Just now the question is being asked: "Why so many criminals are being turned loose by our courts without suffering the penalty the law prescribes for their crimes.' Ssme are disposed to lay the blame on the juries, who are sworn to try them according to the law and testimony. While there may be men serve as jurors, who are swayed by influence outside of the law and evidence in the case, we are inclined to the opinion they only compose a small per cent of the great body of jurors. It devolves upon the prosecution to make out a case beyond a reasonable doubt, that is, beyond a doubt for which a juror can give an intelligent reason; a failure to do so results in the accused being acquitted, which is no reflection upon the honesty of the jurors. WORKINGMEN SLAIN.

TOILERS' LIVES LOST WITHOUT AROUSING PUBLIC SYMPATHY.

More Men Killed In New York's Shops and Factories Last Year Than Were Killed In War With Spain-Employers' Liability Laws.

The annual report of the state commissioner of labor for New York contains the following startling statements:

In times of war the sympathy of an sey's Drug Store. entire state or nation goes out to the bereaved families of fallen soldiers. In times of peace the army of industrial workers suffers losses as grievous without attracting public sympathy or even public notice. Among the million workers in the factories and shops of New York state probably 700 toilers last year met their death through accidents. Such at least is the result obtained by applying the percentages of accidental injuries worked out la the European countries that have been keeping careful records for many years. Nor does this number include the fatal accidents to employees of the railways of the state, of which the state board of railroad commissioners reported 210 in the year ended on June 30, 1899. Contrast these numbers with the total number killed in the American armies during the recent war with Spain-namely, 280-and one obtains some conception of the dangers uncomplainingly met by the people in the regular pursuit of their occupa-

But the foregoing figures relate only to fatalities and convey no idea of the wounding of the industrial workers for both self and family. that occurs every year. There are probably not fewer than 40,000 injuries all told sustained by the working people engaged in the manufacturing in- An Elaborate News Service, dustries of this state. Many of these injuries were trivial, entailing little loss of time. But, on the other hand, the number of serious injuries was considerable. Judging from the experience of Germany, there could not have been fewer than 6,000 injuries that entailed disablement for a period in excess of three months. The total number of American soldiers wounded in the war with Spain was only 1,577.

In this state the liability of employers to pay civil damages to injured employees rests purely upon judge made law, no statute up to the present time having been enacted by the legislature. The source of the present law must therefore be sought in the English common law and the precedents established by English and American courts. While the essential principles of the law have been invested with a mass of detail and legal subtleties they are in reality very simple. They are deducible from two maxims of the common law: (1) A person is liable for his own wrongdoing and breaches of contract; hence a person guilty of negligence is liable to make compensation for pecuniary damages therefrom if the damage is legally traceable to the negligence. (2) A principal is responsible for gence. (2) A principal is responsible for the acts of his agents, a master for those of his servants, an employer for those of his employees, while they are those of his servants, an employer for pages. those of his employees, while they are for the performing his work and acting within the scope of their authority.

Laws for the prevention of accidents have accomplished so little principally because a vast number of accidents is positively inevitable under the pressure of competition. When a workman in order to save time risks his fingers too near a circular saw and eventually receives a bad cut, it is idle to reproach him with his own carelessness. He was saving time for his employer and taking the risk in his employer's service. The hazard of accident is to be treated in precisely the same manner as progressive business men have treated the danger of firei. e., to be insured against and the cost pense account. It thus becomes a charge upon the industry and is eventually paid by the community as con-

In this state liability insurance has already taken deep root. In response to a question asked by the bureau in the present inquiry 1.078 out of 4.931 firms reported the taking out of accident insurance in some form. Many others who failed to answer the question may be assumed to be following the same method of protecting themselves, while still others who reported no accident insurance were discovered to have interpreted the question as not referring to liability insurance.

If now the law should be so amendevery accident the insurance companies would of course advance their rates for much as such a law would do away with the litigation which at present absorbs so considerable a portion of expense would be small in comparison with the great benefits achieved.


