COTTON HARVESTING HINTS -Dry, high quality cotton at harvest time is more than luck. B. G. Reeves, Extension agricultural engineer, says the moistture content of cotton should be no more than eight percent at the time of harvest if you want to get the best quality in every

bale. He suggests that farmers use a hygrometer for determining when open cotton reaches the right moisture content for harvesting. The hygrometer meaures humidity and this will usually correlate directly with the

Questions & Answers About Paraquat

- Q. How does Paraquat crack open mature bolls?
- A. Paraquat desiccates the portion of the boll that it contacts. This causes the boll to dry and split open. and the lint to fluff out.
- Q. Does cotton thiff normally, from mature cotton bolls desiccated with Paraguat?
- A. Yes. The cotton fluffs out in the same manner as cotton from untreated, normal opening bolls.
- Q. Does Paraquat have any effect on cotton quality?
- A. No. Research has shown that Paraguat doesn't affect lint or seed quality of mature bolls. (See chart, Page 3)*
- Q. How does cool weather or rain affect Paraguat?
- A. Paraquat is affected less by cool temperatures or rains than any other materials. Successful results have been obtained when night temperatures dropped as low as 40 degrees and when heavy rains fell within 10 hours after application.
- Q. Will a single application of Paraguat combined with a standard defoliant completely defoliate the crop and open mature bolls?
- A. One application usually does the job under true cut-out conditions. A second application may be needed if cotton is rank, green or dense.
- Q. What happens if Paraguat is applied earlier than Tabel recommendations?
- A. You may destroy a higher percentage of immature bolls than desired, resulting in lower yield and quality
- Q. Are there criteria other than percentage of open bolls for timing of Paraquat applications?
- A. Applications made just prior to an expected frost to crack unopened mature bolls and save them from freezing would not be subject to normal timing.
- Q. How can corrosion to spray equipment be prevented?
- A. Paraguat is water soluble and corrosion is easily prevented by flushing equipment and washing with water after use.
- Q. Can Paraquat be used in all types of water? A. Yes, provided it does not contain soil particles.

Water hardness and pH do not affect Paraguat's activity but muddy water will inactivate it.

- Q. What precautions are necessary for handling Paraquat?
- A. READ THE LABEL. Do not take internally! Take special precaution in handling concentrate to keep it off skin and out of eyes. Do not breathe the spray mist or spray if conditions may cause drift. Paraguat is safe to handle and use when label directions and precautions are followed.
- Q. Is Paraguat a desiccant or defoliant?
- A. Paraquat is a unique harvest aid chemical that is in a class by itself. It exhibits characteristics of defoliants and desiccants, cracks open mature bolls, speeds overall activity, and can be used alone or in combination with standard defoliants. For this reason it is classed as a harvest aid chemical and boll opening agent.
- Q. How soon after application will cotton treated with Paraguat be ready for harvest?
- A. Time required varies from 10 to 14 days for defoliation, and 5 to 7 days for desiccation.
- Q. Under what conditions should the higher water volumes recommended on the label be used?
- A. When cotton is rank or if plants are dusty.
- Q. Should Paraguat be used with a surfactant?
- A. Yes. Use a non-ionic surfactant such as ORTHO X-77 or ORTHO HDD. Surfactants increase spreading, wetting and dispersion of spray mixtures. This results in more thorough coverage and better overall performance.
- Q. Is Paraguat systemic?
- A. No. It is a contact killer only. It is absorbed almost immediately into the plant tissue and is not translocated. This is why, approximately 10 hours after application, Paraquat is not affected by rain.
- Q. How does Paraguat suppress regrowth?
- A. Although the exact answer isn't known, it is suspected that Paraquat delays bud initiation at the growing point. This is why it must be applied before regrowth starts in order to keep it at a minimum.


