Dates for Grazing Diverted Acres Changed

We have been notified that acreages diverted under the Feed Grain and Wheat Program may be grazed through May 14, 1970. This will mean you will have to stay off the diverted acres until October 15 this fall.

Reapportioned Cotton

Those of you who had cotton reapportioned to your farm must come to the office on or before April 8 and sign a revised "Intention to Participate" in the Cotton Program.

Acreage Reports

May 1 is the final date to certify wheat and barley acreages. If your farm is enrolled in the Wheat Program only, diverted acres must be designated by May 1 also. We will be glad to help you in any way we can here in the office when you are ready to measure your crop acreage. Let us remind you measurements made in the office are only a guide and are not official unless we visit the farm and furnish measurements on an official notice. The measurement service is available for a nominal fee. If you are not sure of your acreage, you may want to take advantage of this service.

Covered Crops on Diverted Acres

Sweet and forage sorghums are NOT eligible crops on diverted acres this year. This cuts out red top cane or African millet that a lot of you planted last year. If you plan to plant a cover crop on your diverted acres, check with us, we have a list of eligible crops.

Estlack Employed by WTU Since 1960

Employed by WTU for the past 10 years, Estlack began his career with the Company as a groundman on a distribution crew and a few months later was transferred to the service department in Clarendon. He was working as a serviceman when he was transferred to Hedley as local manager in 1966.

Born in Electra, Texas in 1938, Estlack has lived in the Clarendon area most of his life. He is a 1956 graduate of Clarendon High School. He attended Clarendon College one year and then transferred to Texas Tech where he received his Bachelor of Science degree in 1961.

Weather Blustery But Moisture Is Good

The Panhandle area has been experiencing some unusual weather the past several days which is actually not unusual for this part of the country.

The best snow of the season fell Friday night and Saturday and netted .61 inch of moisture even though it drifted quite a bit.

This total was almost equaled in a heavy downpour about midnight Tuesday when an additional .58 was recorded. This along with .11 in fog and mist brought our total for March to 1.40 and the year's total to 1.98 inches. The total moisture thru March last year was 2.77, so we have some catching up to do and prospects are for more moisture and cold weather. It is presumed that most of the fruit crop has been frozen with the temperature dropping to the low 20's.

Census Takers Are Easy To Identify

Householders will not have any difficulty identifying enumerators for the 1970 Census of Population and Housing. District Manager R. L. Butler pointed out today. Enumerators, or census takers (most of whom are women), started making their rounds in the area on April 1 and are expected to complete their work in three to five weeks.

Each census taker will wear a red, white, and blue identification card. This card bears the seal of the Department of Commerce, and the words "Census Enumerator, Official Credential" are printed across its face. It bears the census taker's signature and certifies that she is authorized to perform the duties of a census enumerator and has sworn to keep confidential all census information you provide.

Persons purporting to be census takers who do not have this identification card should be reported immediately to the local police or to the census district office.

Census takers will be further identified by the portfolio containing their supplies. The portfolio is blue and bears the legend, "1970 Census." In the portfolio, the census taker carries her supplies of report forms, maps, pencils, and other tools necessary for her work.

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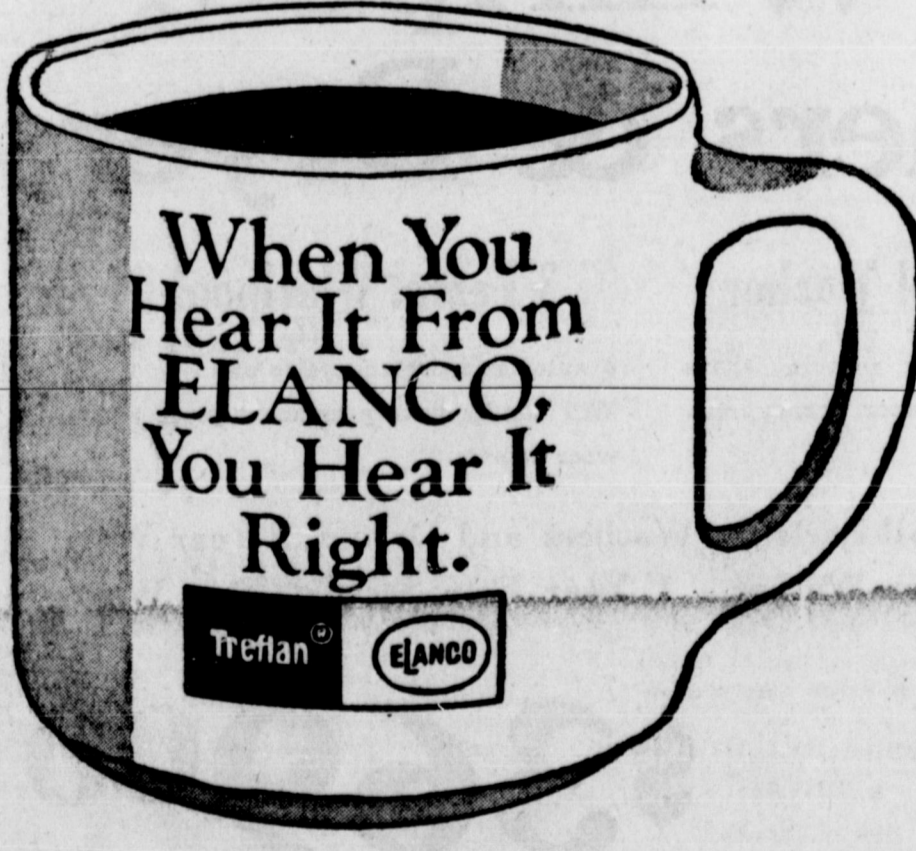

