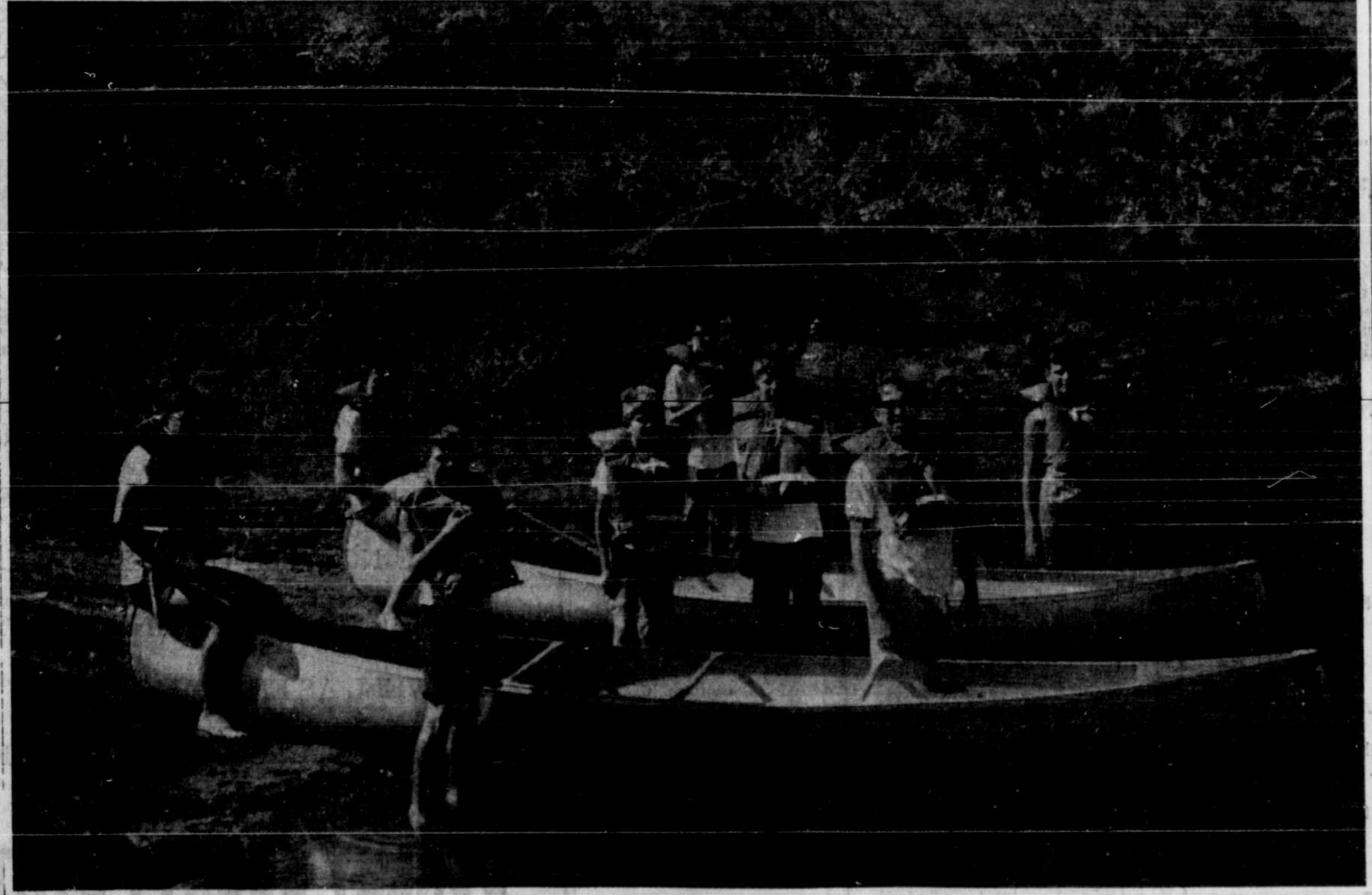
## Bucks Dump Broncs 33-7 Friday Night

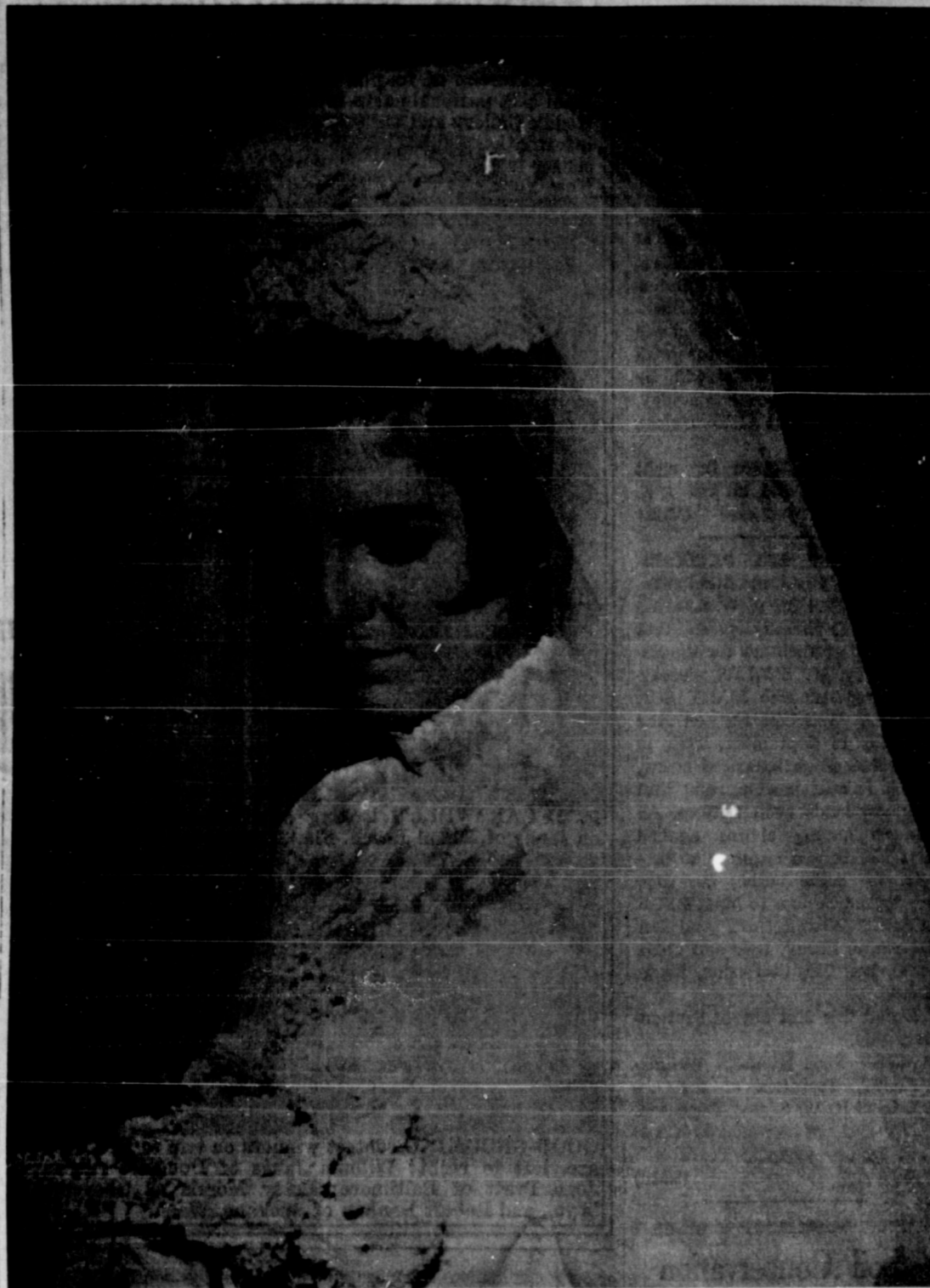

In a recent report on federal tax collections the Internal Revenue Service says that the total Internal Revenue collections for the United States in the calendar year 1969 was \$195,141,923,030. Such men are deliberately fishing for the big 'uns and utilizing all their knowledge and skill for taking braggin' size bass. There are many fishing secrets, and some fishermen seem to know most of them.

For one thing, these lunken-lunders fish practically every day.

They know their waters. They are able to "read" water: with an experienced eye. They watch for the natural habitats of big bass. They know, by studying the land adjacent to the water, where the ledgers are. Then, they have a pretty good estimate of where the points run down into the water.

They mark big trees protruding in the best fishing water. They conserve their casts. When they toss out the lure, they feel that the big old bass they missed the day before may be lurking there again . . . and he usually is. I've known fishermen to go back to the same spot for days just because they knew one big fish lived there.

A real good fisherman, whom I will not name, once was guiding a friend of mine. They had caught a tremendous string of crappie and decided they'd try a little cove for some blacks. My friend hooked one and thought it was a log. Because he knew fishing better, the guide realized it wasn't a log but a lunker.

He went back there a couple of days later and latched onto the same bass, but he lost it, too. This went on for days. The big old bass would grab the plug, spit it out and leave the fisherman empty handed.

No man can stand that kind of treatment, even if he has already caught a boat load of big bass.

This fellow was a plug fisherman, but he just couldn't stand the pressure. He went to a half-

little ones?" "They are harder to catch than the big ones," Hawk replied. And therein lies a story of the few men who never seem to catch anything but big fish.

