

In a survey conducted by THA in 1969 over 2500 budgeted nurse positions were vacant. In the Spring of this year (1970) over 1000 nurses don. were graduated; yet in June of this year, 2100 registered nurse positions remain unfilled in Tex-





Stitch A Sampler

Holiday decorations that mean the most are the ones made by a member of the family or a friend. Used year after year, they become a part of the traditional observance of the Christmas season.

One that will add to your own decorations or make a handsome gift is a holiday needlework sampler.

Samplers have a history dating back to Colonial days, and mention of them can even be found in wills and literature of the early 1500's. They were originally done by young girls learning to sew. They made them for practice or to show their skill.

The holiday sampler above, an original design by Coats & Clark, is worked on cotton monk's cloth with six-strand cotton embroidery floss. The design calls for nine basic embroidery stitches, and the finished size of the sampler is 15 by 19½". Easy for beginners, it's an inexpensive but rewarding project for holiday needlework.

be a coordinated marketing system that provides a number of alternative ways to market livestock," Dr. Black said. "The central question now is whether the leadership for improved coordination in marketing of livestock will come from within or from firms outside the livestock

industry. "If the coordination comes from within, it can either come from farmers and ranchers who join together and form their own marketing associations, or from feedlot operators, meat packers or both who 'reach backward' and integrate producers into the system. However, once there is a high degree of backward integration, producers will have lost opportunity to organize their own marketing organizations.

The other alternative is for firms presently outside of the livestock industry to move in with organization, captial and management to do the coordinating job which producers should

be doing, the economist added. "Society at large doesn't care who's going to be the coordinator," Dr. Black said, "They just want a high quality product put on the counter as cheaply as possible and an assurance of supa difference to those who are now in the livestock industry,

Some feel they have the answer to the question of who will coordinate the marketing system of the future, Dr. Black concluded, adding however, that as of now, it remains to be answered.