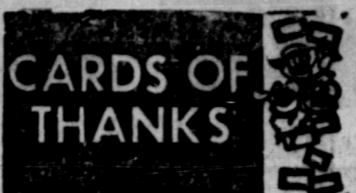

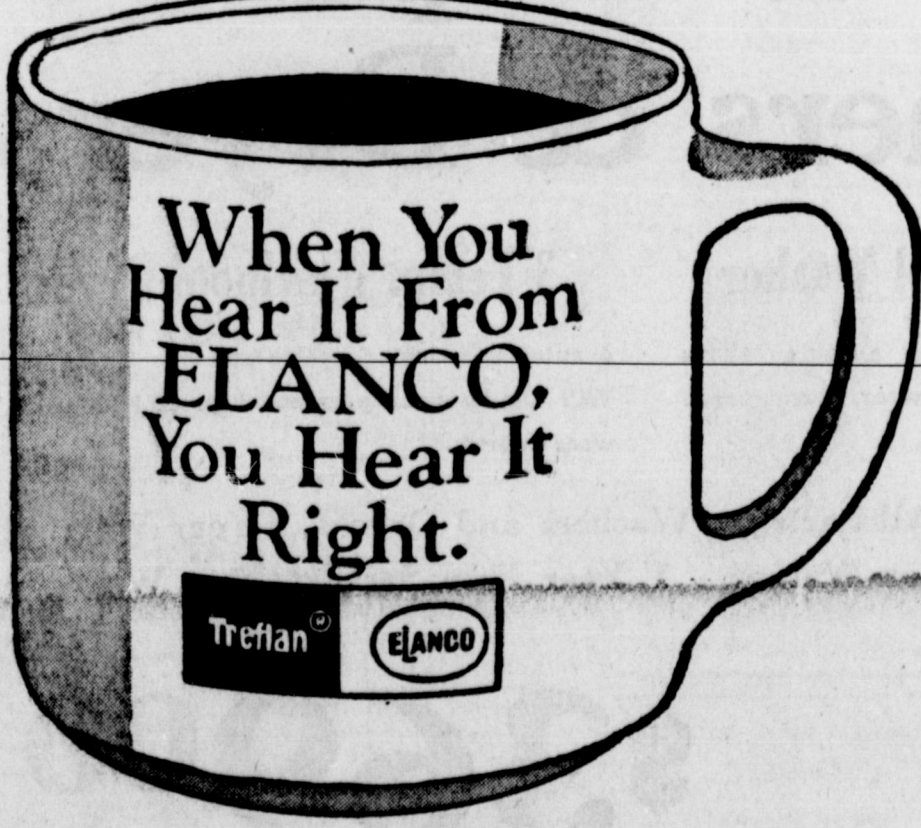

POND FERTILIZATION TIME IS HERE

Fish ponds and lakes should be fertilized in the spring when the water temperature reaches 65 degrees, according to fisheries biologist Charles Inman of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Inman said the water temperature, and not the calendar, should be the guide for determining when to fertilize. Inman said the usual recommended dosage is about 50 pounds per acre of 20-20-5 or 16-20-10 commercial fertilizer.

Social Security News

Q—Was a bill passed to increase the amount of the social security checks in 1970?
A—Yes. The increase is 15 percent and the effective date is January 1970.
Q—What do I need to do to get the 15 percent increase on my social security checks? Should I go to the social security office and file an application?

A—You don't need to file an application or visit your security office in order to get your increase. The increase is automatic.

Q—When will the 15 percent increase be added to my checks?

