Bronchos In State Finals At Austin

Bronchos Conquer Farwell and Seagraves For Regional Title

The Clarendon Bronchos defeated two fine teams at Lubbock Saturday to win the Regional Class A Basketball Tournament and the privilege of returning to the State Tournament in Austin for the second year in a row. In both games the Bronchos proved their ability, retaining their poise, and refusing to lose their composure under pressure.

Clarendon opened the Class A tournament play with Farwell as their opponent. The Bronchos managed to close each quarter with a good lead. The first period ended 17-9 and by halftime the count was 34-19. The third quarter ended 48-33 and the final score stood at 64-54. Charles Louis was high point man with 22 to his credit. Wayne Carter dropped in 17, Jim Moore 13, and Steve Adams 8. High point man for Farwell was Greg Hargraves with 21 points.

Every man on the team did a fine job. Defensively the team played an outstanding game. And though in season play it is hard to give each the credit he deserves, Bennie Reese, played a fine game.

Saturday night the Bronchos met Seagraves for the regional title. The first quarter ended with Broncho fans holding their breath for Clarendon trailed 20-

26. By halftime a recovery had been made but not a substantial lead, 39-36. The third period saw a 54-47 count and the game ended 64-57. But the score by quarters was no clear picture of the game. The ball changed hands many, many times and the score favored first one team and then the other — only a few points making the difference. Again the experience, poise, and training given the team by Coach Carl Irlbeck along with their determination helped win the game. Louis dropped in 26 points, Reese 12, Adams 10, Carter 9, and Moore 7. High for Seagraves were Bob Miller and Eddie Knight with 14 points each.

The Bronchos are to be congratulated on their fine ball handling and their Coach for instilling into the team the principles of good basketball, teamwork, sportsmanship, and fair play. Few breaks came their way. The team played the game and won on their merits.

Clarendon placed two men on the All Regional team: Wayne Carter and Charles Louis.

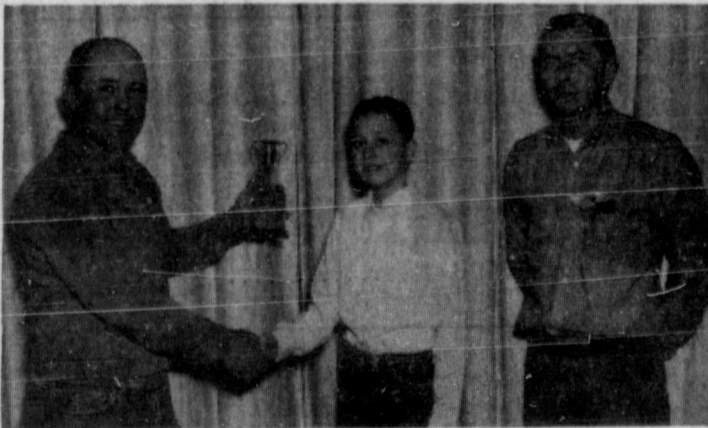

Funeral Services For Mrs. Homer Glascoe Held Wednesday

Funeral services for Mrs. Adelaide Hastie Glascoe, 95, a resident of Clarendon since 1911, were held at 3 p.m. Wednesday, March 4, 1970 in The Episcopal Church of St. John The Baptist with The Right Reverend George Quarterman officiating. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery under the direction of Murphy Funeral Home.

Mrs. Glascoe died Monday March 2, in Adair Hospital after an illness of several weeks. She was born August 16, 1874 in Chicago, Illinois and married Homer Glascoe. Mr. Glascoe preceded her in death February 5, 1936.

The Glascoes came to Clarendon in 1911. Mrs. Glascoe did general clerical work as well as serving as librarian and teaching Kindergarten. Her husband was President of the Farmers State Bank and served as Postmaster in earlier years. Mrs. Glascoe helped organize Les Beaux Arts Club in Clarendon, and was a member of the Eastern Star for over fifty years. She was a member of the Episcopal Church of Saint John The Baptist in Clarendon.