Hawk is one of them. Another is Tex Heth, who guides around Toledo Bend and Rayburn in East Texas. Then there is John Fox of San Augustine. He never seems to take one under four pounds.

dozen bait houses before he was able to get a few minnows about six inches long. Then he went back to that bass hole, made up a dual rig, put on two of those big minnows and tossed the twin offering out to the bass' home base.

That old bass had just heard the dinner bell ring because he grabbed both of those minnows . . . and our fishing friend set the hooks. That was all for Mr. Bass. I might add, however, that it weighed a little more than eight pounds.

Moral here is that determination does it!

**Selective Service**

Q—We were talking last week about men who could be drafted without a lottery number, and you told me that volunteers, men from age 26 up through 34, or 19-year-olds who didn't yet have a lottery number could be drafted on some other basis. Is there anyone else?

A—Yes, but first, it is em-

phasized that the men 26 and above and the 19-year-olds without a lottery number cannot be ordered until all the men age 19 through 25 with lottery numbers have been ordered. The additional group which could be ordered without a lottery would be males age 18½ but not yet 19, in the order of their birthdates oldest first.

Q—The volunteers are ordered ahead of the men with the lottery numbers. Right?

A—Correct.

Q—Under present circumstances, draft calls can be filled with volunteers and a part of the group which has lottery numbers. Isn't that right?

A—That is right. A big war or emergency could change that.

Q—For the remainder of 1970, the draft boards will fill calls with men whose numbers were drawn in December 1969, and in 1971 with men whose numbers were drawn in July of this year.

Correct?

A—Yes, except that deferred or exempt men whose numbers were drawn in 1969 will be placed in the I-A pool in 1971 if they

go into I-A in that year. 1971 will be their year of maximum exposure instead of 1970.

Q—I'm an alien who has been admitted to the U.S., but not for permanent residence. I've been in this country more than a year. I understand this makes me liable for armed forces service under the draft law. Is that right?

A—It is.

Q—Is there some way I can apply to be relieved from this liability?

A—There is, provided you take action before your induction into the armed services.

Q—How?

A—You can file with your draft board a form called "Application by Alien for Relief from Training and Service in the Armed Forces."

Q—Is this a right, or can the application be denied?

A—It is a right, provided you have not been admitted for permanent residence. An alien admitted for permanent residence is not eligible to file this application.

Q—I'm thinking of applying for citizenship. Would signing the application have any effect on this?

A—It would, if you are relieved from liability for training and service on these grounds, you will become permanently ineligible to become a citizen of the United States, ineligible to receive an immigrant visa, and will be excluded from entry into the U.S. for permanent residence, which includes Puerto Rico, Guam, and the Virgin Islands.

FERTILIZE — The shortage of grazing and hay caused by lack of rain is creating problems for stockmen. There's still plenty of time left to grow a lot of forage, reminds A. C. Novosad, Extension pasture specialist, provided pastures are fertilized now and the overdue rains arrive. Novosad says there is some risk involved but he believes pasture fertilization every fall would be a paying proposition. It is doubly important now because of the forage shortage, he says.

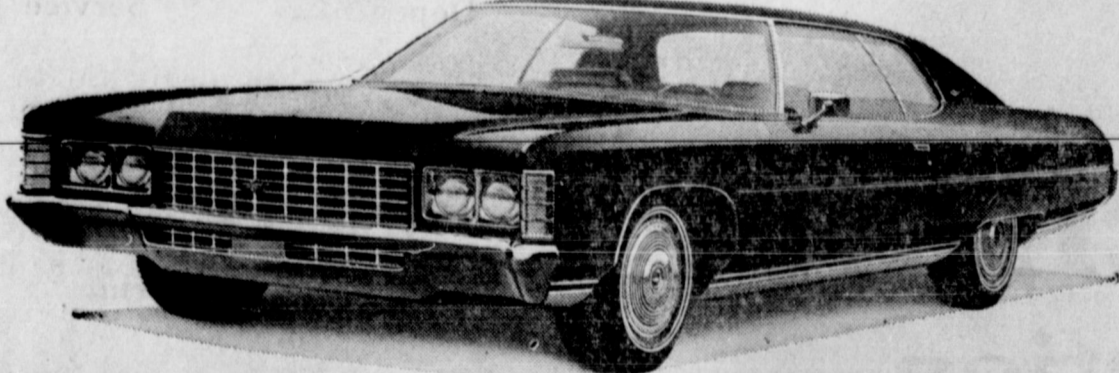

- 10th** 10% Penalty Added to Net Bill Not Paid on or Before 10th. Service Discontinued on unpaid Bills.
- 21st** If Our Collector Has to Call by to Collect Your Delinquent Bill There Will be a \$3.00 Collection Fee.

The above changes were made because our old billing equipment was worn out and the new equipment to be used made the new dates necessary to handle our increased work load.