A—The first check you will receive at your new monthly rate will be the check due on April 3rd, 1970. This check pays your benefit for the month of March 1970. You will receive another check about April 22nd, 1970. This check represents your increase for January and February 1970.

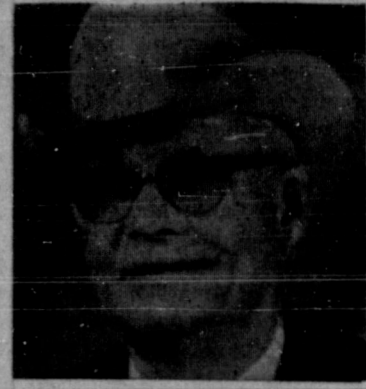
Q—I plan to move about April 10th. Will the check due me on April 22nd be sent to my old address or my new address?

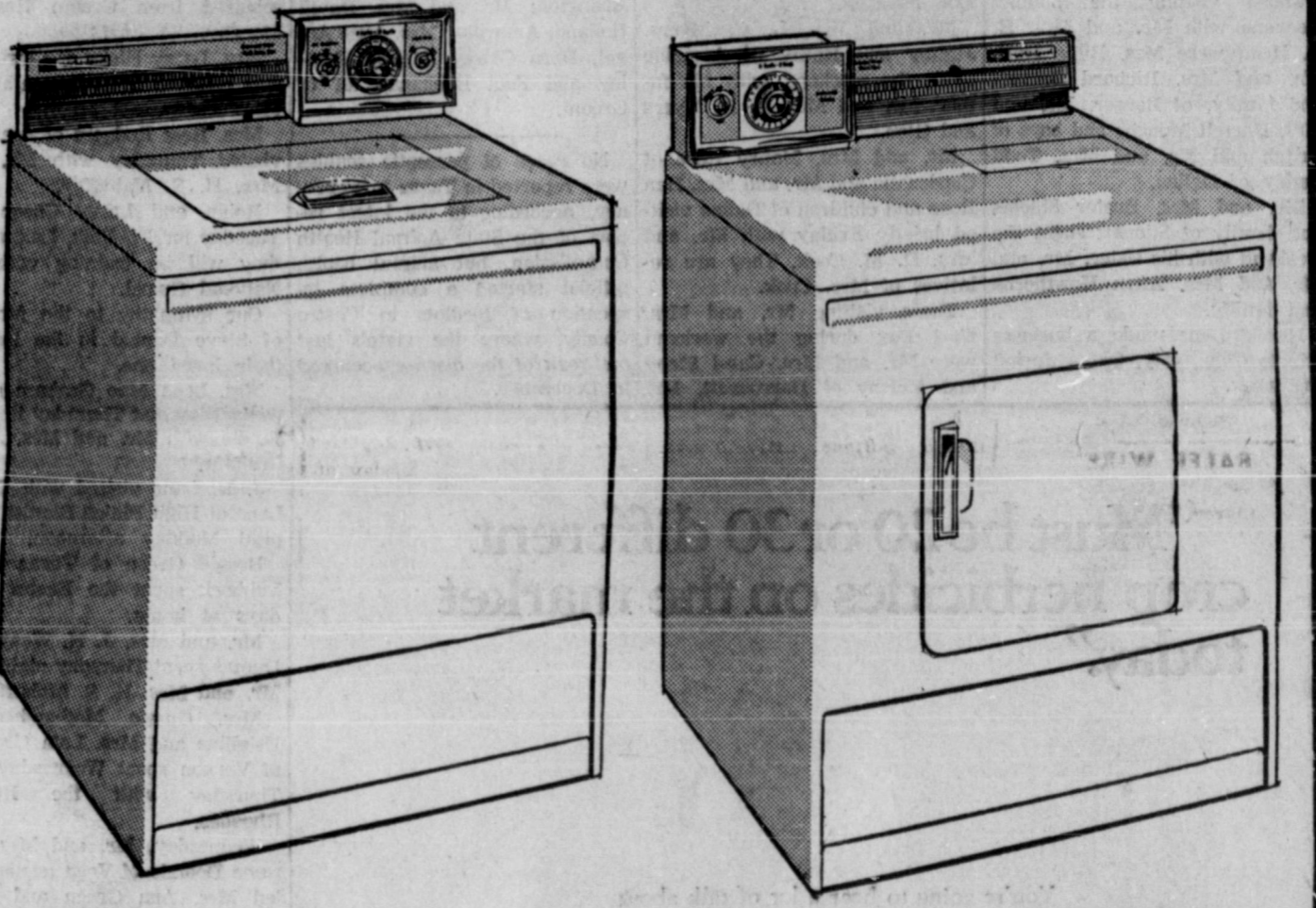

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NEWS FROM

Congressman Bob Price

18th District, Texas

During the final session of Congress before the Easter recess, Representative Bob Price of Pampa, and 25 of his colleagues introduced the Administration's proposals to stop the rash of criminal bombings sweeping the nation.

