> Using stripper harvested cotton weights converted to yield per acre, Bird made these comparisons. In pounds of lint per acre, SP 37 yielded 497, SP 21 made 366, and Lankart 57 totaled 384. Yet, in value per 100 pounds of lint, SP 21 moved ahead of Lankart \$20.00 to \$19.45. SP 37 was tops with \$21.40.

> These tests were conducted on at the Stiles Farm; however, these selections have been in demonstrations and formal testing for a longer period, said Calvin Rinn, farm manger.

> SP strains differ from other cotton varieties in that emphasis in genetic selection is practically the reverse of classical concepts, Bird explained. To develop these strains, first priority was placed on resistance and escape from five major diseases, seed and seedling cold tolerance, and resistance to seed deterioration.

Although these traits were given first consideration, strains having poor yielding ability and low fiber quality were eliminated, Bird emphasized. In fact, fiber on SP strains is as good as some selected for improved fibe quality, he added. Researchers have been pleased with machine picking and stripping of SP strains and note that harvesting

Demonstration results in various counties and at Stiles Farm have been crucial in helping researchers realize just what they had with the SP types. Studies at Stiles Farm have been on a somewhat larger scale than other

Thirty to forty-acre blocks of SP strains are planned for demonstration at Stiles Farm this coming crop season. Some foundation seed will be produced this year, but no substantial amount of seed will be available for producers until around 1972, Bird estimated. SP 21, SP 23 and SP 37 are ones likely to meet standards for eventual release,

The Stiles Farm Foundation strives to demonstrate the value of research-proven practices, said Rinn. The farm operation is self-supporting and is under the trusteeship of the Texas A&M University Board of Directors. It was established in 1961,

## Study of Beef Cattle Reproduction Made

Three organizations have joined in providing funds and livestock for a special research program with Texas A&M Univerfects of energy and phosphorus on beef cattle reproduction.

Dr. A.M. Sorensen of the A&M Animal Science Department, project leader, said the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo is providing feed and labor. Chance Farms of Bryan is supplying livestock and hay, and Fair Foundation of Tyler has given funds for research facilities at the East Texas Research and Extension Center near Overton

Sorensen said the project is layed re-breeding of first-calf heifers. The trouble is primarily in the East Texas and Gulf Coast

"The problem is apparently one of nutrition, with phosphorus deficiency strongly suspected," the animal scientist explained "In the research, different levels of phosphorus and energy in a complete feed are being supplied to determine the best levels for optimum reproduction."

Dick Weekley, general manager of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, said resuls of the research should prove valuable to the livestock industry. Jim Eller, Chance Farms manager, said the study will help him develop better methods of breeding and raising calves for sale as crossbred replacemest stock.

Only four of the 43 ranchers used technicians to artificially inseminate their cows, Beverly continued. The other ranchers did their own insemination or utilized personnel which seems to be the most practical and popular concept, he said.

If just one single undetected smallpox case should be introduced into a U.S. community, it could touch off a serious epidemic.

Is it true that a baby is protected by his "natural immunity" acquired from his mother? Some of a mother's natural or acquired immunities, if any, can be passed on to her unborn infant as her blood courses through the placenta that nourisines him, but this inherited immunity remains effective for only a short

In the case of whooping cough, a highly contagious disease that is especially dangerous and often fatal for small babies, there is evidence that immunity is only occasionally passed on.

Every parent, advises the State Health Department, should plan an immunization program beginning at six weeks of age against diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, poliomyelitis and smallpox. Booster shots to maintain complete protection should them by adulthood and thereby follow at prescribed intervals throughout childhood and, in the case of certain diseases, well into adult life.



A taxpayer can have someone else prepare a return, but it is the taxpayer who is responsible for the accuracy of the data entered and for the full payment of any additional tax, penalties, and interest charged, IRS District Director Ellis Campbell, Jr.,

While most tax practitioners are competent and honest, Mr. Campbell alerted taxpayers to these potential danger signals:

Never sign a blank return: Do not sign a tax return prepared in pencil, it can be changed ater;

Avoid the advisor who "guaranees" refunds, wants a percentage of the refund, or supposedly

knows all the angles; and

Be on your guard if it is suggested that your refund check be mailed to the advisor.

Mr. Campbell said a professional advisor should sign the tax return he prepares on the line provided and you, the taxpayer, should record his name and address for future reference.







Dear Mr. McGully:

You have requested that, as financial adviser, I advise you of the amount of tax that would have to be levied by the Donley County Mospital District to pay the interest and principal on \$590,000 of hospital bonds.

In January when the Schedule of Maturities was prepared, it was shown that a tax of 40c on each \$100 of assessed valuation would retire the issue over a period of 28 years. Since that time the bond market has shown considerable improvement and we have every reason to believe that an interest rate lower than the one we used at that time will be received by the District for their bonds. In other words, the tax would probably be less than 40c.

The reason that the citizens are being asked to authorize a ter of 75¢ on the \$100 valuation is to comply with the special Act creating the District. This does not mean that the 75¢ must be levied, but only authorises the Board to levy up to this amount if weeded.

As you will recall, it was the desire of the Hospital District to issue only \$250,000 to \$300,000 of tax bonds with the balance of the necessary funds to be borrowed from the Department of Housing and Urban Development as Revenue Bonds. However, to evidence good faith with HUD, it was decided to ask the citizens to authorize as much as \$590,000 of bonds.



Some housewives, notes Orts, have the idea that frozen meats in the meat counter are of subpar quality; however, this was quickly changed after trial usage. They said the meat was very fresh even after it had been in their home freezer several days.

One of the major problems which must be overcome with frozen meat, explains Orts, is the acceptance of the product by Mrs. Homemaker. 



# Tribute To Hospital Board

Donley County residents owe a real vote of thanks to the Board of Managers of Adair Hospital. These citizens serve without pay, after appointment by Commissioners Court and City Council. A majority of these members have served continuously since the hospital was reopened as a City -County Institution in 1956.

Consider their accomplishments. They sought to reopen an old, outmoded physical plant, constructed in 1910, which had been closed. For six years Donley County had had no hospital whatever, after several brief and unsuccessful attempts at reopening.

With a very minimum of tax support, they have provided thirteen and one-half years of continuous, successful operation. In addition to patient bed care, the emergency facilities have been in 24 hour service, and a licensed staff physician has been available at all times. In this county, it is a rare family which has not required a service from this hospital at some time.

Successively, it has been required that they maintain, at all times, approval as a Blue Cross institution, State Health Department licensure, compliance with Medicare and Medicaid, and continuing approval of various public and regulatory agencies. They have constantly upgraded and increased their personnel. When their licensed nursing school became fully accredited by the state, Adair Hospital was likely the smallest Texas institution to ever accomplish this.

Despite soaring costs of every nature, including application of new Federal wage and hour requirements they have kept the hospital continuously "in the black", have never asked for additional taxes or other sustentation, and yet have maintained a rate structure lower in overall cost to the patient than any hospital in the area.

The seven members of the Board of Managers are named below. They are conservative, substantial people and include some of Donley County's largest tax payers. They started years ago planning a means to provide needed health care facilities. Unanimously they petitioned the State Legislature to provide the bill to create a county-wide district, and unanimously they petitioned the Commissioners Court to call the election for March 14th.

Support them. The next time you see one of them, thank him. Ask him how you can help.