The bill will arrive in a light blue envelope. Inside you will find the bill and an envelope to return the large portion of your bill with the reading on it. The Coop. address, on the back of the bill, must show through the window of the envelope.

It is important that we receive the bill stub, as the holes punched in it will automatically give you credit for your payment when they are inserted in the machine.

This change is not as great as it may seem. The billing date has been set back five days along with the other dates and the appearance of the bill has changed and that is all.

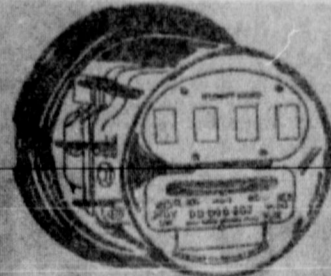

## Minutes of Hospital Board Meeting

The Board of Directors of the Donley County Hospital District met in a called meeting September 16th, 1970, at 7:30 o'clock P.M. at the City Hall with the following Directors Present: O. C. Watson, John Jones, Delbert Robertson, Ernest Barbee, Lloyd Risley, Earl Wheatley and Jane Bownds.

This meeting was called to order for the purpose of obtaining information from the Financial Advisors and the architect, Mr. Underwood and Mr. Morris, Financial Advisors explained in detail ways of financing the construction of a hospital building by the sale of tax bonds.

After a full discussion a motion was made by John Jones that the Board defer any immediate action on selling bonds until the architect can complete the building plans with a cost estimate. Motion was seconded by Lloyd Risley. Motion carried unanimously.

Mr. Watson reported that he talked to the Hill-Burton office and informed them that the Donley County Hospital District is planning to build a hospital building. Hill-Burton authority advised the Board to send a sketch of the proposed plans and send in an application for a grant for addition to hospital.

Mr. Goss was asked to present the plans to the Hill-Burton office for their consideration.

Ernest Barbee made a motion that the Board accept the plan as presented and asked the architect to contact a contractor and present the Board with a cost estimate. Motion was seconded by Delbert Robertson. Those voting for the motion were O. C. Watson, John Jones, Delbert Robertson, Lloyd Risley, Ernest Barbee and Jane Bownds. Earl Wheatley voted against the motion.

Delbert Robertson made a motion that the Board appoint Mrs. Neil Cornell, Tax Collector and Mrs. Cula Jo Trout as Deputy Tax Collector for the Donley County Hospital District and bonds be obtained in the amount of \$8,000.00 for each.

Governor Preston Smith has approved a planning grant of \$19,885 to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, Amarillo, for updating its regional law enforcement plan and expanding its program to include all 25 counties of the Panhandle State Planning Region.

The grant was made on recommendation of the Texas Criminal Justice Council, which advises the Governor on administration of funds received from the U. S. Department of Justice under the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968.

It was one of eight planning grants, totalling \$148,944, recommended by the Council at its regular monthly meeting. Also recommended were 11 action grants, totaling \$208,542.

Judge Joe Frazier Brown, executive director of the Criminal Justice Council, said the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission would use the grant to employ a fulltime regional criminal justice coordinator to serve all 25 counties of the region. Professional criminal justice planning assistance will be rendered to units of local government, helping them to plan projects which are compatible with the Criminal Justice Plan for Texas.

Local funds applied to the planning program will be \$2,210.

Counties in the Panhandle State Planning Region are Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hartley, Moore, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill, Oldham, Potter, Carson, Gray, Wheeler, Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Donley, Collingsworth, Parmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe and Hall.

**HUNTING, FISHING, LICENSES NEEDED NOW**

Sportsmen planning a dove shoot or fishing trip should make sure they have two important items before leaving — their 1970-71 hunting and fishing licenses.

The only exceptions are fishermen using pole and line in their county of residence and hunters shooting doves in their home county.

Both licenses for 1969-70 expired Aug. 31, so sportsmen who wish to avoid the expense and embarrassment of a fine should pick up their licenses before going hunting or fishing.

The licenses may be purchased at approximately 3,600 locations throughout the state, including sporting goods and hardware stores, county clerks offices, and at Texas Parks and Wildlife Department field, district and regional offices.

The price remains the same for both licenses. Fishing licenses are \$2.15; and hunting licenses, including deer tags, are \$3.15.

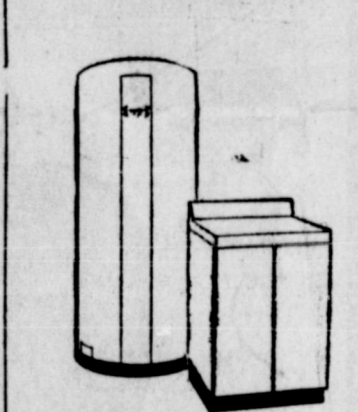