Price declared, "These senseless acts of wanton destruction, under the guise of political idealism, are but the first stages of a violent revolutionary movement which threatens to destroy American institutions and traditions." "The perpetrators range from anarchists to Communists; but whatever their political motivation, they have joined in an orgy of violence against our country and our people," he added. "These outrages must be stopped and stopped quickly," he said, "before any more innocent individuals are injured or killed and before any more property is damaged or destroyed."

Price stated, "President Nixon has my wholehearted support in his efforts to stop terrorist bombings and bring the wrongdoers to justice."

Nixon has proposed strengthening and expanding the existing federal law which makes the transport of explosives across state lines, a federal crime under certain circumstances. Penalties will be increased — the death sentences will be given in bombings involving fatalities.

The Administration bill provides: — Anyone involved in the transport or receipt in commerce of explosives, intending their unlawful use be made subject to imprisonment for ten years or a fine of \$10,000 or both. The current maximum penalty is a single year in prison or a thousand dollar fine or both.

— The maximum penalty be doubled to twenty years in prison or a twenty thousand dollar fine or both if anyone is injured as the ultimate result of such transport of explosives.

— Penalties for bomb threats be raised from one year in prison to a maximum of five years or five thousand dollars fine or both.

— Use of explosives to damage or destroy any building or property used for business purposes by any person or firm engaged in interstate commerce, or in any activity affecting such commerce, be made a Federal crime.

— Possession of explosives with the intent to damage either Federal property or property used in its business by a person engaged in interstate commerce also be made a Federal crime.

— The individual engaged in the transport or use of explosives in violation of these provisions be made subject to the death penalty if a fatality occurs.

Price urged his colleagues to come together in a non partisan effort to stop terrorist bombings and bring the wrongdoers to justice. Price said, "The individuals involved are potential murderers. They must not be coddled; their actions must not be condoned by a permissive society."

Autos Rarely Cause Accidents-Drivers Do

As essential as vehicles are for the delivery of goods and services, the cost of transportation remains extremely high. Beyond the direct expenses of buying and operating a vehicle, the cost in pain, suffering, and human lives when vehicles get out of control continues to increase.

Even though the death rate per 100 million miles driven has receded slightly, the death toll keeps edging higher. Some accidents are due to mechanical failure, but the fault lies primarily with human error in spite of improved highways and special efforts to reduce accidents caused by mechanical defects.

Today, many thousands hold driving licenses whose mental and physical capabilities are not adequate to the demands which driving requires in an emergency situation. Barring emergencies, these people can get by safely most of the time. But it is precisely when the emergency occurs that driving judgment counts the most. A large number of drivers can pass the written and driving tests for a license, but lack the necessary good judge-

ment for continuous safe driving.

No other explanation is possible when you consider the attempt to pass on hills and curves, pulling out unexpectedly into traffic from a side road, and running stop signs and red lights. Regardless of excuses, these actions reflect a simple inability to recognize the realities of a particular driving situation. When the number of drivers is climbing steadily, such shortcomings are more and more apparent. From all indications, the problem of drinking and use of drugs is also a large factor in one way or another, accounting for possibly half of all fatal accidents involving vehicles.

Pitts Employed by WTU For More Than 42 Years

C. A. Pitts, Local Manager in Clarendon since 1956, began his 42-year career with West Texas Utilities Company in 1927 as a groundman on a McCamey distribution crew and several months later he was transferred to Iraan where he worked as a serviceman and lineman for 16 months.

His first experience as a WTU local manager came in the summer of 1929 when he moved to Bakersfield in Pecos County to assume the duties as local manager. "I was the first, last and only local manager this town ever had," says Pitts. "Bakersfield, now only a 'gasoline stop' on the Old Spanish Trail southwest of McCamey, had promise of making another oil boom town in the Permian Basin. A town-site was laid out, an adobe post office built, and people began moving in. A short time later the East Texas oil field began to 'boom' and Bakersfield was doomed. I found myself a WTU local manager in a town with practically no customers, and I returned to McCamey in 1930." During the next three years, Pitts worked in the line gang, and served as foreman of the crew for three years. He served as local manager in Rankin until he moved to Ballinger in 1937, and a few months later was transferred to Matador as local manager. In 1944 he moved to Mason where he served as local manager until he began his 14 years service in 1956 as local manager in Clarendon.

