Election Called For August 29 To Vote On One Percent Sales Tax

A notice of special election is appearing in the Leader this week calling for an election to be held August 29, 1970 on the question of the adoption of a one percent local sales and use tax within the city of Clarendon.

An ordinance ordering the special election was passed by the City Board of Aldermen June 30, and appears in this issue of the Leader.

The ordinance sets out the following propositions which shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City:

For ADOPTION of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the City.

AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the City.

The election will be held at the City Hall August 29 with Sam Lowry as the presiding judge and L. P. Moore as the alternate presiding judge.

The above action was taken by the City Council as a means of raising needed revenue in place of raising local property taxes. Practically all surrounding towns in this area have already adopted the one percent sales tax.

Wheat Marketing Quota Referendum

Secretary of Agriculture, Clifford M. Hardin, has proclaimed July 27-31 as the dates for a mail referendum on 1971-crop wheat Marketing Quotas. The Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938 requires that, in absence of new legislation, a Marketing Quota referendum applicable to the 1971 crop be held. If Marketing Quotas are approved by two-thirds or more producers will be limited to their allotment acreage, beyond which they cannot plant and harvest without a Marketing Quota Penalty.

To be announced in advance of the referendum will be the Price Support loan diversion percentages, and other program details. You will be receiving program information, and your individual farm allotment notices along with your ballot voting instructions.

1970-Crop Wheat Marketing Certificates

Domestic marketing certificates for eligible 1970-crop wheat will be worth \$1.57 per bu. This is 5 cents more than the 1969 certificates value.

Spot checks are made on those farms which are certified and were picked for spot check. Let us remind you that you are subject to spot check at any time after you certify your acreages, so be sure to carefully measure your crops.

COMMISSIONERS COURT NAMED O. C. WATSON TO FILL VACANCY

According to the official minutes of the Donley County Hospital District in a called meeting July 8th and recessed meeting July 10th, F. E. Chamberlain Jr.'s letter of resignation from the board was accepted along with that of President J. R. Bartlett. Quoting from the minutes, "The president announced his resignation to the Board and the Public stating that he had done all he could do for the Board, and left the meeting table and took a seat in the audience."

The Donley County Commissioner's court appointed O. C. Watson, prominent retired hardware dealer, to fill one of the vacancies on the board, Tuesday afternoon.

In action taken by the Hospital Board July 10th, E. W. Barbee, prominent farmer in the Chamberlain Community, was named temporary chairman of the board and Earl Wheatley, prominent rancher south of Hedley, was named temporary vice-chairman of the board.

In regard to progress toward the construction of a new hospital, the board voted to file an application with Hill-Burton for a grant of \$580,000 and also make final application to H.U.D. for a \$950,000 loan. It was pointed out that by using both, the cost would be much easier on the county taxpayers. Contact was made with the architect to make plan changes etc.

In other action, the Board voted to do away with the position of superintendent of the hospital and administrator or manager of the Hospital or Hospital District since the hospital was closed. Termination date was set as July 31, 1970.

The full text of the minutes as released by Jane Bownds, Secretary, are as follows:

The Board of Directors of the Donley County Hospital District met in a called meeting July 8th, 1970 at 7:30 o'clock P.M. at the City Hall with the following Directors present: J. R. Bartlett, Lloyd Risley, John Jones, Ernest Barbee, Earl Wheatley and Jane Bownds.

The President called the meeting to order.

Roll was called.

Minutes of the previous meeting were read.

Motion was made by Lloyd Risley that the minutes of the previous meeting be approved as read. Motion was seconded by Ernest Barbee.

Motion carried unanimously.

The President read a letter of resignation from F. E. Chamberlain, Jr.

Motion was made by Jane Bownds that Mr. Chamberlain's resignation be accepted as he desires.

Motion was seconded by Earl Wheatley. Motion carried unanimously.

The President read the duties of the officers and the Directors from paragraphs in the Policies, rules and regulations.

Lloyd Risley reported the progress of the Finance Committee. He stated that prospects for financing the construction of the new hospital looks very good.