Survivors include a nephew, Robert Broad of Minneapolis, Minnesota.

To Play Itasca In First Game Saturday Morning at 10 a.m.

The Clarendon Bronchos open their State basketball play at Austin Saturday morning March 7 with Itasca as their opponent. The game will be played in Gregory Gym on the University of Texas campus at 10 a.m. In the earlier morning game Kennard and Deweyville will be playing a 8:30.

Of the four teams in Class A, the Clarendon Bronchos are the only team returning from last year's play. Deweyville defeated Friendswood (winner of the state title last year) in a double overtime to win Regional finals. Kennard beat West Sabine (also a contender at State last year) and Itasca beat Detroit, a team Clarendon played last year. The

Bronchos lost to Friendswood in their first game at Austin last year. Itasca holds a 27-6 season record; Kennard a 41-0 record; and Deweyville a 31-5 record. The Bronchos will enter the State play-off with a 27-2 record.

The winners of the two morning games will play Saturday night at 8:30 for State Championship. The Bronchos plan to be ready for these games and expect to put forth their best effort for the State Title has been their dream and goal the past year. 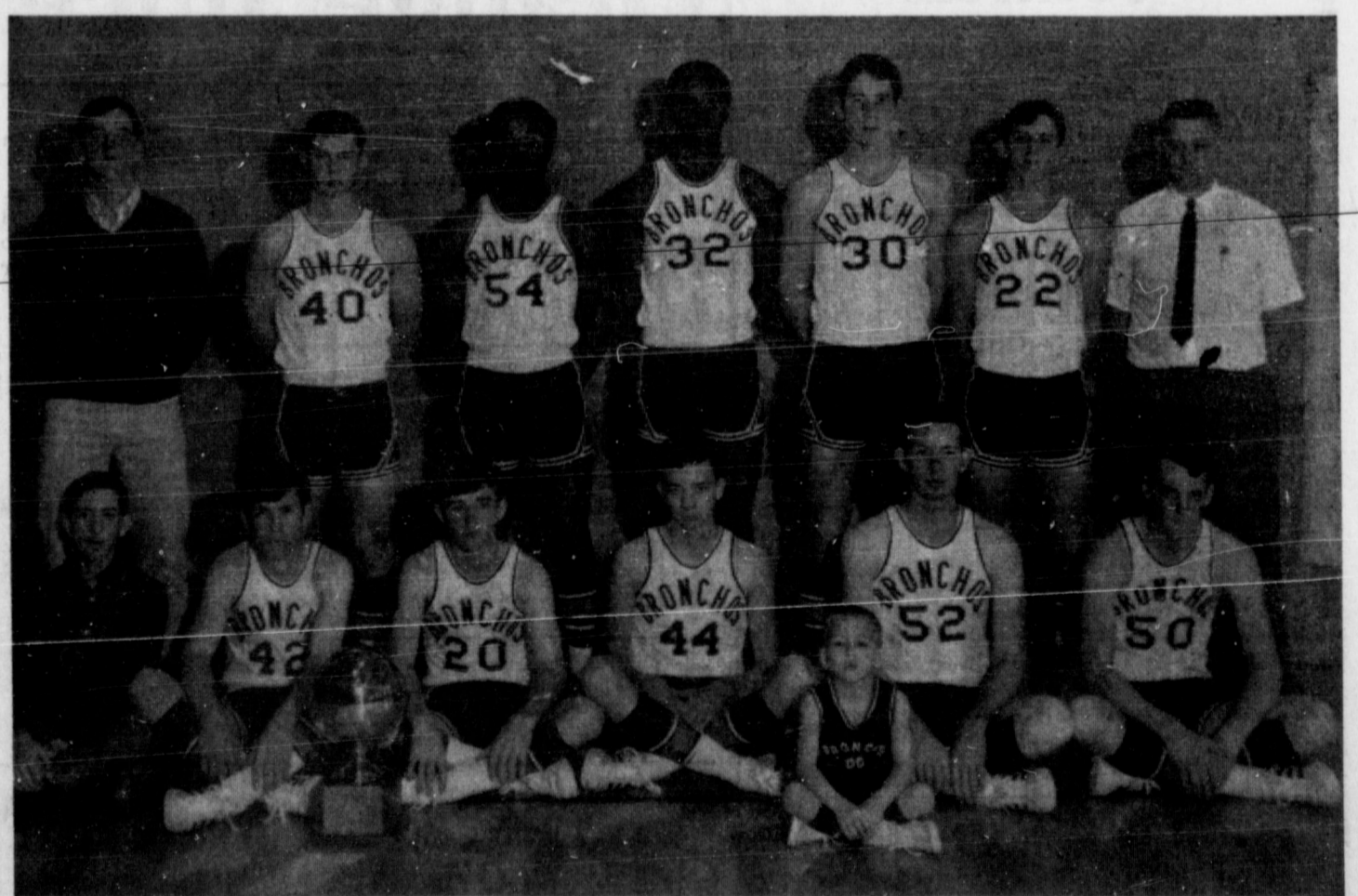

