 90 minutes, on the average, a vehicle and train collide somewhere in the U.S. Last year there were 579 people killed and 1,975 injured in 4,910 grade crossing crashes according to the FRA.

Texas ranks number one in the nation for vehicle-train crashes. Last year there were 486 crashes which resulted in 59 fatalities and 196 injuries. This year doesn't promise to be any better for Texas. FRA's preliminary statistics for the first six months of 1993 indicate a five percent increase in vehicle-train crashes and a 60 percent increase in fatalities in Texas compared to the same period in 1992.

Texas Operation Lifesaver urges all motorists to follow these safety tips to prevent highway-rail grade crossing crashes:

Lose! * Do not get trapped on a crossing. Proceed through a crossing only if you are sure you can clear the entire track.

Expect a train on any track at any time.

* Look for a second train when crossing multiple tracks.

* Get out of your vehicle if it stalls on a crossing and call 911. Only attempt to restart your vehicle if you can post a lookout to watch for approaching trains.

* Never drive around crossing gates when they are down. To violate

* Be aware trains cannot stop quickly. Even though the locomotive quently occur during the summer, according to the National Highway engineer may see you in a crossing, it can take up to one and a half miles to stop once the emergency brakes are applied.

"This winter - and always - remember four simple words when approaching grade crossings - Look, Listen and Live," urged Simpson.





(NAPS)-Your children's ability to say no to alcohol, tobacco and other drugs often depends on their ability to say no to their friends. Here are some ways you can help your children resist peer pressure:

• Talk to them about the dangers and problems of alcohol, tobacco and other drug use. Discuss situations they may face, such as riding with someone who's been drinking, being offered a drink, or accepting a free tobacco sample.

· Help them feel good about themselves. Give lots of praise and encouragement. Older children are often unsure of themselves. Show you have confidence in them and believe they can be trusted to do the right things.

With landfill space quickly disappearing, interest in recycling plastics has become widespread. More and more plastic bottles and

other rigid containers feature a coded symbol to help recyclers identify their plastic type. But the presence of a code or the fact that a plastic container has been collected for recycling does not guarantee that the product actually will be recycled.

Recycling occurs only when a product is manufactured using recycled material and is sold in the marketplace. If the public creates demand for these products, plastic and all other types of recycling will increase