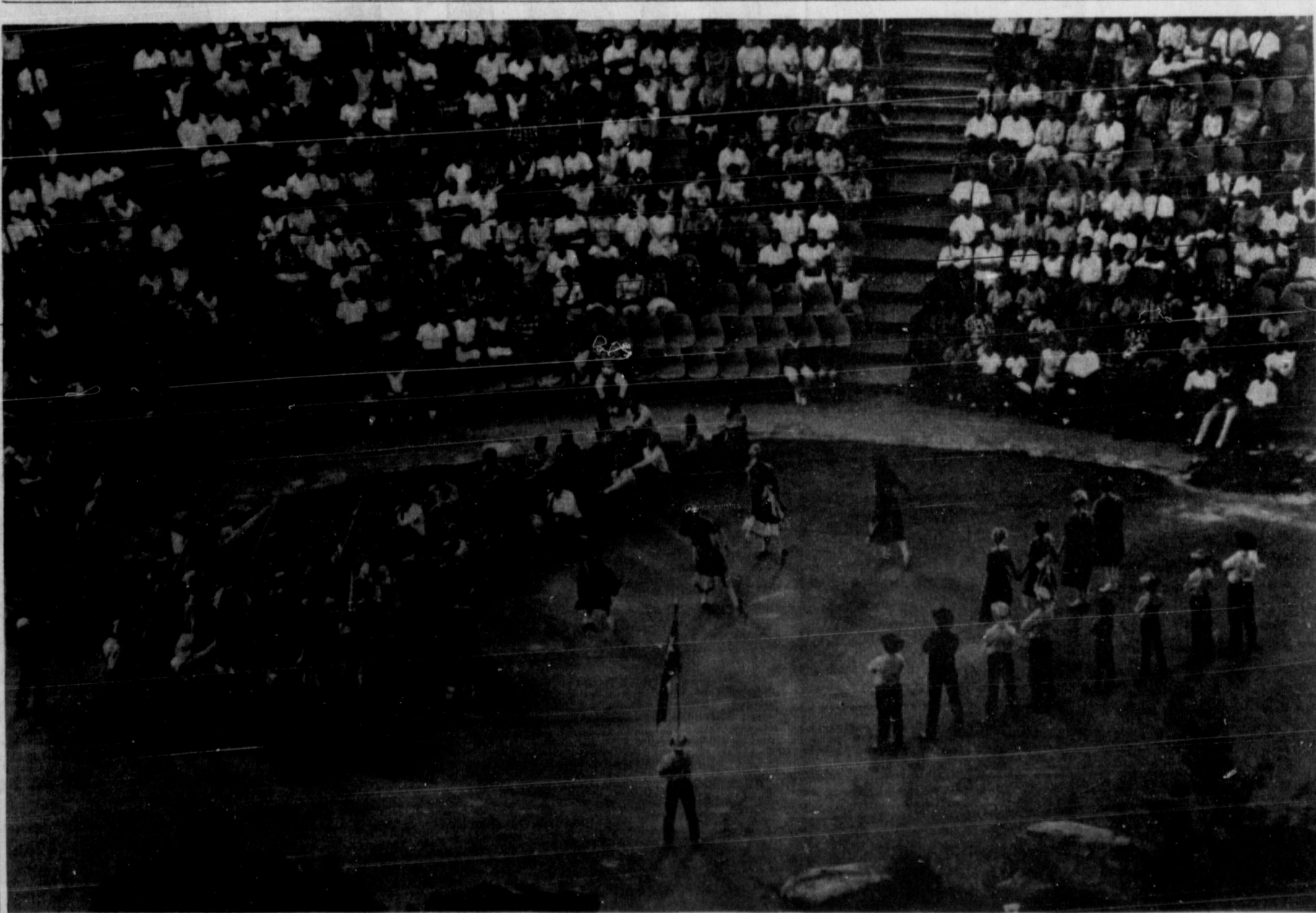

LOST BUOY REPLACED IN THE GULF

For the third time the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has had to replace a buoy marking the location of an artificial fishing reef in the Gulf of Mexico.

The buoys have broken loose when large boats tied on to them in violation of the law.

The lighted buoy, marked with Parks and Wildlife Department decals and painted orange and white, is located 10 miles south of the south jetty on Galveston Island and two miles southwest of the recently burned offshore drilling rig.

The reef is one of several along the Texas coast sunk by the Department to improve coastal fishing. Fish gather around the artificial reefs because of a phenomenon known as thigmotaxis. This means fish are attracted to objects which offer relief from the Gulf of Mexico's monotonous bottom.

rooms should the hospital contain. Mr. Collins referred him to an Assistant, Harold Smith. Mr. Bartlett said that Mr. Smith said that a matching grant up to \$590,000.00 could be received for a planned hospital of 22 acute beds and 23 extended care facility. The Board of Directors unanimously agreed to file an application with Hill-Burton for a grant of \$590,000.00. Lloyd Risley made a motion that the Donley County Hospital District make final application to H.U.D. for a \$350,000.00 loan.

Motion was seconded by Ernest Barbee. Motion was unanimously carried.

John Jones, Chairman of the Construction Committee reported that he tried to call Mr. Donald Goss, the Architect, today and that Mr. Goss was out of his office. Mr. Jones said that he needed to talk to Mr. Goss about the hospital plans.

The President thanked the Board for the cooperation and turned to the Citizens attending the meeting and told them, "You see we are going to build you a hospital."

The President asked for a motion for the meeting to be adjourned.

John Jones addressed the chair and made a motion that since the Adair Hospital is now closed to patients and the work performed by the Superintendent of the Hospital and Administrator or Manager of the Hospital or Hospital District will no longer be necessary, I move that the position of Superintendent of the Hospital and Administrator or Manager of the Hospital or Hospital District be vacated and the services of the present Superintendent, Administrator or Manager be terminated effective July 31st, 1970.

Motion was seconded by Lloyd Risley.

