Farm News from County ASCS Corp.

Correction! Cross Compliance - The article in last week's paper concerning compliance was in error. It should have read as follows: "Cash leasing a non-complying farm does NOT relieve the owner of the offsetting compliance provisions."

If you are signed up in the Cotton, Feed Grain, and/or Wheat Programs on one farm, do not permit any other farm in which you have an interest to have more acreage than the base or allotment.

Cotton Planting Date

There has been a lot of discussion and misunderstanding concerning the June 10th planting date for cotton. We hope this will clear up some of the questions. The final planting date does NOT mean that you cannot plant after June 10th. It simply means that you will not be required to plant (or replant) after that date if you feel that you could not expect to make a crop.

This date was set by the State Committee as the final normal planting date for Donley County and was not meant to be a cut-off date for planting cotton. If you have been unable to plant your cotton, or if you have planted and lost it, and do not want to plant or replant, you must come by the office and make application for acreage credit. You will be required to bear the expense of inspecting the field. All applications must be approved by the County Committee.

Emergency Practices - Clearing Debris

If you intend to make application for cost-share for clearing debris left by the tornadoes, you must do so by July 1. You will have one year after you file your application to complete the practice. Keep any record of expense involved in clearing the debris. You will be required to present actual expense evidence upon completion of the practice.

On the local level, W. R. (Billie) Christal received the Democratic Nomination for County Judge with a majority vote in the runoff election held Saturday. Christal received a total of 464 votes and Frank Thomas received 300 votes.

In the State Senate Race, Max Sherman was the top man in Donley County with 429 votes and also received the Democratic Nomination for the district over Jack Hazlewood who received 329 votes in Donley County.

Christal will face James F. Hayes (Republican) and Sherman will face Malouf Abraham (Republican) in the General Election in November.

Elm Leaf Beetle Invasion Begun

The elm leaf beetle has begun its annual invasion of the elm trees in Donley County. The first generation of the beetle has hatched and is feeding on the leaves of the elm trees. The yellowish-green, 1/4 inch long beetle or the small yellow to black larvae can be found feeding on the under side of the leaf or crawling on the trunk of infested trees, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch.

This beetle can be controlled by thoroughly spraying the trees with one of the following insecticides: sevin, malathion, diieldrin, lead arsenate or toxaphere. Several spray applications may be necessary to control later generations of the beetle. Be sure to follow the label directions of the insecticide used, as insecticides by design are toxic; thus, care must be exercised in their use, Gooch said.

Hospital Fund Extension Voted

Editor's Note - The following information was released the forepart of this week and gives new hope to the Hospital Board in the possibility of going the Hill-Burton route in securing funds for our new hospital instead of borrowing a large sum of money that will have to be paid back.

The Senate has passed a \$2.6 billion compromise bill that would extend the Hill-Burton hospital aid program for three more years.

It was passed Monday by voice vote and sent to the House. It would authorize \$1.26 billion for construction and modernization of hospitals, much more than President Nixon had asked. It also contains \$1.5 billion in guaranteed loans Nixon had requested and some government interest subsidies which he had not requested.

A House-Senate conference had deleted a Senate-approved formula to help industrial states, but inserted a compromise measure directing a two-year study of possible aid formula changes.


GRADUATES AT BAYLOR

TAX CLINIC FOR TORNADO VICTIMS

As a result of the tornado and storms in the ten-county High Plains disaster area, a tax assistance clinic will be held in Pampa on June 17. The meeting will take place at 8:00 p.m. in the Hospitality Room of the Citizens Bank & Trust Building.

The purpose of the clinic is to inform taxpayers on what steps to take to claim tax deductions for property damage and losses and how to claim immediate tax benefits for tornado and storm damage.

A second meeting will be held in Clarendon on June 18, at 8:00 P.M. at Room 102 in the Academic Building of Clarendon College. The public is invited to these meetings.

Accent On Health

The season of fishing and boating enthusiasm is now in full swing. But those enjoyable excursions out at the lake or stream could turn into catastrophe unless a few simple rules are followed.

All fishermen — experts and novices alike — should know how to swim, should know basic first aid, and have a first aid kit with them. Since fish hooks sometimes "catch" anglers as well as fish, carry needleless pliers, wire cutters, and pocket knife in your tackle box.

Always keep hooks in covered containers. Always look before casting, and make certain you have room to do so without hooking someone else. Use an overhead cast when in a boat with others. It's much safer to fish with a companion.

But when fishing alone, always leave word where you will be and when you plan to return. Wear thick-soled boots in densely wooded or marshy areas. Do not wear waders while in a boat.

Wade cautiously to avoid slipping on unseen rocks or stepping suddenly into deep water. Stay in open areas. Avoid swimmers, water, skiers, and skin and scuba divers. Learn how to hold a fish properly while extracting a hook. Many species have sharp teeth or fins that can cause deep hand wounds.

All water skiers should know it takes a team effort, with at least three people involved — one person to ride behind the boat, one to steer with eyes front, and another to watch the skier and his hand signals. Although skimming 75 feet behind a powerboat doing 30 miles per hour may look dangerous, it need not be if you use the right sign language and follow a few safety rules. Even qualified swimmers should wear a flotation device while skiing, preferably a life jacket. Have a good communication system between the driver, the observer, and the skier. Learn the hand signal system developed by the American Water Ski Association. The skier can use these signals for everything from making turns to adjusting speed.

If you are involved in a boating accident, do not panic. The one most important factor in avoiding panic is training and preparation. Boats will float, and you will too, if you don't lose your head. Never overload the boat, and always insist that all passengers wear life preservers. If the boat overturns, stay with the boat — it will float.