1970 Farm Program Signups

Only two weeks remain in the signup period for the cotton, feed grain, and wheat programs. To date, approximately one-half of the eligible producers have signed up. This doesn't leave much time and we will probably be very busy the last few days. We urge you to come in now and avoid the last minute rush.

1970 Feed Grain Program

The minimum diversion required for program participation is 20% of the farm's feed grain base. No payment will be made for this first 20% diversion, except for small farms. Small farms are those with bases of 25 acres or less including those which have been temporarily reduced to 25 acres for one year.

Payments will be made for additional diversion of feed grains. The maximum acreage that can be diverted for payment will be the larger of 30 percent of the feed grain base or 25 acres less the minimum 20% diversion. This means that farms with bases of less than 50 acres can divert a total of 25 acres and plant the difference to feed grains.

Production Records

Farmers may now begin bringing in cotton production records for the years 1967, 1968, and 1969. Farmers will be required to furnish these records, as we will not have any gin records here in the office. We do not have any information concerning the 1971 program other than we do know we will need these records. So, bring them in as soon as it is convenient for you to do so.

Cotton Reapportionment

Monday, March 9, is the last day for cotton producers to release cotton acreage they do not plan to use. This is also the deadline for requesting extra cotton from any that is released. Don't let this day slip by if you plan to release or request cotton.