Born in Binghamton, New York in 1905 Pitts spent his early life on his father's farm; attended school in Binghamton; and following graduation from high school he attended Cordell University.

Pitts came to Texas in 1922, stopped in San Antonio; and then went to Phoenix, Arizona where he was employed by the Phoenix Electric Company. He later worked in California for the Pacific Gas and Electric Company; returned to Texas in 1926 and was employed in Borger by the Panhandle Power and Light Company. Before joining WTU in 1927, Pitts was employed in Fresno, California by the Southern California Edison Company.

Mrs. Pitts is the former Lockie Taylor. They married in Carlsbad, New Mexico in 1922 and are the parents of two sons, Don and David.

Capt. Donald Pitts is serving with the USAF, and is now stationed in Omaha, Nebraska, in S.A.C. Headquarters. He will be sent to college this fall to complete his work for his Masters Degree.

Capt. David Pitts is serving with the U. S. Army and was home on furlough in March. He left Clarendon on March 15 for active duty in South Korea.

Mr. and Mrs. Pitts are members of the First Methodist Church where he has served as a steward.

During his long residence in Clarendon, Mr. Pitts has served as a director of the Lions Club, President and director of the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce and was named "Mr. Chamber of Commerce" in 1963. He has also served as chairman and a director of the Donley County Industrial Foundation and a director of the Donley County Planning Board.

"1969 witnessed an all time high of over 3,500 dead citizens, 230,000 injured at a cost approaching one billion dollars. The most distressing part of this is the tragedy and heart-break which resulted, but an equally disturbing aspect of this record is the fact that nearly half of these cases involved a drinking driver.

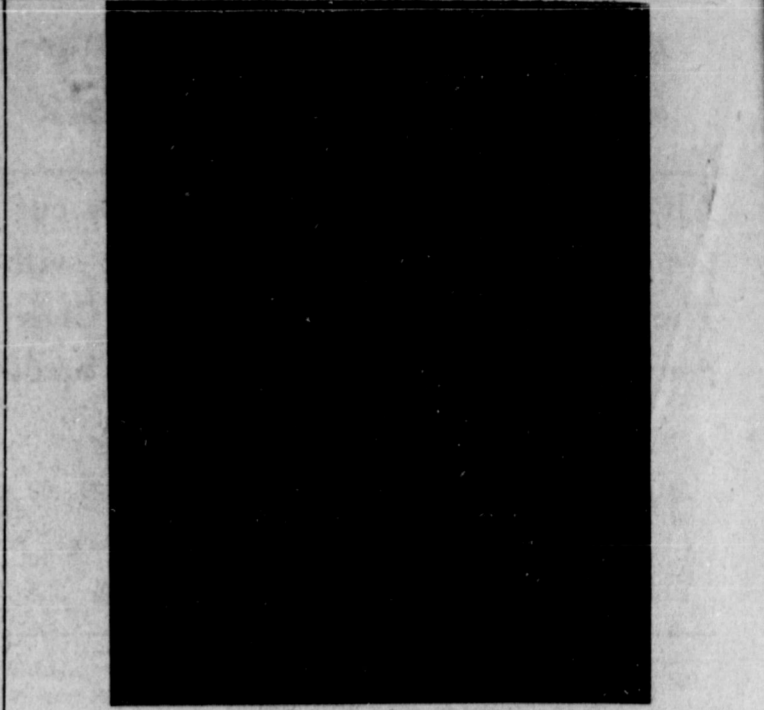
"I am convinced Texas citizens can do something about this, because I have utmost faith in the people of this State. So, I am appealing to every motorist to follow what "Drive Friendly" means.

"Drive Friendly" simply means:

"I strongly urge all news media, private employers, local governments, civic clubs, women's groups and all other community organizations to get behind "Drive Friendly", and I appeal to all law enforcement agencies and traffic courts to be as strict and firm as the law allows to convince errant drivers that "Drive Friendly" has a real meaning.

"If "Drive Friendly" is seen and heard enough around this state, I believe an impact can be made and these needless tragedies will not strike the homes and citizens of Texas in such appalling proportions," the Governor concluded.

Over 400,000 "Drive Friendly" dashboard, window and bumper stickers are already in use in Texas. They are used on state vehicles, driver education cars and school buses. Business firms are using them on company vehicles, billing statements, insurance policies, new car papers and under letter signatures. All correspondence from the Governor's Office carries a small "Drive Friendly" sticker under the name

of the signer. Stickers can be obtained at nominal cost by writing "Drive Friendly," Governor's Office, Austin Texas 78711.