The President read the minutes, of the Board of Directors, of May 28th, 1970, wherein Dr. George W. Smith was made Manager of the Donley County Hospital District and Superintendent of the Adair Hospital until the new Hospital is ready to be opened, and stressed that all members present at that meeting voted for the motion as made.

Dr. Smith should administer the hospital.

The President told the Board that Dr. Smith was out of town to attend the funeral service of an uncle and he thought it was bad to bring up such an issue without Dr. Smith being present. He said that he wouldn't do a hound dog that way.

The President asked "Do you want this meeting recessed or do you want to dismiss it (the motion) that is your option?"

IRS Answers To Taxpayers Questions

Q—I don't think the agent who examined my return was right in disallowing a lot of my deductions. Is there anyone else at IRS I can talk to about this?

A—You may request a district conference to discuss the disputed deductions. The way to do this is described on the notice you received explaining the proposed adjustments in your tax.

The conference provides you with an independent review of the items in question since the person representing IRS at the conference is independent of the office that examined your return.

Q—My boss stopped taking social security tax from my pay. Why?

A—Employers are required to withhold social security taxes on the first \$7,800 in wages paid during the calendar year to each employee. In your case, that requirement has evidently been met.

Q—My son is putting aside his earnings from a summer job to pay for college. Do I count these earnings when I figure his total support?

A—The earnings are included for support purposes in the year they are spent for that purpose. If he spends the money this year then they have to be taken into account in computing total support when you file your 1970 return.

To meet the support test, you must provide ever one-half the cost of providing your son's food, shelter, clothing, medical and dental care. Educational expenses are also included.

O—I'm selling my house and moving into a retirement community. Will I have to pay tax on the profit I made?

A—Any gain on the sale of property is usually taxable. However, you can postpone the tax on the sale of a personal residence if another is bought within a year before or after the sale at a price at least equal to the "adjusted sales price" of the old house.

If you are 65 before the date of sale, you may avoid paying tax on the profits from a home sale altogether. To do this, the house must have been owned and used as your principal residence for five of the past eight years and the "adjusted sales price" be \$20,000 or less. When the "adjusted sales price" is over \$20,000, only a portion of the profit will be taxable.

Q—Has there been any rate change on the highway use tax?

A—No. It is still \$3 per 1000 pounds or fraction thereof for trucks with a taxable gross weight of over 26,000 pounds.

Q—Is there any tax difference between alimony and child support payments?

A—Yes, alimony payments are taxable to the person who receives them and deductible by those who pay them. Child payments are neither taxable nor deductible, but should be counted in total support for determining who is entitled to claim the child as a dependent.

Production Begun On Chevy Vega 2300

Production of the Vega 2300 will begin today at the ultra-modern Chevrolet-Fisher Body assembly plant in Ohio and the first units will head north for dealerships—but for schools.

John Z. DeLorean, Chevrolet General Manager, announced that the first 60 Vegas produced will be sent to the 30 General Motors Training Centers across the country to be used in training Chevrolet dealer technicians.

"Our research shows that efficient service and ready availability of replacement parts through our network of 6300 Chevrolet dealers will be a particularly attractive Vega feature to prospective economy car buyers," DeLorean said.

Vega production at Lordstown will be increased gradually to make sure each unit meets a high level of quality. Every car will be given a road test as a final check on the computer controlled inspection system in the plant.

Chevrolet's new little car will be offered in four models. It is named for Vega, one of the brightest stars visible from the earth. Chevrolet predicts it will "become the brightest star in the fast-growing small car world."

The "2300" refers to the 2300 cubic centimeters in its innovative lightweight, overhead cam engine. This engine was specifically designed and built in America to give a Vega a maximum blend of fuel economy, performance and low pollutant emission.

TAX MAN SAM SEZ

The 1969 Tax Reform Act contained a change that can be important to many taxpayers. Under the old law you could decrease your withholding tax for the following year if your itemized deductions for the past year ran high enough to create a very large refund. However, under the new law you can now decrease your withholding during the year before you pay a lot of withholding tax that you don't owe. A good example of what can happen was brought out by the tornado and storm victims in West Texas. Many of these taxpayers are eligible to immediately reduce the amount of tax withheld from their pay, since their itemized deductions for the 1970 tax year will include a casualty loss amounting to several thousand dollars. Of course the itemized deduction provision of the law is not limited to casualty losses but also applies to all types of

7 RURAL ACCIDENTS INVESTIGATED IN JUNE

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated seven accidents on rural highways in Donley County during the month of June, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed, six persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$3,780.00.

The rural accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1970 shows a total of twenty-four accidents resulting in three persons killed, eleven persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$68,365.00.

During the first six months of 1970 in Texas, there were 1,482 traffic deaths which was twelve more as compared to the 1,470 traffic deaths for the same period of 1969. However, if trends continue, the last six months of 1969 there were 2,081 traffic deaths.

The Sergeant stated, "With a record of 38 traffic victims over the July 4 weekend, Texas is well on its way to establishing an all time record of traffic deaths in 1970."
