DO WE NEED A HOSPITAL?

No. 5

(An Editorial)

Few, if any, will deny the fact that an adequate hospital is needed in Donley County for the protection and care of its people.

Senate Bill No. 525 was passed by the Texas Legislature and signed by the governor on June 12, 1969.

This bill made it possible to call an election for the 8:30 p.m. to 12:30. purpose of creating a hospital district with the authority to levv annual taxes at a rate not to exceed 75 cents on the \$100 valuation for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, and its maintenance and operating expenses.

Since we are looking at this election from a standpoint of need . . . then personalities, likes and dislikes should not be considered on such an important issue in view of the benefits to be derived. The following are some facts that we find to be true and taken from actual documents.

Named in the bill as the temporary or provisional directors of such district were: M. M. McCully, Fred E. Chamberlain Jr., Henry Moore, Jane Bownds, Charlotte M. Adams, J. R. Bartlett and Rachael Swift. At 3705. such time as the creation of the district is approved. these persons shall become permanent directors and divide themselves into two classes; Class one, four persons to serve until the first Saturday in April next following; Class two, three persons to serve until the first Saturday in April of the following year. Successors shall be appointed by the Commissioners Court for the two

The bill also points out that all district taxes shall be assessed and collected on county tax values in the same manner as provided by law with relation to county

For the benefit of residents residing within the City of Clarendon, the present 10 percent hospital tax on city property would be dropped when the hospital district

Our present hospital is licensed to operate until 1971 for general hospital care but will not be qualified to participate in the medicare program if a hospital district GALLOWAY BULLS ARE is not formed. The physical structure of the present hospital does not meet medicare requirements. Since the greater portion of the present revenue for the operation Livestock Show and Rodeo was of the hospital comes from medicare patients, it would held in El Paso last week. not be feasable to continue operation of the hospital in the red. If it is ever shut down, it would be a problem to get it relicensed in its present condition. No community can hope to grow and prosper without a hospital.

When a hospital district for Donley County is created. the Hospital Board proposes to build a hospital complex at a proposed cost of one million and ninety thousand dollars with 20 regular hospital beds for general hospital patients and a 30 bed wing for extended care patients that will be classified under the medicare or medicaid program. Taylor, Mrs. Eva Rhode, and retirement of bonds . . . and the voting of bonds not to exceed \$590,000. It will be necessary for the Hospital Board to apply for a loan for additional money from the Housing & Urban Development Agency of the U. S. Government.

The higher the loan obtained will reduce the amount of bonds to be sold. The loan itself will be in the form of revenue bonds which will be repaid mostly from the extended care unit of the hospital (money from the melicare program). The law definitely forbids the use of tax money to repay revenue bonds.

There are numerous questions to be answered if and when the district is created. A number of these questions are in regard to possible plans and proposals which can only materalize after such an election.

Since they are not an actuality, you and I. the citizens of Donley County can make our requests known in regard to building structure, administration etc., to the governing authority, the Hospital Board, through letters, personal contacts and petitions if necessary to have a voice in the setting up and operation of a hospital that will be an asset to our county and not a point of confusion.

In order that you, our readers, may have a clearer picture of the entire proposition, more explanations will be forthcoming between now and election time.

The annual period for enrolling in the supplemental medical insurance program under Medicare will end on March 31, 1970, according to Travis C. Briggs, manager of the Amarillo social security office. This will be the last opportunity for many persons over 65 to become eligible for the doctor bill part of Medicare. Those enrolling during this period will have this coverage ef-

fective July 1, 1970. This part of Medicare helps pay doctor bils and other related medical services and is separate from the hospital part of the law. The medical part is paid for by the participants paying \$4 a month -which will increase to \$5.30 in July - with the government Ferol, why didn't you move matching the costs from general revenues.





Discussing the local area effects of Mr. Blounts new order, Postmaster McCully explained: This should be especially beneficial to people who do not have transportation to get to the Post Office or who have to rely on other people to transact their postal

To get the new service it is only necessary that those living in the eligible areas ask their postmasters to provide it, and must want the home service.

Under Mr. Blount's order, those living less than a quarter mile from the post office will continue to pick up their mail at these offices.

"But," the postmaster noted 'that's no more than a few blocks. This order, however, will make the home deliveries avaiabe wherever desired by the ma jority of those living beyond a

'This distance factor can be significant for much of the year in areas where severe weather conditions prevail; in areas where numbers of older persons are living, or in more remote sections where even a little distance may mean a lot in terms of travel difficulties. expansion of service

should be virtually complete in all of the affected delivery servce areas - under actions taken by postal regional offices, acting recommendations of local postmasters - by February 1. It will be accomplished prin-

cipally by adding delivery stops to already existing rural delivery routes, or by expanding the area served by some shorter rural route for the purpose, and, a limited number of new rural routes may also be needed in other instances.

The fact that fewer persons will be calling at post offices for their mail will not alter the independent status of any of the post offices where the service change is provided.