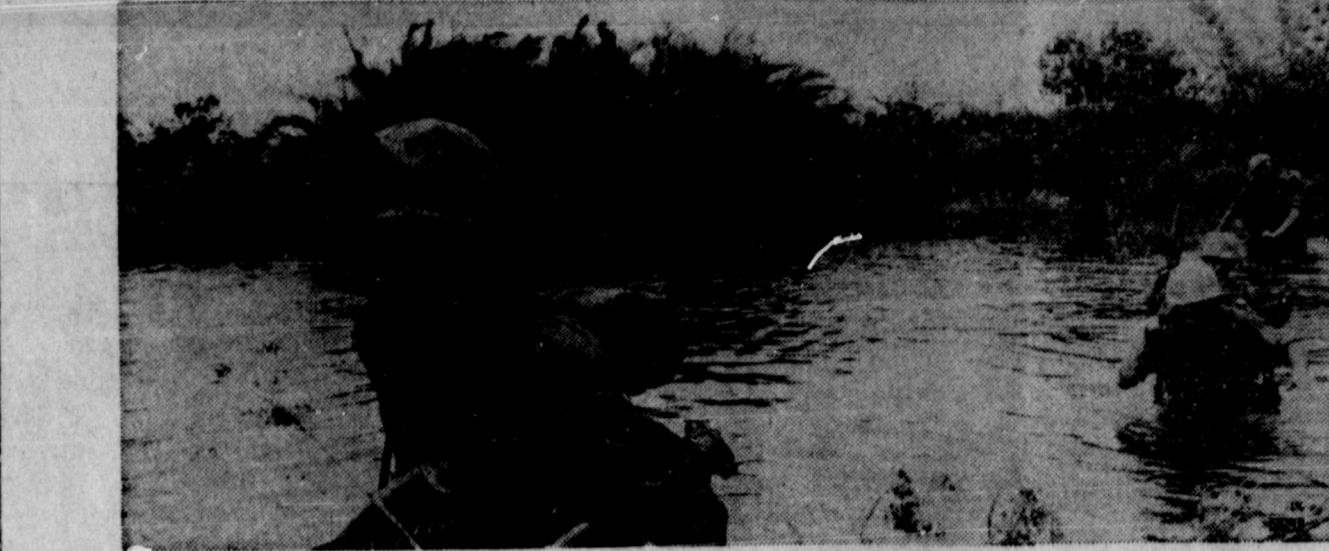

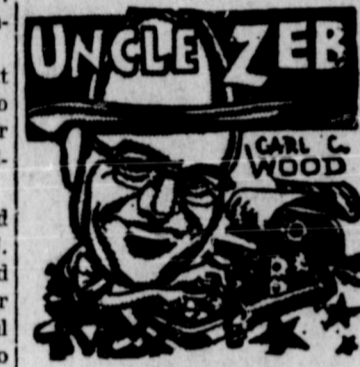

THE SPRINGER SOILS

By Jerald O. Crump
This is the fifth article in a series, describing the more prominent types of soils found in Donley county. A soil survey is in progress now in Donley county.

The Springer soils are very common in Donley county and are found mostly around Lelia Lake and Hedley. Another area where this soil is common is south of McLean. The areas of this soil are generally large and are usually found on moderately steep slopes and rolling type of land.

This soil was developed under a cover of tall grasses such as Little bluestem.

The Springer soils consist of

deep, brownish, sandy textured soils. They have reddish brown, loamy soil, loose topsoils. The subsoil is a reddish brown fine sandy loam about 25 inches thick. The parent material is a yellowish red, loose loamy sand that is free of lime.

The Springer soils have very good surface drainage and have very little runoff. They have moderately rapid permeability (downward movement of water within the soil) a low water hold capacity. This soils natural fertility is below average. Most of the Springer soils in Donley county are in pasture or grass, because this soil is highly susceptible to blowing if left bare.

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"E. C. F."

What is an EXTENDED CARE FACILITY?

An E.C.F. is a specially qualified facility which is staffed and equipped to furnish skilled nursing care and many important related health services to citizens 65 and older who are eligible for medicare benefits.

It must and will be approved in advance by the Social Security Administration, and must meet rigid requirements for participation as outlined in laws and regulations.

Are most nursing homes approved for medicare benefits?

No. Nursing homes are never approved for medicare benefits unless approved for participation as extended care facilities.

What types illnesses are treated in an E.C.F.?

Medicare coverage will pay for extended care facility services your doctor orders for you in any type condition which requires continuing skilled nursing care longer than the treatment which has been rendered in a hospital.

Some of the more common instances of need for E.C.F. care occur with patients recovering from heart attacks or strokes, and during recovery from hip fractures.

How many E.C.F. beds are available in Donley County now?

None in Donley County. Also none in Hall County.

Until recently many medicare patients from the Hedley and Clarendon communities were served by a Convalescent Hospital in Hollis, Oklahoma, but these E.C.F. beds are no longer available to Donley County residents.

Will the proposed new hospital District Medical Center include E.C.F. beds?

Yes. Plans include provision for an entire wing with thirty E.C.F. beds, and for the equipment and personnel to meet all requirements for medicare participation.