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

The Senior Citizens regular monthly party was held Saturday, June 6, at Lions Club Hall. At this meeting, Mrs. N. L. Jones was honored.





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

### Students Withholding Tax Exemption

The Tax Reform Act of 1969 is helping thousands of Texas students save time and trouble on filing an income tax return this year. This summer students who will not owe any income tax for the year can fill out the new Withholding Exemption Certificate, Form W-4E. This authorizes their employer to stop withholding tax and they won't have to file an income tax return next January 1, to get their money back.

The same rule applies to some retired persons and part-time workers. For 1970, a single person who makes less than \$1,725 owes no tax. This is based on the \$1,000 low income allowance and a personal exemption of \$625. A taxpayer over 65 can earn wages up to \$2,350 without incurring a tax liability. If you qualify, talk to your payroll office, but you will not ordinarily qualify if you are married, due to the community property law in Texas.

### Aids Prevent Disease Losses In Sorghum

The grain sorghum industry is vitally important to the agricultural economy of Texas and anything producers can do to prevent disease losses adds to its value.

As an aid to growers, County Agent Ronald Gooch says, extension and research plant pathologists of Texas A&M University have prepared a comprehensive publication, B-1085, "Sorghum Diseases," and copies are now available from the office of local county agents.

Gooch said the publication uses color to show in detail how the plants are affected when attacked by one of the damaging diseases. Each of the economically important diseases is discussed along with suggested controls.

The county agent noted that growers should not expect one control practice to solve the disease problem. Best results are obtained when all improved practices are fitted into a proper combination with other recommended practices.

### Wildlife Agency

Texas can do something about water pollution, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Department biologists are asking Texans to be pollution detectives by reporting fish kills. The Department has jurisdiction over water pollution which affects fish and wildlife, but sometimes game management officers and biologists arrive at the scene of a fish kill too late to determine the source.

Prompt investigation could help chemists and biologists solve this problem.

Reports should be made at the nearest Parks and Wildlife regional or district office.

### Program Planned To Improve Ag Income

An all-out effort to increase agricultural income in Texas by \$1 billion by the end of the 1976 crop year has been announced by Dr. John E. Hutchison, director, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, reports County Agent Ronald Gooch. The program objective is to further develop the tremendous potential for agricultural income in Donley County and for all other counties of the state.

The slogan for the program, "3.76 in '76," is significant for it marks the centennial year of Texas A&M University, the state's land grant university. Too, the agricultural income of Texas is now approximately \$2.76 billion and the \$1 billion increase would achieve the 3.76 figure.

The program is specifically planned to close the gap between average and potential yields of all economically important agricultural commodities produced in Donley County and will utilize improved marketing practices, Gooch says. Too, the program is designed to increase both the gross and net income of producers.

The County Program Building Committee will set long range and annual goals based on the knowledge and experience of local farmers and ranchers, Gooch said. These will be attainable, he added, if producers will follow the coordinated application of improved practices already proved by research and Extension demonstrations. The practices have been outlined in production guides prepared by Extension specialists and other resource people for each economically important agricultural enterprise in the county. Improved marketing practices will receive emphasis equal to production in the program effort, Gooch said.

The County USDA Rural Development Committee, composed of representatives of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service, Farmers Home Administration, and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, have pledged their services to the County.

### The Obaro Soils

*By Jerald O. Crump*  
**Soil Conservation Service**  
This article is another in a series of articles describing the more prominent types of soils found in Donley County. We are presently conducting a soil survey on Donley County to find out what kinds of soils are here and where they are located.

The Obaro soils are of minor extent in the county, but are very common in the south and east part of the county where the permeable redbeds are exposed. A typical area can be found along highway 70 south, close to the Hall County line. Most of this soil is now in grass, but many small areas are still cultivated especially on the smoother slopes.

The Obaro soils consist of a shallow to moderately deep, reddish brown, friable, silty soils that are well drained. The topsoil is a reddish brown, friable, silt loam about 12 inches thick. The subsoil is a yellowish red, friable, silt loam about 20 inches thick, with little increase in clay content. The parent material is a raw, silty, redbeds material that is actually a soft rocklike material.

The Obaro soils have good runoff and drainage characteristics. The fertility level of this soil is moderate and yields are below average for the county. The grasses found on this soil under good conditions are a good cover of short and midgrasses such as side-oats, grama, blue grama, and buffalograss.

**PARALLEL TERRACES**

Parallel terraces have been constructed on cropland portions of several farms and ranches this year. This type terrace was completed on D. G. Brays' in the amount of 50,628 linear feet. Stewart and Tucker have completed 18,679 linear feet of parallel terraces. Donald Odum has completed 19,147 linear feet of parallel terraces. Also, R. L. (Bob) Ayers has completed 5,876 linear feet of parallel terraces. Homer Hardin is presently constructing 45,641 linear feet of parallel terraces.

The above listed parallel terraces have been constructed with 70% cost share under the Great Plains Conservation Program.

Most of the terraces being constructed over our state are parallel because it makes the job of farming easier and may spread water more evenly. Parallel terraces are laid off to fit four and six rows equipment with no point rows. Construction cost is greater than for conventional terraces because land smoothing is done somewhat like bench leveling. Both cuts and fills are made over wide areas which amounts to bench leveling with wide parallel borders. Smoothing and leveling of the land is done before terrace construction is begun.

Approximately 120,000 feet have been completed so far this terrace season in paralleling, and we expect to do more before the season is over.

Both ACP and Great Plains Conservation Program are available for cost share. Contact your local Soil Conservation Service for information.
